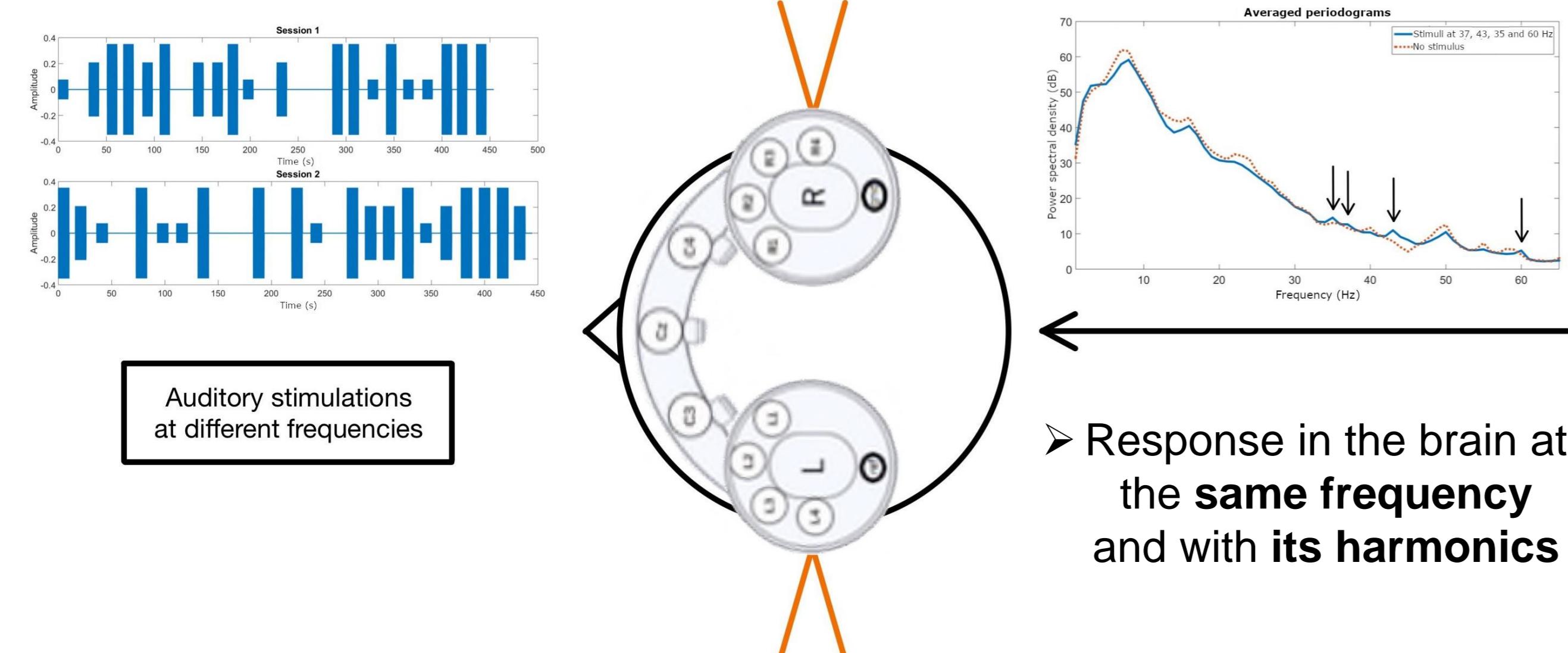

Motivations

- More comfortable carrier signals
 - Amplitude-modulated natural sounds
 - Imagined sounds
- Shorter stimulus durations
- Modulation frequencies easier to identify
- Lower sound levels
- Spatialisation
 - Reinforcing separability in brain signals

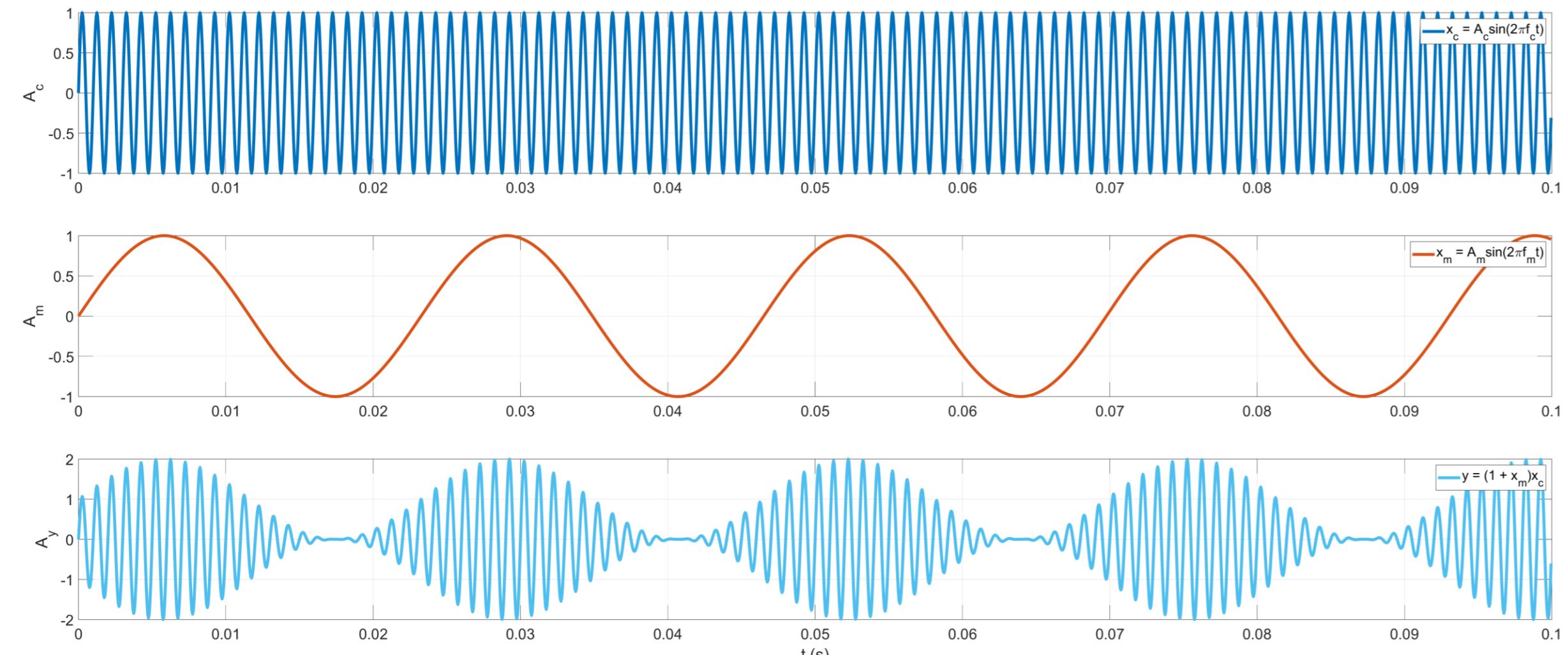
Steady-State Auditory Evoked Potentials (SSAEPs)

- Repeated stimulations
 - Permanent « operating regime »
 - **Steady-state**
 - Measurable



Previous experiment

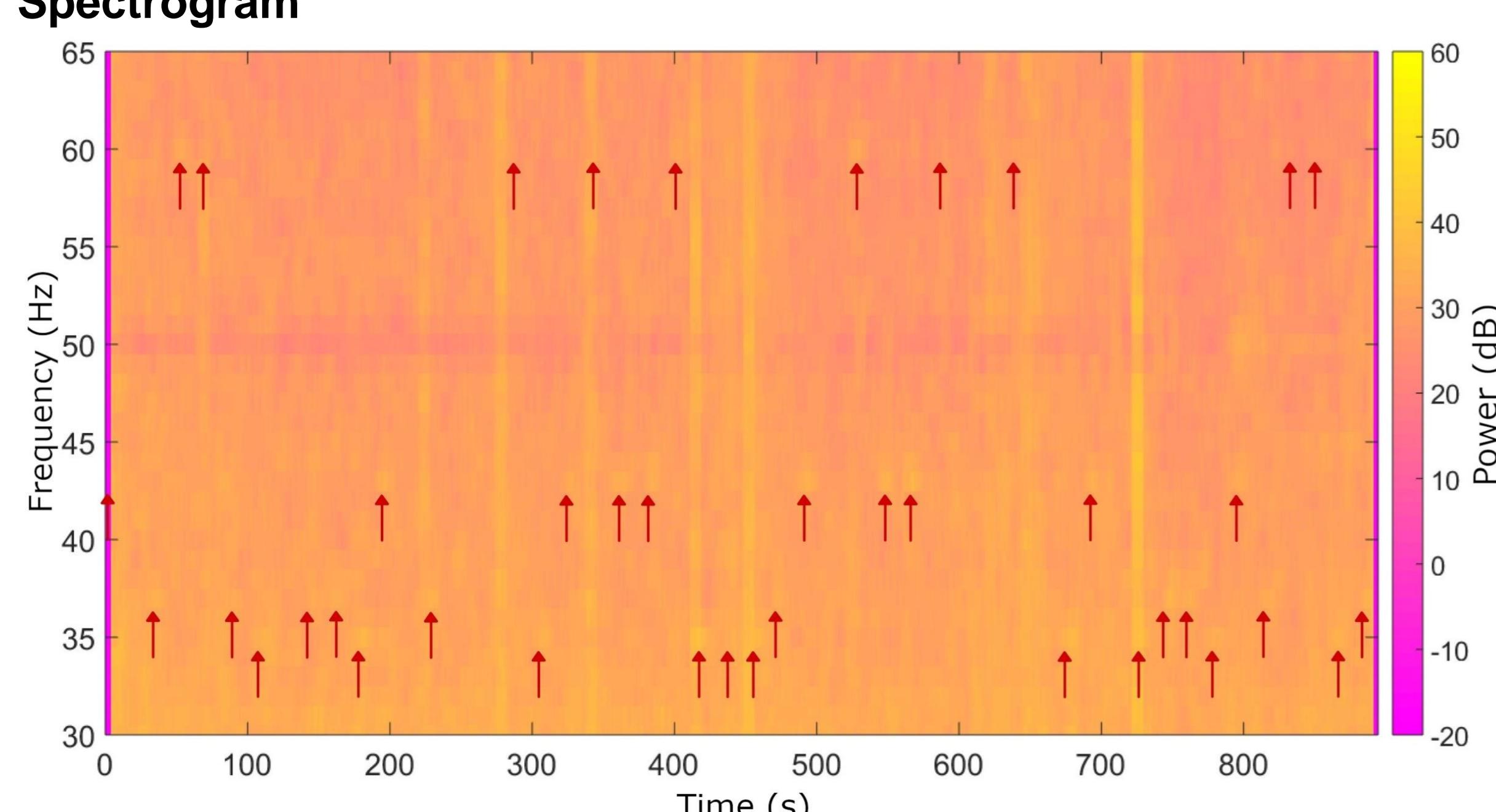
- Auditory stimulations [2]



Carrier frequency f_c (Hz)	Modulation frequency f_m (Hz)
2500	37
1000	43
500	35
500	60

- 2 sessions (8 minutes each)
- 4 conditions (see tab for modulations)
- **10 randomised stimulations per condition** (10 seconds each)

Spectrogram



Arrows point to the powers detected over time according to the modulations

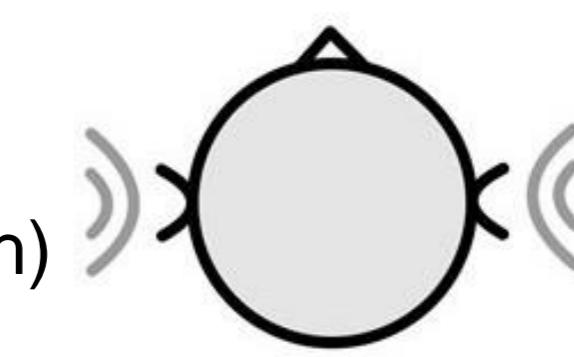
Individual factors influencing sound signal processing zones

- **Handedness** [3]
 - Left brain dominance for language
 - 95 - 99% **right-handed**
 - 70 - 80% **left-handed**
- **Gender** [4]
 - **Men** = Mainly dependent on the left cerebral hemisphere
 - **Women** = Hemispheric balance
- **Musical expertise** [5]



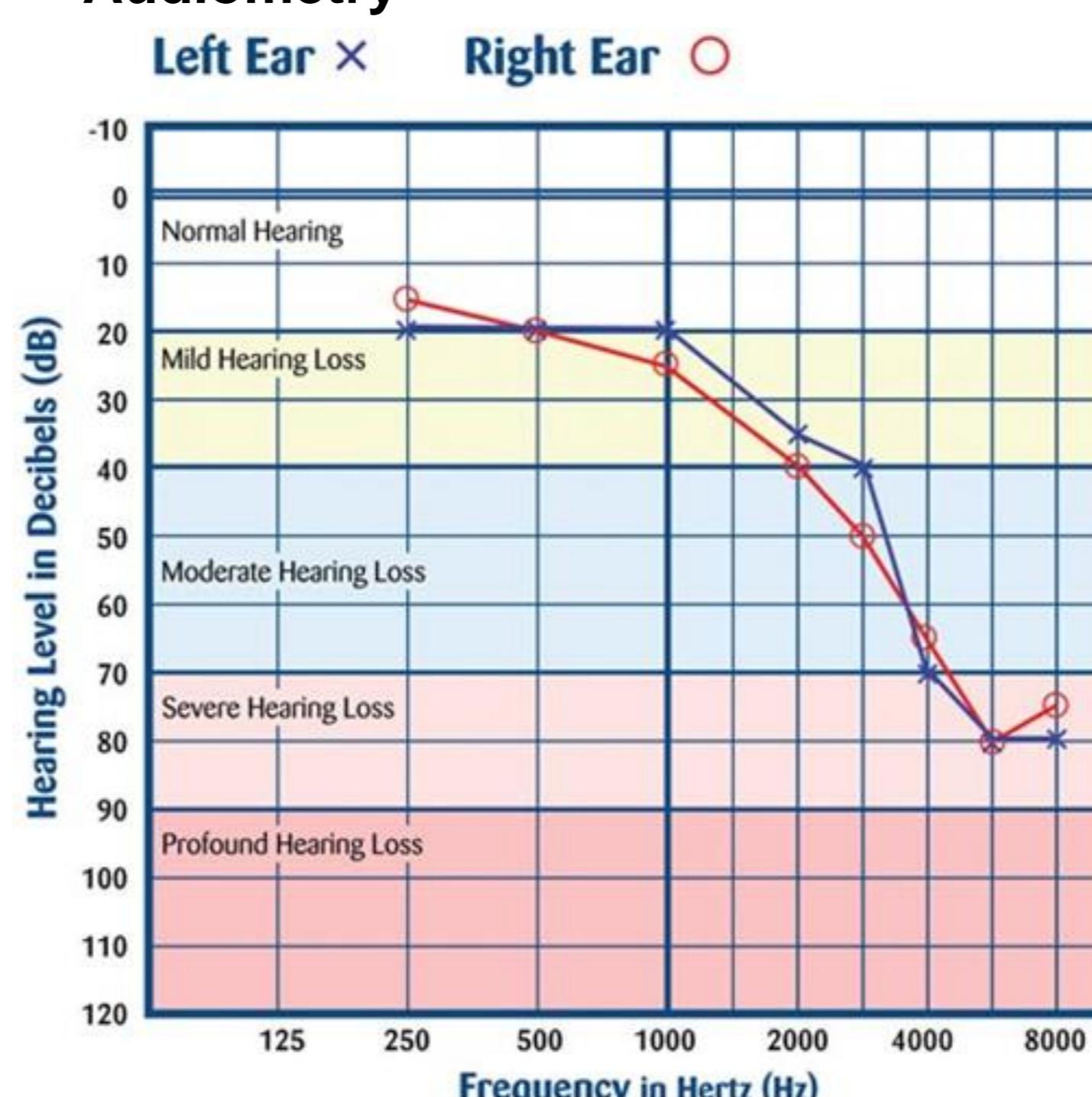
Next experiment: Effect of carrier signals on brain activity and user's preference

- Different carrier signals
 - **Sine wave (reference)**
 - $f_c = 1000$ Hz
 - **Natural sounds**
 - Cicadas
 - Purring of a cat
 - **Brown noise**
- Modulation frequency = 40 Hz
- Presentation
 - 2 sessions (10 minutes each)
 - 4 conditions
 - **20 pseudo-randomised stimulations per condition** (10 seconds each)
- Measurement of brain signals

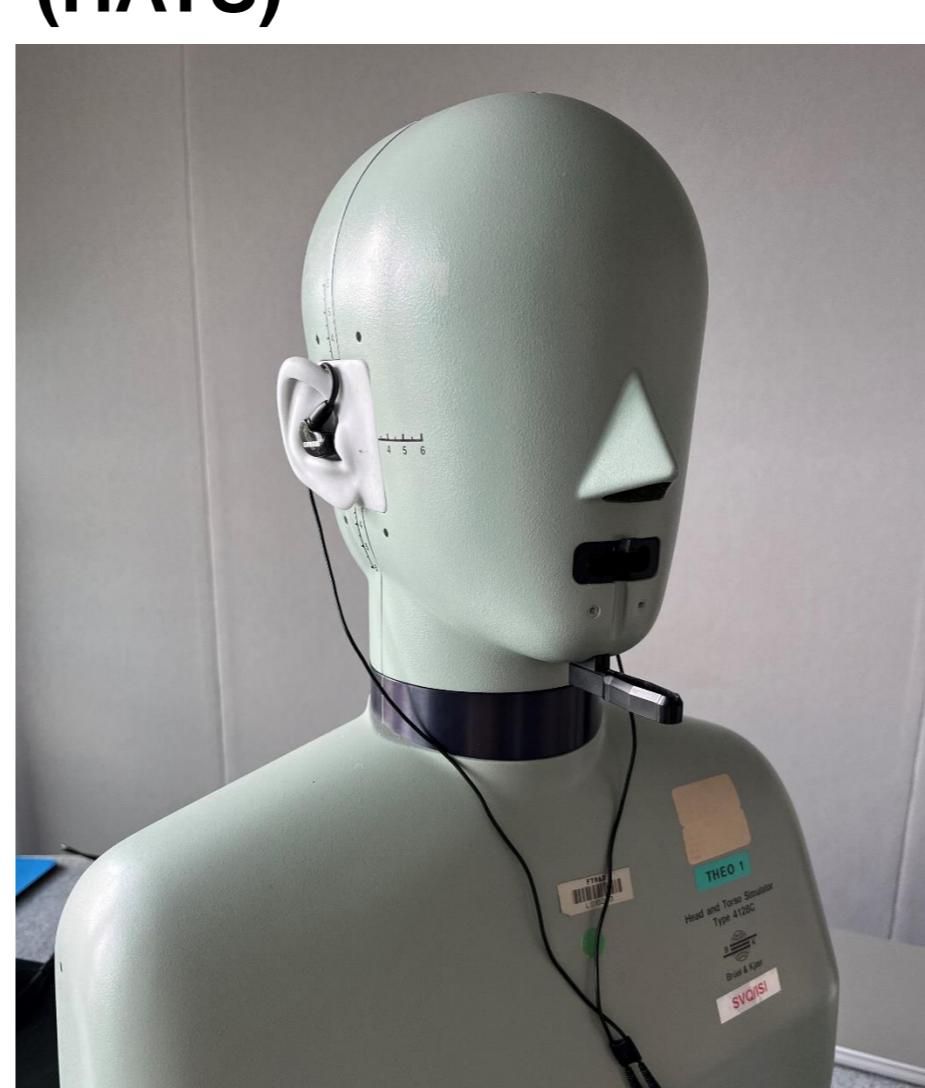
Goldsmiths Musical Sophistication Index [7]
