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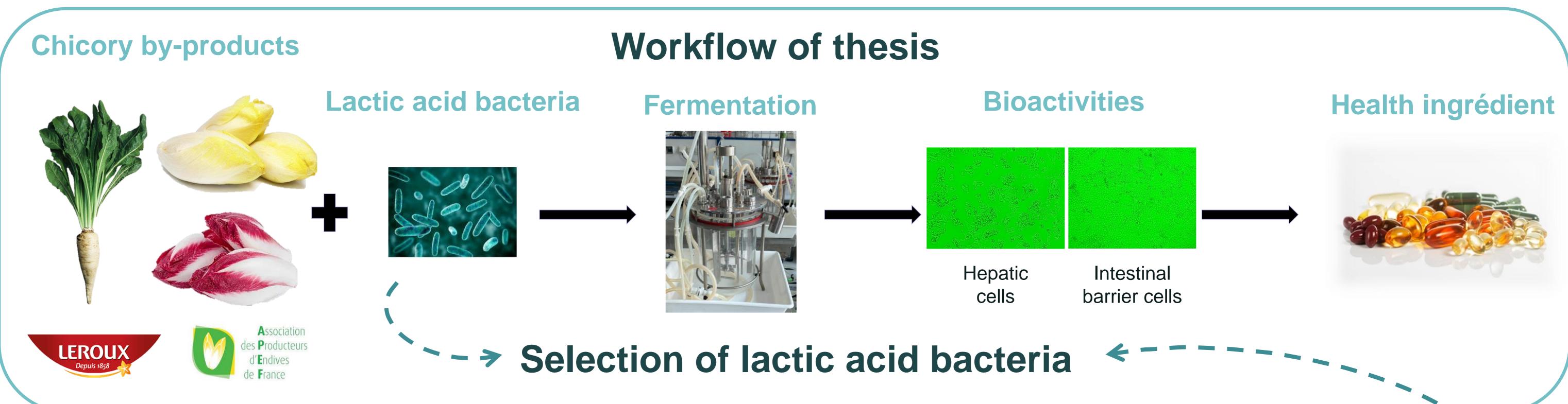
Development of health ingredients from chicory by-products fermentation: first step strains selection

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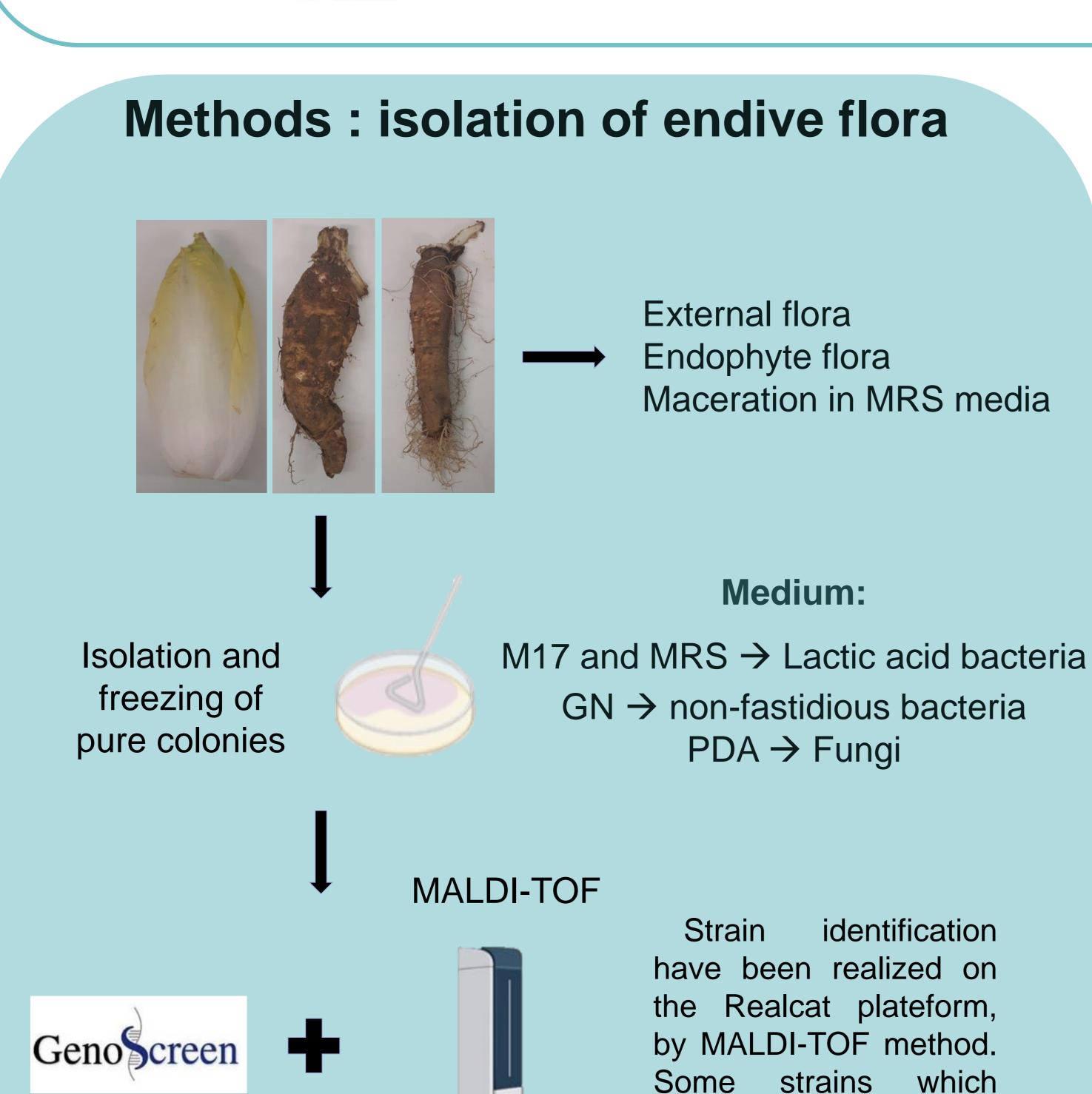
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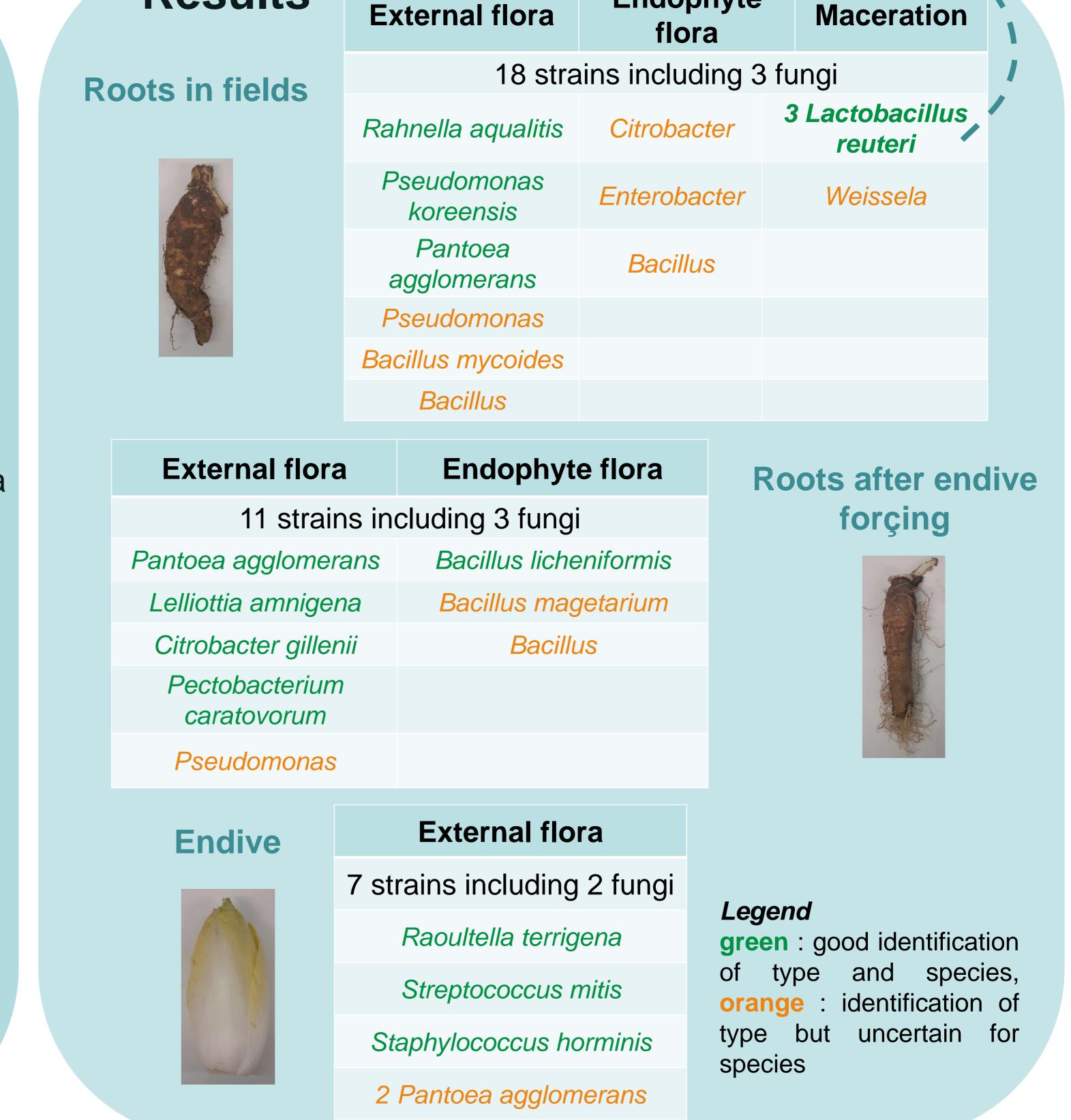
Introduction

The chicory production generates many by-products, particularly in Hauts-de-France, the leader region. It is necessary to valorize these by-products, which can exert bioactivities. Chicory is known to possess molecules such as polyphenols responsible for multiple anti-oxidant, anti-microbial, or hepatoprotective activities. Lactic acid bacteria possess different enzymes which can transform polyphenols. Fermentation of chicory by-products by different species of lactic acid bacteria could release bioactive molecules with activities related to human health. In order to select the lactic acid bacteria that will be used in fermentation, an isolation of the total endive flora has been performed.

Conclusion and perspective

This study aims to find lactic acid bacteria from chicory leaves and roots to be used in fermentation. This study highlighted 36 strains. Most of the strains were isolated from roots and belong to external flora. Most strains come from soil and waters like Bacillus, Citrobacter, or Pseudomonas. Other species are commonly found in plants like *Pantoea agglomerans*, *Pseudomonas koreensis*, *Bacillus mycoides* or *Pectobacterium carotovorum*. Only *Rahnella aqualitis* as already been found in chicory. Most of the strains isolated in this study were possibly not present in the chicory itself but in the soil. However, some strains look promising for the continuation of the project. It is, therefore, necessary to identify the fungi. **Notably, three Lactobacillus strains are promising for the continuation of this project.**These strains will be used to ferment chicory by-products.



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
