

Motivation

The energy transition to a low-carbon society is both a major challenge for innovation and a great opportunity for the economy.

Technological innovation in the field of electrical engineering can have an important role to play.

But an innovation has little chance of being adopted if it is not competitive over its life cycle.



I. Techno-economic assessment framework


Definitions





Product system

Collection of materially and energetically connected system elements, which perform one or more defined functions.








System element

Smallest unit for which data are inventoried. It can be hardware, software, data, humans, organisms, processes, procedures, facilities,

materials, or any combination of these.








Functional unit

Quantified description of the function of a product system that serves as the reference basis for all calculations.











System boundary

Set of criteria specifying which system elements are part of a product

system.











Time horizon H

Study period, usually expressed in years, over which the assessment

is carried out.











Techno-economic assessment 3 Difficulties

- Optimization problem: To be fair, one should only compare 2 systems that have been optimized on the same set of requirements and for the same scenario.
- Prospective performances: To be fair, the techno-economic assessment of a technological innovation should rely on projections of the value of its technological and economic parameters when it will reach market maturity.

II. Performance indicator?


Life cycle cost (LCC)





System lifetime L

Duration, usually expressed in years, over which the system remains integer and usable for its primary function for which it was conceived and produced.







Cash flow

Real or virtual movement of money.





Present value of a cash flow

Value at the present time of a future cash flow, discounted to account for the time value of money.

The present value PV(F) of a cash flow F is calculated by,

$$PV(F) = \frac{F}{(1+dr)^t}$$

- dr discount rate
- t duration, usually expressed in years, between the present time and the date of the future cash flow.





Cost & Revenue

A cost (positive value) is a negative cash flow. A revenue (positive value) is a positive cash flow.







Capital expenses *CAPEX*

Fixed and variable costs due to capital, e.g., equipment, system design, engineering, installation and decommissioning.





Operating expenses *OPEX*

Fixed and variable costs due to operation, e.g., maintenance, reparation, salary of the operator, site access, guarantees and fuel.





Life-cycle cost (LCC)

$$LCC = \sum_{t=0}^{H} \frac{C_t}{(1+dr)^t}$$

- C_t costs in year t
- *dr* discount rate
- H time horizon.

Since all the costs have positive value, the LCC is positive as well. The present time is t=0 and therefore C_0 is the initial investment.





Life-cycle cost (LCC)

Hypotheses:

- (i) the assessment time horizon H is taken equal to the system lifetime L.
- (ii) the costs include only the capital and operating expenses.

$$LCC = \sum_{t=0}^{L} \frac{CAPEX_t + OPEX_t}{(1+dr)^t}$$

- CAPEX_t capital expenses in year t
- $OPEX_t$ operating expenses in year t
- dr discount rate
- L system lifetime.





Discussion

The LCC is a techno-economic performance indicator.

It allows one to compare 2 competing technologies that provide the same service on the same time horizon.

One normally wants to choose the technology with the lowest LCC.

Phase 1: Goal and scope definition

Goal definition

- □ Intended application of the study
- □ Purpose of the study
- □ Target audience
- □ Time horizon
- □ Location
- □ Scenario to be analyze

Scope definition

- □ Function of the product system
- □ Functional unit
- □ System boundary
- □ Performance indicators








Phase 2: Inventory analysis

- ☐ Identify the system elements of the product system
- □ Collect the technological parameters (e.g. efficiency) of each system element
- □ Collect the economic parameters (e.g. capital expenses and operating expenses) of each system element








Phase 3: Calculation of indicators

Modeling

- □ Select the technical models of each system element
- □ Select the economic model of each system element

Characterization

- □ Calculate the performance indicators for each system element
- □ Calculate the performance indicator for the product system







Phase 4: Interpretation

- □ Perform the scenario analysis
- □ Describe uncertainty and sensitivity of the results
- ☐ Provide conclusions, presenting the whole spectrum of criteria relevant for decision making
- □ Discuss limitations
- ☐ State recommendations, if any








Phase 5: Reporting

- ☐ Write the report, depending on the audience and the objectives of the commissioner
- □ Make sure it offers enough data to enable reproducibility







V. Conclusion





Conclusion

We discussed a framework for the techno-economic assessment (TEA) of a technology.

It needs to be compared to competing technologies providing the same service on the same time horizon, keeping in mind that:

- one should only compare 2 systems that have been optimized on the same set of specifications and for the same scenario,
- the techno-economic assessment of a technological innovation should rely on projections of the value of its technological and economic parameters when it will reach market maturity,
- the life-cycle techno-economic performance of any technology can be quantified using the life cycle cost (LCC).
