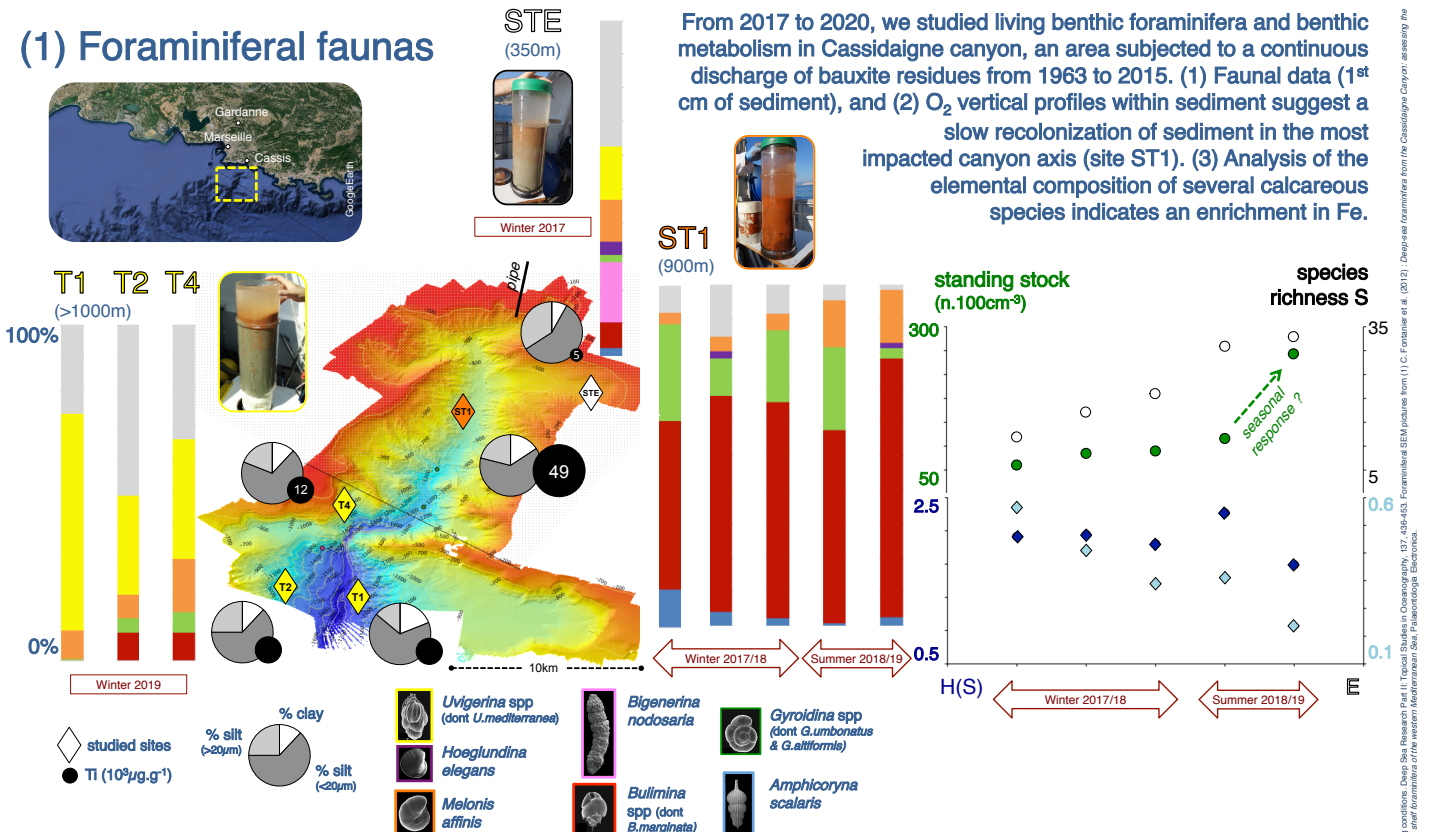

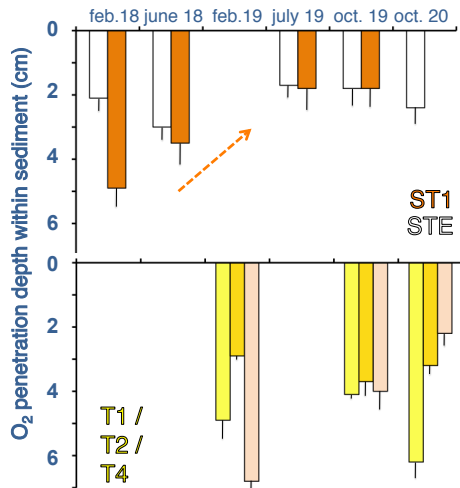

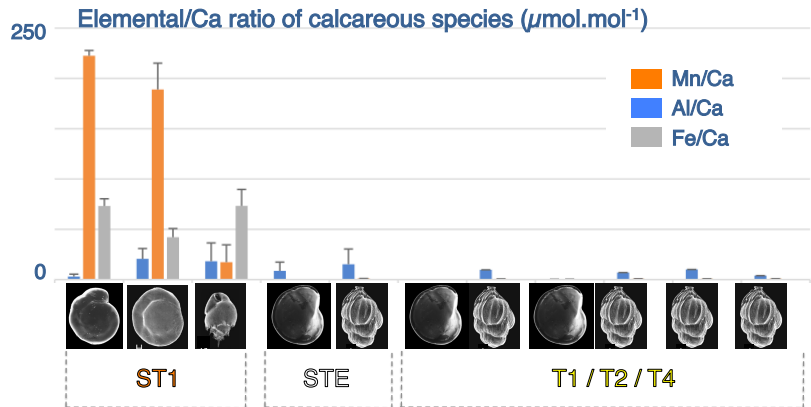
(1) Foraminiferal faunas
