




Backgrounds

The **gaze** directed towards visible facial differences (VFD) can be experienced as highly **stigmatizing** [1].




This gaze is made of a focus on the VFD combined with a lack of attention to the eyes [2].




This gaze is correlated with stigmatizing affective reactions [2,3].

Aim

To demonstrate that the way people visually treat faces with VFD is stigmatizing because it is specific to VFD and not observed for another feature.






Discussion


Gaze towards VFD is intrinsically problematic because:



It diverges from the way faces without VFD are treated.



It is associated with stigmatizing reactions.



It is specific to VFD.

There is a need to reeducate the gaze towards VFD.
