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
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



Reasons given by patients for using CAM

The three reasons given by patients for CAM use were:

- having an expectation of benefits of CAM
- dissatisfaction with conventional medicine
- the perceived safety of CAM

The aim is foremost to feel better with side effects, to relieve symptoms and strengthen the body's ability to manage the disease:

- by reducing nausea, fatigue, pain... due to chemotherapy.
- helping limit burns from radiotherapy
- in the case of hormone therapy used for gynecological cancers, limiting night sweats effective
- hand-foot syndrome by eliminating violent tingling sensations and intense burning of the extremities
- enabling patients to continue their treatment at the maximum dose for as long as possible, and thus not compromise their chances of recovery.

Acupuncture is most wellknown analgesic effect, enhance endogenous endorphins. The Nicolas Commission in 2002 led to the recognition of acupuncture and homeopathy as legal medical practices.

Who can practice CAM, acupuncture in France ?

The French Medical Council officially recognizes 4 types of CAM, known as "unconventional healthcare practices": **acupuncture, homeopathy, mesotherapy and osteopathy.**

Acupuncture is only reimbursed by the national health insurance scheme for 4 indications :

- nausea and vomiting,
- pain relief,
- anxiety-depression syndrome
- alcohol and smoking cessation.

There are over 3 000 acupuncturists in France, with around 800 practicing acupuncture exclusively.

As far as the medical professions are concerned, there are an estimated 1 632 doctors who practise acupuncture in France, i.e. around 3% of general practitioners in the private sector, and 21% of doctors with special practices (homeopaths, naturopaths, etc).

There are also between 4 000 and 6 000 people in France who "practise acupuncture illegally", without a recognised health diploma.

Some practitioners in France consider that acupuncture is not medicine in the Western sense of the term, but a Chinese practice, and that the illegal practice of medicine does not therefore concern them.

Only doctors, dentists and midwives holding a DU in Chinese medicine are entitled to practise it. Considered a medical procedure, acupuncture is used in oncology to alleviate some of the effects of chemotherapy, including vomiting and the joint pain induced by certain hormone therapies.

Process regarding acupuncture support

 For chemotherapy one session 48 hours before the session (to boost platelets) and one session on the same day or the following day to neutralize the treatment's side effects.

 For radiotherapy, one session a week can be scheduled during radiation to reduce redness and burning.


 During surgery, the optimal timing is to schedule one session 48 hours before surgery to reduce the stress associated with the procedure, and one session on discharge from hospital or clinic to reduce fatigue and aid healing.

 To support the immune system. Regular follow-up over a 4-month period helps to keep people's vital energy flowing.







Conclusion

- The use of CAM mobilizes beliefs, emotions and agency linked to the different stages of the disease. The transparency nature of exchanges in the management of side-effects, can lead to the co-construction of supportive care and towards an integrative medicine that humanizes care and recognizes patients' experiences and choices.
- Using CAM and medical pluralism stimulates patients' reflexivity, from seeking information about their disease, to questioning the medical team, to choosing supportive care, sharing experiences with groups of patients, enabling them to do their part and question the meaning they want to give to their agency and their resistance to evil.
- There is a common denominator to all these CAM, which is the approach to the individual as a whole and as a subject-actor in his or her own life, are seen elsewhere.
- TCM is one of comprehensive global health system that includes acupuncture, mind-body techniques such as qi gong and tai-chi-chuan, nutrition, herbal medicine and energetic massage. It is a highly personalised therapeutic approach (the practitioner adapts his treatment according to the patient in front of him).
- More and more patients, often because they have developed a distrust of drugs, are turning to CAM and seem satisfied.

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
