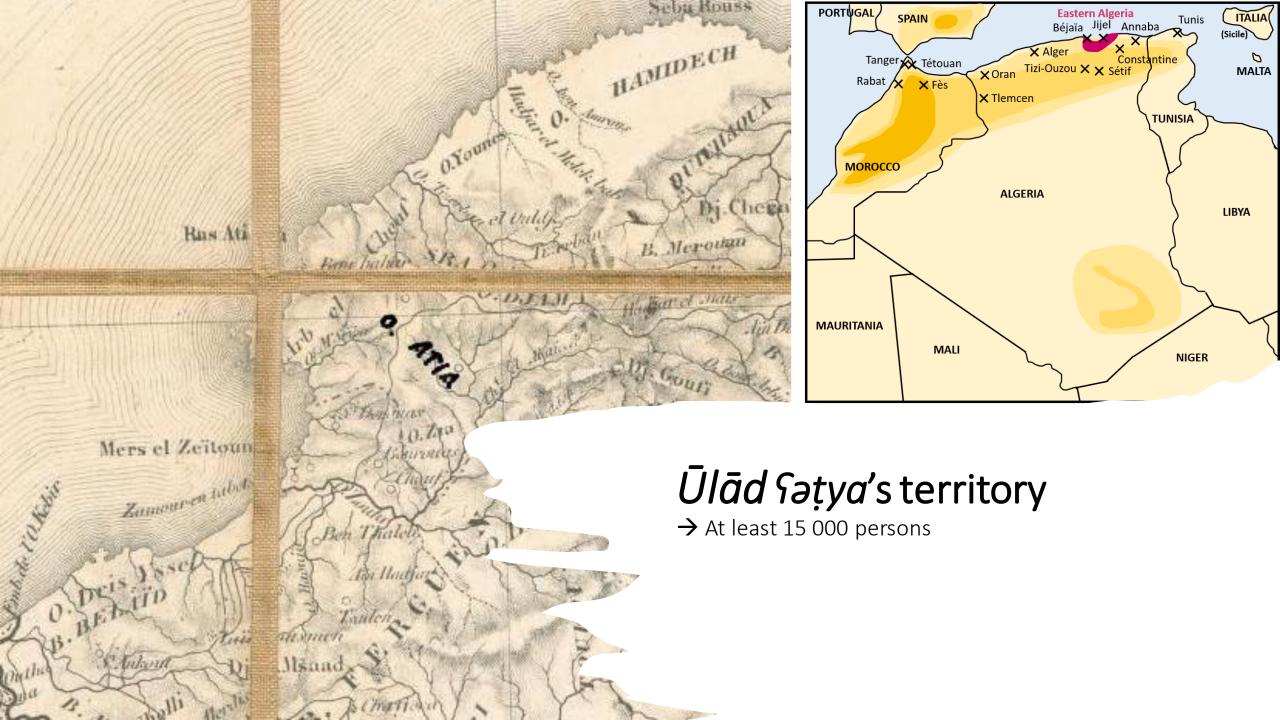
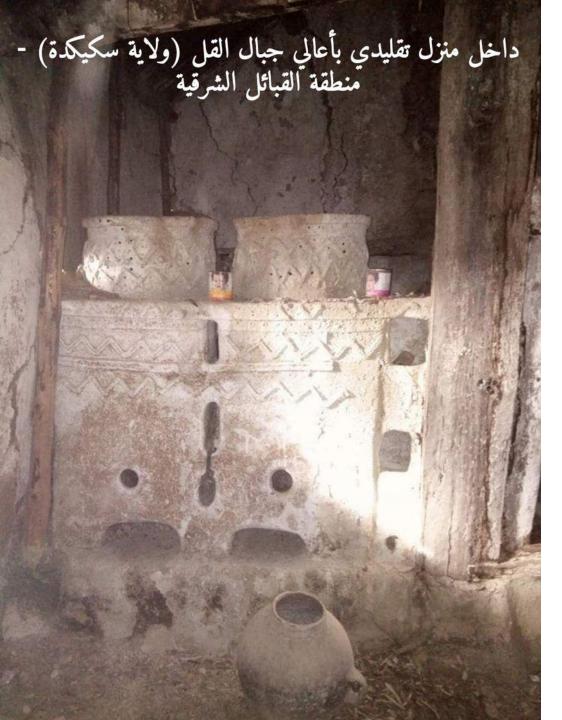

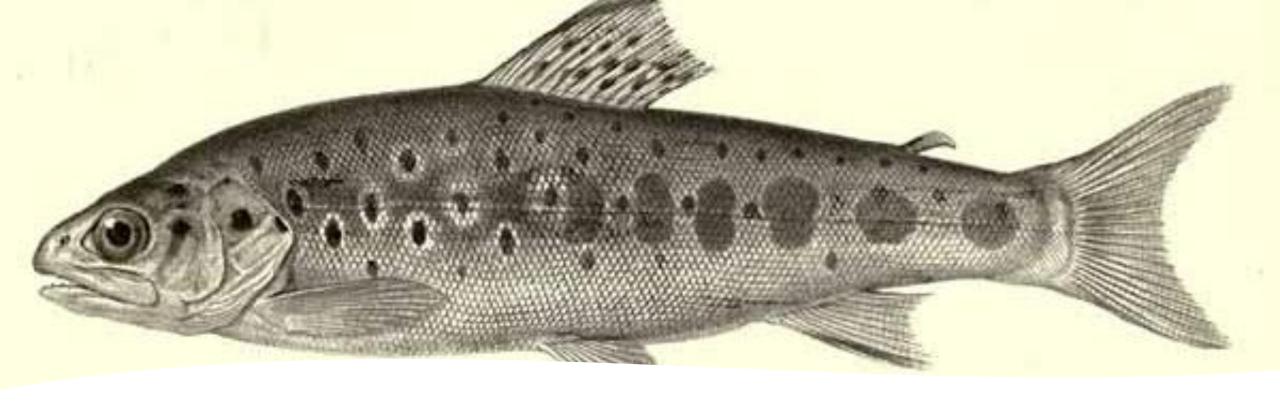

Socio-cultural and environmental characteristics

- \rightarrow During the French conquest, the latter said that the $\bar{U}l\bar{a}d$ Δtya were living in troglodyte habitats
 - ightarrow No information on the conservation of this habitat (and the knowledge linked to it) today
- → Two gastronomic particularities: the cultivation of chestnuts and the consumption of several species of mushrooms (their picking is the occasion of an agrarian festival specific to the region)
- → Their rivers were home to the only Algerian trout species; an earthquake would have caused its disappearance. We do not know if it was consumed and subject to traditional fishing techniques

- \rightarrow Methodology (Caubet 2000): short 5-day fieldwork in $\bar{U}l\bar{a}d$ $\Im tya$ in April 2013. I was helped by mr. Alidra, an $\Im tw\bar{t}$ passionate about the culture and of his confederation.
- \rightarrow Complete lack of data for all Collo dialects. I wanted to start with the $\bar{U}l\bar{a}d$ γ_{a} one since from first observations this mountain this variety presents a conservative profile so that it could bring us information about the linguistic history of Eastern Kabylia.
- → Classification: Is Ūlād ʕəṭya Dialect a village Prehilalian variety? If so, what are its particularities compared to neighboring Djidjelli varieties (Marçais 1956)?
- → Linguistic history: Can we recognize possible linguistic substratum's testifying the existence of ancient language contacts situations in the Collo Peninsula?

- -Feminine plural Amazighized nouns are all frozen
- -External plural forms are formed with the suffix —an: ţizgān "fig variety", ţizəġban, ţizərbān, ţidyān toponyms
 -It is also known from Djidjelli and attested in Amazigh only in Eastern Tasahlit (Babor Massif) and in Ghomaras (Moroccan Rif)

***Some original nominals:

Lexicon: the Amazigh substratum

Jay: azġib (<ZWĠ "red", cf. Jijel azwiġ)

Nail: aģšər (<SKR, cf. Jijel ašķər ~ aššər)

Glottis: lāġ ~ nāġ (<Nɣ)

Ankle: tawarziz ~ tawalziz ~ tawziz (<WLZD)

Toad: *ģərģru* (<GR, cf. Jijel *aģru* ~ *aģur*)

-Typically non-zenatic form

Thumb: *ģuẓmi* (<KMZ)

-Amazigh word preserved even though the closest Amazigh languages have borrowed this name from Arabic





Lexicon: other substrata

*Latin from Amazigh

New year: gənnār (<cf. Latin lanuarius, Jijel yənnar)

Chard: *blaţu* (<cf. Latin *blitum*)

-vocalization /i/ → /a/ typical of Eastern Tasahlit and of the Amazigh substrate of Djiedjelli Arabic

*Mysterious

The Parasol mushroom = $\frac{ta(ma)\dot{g}riwa\dot{s}}{ta}$ (<?) ta- <Amazigh morphology, $-wa\dot{s}$ Latin suffix?

Various toponyms: Ķţūnən ~ Ķţūmən (~ Ikutamən ?), Rirnirān, Lāddən, Rāzzən, Yādən, Ţādən, Mayyūn, etc.

- → Ūlad Saṭya's Arabic is a **Prehilalian villageois Dialect**
 - → It presents important similarities with Djidjelli Arabic as well as diverging characteristics which allow Collo Arabic to be considered of as a separate dialectal area.
- → The Amazigh substrate of this variety is as considerable as it is in Djidjelli Arabic
 - →I have not identified any other ancient contact language or substratum
- →Research must be carried out on the dialects of the Collo peninsula which are still undescribed today and all threatened by leveling sometimes in the short term
- →It is urgent to carry out an inventory of the old Prehilalian lexicon and Amazigh retentions which are among the elements most affected by leveling
 - → Their study will make possible to better understand the history of Prehilalian dialects and the identity of de Amazigh substratum(s)
