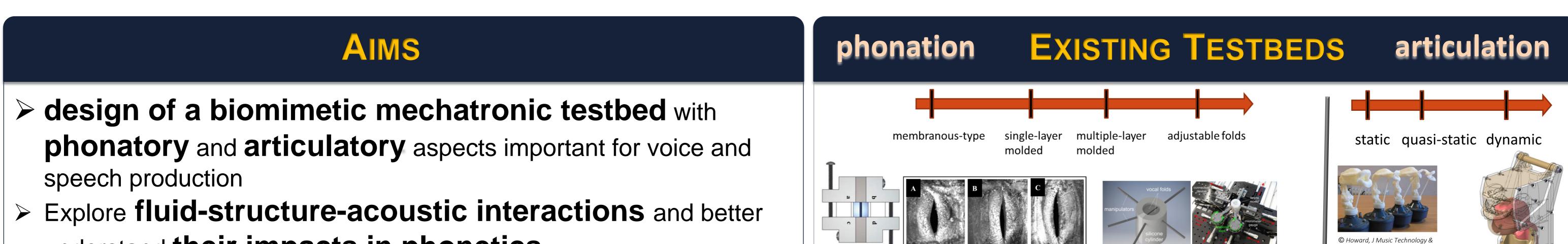

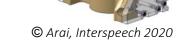

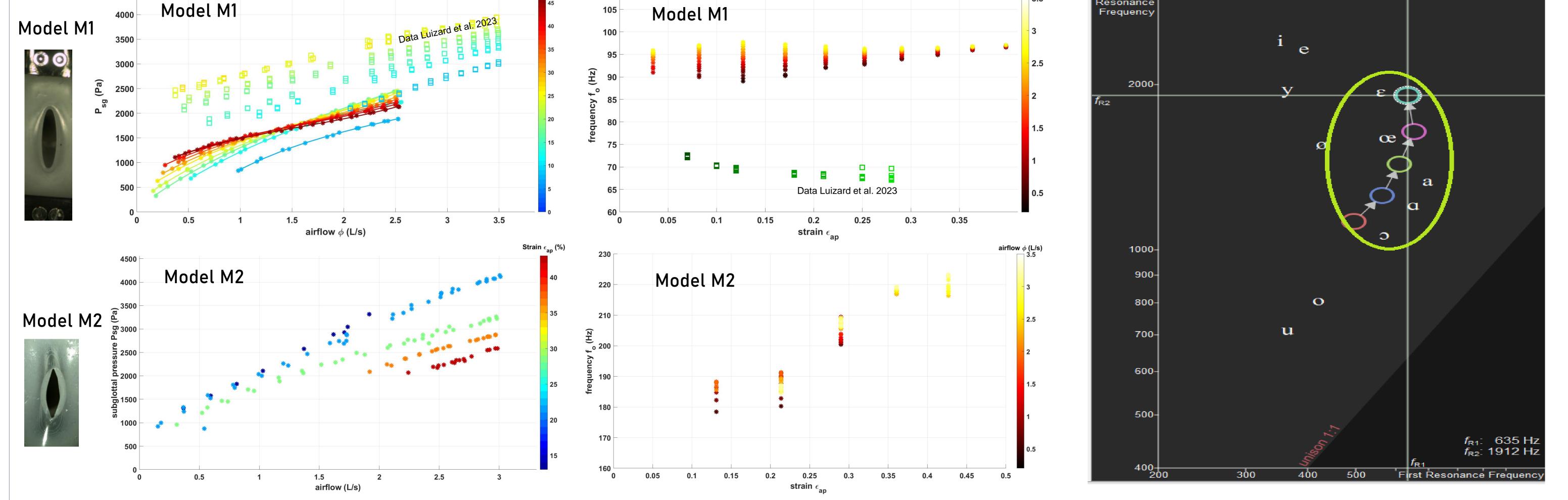

## CONCLUSION DISCUSSION &

**Ability** to self-oscillate with and without a vocal-tract, over a wide range of flow rates and for different degrees of tensile stretch

Variation of F1 between 500 and 700Hz with mouth opening induced by jaw movement

**Increasing f**, with increasing pre-strain in the anterior-posterior direction ( $\epsilon_{ab}$ )

**Factor of variability** in vibratory behaviour is mainly folds geometry

Variation of F2 between 1000 and 2000Hz with tongue and jaw movements

**Baby Pinocchio was able to produce vowels** in the surrounding of [a]
