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## INTRODUCTION

## MATERIAL & METHODS

- Challenges of the personalized medicine are to make the right diagnosis in order to provide the right treatment at the right time to the right patient.
- Metabolomic approach allows to enhance patient biological data to describe the individual health status and to enhance the clinical biology parameters.
- Currently, several medical biology analyses are performed using blood samples.
- DBS (Dried Blood Spot) are used in clinical settings to detect neonatal



diseases.

• DBS could be a self-sampling device, possibly sent by mail to the hospital, allowing everyone to easily access to biological analysis even in a remote area or for elderly patients with mobility problems.

The aim of this study is to evaluate the metabolomic and lipidomic information obtained from blood samples compared to DBS

- DBS is as informative as serum with metabolomic approach
  The compound number in all chemical classes are equivalent
- DBS is less informative than serum with lipidomic approach
  The compound number in all chemical classes are not equivalent

### **CONCLUSION & PERSPECTIVES**

- ⇒ Using a metabolomic workflow, the metabolic information of DBS is superior to serum (features: 11 314 vs 8 826 respectively), while maintaining a similar molecular diversity and complying with objective assessment criteria (CV< 10% obtained with n=10).</li>
   ⇒ Using a lipidomic workflow, the lipidic information of DBS is lower than serum information (features: 2 258 vs 10 841 respectively).
- Furthermore, DBS are self-sampling devices, inexpensive & can be sent by post to the laboratory, so they could be used in clinical studies, for patient monitoring and to connect people living in remote area with healthcare.
