

Exploring the metabolic effects of different genotoxic compounds from transcriptomics data: using gene selection to unravel significant effects

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Context

- ANR GENOSHIFT : toxic agents are a major risk for human/animal health and biosystems, to understand their modes of action, a multi-omic study is conducted to identify biomarkers of exposure following chronic exposure of human liver cells to 12 reference genotoxic compounds at low doses.
- The differential gene analysis revealed Differentially Expressed Genes (DEGs) for some of these 12 molecules and no DEGs for others. But, variable selection highlighted a transcriptomic effect for these latter compounds.
- > Statistical integration of metabolomic and transcriptomic data: identify genes and metabolites correlated and modulated by chronic exposure of human liver cells to 12 genotoxic compounds.
 - > Selection of the most "informative" variables for statistical integration by removing non-informative, redundant and noisy variables in transcriptomic data using the following methods:
 - Affinity Propagation Clustering[2] (apcluster R package), unsupervised method of selection by grouping similar variables: allows to remove redundancy.
 - **RELIEFF**[3] (mt R package), supervised method of selecting discriminant variables.



Material and Methods

Affinity Propagation Clustering

RELIEFF method combined with Affinity Propagation clustering

Compounds vs Control	Number of selected variables
AFB1 vs Control	1456
ETO vs Control	1405
CIS vs Control	1232
TAX vs Control	1278
DAT vs Control	1185
DEA vs Control	1255

Number of non-redundant variables selected by Affinity Propagation clustering: each line indicates the number of variables selected for a compound compared to its control.



The table indicates the number of variables selected for each compound: approximately one thousand variables were selected to have a number of variables of the order of those of metabolomic



Heatmap of discriminant and non-redundant variables selected by the RELIEFF method combined with Affinity Propagation clustering. In line, there are the selected variables and in column, the control samples (in blue) and treated samples (in orange).

- The RELIEFF [3] method combined with Affinity Propagation clustering [2] selected discriminant and non-redundant variables, particularly for compounds where there was no differentially expressed gene (e.g. CIS, TAX, DAT.).
- We can see on the heatmaps that the selected variables have a differential expression

Conclusions and Perspectives

- Y These results show that the RELIEFF method combined with Affinity Propagation clustering is able to select discriminant and non-redundant genes, particularly for compounds for which there is a no clear transcriptomic effect (e.g., CIS).
- ✓ The unsupervised method (Affinity Propagation clustering) reduced the size of the data by selecting around 3% of variables.
- ✓ The selected variables will be used for statistical integration with the metabolomic variables.

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
