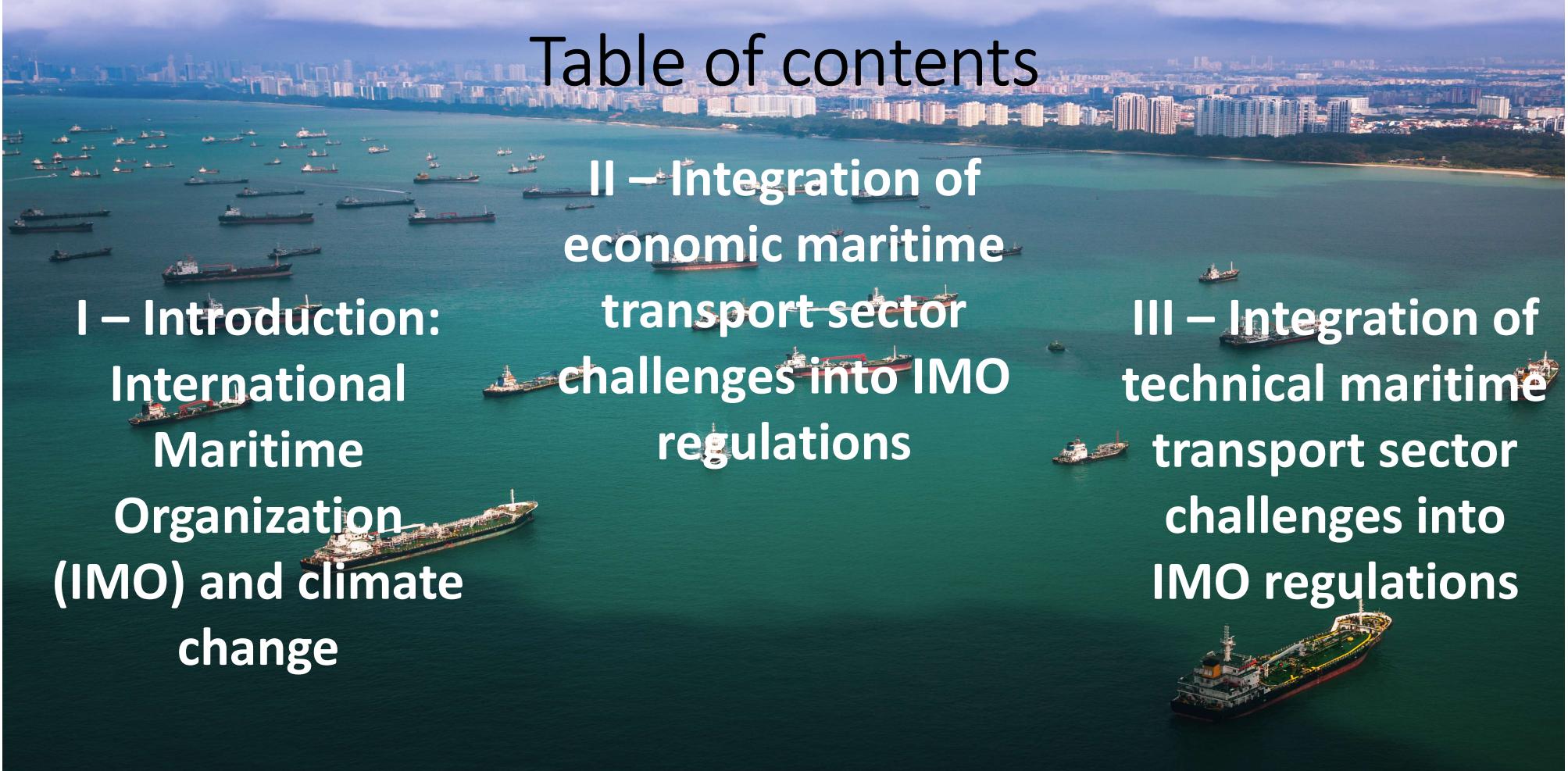

What is the International Maritime Organization (IMO)?



Article 1 alinéa a of the Convention on the International Maritime Organization,
as amended in 1975

To provide machinery for cooperation among Governments in the field of governmental regulation and practices relating to technical matters of all kinds affecting shipping engaged in international trade, and to encourage the general adoption of the highest practicable standards in matters concerning maritime safety and efficiency of navigation, *[the prevention and control of marine pollution from ships; and to deal with legal matters related to the purposes set out in this Article]*

EEDI ENERGY EFFICIENCY DESIGN INDEX IMPROVING THE TECHNICAL PERFORMANCE OF NEW BUILD SHIPS

1

Ships which are designed and constructed today must be **MORE ENERGY EFFICIENT** than the baseline, thus reducing their carbon intensity

2

Performance targets are increasingly stringent overtime, thus **INCENTIVIZING INNOVATION** in ship design

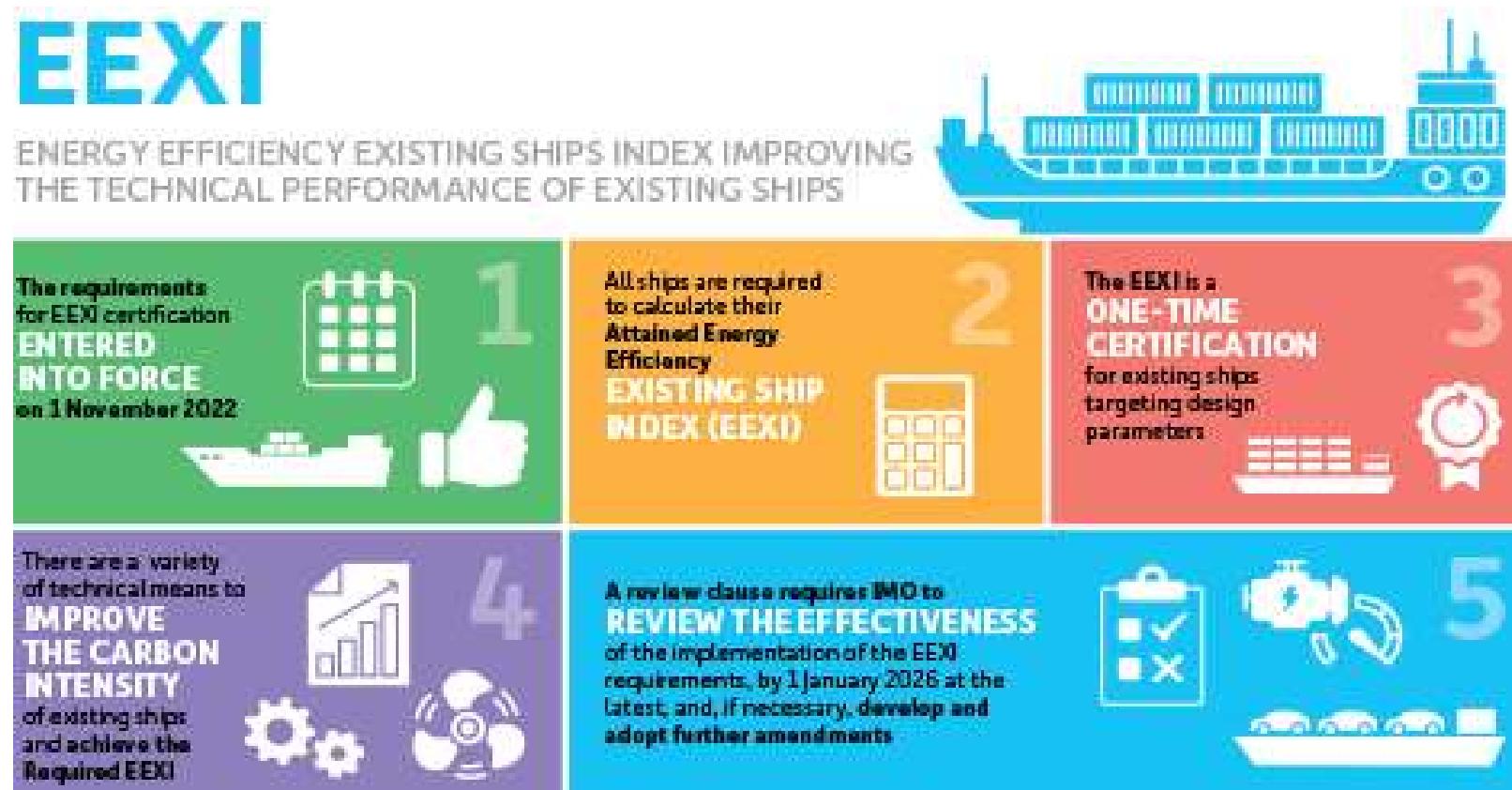
There are **DIFFERENT GOALS FOR DIFFERENT TYPES OF SHIPS**, recognizing the specificities of different types of ships

4

For example, **THE LARGEST CONTAINER SHIPS** (>200,000 DWT), built after 1 April 2022 must be **50% more efficient** than the baseline

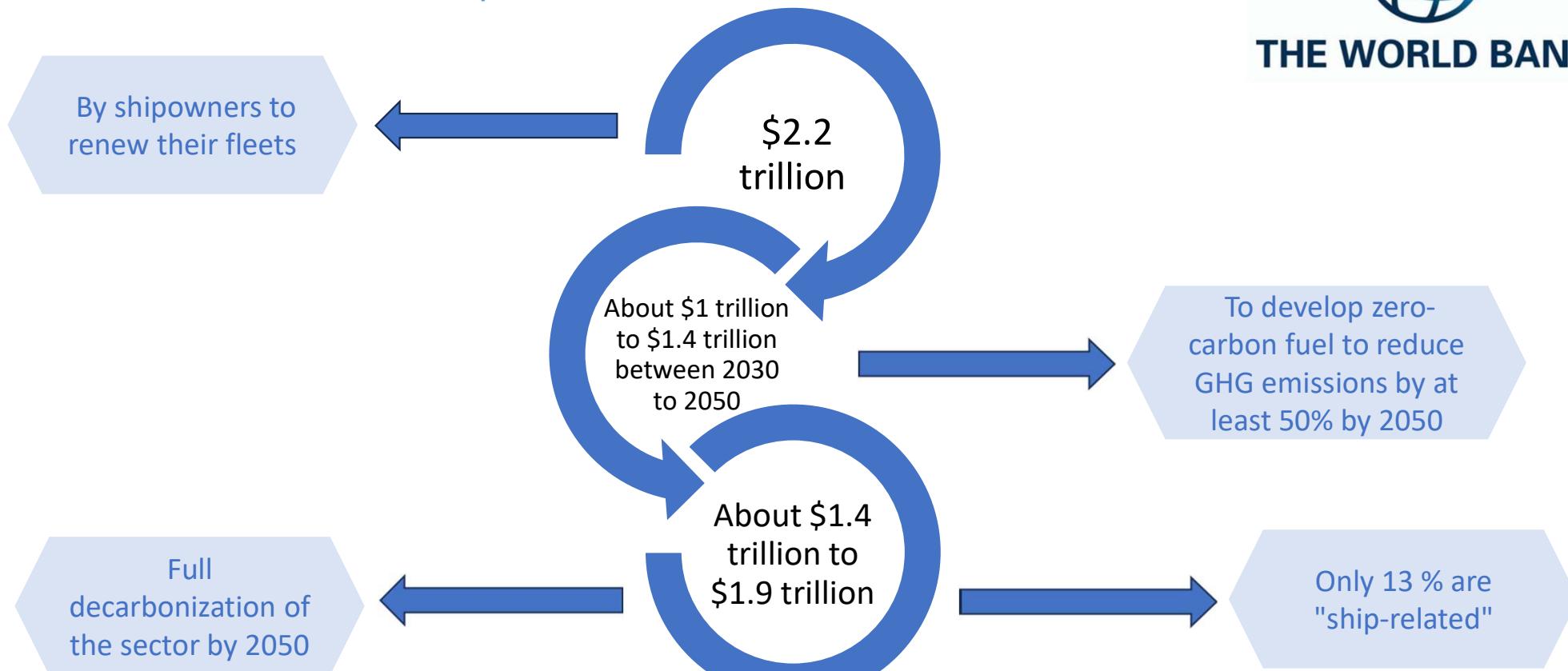

IMO has developed the ambitious target of a minimum **50% reduction** in greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions **by 2050**.

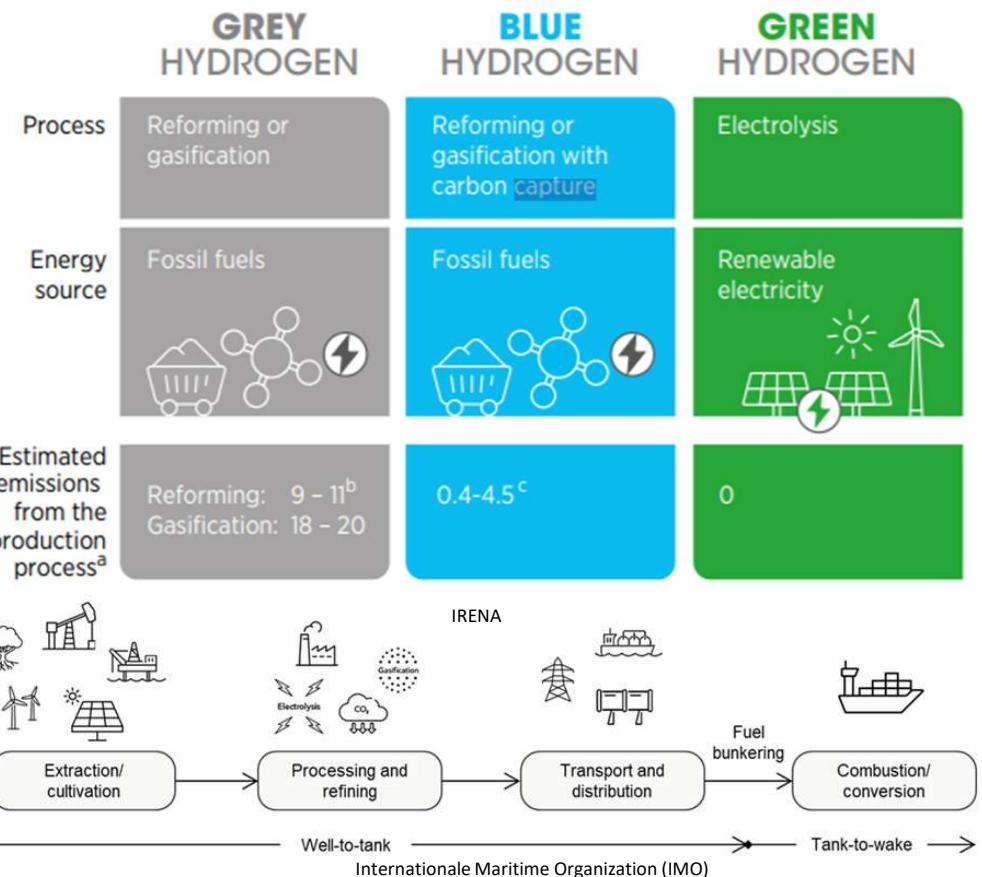
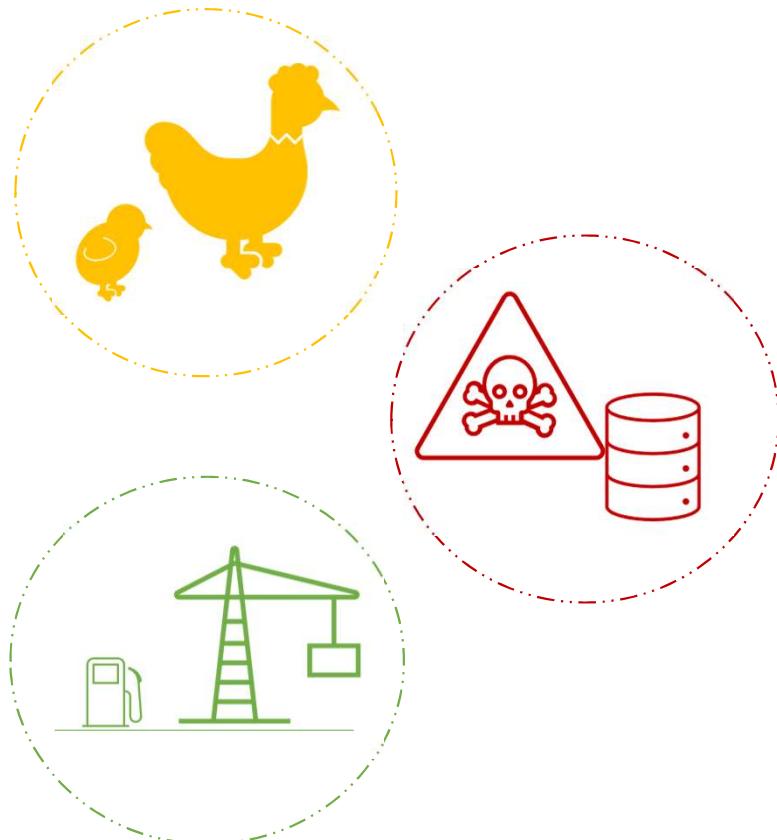

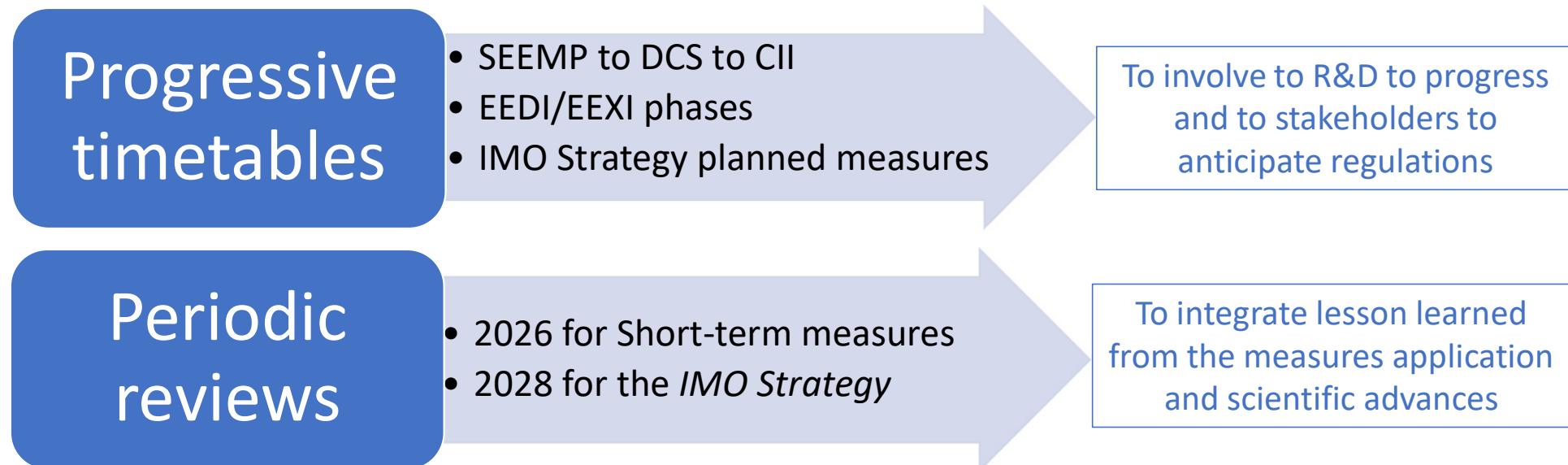

Guidelines on life cycle GHG intensity of marine fuels (LCA Guidelines)



- Adopted in 2023;
- To provide a corresponding calculation basis for the new *IMO Strategy*;
- Define the emission factor attributed to a fuel according to its production pathways;
- To be improved by the MEPC.

III – Integration of technical maritime transport sector challenges into IMO regulations

Which are the mid-term measures to ensure green fuels on WtW basis ?

GHG Fuel Standard (GFS)

- Currently under discussion as mid-term measures;
- To gradually limit GHG intensity from fuels used by ship;
- On a WtW basis, and including CO₂, CH₄ and N₂O.
