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Carbon stabilization in soil after organic amendment application – A comparison of two biomass use scenarios

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Context and Objectives Organic amendments are used to maintain or increase soil organic carbon (C) in arable soil. Plant biomass can be directly applied to soil or processed prior its application, e.g. through anaerobic digestion. Two scenarios: Scenario A – Exogenous organic matter Scenario B – Farm internal recycling Application of organic amendments according to fertilizer Two possibilities: i) direct application of plant residues to recommendations using exogenous organic matter soil, ii) prior use in anaerobic digester (biogas production) → Equal application rates of C to soil → Different application rates of C to soil 3.2 t C ha⁻¹ 3.2 t C ha⁻¹ 3.2 t C ha⁻¹ 3.2 t C ha⁻¹ Soil organic C balance?

Materials and Methods

Plant residue and Digestate

- Sorghum bicolor (C4 plant)
- Experimental anaerobic digester





C balance during digestion

Incubation experiment

- Luvisol with C3 plant history (Closeaux, Versailles France)
- 85 days, 20 °C, 64 % water holding capacity
- Four treatments:
- Plant residue plus nitrogen (scenario A + B) (nitrogen addition to reach C:N ratio of digestate)
- Plant residue (scenario A + B)
- iii. Digestate scenario A
- iv. Digestate scenario B

Analysis of soil respiration

- Mineralization of organic amendments
- Priming of SOC
- Fitting one compartment, first-order model:

 $CO2 - C_{amendment} = C_{fast} * (1 - e^{-\alpha * t})$



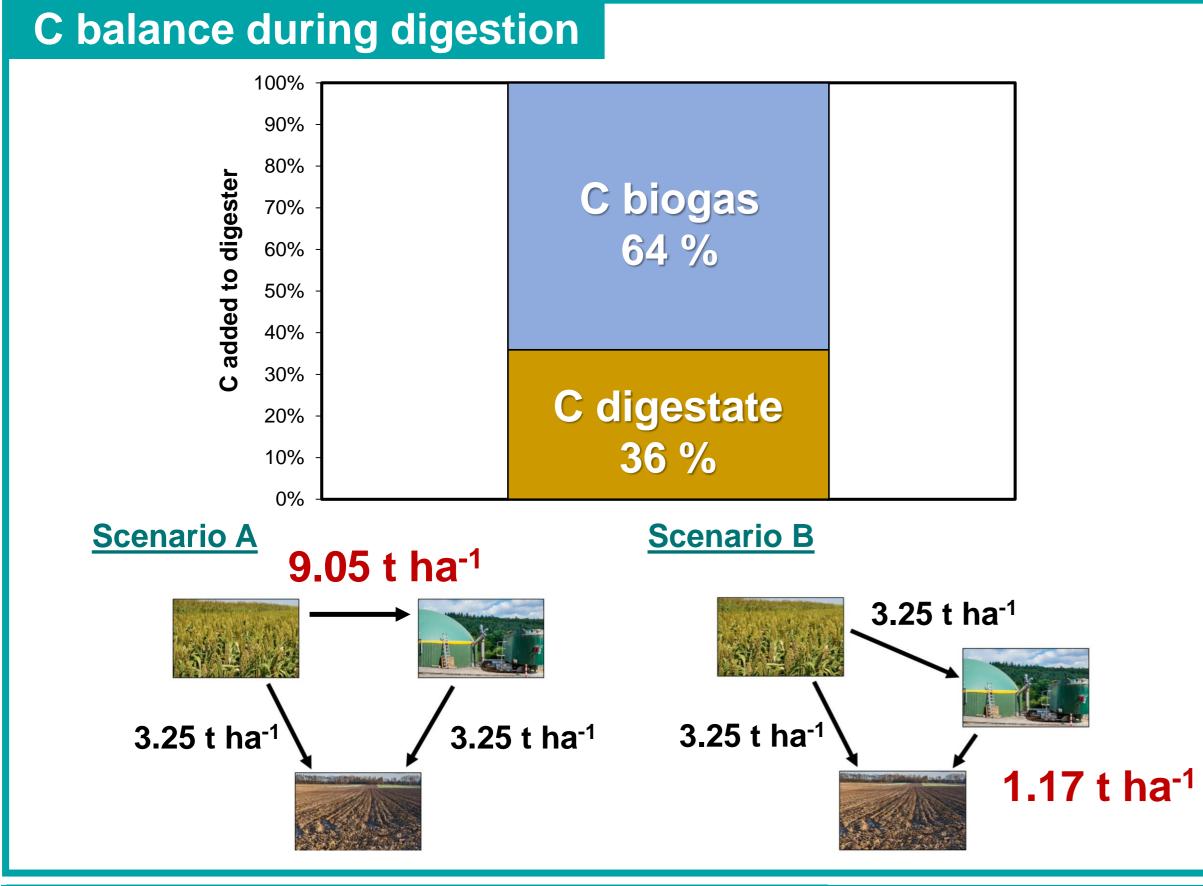
 $1.03 \text{ mg C g}^{-1} \text{ soil} = 3.25 \text{ t C ha}^{-1}$

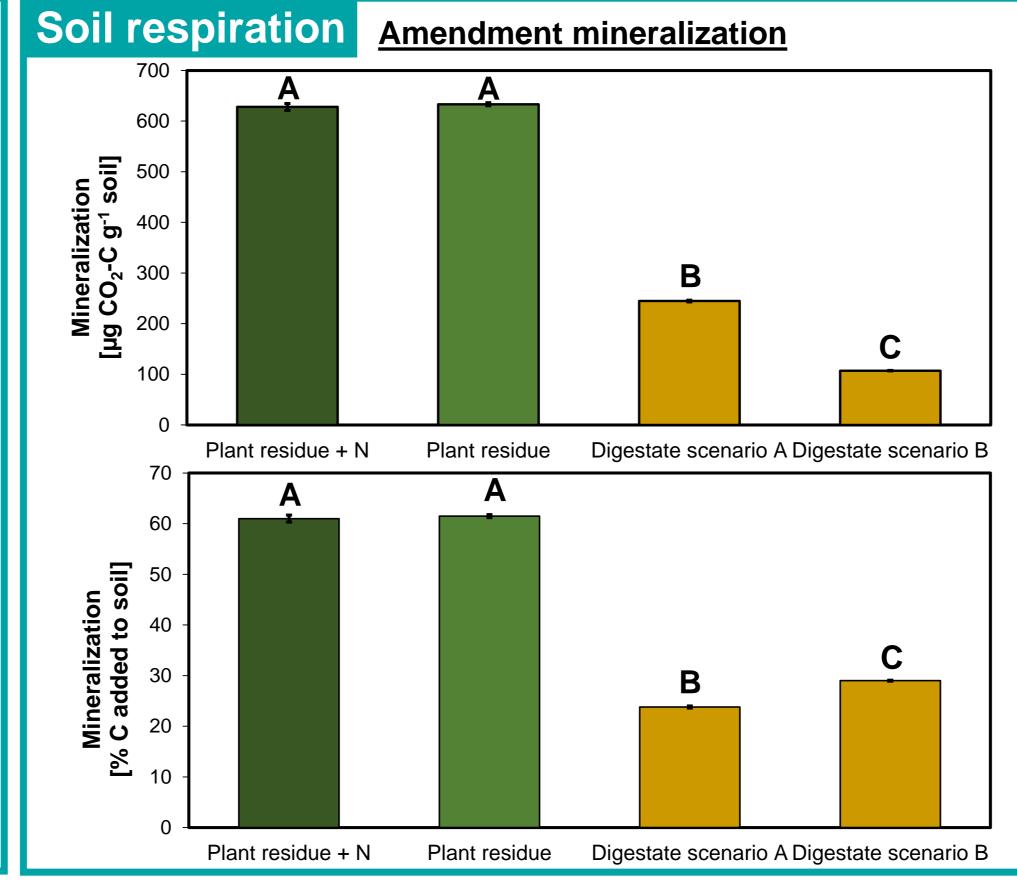
 $0.37 \text{ mg C g}^{-1} \text{ soil} = 1.17 \text{ t C ha}^{-1}$

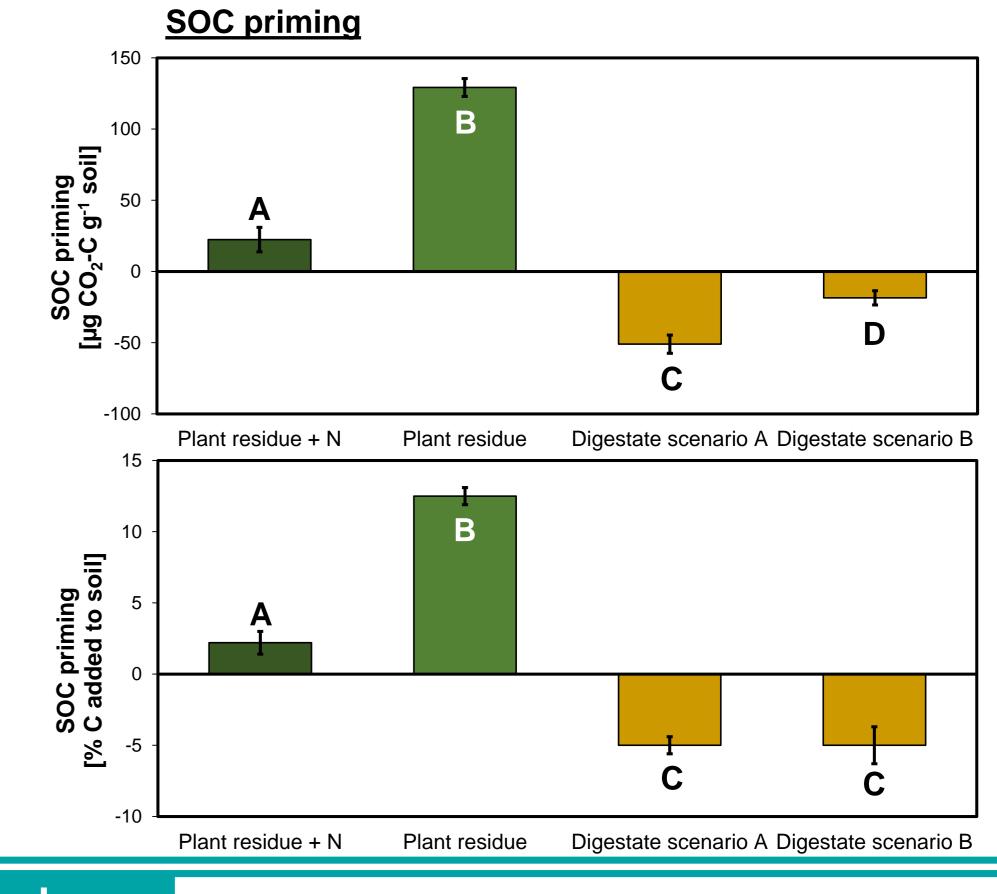
Assumption: Model compartment (C_{fast}) represents fast decomposing C → remaining C considered 'stabilized C'

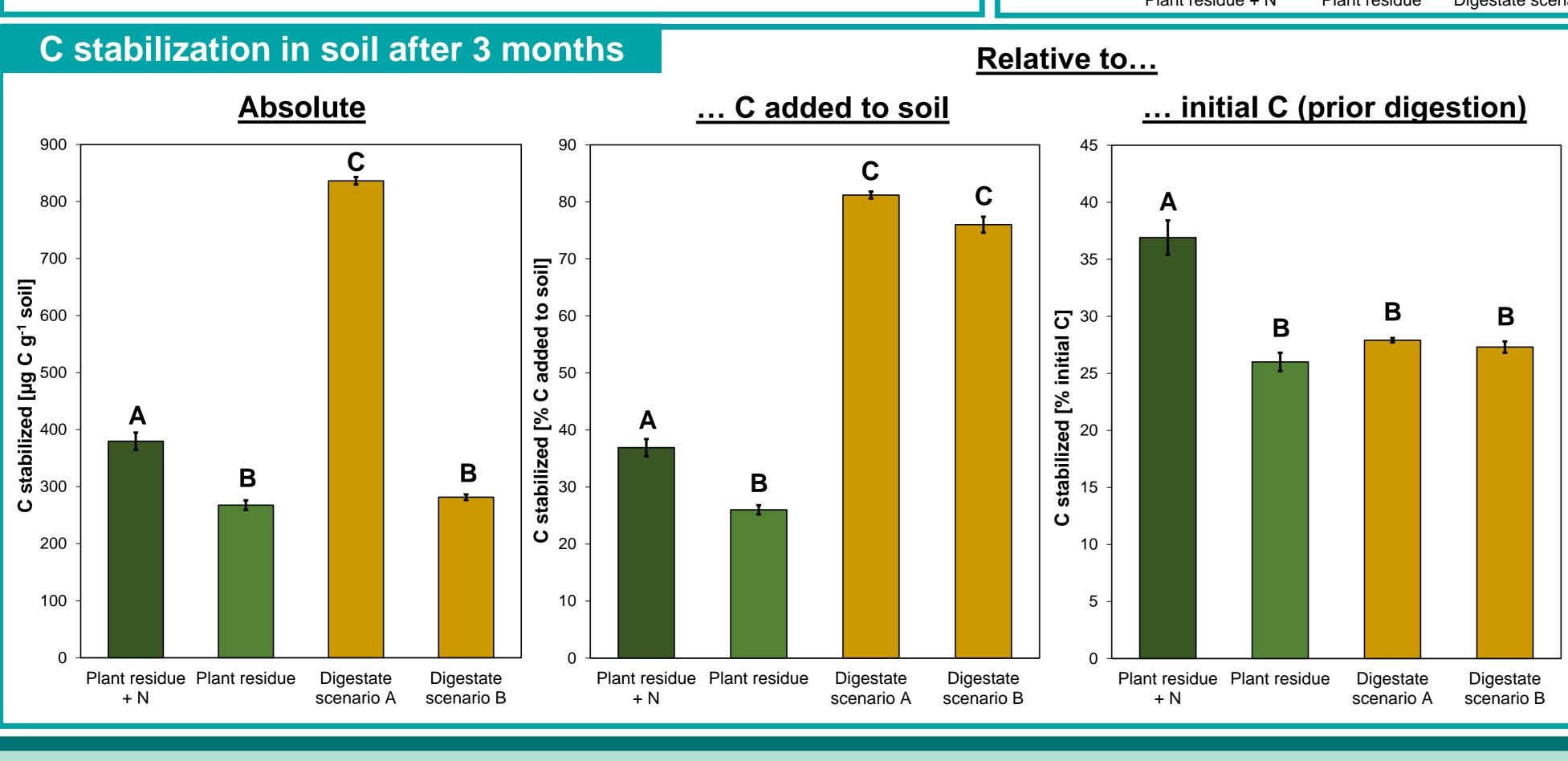
→ Soil C balance

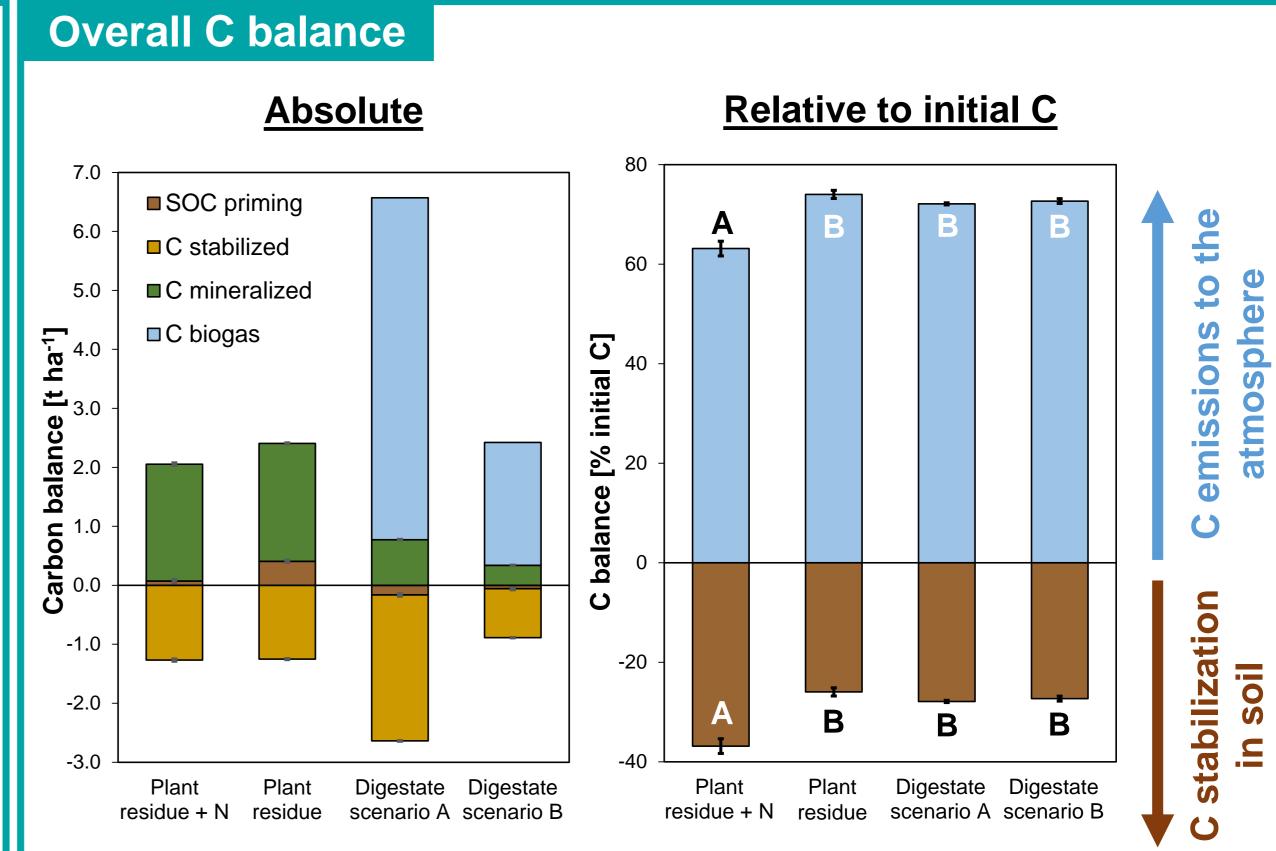
Results











Conclusions

Scenario A

Initially, more plant material required for digestion.

- **→** Largest C stabilization with digestate.
- **→** Largest C emission with digestate.

But, similar C stabilization relative to the initially utilized plant C.

Scenario B

Less C applied to soil for digestate, but...

- → ...similar C stabilization for plant residue and digestate,
- → Because relatively more digestate C is stabilized in soil than plant C.

Yet, similar C stabilization relative to the initially utilized plant C

Overall: Largest C stabilization when plant residue is applied together with N to soils and no differences between other treatments/scenarios
