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# Influence of grain size and the presence of nano-oxides on the radiation resistance of a FeCrW alloy

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## Introduction

One of the most promising candidate materials for both nuclear fusion and Generation IV fission reactors is the class of oxide-dispersion strengthened (ODS) steels. The presence of uniformly dispersed nano-sized oxide particles provides an enhanced resistance to irradiation induced swelling by acting as nucleation sites for helium and as sinks for the irradiation-induced defects as well. While impeding dislocations movement has as result their high mechanical strength even at high-temperature.

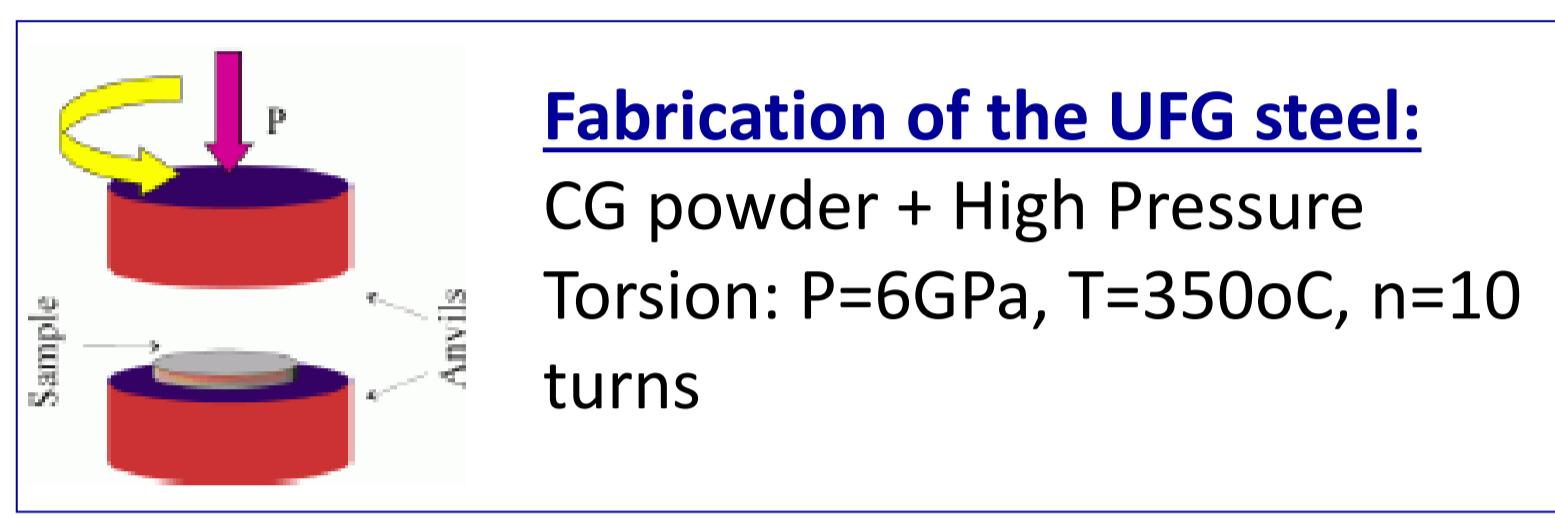
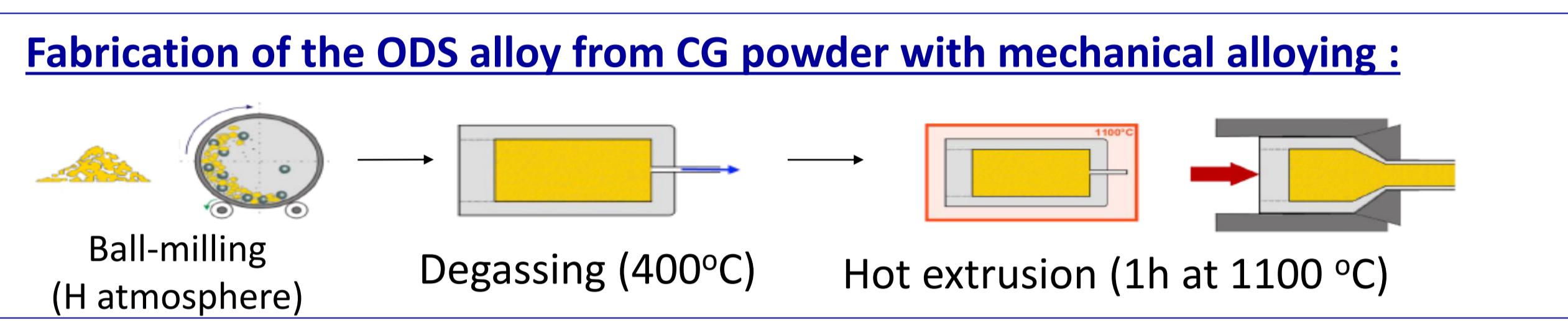

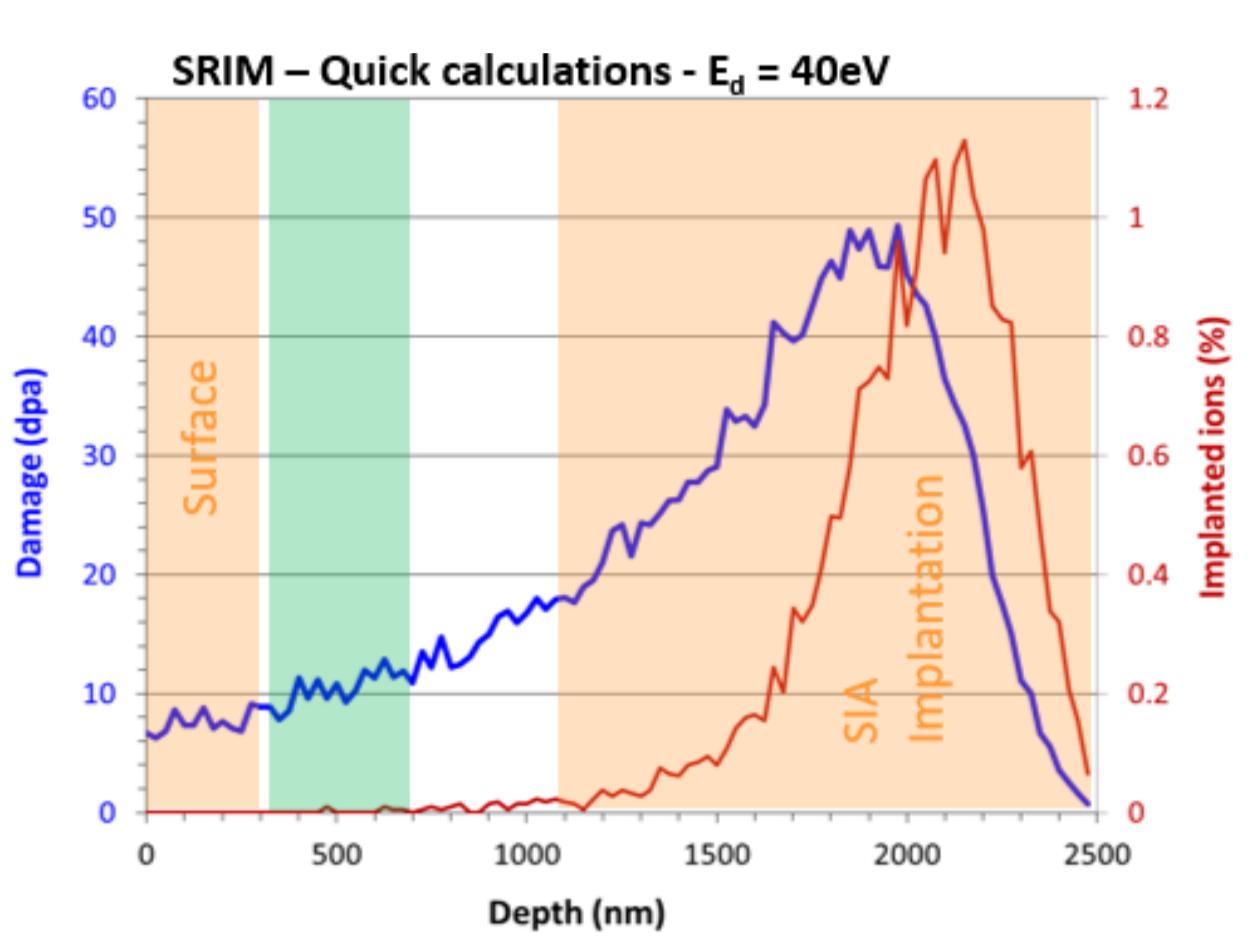

Grain size effect



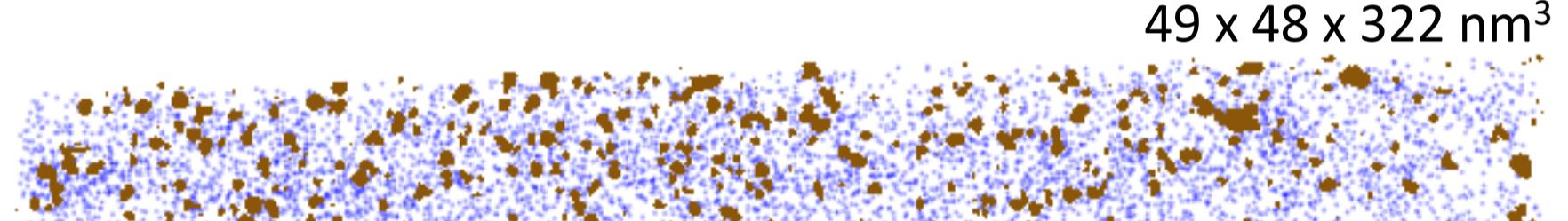
Irradiations performed in Epiméthée Accelerator in JANNUS Saclay with the following conditions :

- Ions : Fe<sup>5+</sup> - 10MeV
- Flux :  $7 \times 10^{15} \text{ m}^{-2} \cdot \text{s}^{-1}$  for 20h
- Fluence :  $5.0 \times 10^{20} \text{ m}^{-2}$
- Temperature : 400°C

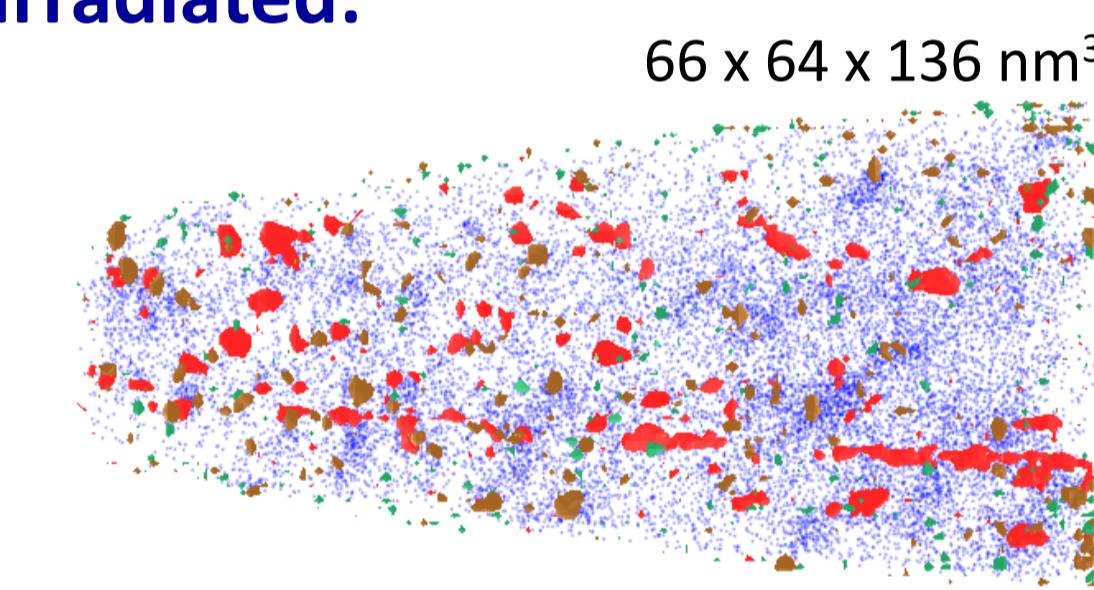

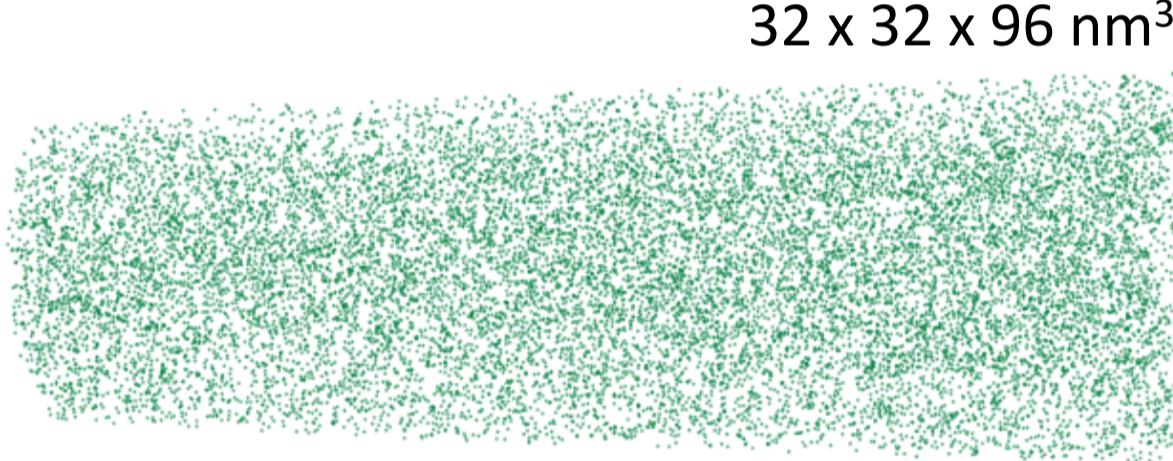

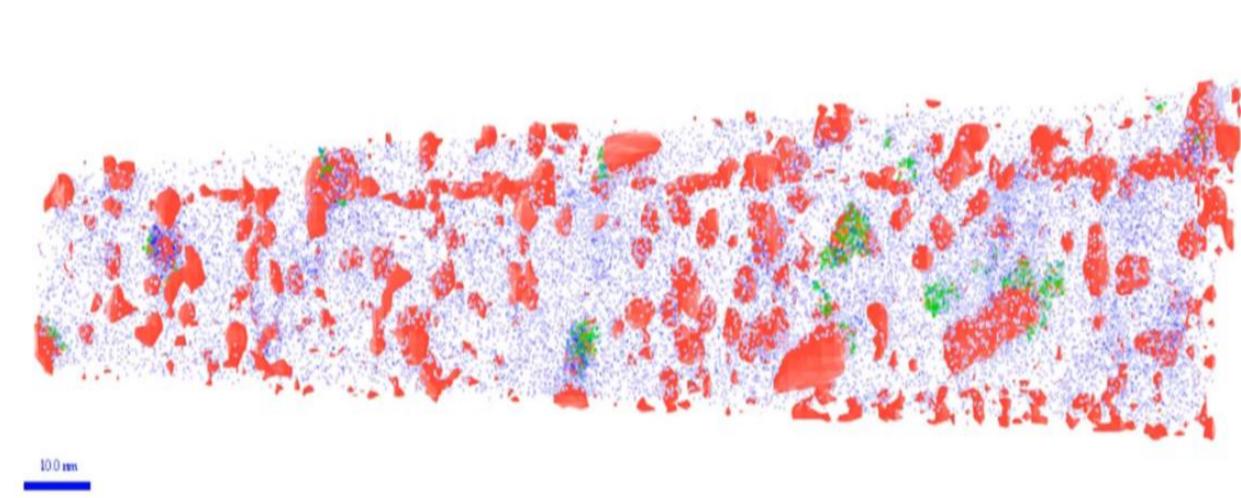

- Grain size: 5 µm

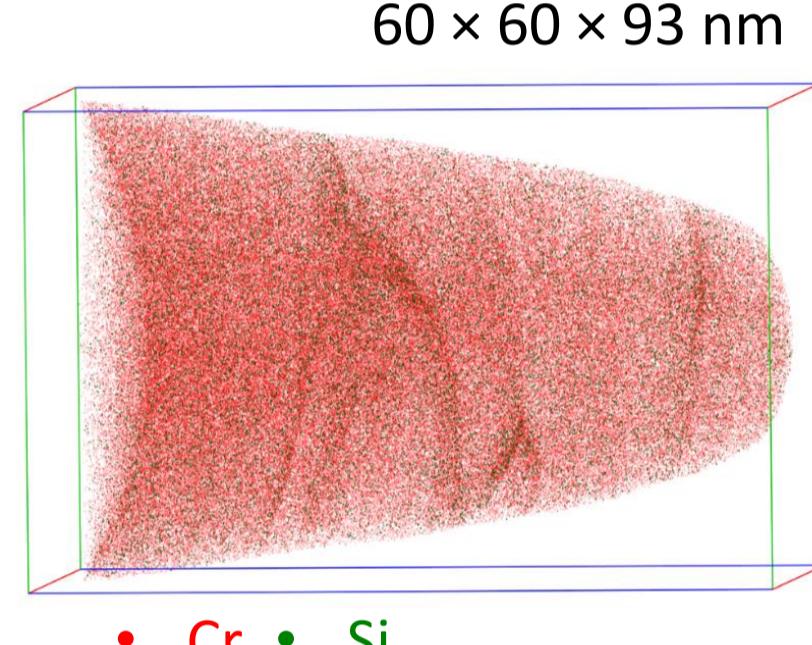

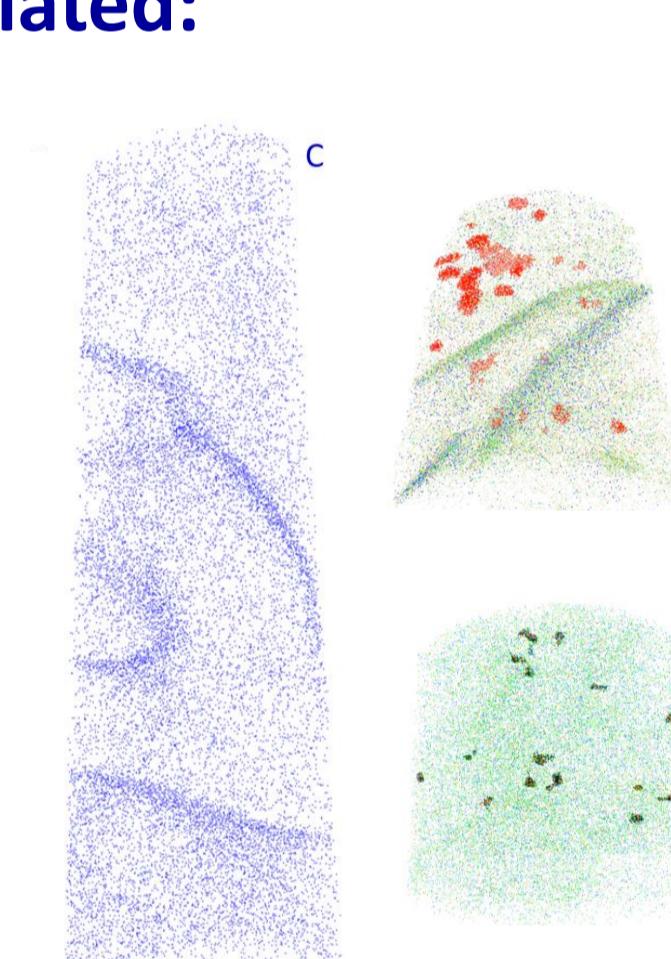
## Ultra Fine Grain

- No chemical heterogeneities in the grains
- Grain size: 0.115 nm

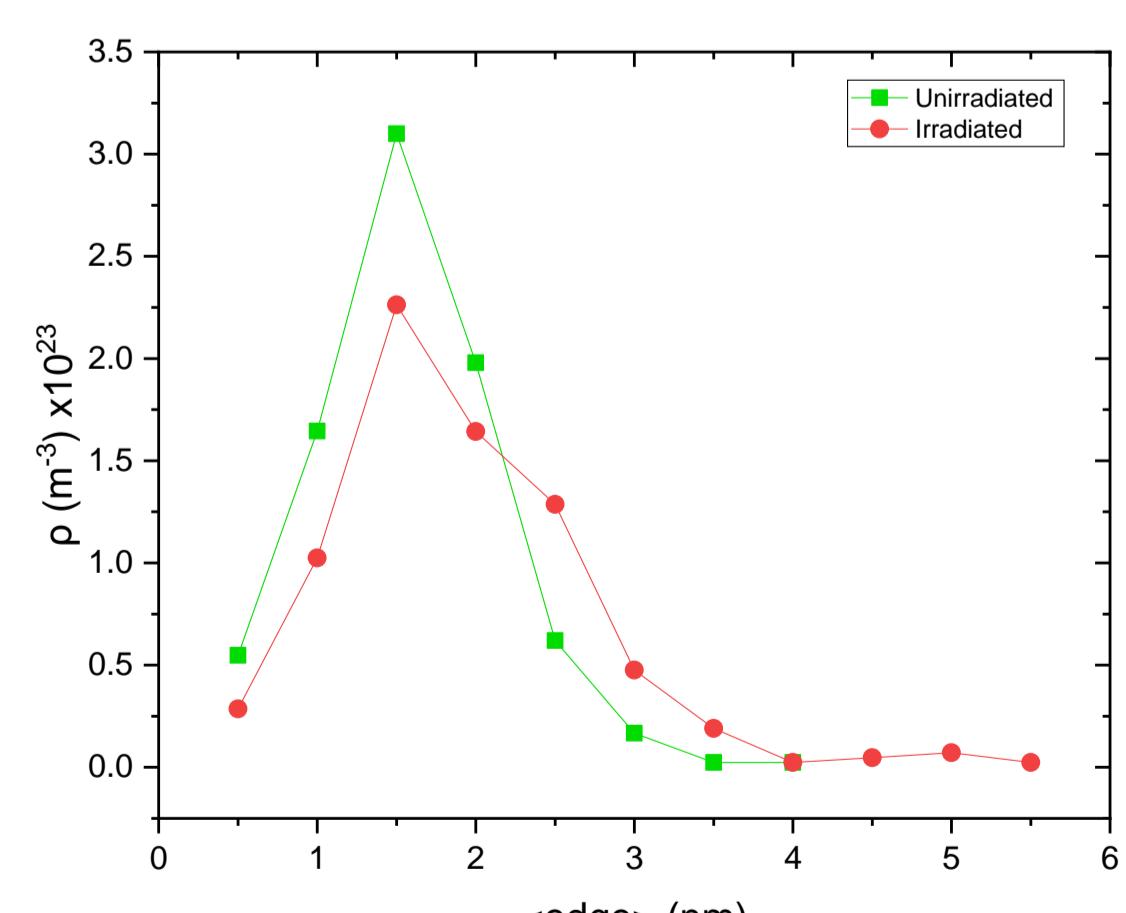


- Grain size: 185 nm
- 2 types of clusters:
  - $\alpha'$  precipitates
  - NiSiMn clusters

## Discussion

### Stability of nano-oxides → slight coarsening

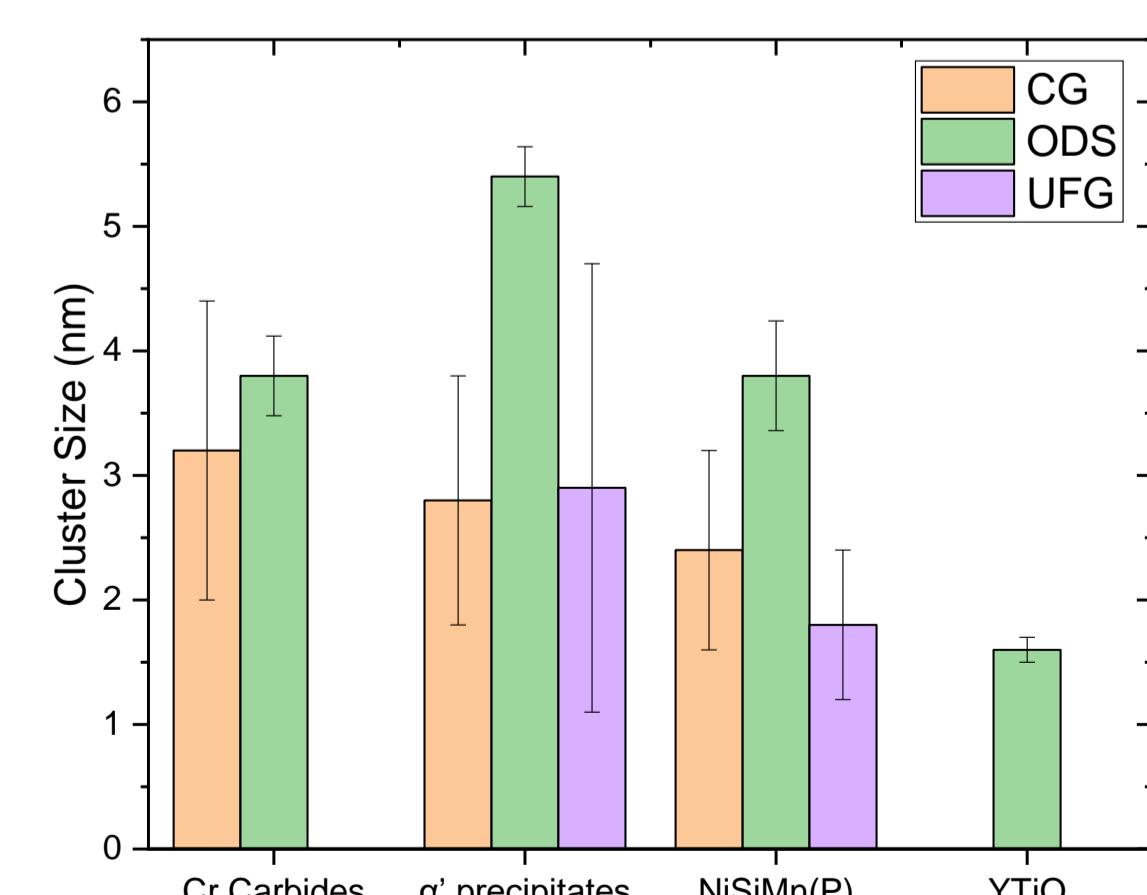
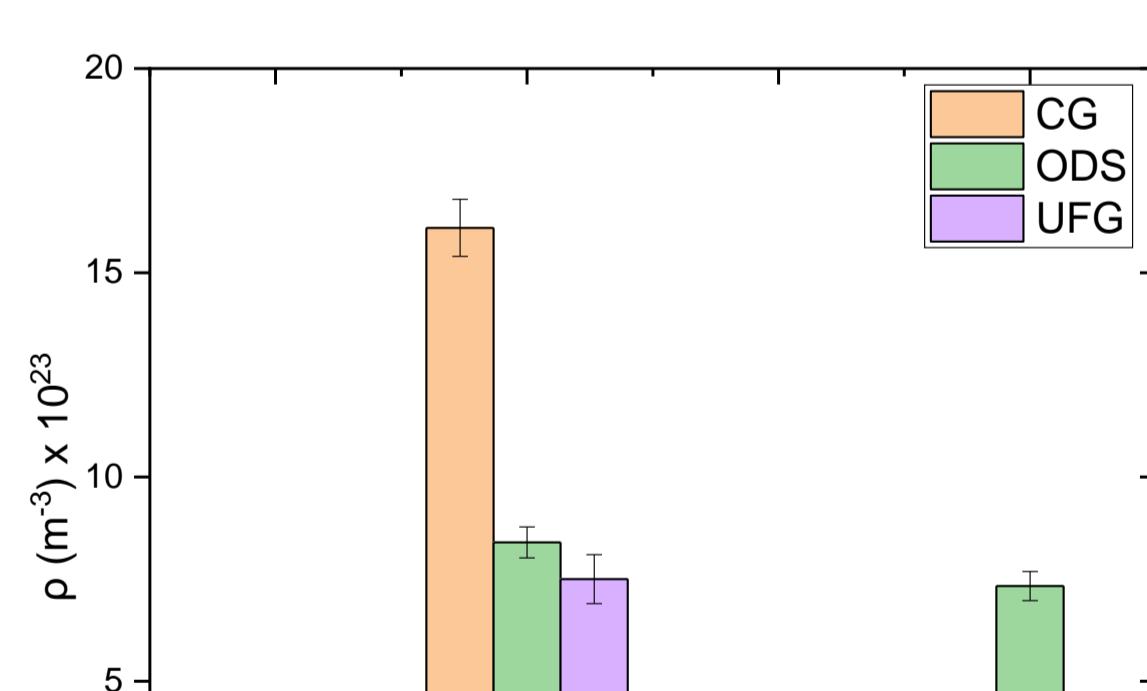
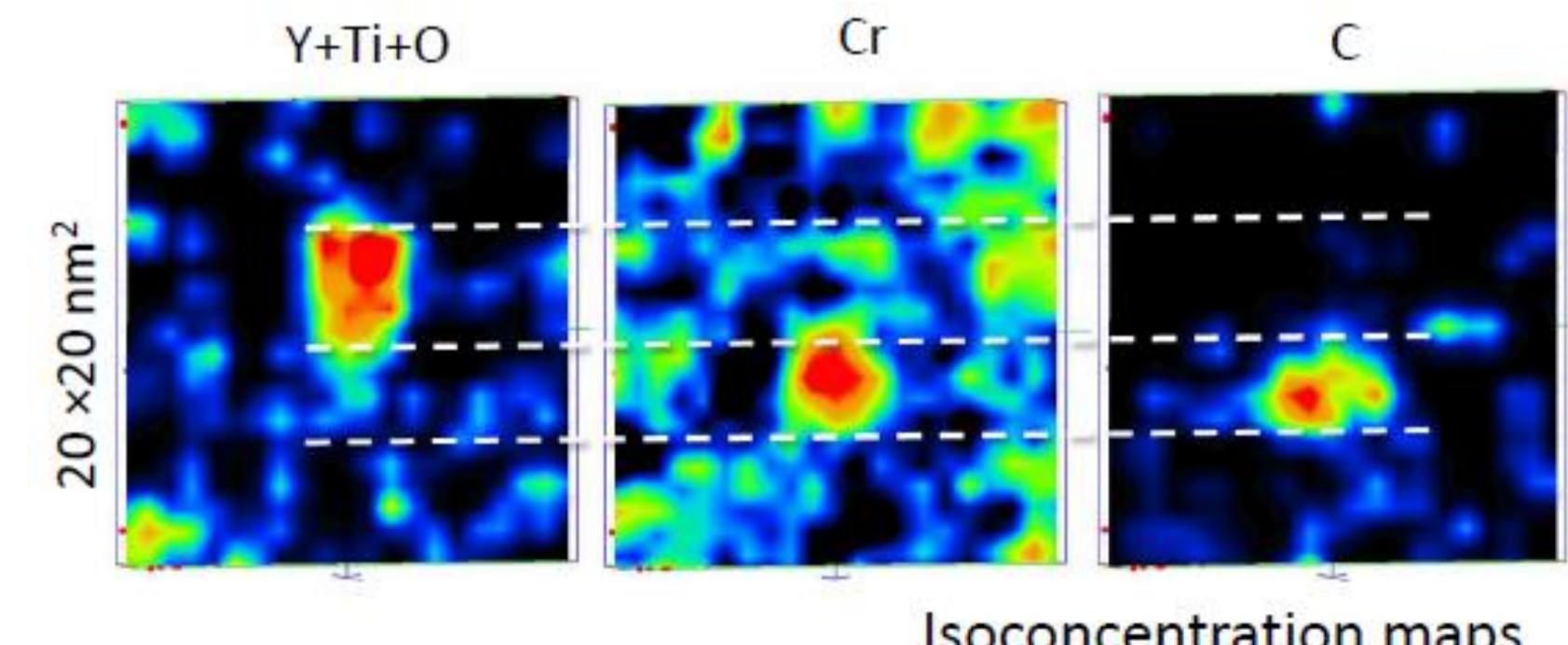

### Formation of clusters:

1. Cr Carbides : Due to C contamination during irradiation
2.  $\alpha'$  precipitates : Due to Radiation Enhanced Diffusion
3. NiSiMn(P) : Unexpected family of clusters, possible mechanism: Radiation Induced Segregation at different sinks

### Localisation of Cr carbides :



### Grain size effect:

#### CG vs UFG :

- Absence of Cr Carbides for the UFG
- No grain size effect (for  $\rho$  or cluster size) for the  $\alpha'$  precipitates
- Slight grain size effect for the Ni family clusters

### Effect of nano-oxides :

#### CG vs ODS :

- Largest cluster size → ODS
- Highest cluster number density → CG

## Conclusion

- ✓ Stability of nano-oxides & slight coarsening after irradiation

After irradiation: Cr carbides,  $\alpha'$  precipitates and NiSiMn(P) clusters

→ Not efficient resistance after irradiation
