NEW TOWN OF COLUMBIA PROPOSES 10 VILLAGES TO ACCOMMODATE 110,000 The design for Columbia, Maryland, a complete new

The design for Columbia, Maryland, a complete new town for 110,000 people, will be a series of 10 villages of nine to 12 thousand people each around a town center. It is being developed by Community Research and Development, Inc., Baltimore, on a 15,200-acre site.

William E. Finley, former director of the National Capital Planning Commission, is project director for Columbia. Chief designer on the project is Morton Hoppenfeld, also a former member of the N.C.P.C. and of the Philadelphia City Planning Commission. Staff architects include Robert Tennenbaum, another former N.C.P.C. staff member, Richard Stauffer and William Gillitt.

Columbia is located in the heart of the transportation corridor between Baltimore and Washington in Howard County which now contains 48,000 people.

Each of the villages will contain from 2,500 to 3,500 families. In each village will be a center which is the heart of its community.


Columbia's typical village will consist of five or six neighborhoods of 500 to 600 families each. Within each space is provided for a neighborhood center.

The villages are clustered around the town center (above). The town center, located on a lakefront, will contain public and municipal facilities, as well as structures for commercial and recreational use.

In the total project, expected to be completed by 1980, there will be 29,000 dwelling units and employment for 30,000. There will be 3,469 acres of permanent open space; 1,674 acres for industrial and primary employment; 6,739 acres for residential; 346 acres for commercial; and 1,780 acres for miscellaneous use. There will be five lakes totaling more than 600 acres of water surface.



Finnish Exhibit In D.C.

A REMARKABLE planned community in Finland is the subject of an exhibition that has opened at the National Housing Center in Washington.

The community is Tapiola, located 7 miles from Helsinki. It is not just a suburb. It is a town on its own, incorporating all levels of wage earners on a 670acre site. The buildings are 90 per cent owned by the dwellers. and the community has jobs for 60 per cent of the population.

This is not a drawing board dream-17,500 people live there now, and by the expected completion date of 1965 the anticipated population will be 60.000.

Seven private welfare organizations banded together to produce the community effort. A housing company is formed to construct each apartment building; there are also single-family residences. Apartment owners are stock holders in the company. These various housing companies, in turn, own the service and supply companies which maintain the community.

The landscaping for each residence is handled on a community basis. This includes lower income homes as well as those for higher income families. Thus, landscaping is not a mat-ter of each individual doing what he can or will. The town does the landscaping in accordance with a well-coordinated design.

The community is on a rolling wooded site, dotted with lakes, There are forested areas 'and light industrial areas, A unique traffic plan gives prime consideration to pedestrians and the safety of the young and old, It even includes special lanes for cyclists.

Finland's cold winters are dealt with by a central heating facility for the whole town, including the single-family resi-

What does Tapiola mean? The name derives from Tapia, an old Finnish god of the forest,

The organization which made the community a reality is known as the Finnish Housing Foundation. It consists of the seven welfare organizations.

Although I realize that you have met Heikki von Hertzen, and that Bill Finley has also had discussions with him I feel that a 3 to 5 day visit by him as a consultant to us would be tremendously helpful at this stage of Columbia development. There are 2 specific uses to which I think he could be put.

l) To review our present plans for the allocation of land to detached houses, townhouses, garden apartments and high rise.

This particular aspect of the Tapiola development is superior to anything that I have seen. We were also tremendously impressed by methods he used in mixing the economic contours. I feel that they have accomplished to a great extent what we are trying to accomplish in this aspect of Columbia. He has shown a practical approach to planning and for solving problems that involve our future merchandising that would be most helpful.

It is my thought that he should meet with our merchandising and management committees plus several people from the mortgage department. I would contemplate that these meetings would involve as many half day sessions as appear advisable. In between times I would plan to work with him on the details of some of our present plan as they relate to merchandising in accordance with our over all objectives. His experience and knowledge I feel would be most helpful.

2) It had been my desire and I believe yours to arrange for a series of fairly intimate luncheon meetings (light lunch) of key businessmen from Baltimore and Washington. Von Hertzen is an interesting and impressive speaker. The ULI group were fascinated by his talks with us. If we arranged for 4 luncheons with 25 to 35 businessmen at each luncheon, 2 days for Baltimore businessmen and 2 days for Washington businessmen – V.H. as speaker would create additional interest in these meetings. The list of guests should be compiled by the merchandising committee with the assistance of George Brady. It should include retail prospects, house and apt. builders with whom we desire to do business, industrial prospects, opinion moulders and potential investors.


