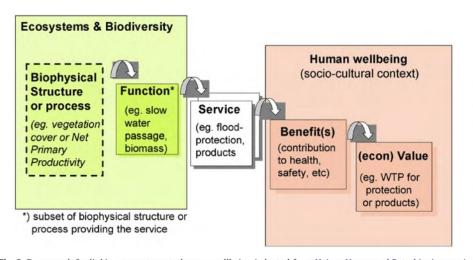

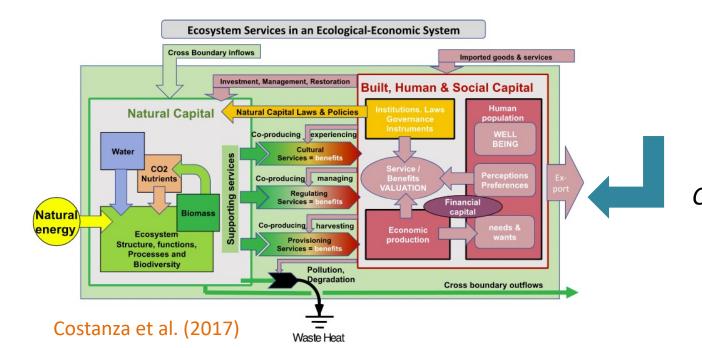

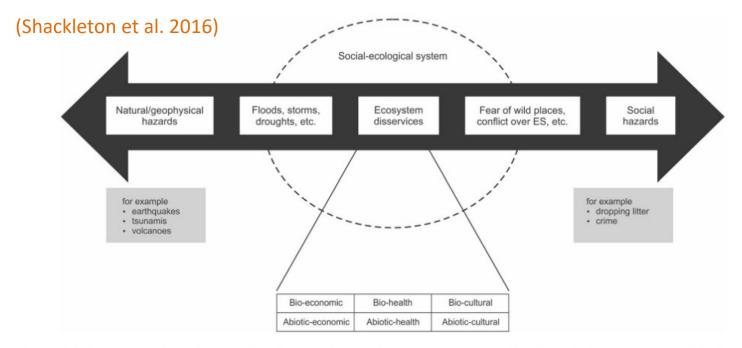
#### Contributions of the cascade model

- > Articulates Ecosystem services (ES) and Ecosystem structures & functions
- > Articulates ES and benefits (Fisher et al. 2009:646)
- ➤ Distinguishes intermediate and final ES (Boyd & Banzhaf 2007)
- > Acknowledges coproduction processes (Palomo et al. 2016)

But cascade models do not explicitly take into account ecosystem-based nuisances

## The concept of ecosystem disservices (EDS)

"Ecosystem disservices are the ecosystem generated functions, processes and attributes that result in **perceived or actual** negative impacts on human wellbeing" (Shackleton et al. 2016:590)



**Figure 1.** Ecosystem disservices within the continuum from natural to social hazards. The social-ecological system boundary is not solid to reflect that the boundaries between ecosystem disservices and other harmful phenomena (termed hazards) are usually fuzzy

#### EDS are not

- Reduced or constrained supply of an ES
- Events or phenomena that have no ecosystem origin
- Social responses
- Land management actions that impact biodiversity

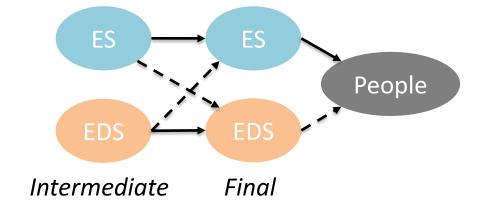
#### A constructivist definition of ES and EDS

ES and EDS as social constructs

They are subjective interpretations, socially situated and constructed, of ecological phenomena

Intermediate vs. final

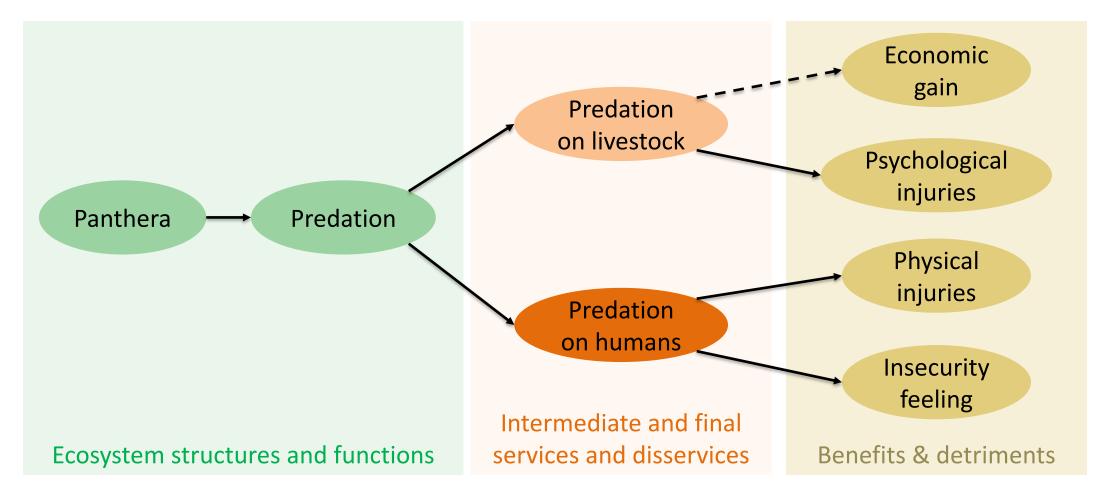
They influence human well-being either directly or indirectly



- Ecosystem services: the ecological structures, functions and processes that people recognize as supporting, directly or indirectly, their wellbeing
- ➤ Ecosystem disservices: the ecological structures, functions and processes that people recognize as detrimental, directly or indirectly, to their well-being

#### **Delineating benefits and detriments**

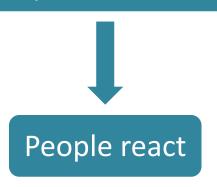
ES and EDS must be ecosystem-based



#### **Integrating coproduction processes**

People are affected by ES and EDS

People's mental models (representations, knowledge, motivation) People's well-being (material and non-material)

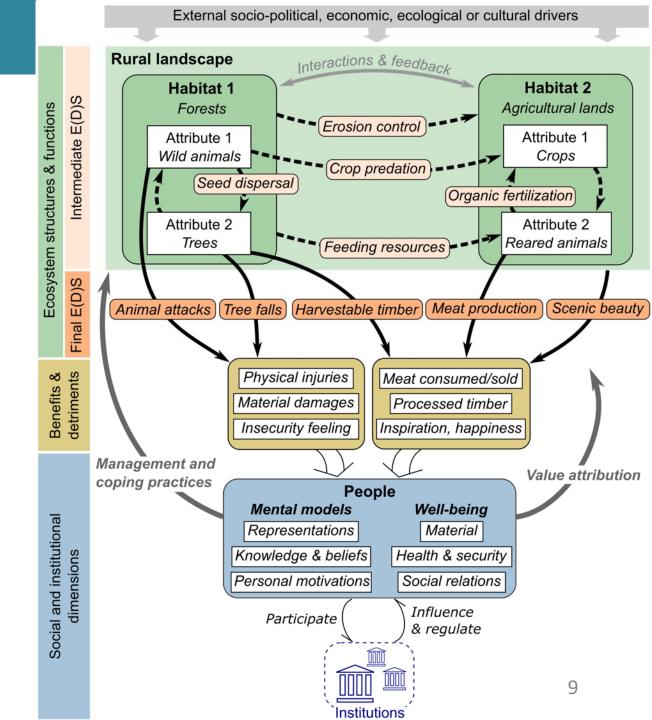


Through management and coping practices
Through value attribution processes
Through institutional arrangements

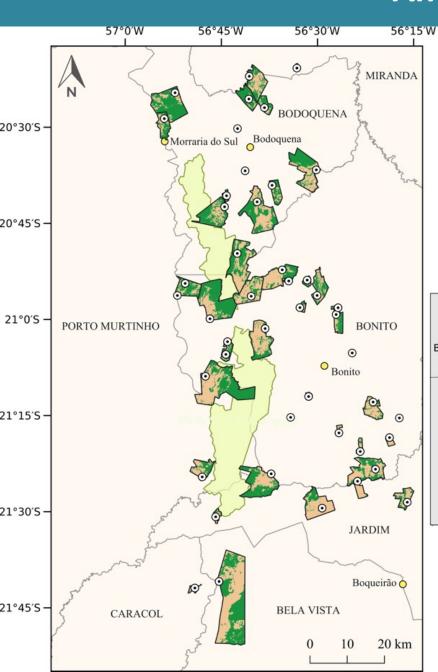
## The ES/EDS cascade model

- ➤ ES and EDS are produced at different organizational levels
- ➤ ES and EDS can be intermediate or final

- ➤ Benefits and detriments are either material or non-material
- ➤ ES and EDS induce a response from the society at different levels

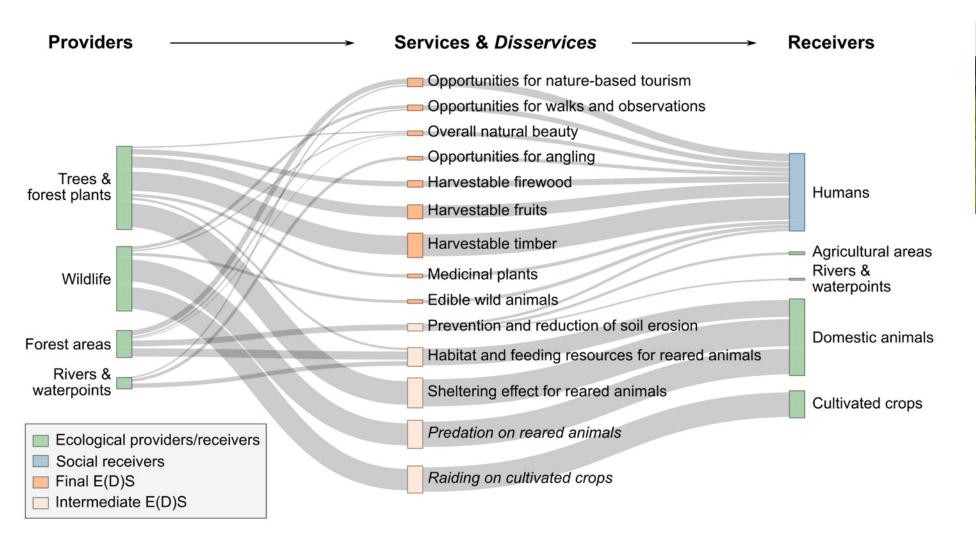
## Semi-structured interviews in 46 farms (~120 000 ha)

> 30 ES (15 final + 15 intermediate) and 18 EDS (6 final + 12 intermediate)

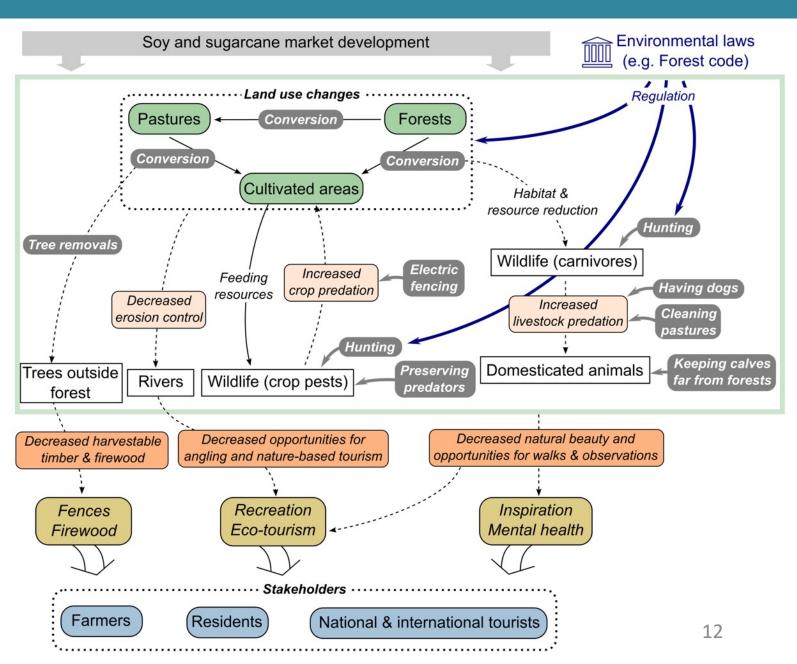






## An application example in Brazil

#### Potential and limits of this novel E(D)S cascade framework





- > Understanding who benefit and who suffer from a decision, and tackling social conflicts and justice and equity issues
- > Balanced systemic approach of the complexity of human-nature relationships
- > Towards innovative pathways to cope with disservices without harming ecosystems

> Anthropocentric and utilitarian framework



- ➤ The ES / EDS dichotomy might not always be easy to sustain as the frontier between the two could be porous
- ➤ What added value compared to an environmental values framework?
