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# Optimisation strategies of different VAT photopolymerization printers

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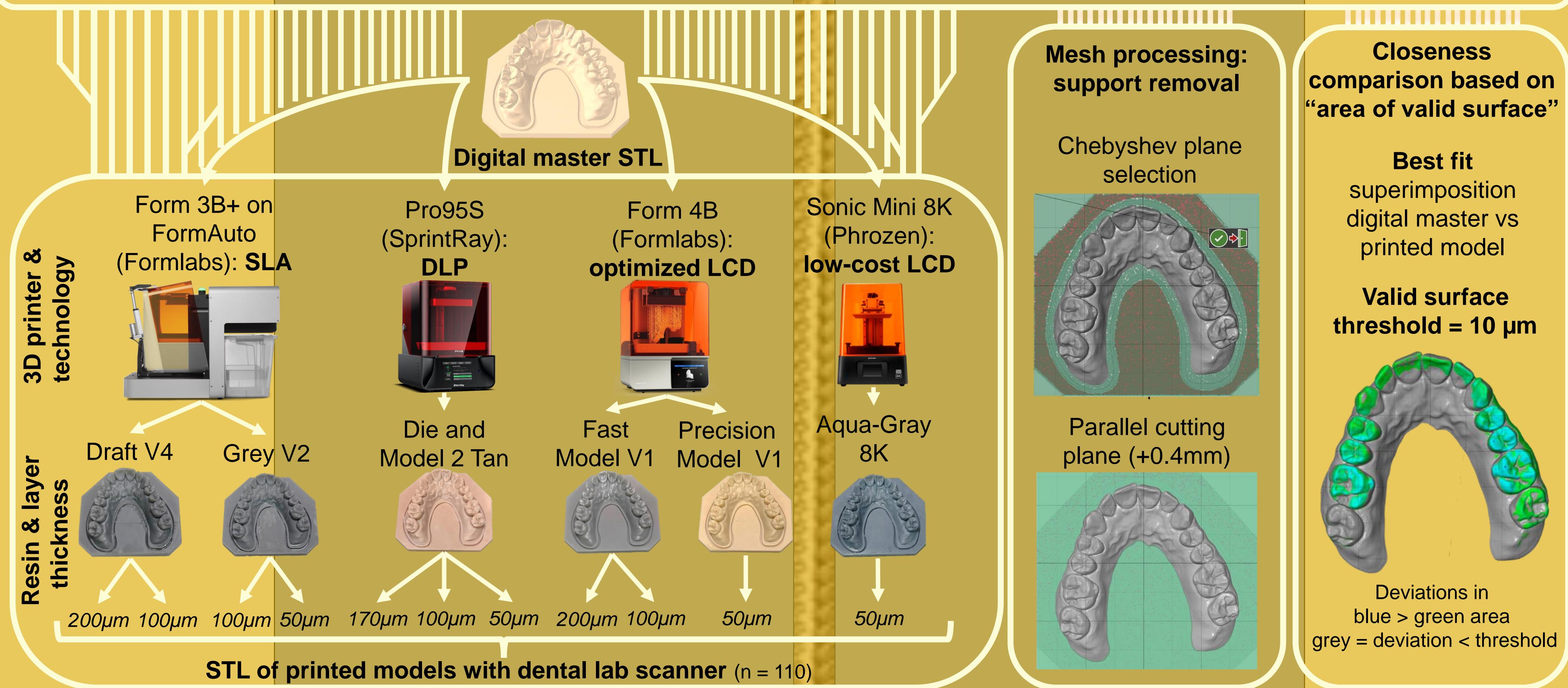
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**Objective 1:** Create a protocol to compare the **closeness** of 3D printed models, with different VAT printers & post-processed while considering various resin types and layer thicknesses.

**Objective 2:** Assess the **efficiency** of printing and post-processing 10 models, printed two by two on the platform.

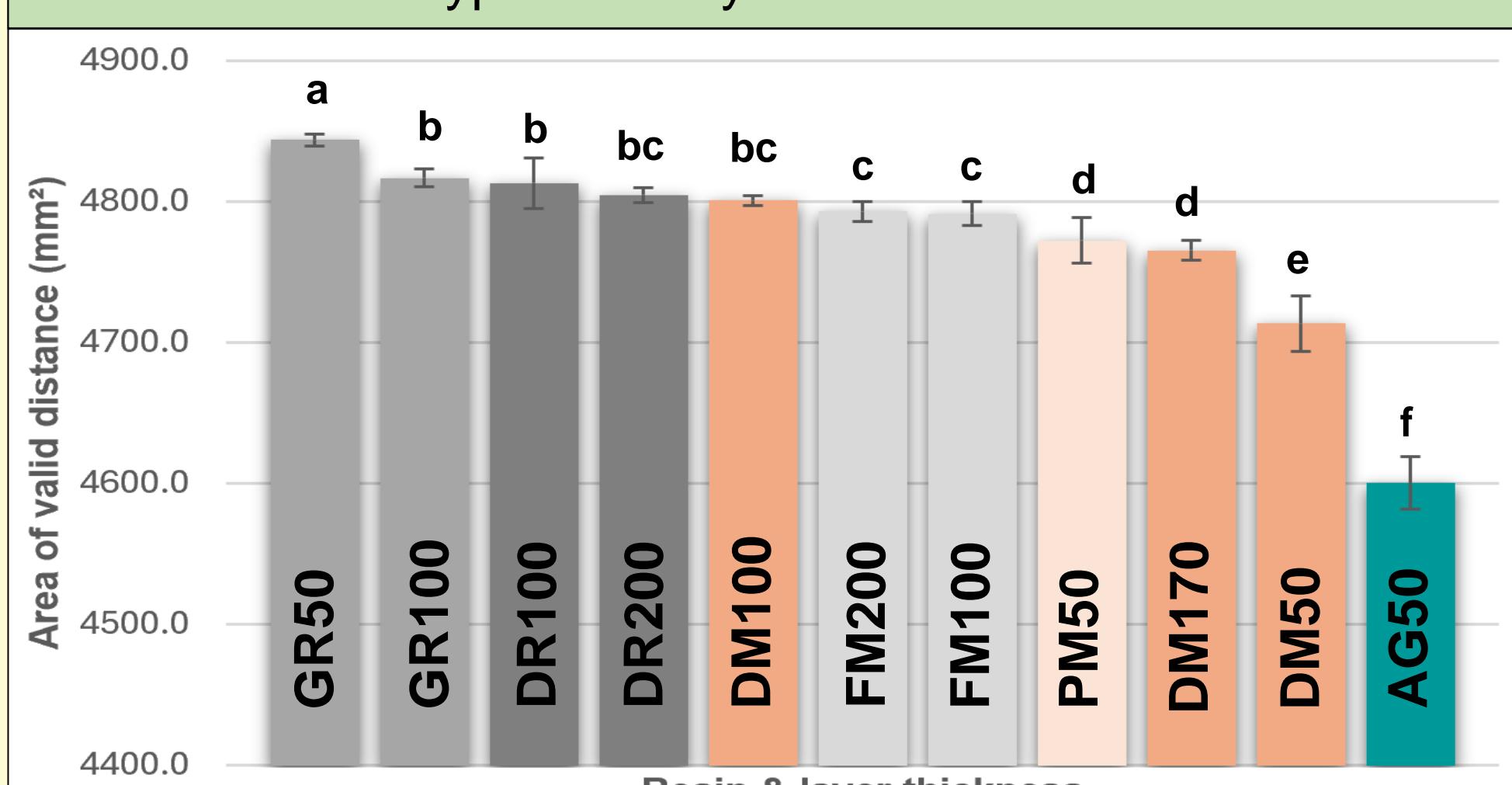


## Results

**Printing efficiency:** total printing and production (printing + post-processing) time of 10 models for each resin & layer thickness

Resin & layer thickness	Total printing time	Total production time
Draft 200µm (DR200)	3h40	<b>4h08</b>
Draft 100µm (DR100)	7h45	<b>8h13</b>
Grey 100 (GR100)	12h35	<b>13h35</b>
Grey 50 (GR50)	22h00	<b>23h00</b>
Fast Model 200µm (FM200)	1h05	<b>2h45</b>
Fast Model 100µm (FM100)	3h05	<b>4h45</b>
Precision Model 50µm (PM50)	9h00	<b>9h50</b>
Die and Model 170µm (DM170)	2h35	<b>3h35</b>
Die and Model 100µm (DM100)	3h10	<b>4h10</b>
Die and Model 50µm (DM50)	5h25	<b>6h25</b>
Aqua-Gray 50µm (AG50)	8h40min	<b>12h30</b>

**Closeness:** “area of valid distance” between the various resin types and layer thicknesses



Values with the same superscript letter are not significantly different at  $p < 0.05$ .

**Capacity** (2 models vs 10 models in a go (DR + GR group)) and **parameters** (wash time & cure time) of post-processing units respective to the manufacturer parameters and the established protocol **influence the total production time** of 10 printed models.  
e.g. post-processing time is 28 min for all 10 models within DR group versus 3h50 for AG50 group

## Discussion

Closeness can be affected by the parameters related to the **hardware** of the VAT printer and the post-processing units:

➤ **Platform speed + VAT temperature** need to be adapted to the **resin's rheology** for optimising **resin flow**

→ avoid separation of the layers (e.g. DM50)



➤ **Pixel smoothening** in the new-gen “optimised LCD” could reduce the closeness with the original STL model

➤ Inappropriate curing time & temperature may lead to **part warpage** (i.e. distortion)

## Conclusion

New-gen “**optimised LCD**” matches **DLP** and surpasses “**low-cost LCD**” in printing closeness depending on the resin type and layer thickness

**Automated SLA** printer (i.e. FormAuto) and **large** post-processing (wash & cure) units are promising to optimise both closeness and efficiency

**SLA VAT printer** present a better closeness overall

Reducing layer thickness does not necessarily increase the closeness
