Level 1: Teleoperation

The Intelligent Assistance system (IAS) acts as an interface for teleoperation between the human and robots.



Level 3: Autonomous decision making

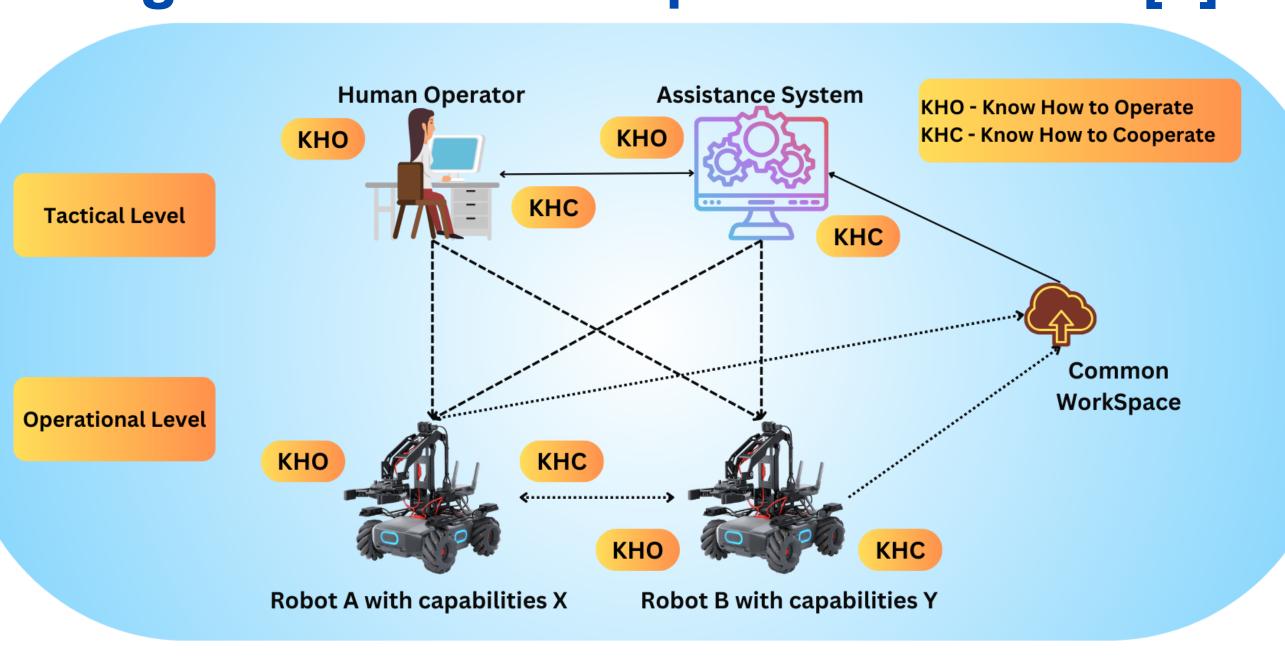
The IAS gains authority to make decisions

strategies.

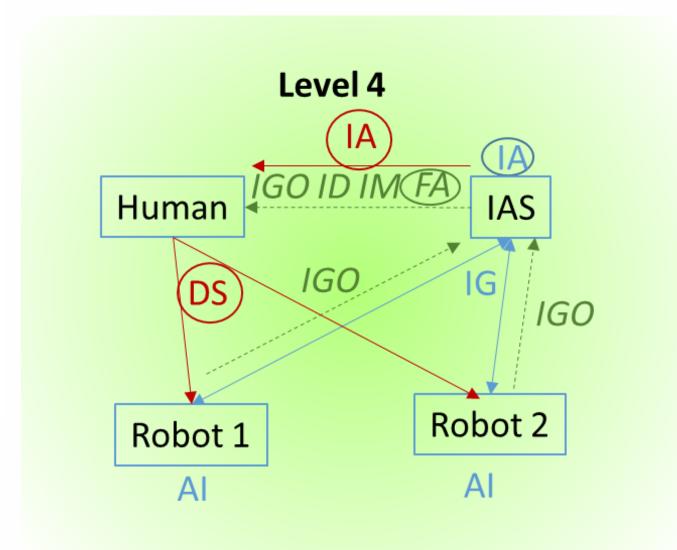
Organization of cooperation model [1]

Level 2: Decision Support

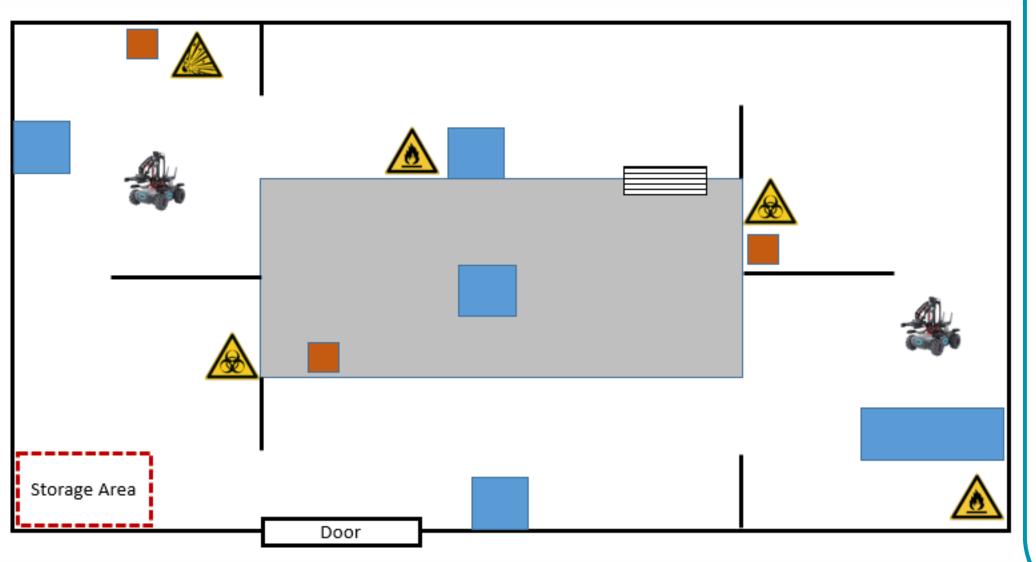
IAS enhances the capabilities of the human operator by providing predefined strategies tailored to the task at hand.



Level 4: Supervised Autonomy

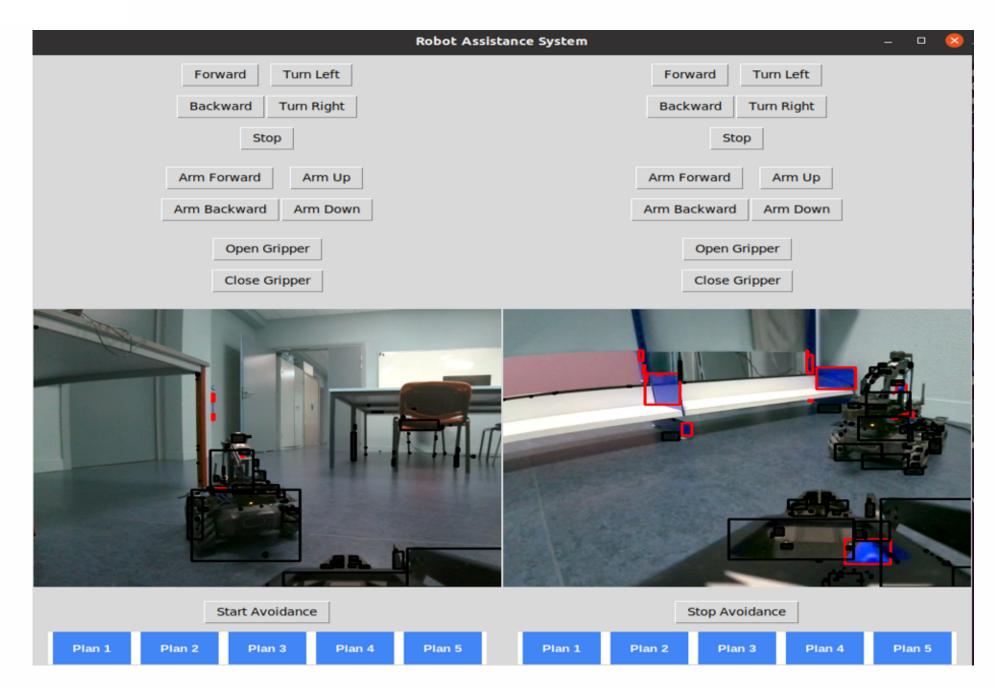
The IAS has the highest level of autonomy, assuming full control over the robots.
