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# Challenges in the synthesis & optical characterization of 2D ferroelectric Ba<sub>0.85</sub>Ca<sub>0.15</sub>Ti<sub>0.9</sub>Zr<sub>0.1</sub>O<sub>3</sub> by RF sputtering

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## ABSTRACT

# EXPERIMENT

Ferroelectric materials, such as BaTiO<sub>3</sub> and (Ba,Ca)(Ti,Zr)O<sub>3</sub> (BCTZ), are essential in modern technology, thanks to their permanent electrical dipoles and unique properties like piezoelectricity. These lead-free perovskites are especially valuable, offering tunability for advanced applications such as transducers and tunable lenses. Despite their potential, achieving high-quality BCTZ thin films via magnetron RF sputtering remains a significant challenge. Our current study aims to find the optimum deposition parameters for BCTZ thin films by RF sputtering. [1-6] ADDAX magnetron RF sputtering system was utilized for all depositions. Hand-made quartz tubular furnace was used for postannealing treatments. Siemens D5000 X-ray diffractometer (XRD) was conducted to examine crystallinity of the films. Thickness of the films was measured via Veeco Dektak 150 profilometer. The prism coupling measurements have been conducted in Metricon 2010/M. New XRD holders were fabricated via Elegoo Saturn-3 12K SLA 3D printer.

## **BEHIND THE LOGIC & RESULTS**

What are the challenges in fabricating highly crystallized sub-micron BCTZ films by sputtering? What is the sputtering process, and what are the two distinct approaches?

- 1. Depositions with in-situ temperature.
- 2. Depositions at room temperature followed by post-annealing treatments.

We started with post-annealing method. The main parameters are:

- Deposition position : determined after mapping the distribution,
- Substrates : Si, Sapphire, Si(Pt/Ti), Sapphire(Pt/Ti),
  RF power : 100W and 50W,





• Post-annealing temperature : ranging from 500°C to 800°C.

All samples exhibited weak XRD signals. What was the problem?

Was furnace calibrated well? We re-calibrated it, yet it did not solve our problem. So, was it about XRD? This was the first challenge.

The solution lay in a fundamental understanding of XRD principles.



XRD signals were enhanced with a new holder design and understanding the fundamentals of XRD. Yet, peaks were still weak for all samples. What was the next problem?





This experiment was conducted at Laboratory of Ceramic Materials and Associated Processes - EA 2443 (Boulevard Charles de Gaulle, 59600 Maubeuge - France)





Cross-section measurements were conducted to uncover the main reason. It showed that there was porosity in all samples regardless of the power, substrates, post-annealing temperatures or their deposition locations.

This experiment was conducted at Laboratory of Ceramic Materials and Associated Processes - EA 2443 (Boulevard Charles de Gaulle, 59600 Maubeuge - France)

Finally, we changed our approach from the room temperature deposition process to in-situ temperature which solved the density problem, increased the XRD signals, enhanced the refractive index and improved the crystal quality. However, the peak is shifted to lower 20 angle, so this is the new problem that awaits a solution.





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
