## Background

Measuring reading performance using reading charts requires highly standardized reading material.
Such material is hard to produce and most charts are limited by their relatively small number of texts or sentences


How to generate a large number of standardized sentences?
1 - Naïve method: search for MNREAD-like sentences in a corpus


2 - Ad-hoc method, based on hand-defined templates (Mansfield et al., 2019)

© $\cdot$ Semi-automatic method
Z. Must generate 8,000 sentences to get 1 match

## Conclusions

- Our method provides valid standardized sentences that follow the MNREAD rules and yield similar performance, at least in French. - This method is flexible and allows to customise the rules easily.

This method is applicable to other languages and remains to be validated in English, Spanish, Italian, etc

## Objective

Using the MNREAD as a proof-of-concept, we propose a new automated method to generate highly constrained short sentences, following the stric rules of MNREAD and applicable to different languages.


## - Scoring the sentences

GPT-2 was used to assign a perplexity score (PPL) to each sentence The lower the score, the most "natural" the sentence

3- Validating the sentences
$\rightarrow$ Normally sighted subject read French sentences at fixed print size (1.2 logMAR at 40 cm )
Experiment $1 \quad$ Experiment $2 \quad$ Experiment 3

## Experiment 2

- $N=24$
- Mean age $=40 \pm 14$

Computer screen

- $38+30+30$
$\mathrm{N}=12$
- Mean age $=24 \pm 6$

Computer screen + eye tracker

- $38+100+100$
