Background Antibiotic Microbial Resistance (AMR) is a major public health issue prioritized by international institutions. The ABRomics project is funded by the French Priority Plan on antibioresistance (2M€; 2021-2025). We developed a shared web platform to assist AMR surveillance across human and veterinary medicine, including environment and food isolates. It is made of:

- a repository of structured, interoperable, standardized and well-annotated multi-omics microbiological data from human, animal and environmental origins
- with an up-to-date arsenal of mathematical and bioinformatic tools to answer generic and specific research questions related to AMR


ABRomics database samples location (map visualization)

- Enrich the ABRomics AMR resources with the help and expertise of both the community and the consortium.
- Expand the catalogue of available analyses to more Omics data.
