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Background

Gut Microbiota is composed of diverse populations of bacteria ,protozoa, archaea, fungi and viruses (Tripathi et al., 2018)



The intestine communicates with the liver through the gut-liver axis which affects pathogenesis of Hepatitis B virus infection through release of cytokines causing hepatocyte damage (Tranah et al., 2020)

250 million are infected with HBV worldwide with risk of cirrhosis and HCC (Zeng et al., 2020)

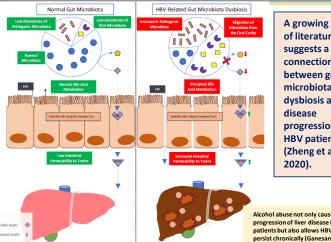

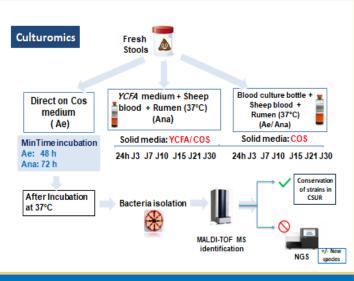

Alcohol abuse not only causes rapi progression of liver disease in HBV patients but also allows HBV to persist chronically (Ganesan et al., Injured Liver

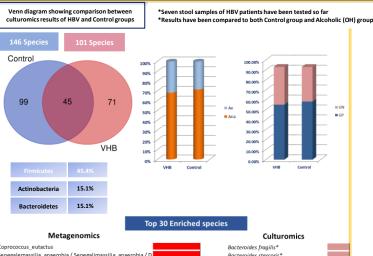

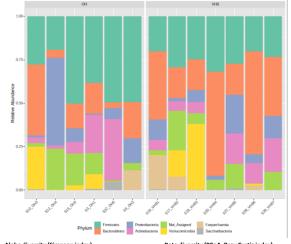


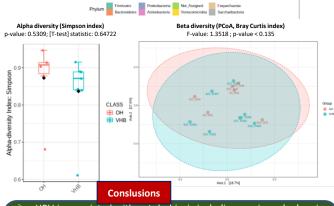
