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Phonon sidebands, electron-phonon coupling and vibronic lasing in Tm³⁺:Lu₂O₃ sesquioxide

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Résumé

A vibronic Tm:Lu₂O₃ laser generated 654 mW at 2238-2309 nm with a slope efficiency of 68.9% exceeding the Stokes limit. Tm:Lu₂O₃ features a strong electron-phonon interaction resulting in a profound long-wave phonon sideband for the ${}^{3}F_{4} \rightarrow {}^{3}H_{6}$ electronic transition extending up to at least 2.4 µm supporting vibronic laser operation.

1. INTRODUCTION

Cubic (C-type) rare-earth sesquioxides such as Lutetia (Lu₂O₃) are attractive laser host media for doping with rare-earth ions (RE³⁺) for the development of lasers emitting in the shortwave infrared spectral range [1]. They benefit from high thermal conductivity, broadband transparency, low phonon energy (among oxides), easy RE³⁺ doping and strong crystal-fields for the dopant ions resulting in broad emission bands. Thulium ions (Tm³⁺) in Lu₂O₃ crystals emit slightly above 2 μ m and Tm:Lu₂O₃ crystals find applications in high-power continuouswave and femtosecond mode-locked lasers. It is interesting to further extend the emission wavelengths of Tm lasers, e.g., by relying on the electron-phonon coupling (vibronic lasers) or the ³H₄ \rightarrow ³H₅ electronic transition [2]. Such 2.3-µm laser sources are of interest for molecular spectroscopy and fiber gas photonics. In this work, we have systematically studied long-wave emissions of Tm³⁺ ions in Lu₂O₃ and demonstrated efficient vibronic laser operation of this crystal at wavelengths beyond 2.2 µm.

2. PHONON SIDEBANDS OF TM³⁺ IONS

The experimental crystal-field splitting of the ground-state (${}^{3}H_{6}$) and the first excited state (${}^{3}F_{4}$) of Tm³⁺ ions in C_{2} symmetry sites in Lu₂O₃ is shown in Fig. 1(a). Given the total Stark

spliting of the ground-state of 828 cm⁻¹, the longest wavelength of the purely electronic ${}^{3}F_{4} \rightarrow$ ${}^{3}H_{6}$ transition is 2092 nm. As depicted in Fig. 1(b), the stimulated-emission cross-section, σ_{SE} , for the corresponding emission peak amounts to 0.21×10^{-20} cm². Furthermore, Tm³⁺ ions in Lu₂O₃ exhibit a broad and smooth phonon sideband extending up to at least 2.4 µm. By cooling the Tm:Lu₂O₃ crystal to 12 K, it is possible to reveal the structure of this long-wave emission and assign it to transitions to vibronic sub-levels coupled to the electronic states of the ³H₆ ground manifold, see Fig. 1(c). The same figure clearly presents weak and narrow lines related to the ³H₄ \rightarrow H₅ electronic transition.

3. VIBRONIC TM:LU₂O₃ LASER

For the laser experiment, an uncoated 1.8 at.% Tm:Lu₂O₃ crystal having a thickness of 5 mm was used. It was mounted on a passively cooled Cu-holder and placed in a hemispherical cavity formed by a flat pump mirror (HT at 0.80 µm and 2 µm, HR at 2.18–2.35 µm) and a concave (RoC = -100 mm) output coupler with a transmission *T*_{OC} of 0.65% or 0.8% at 2.3 µm. A Ti:sapphire laser tuned to 796 nm was used as pump source. The pump radiation was focused by an achromatic AR-coated lens (f = 75 mm). The continuous-wave Tm:Lu₂O₃ laser generated a maximum output power of 654 mW at 2238-2309 nm (a broad spectrum) with a slope efficiency of 68.9% with respect to the absorbed pump power and a laser threshold of 0.70 W, Fig. 2(a,b). The laser efficiency exceeded the Stokes limit due to a one-for-two pump process enabled by an energy-transfer upconversion, ${}^{3}F_{4} + {}^{3}F_{4} \rightarrow {}^{3}H_{6} + {}^{3}H_{4}$. For comparison, laser operation on the longest electronic transition (at 2081 – 2102 nm) was studied, Fig. 2(a), featuring a much lower laser threshold. Both laser wavelengths were well explained by the gain spectra considering the phonon sideband, as shown in Fig. 2(c).

4. CONCLUSION

To conclude, Tm:Lu₂O₃ crystals feature a strong electron-phonon interaction which results in an intense phonon sideband in the emission spectrum extending up to at least 2.4 μ m and supporting vibronic laser operation at wavelengths being much longer than those for the ³F₄ \rightarrow ³H₆ electronic transition. The obtained results are relevant for the development of broadly tunable and femtosecond mode-locked lasers emitting beyond 2 μ m.

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
