Feed restriction in dairy ewes decreases milk lipolysis and remodels the milk proteome and lipidome

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> Milk lipolysis implications

Milk fat lipolysis = hydrolysis of fat globule triglycerides into free fatty acids. High level of lipolysis in milk : v organoleptic (rancid taste) and technological properties of products.



Ewe's milk production in the EU is dominated by Greece, Spain and Italy. France, Cyprus, Turkey, Bulgaria, Portugal and Romania are also producers.

↗ use for highly-fresh products
(yogurts) from which rancid flavor is not acceptable.



Major part is processed in cheese (e.g. in France Ossau-Iraty and Roquefort). Foaming problems can occur.

The lipolysis of milk is of three types:

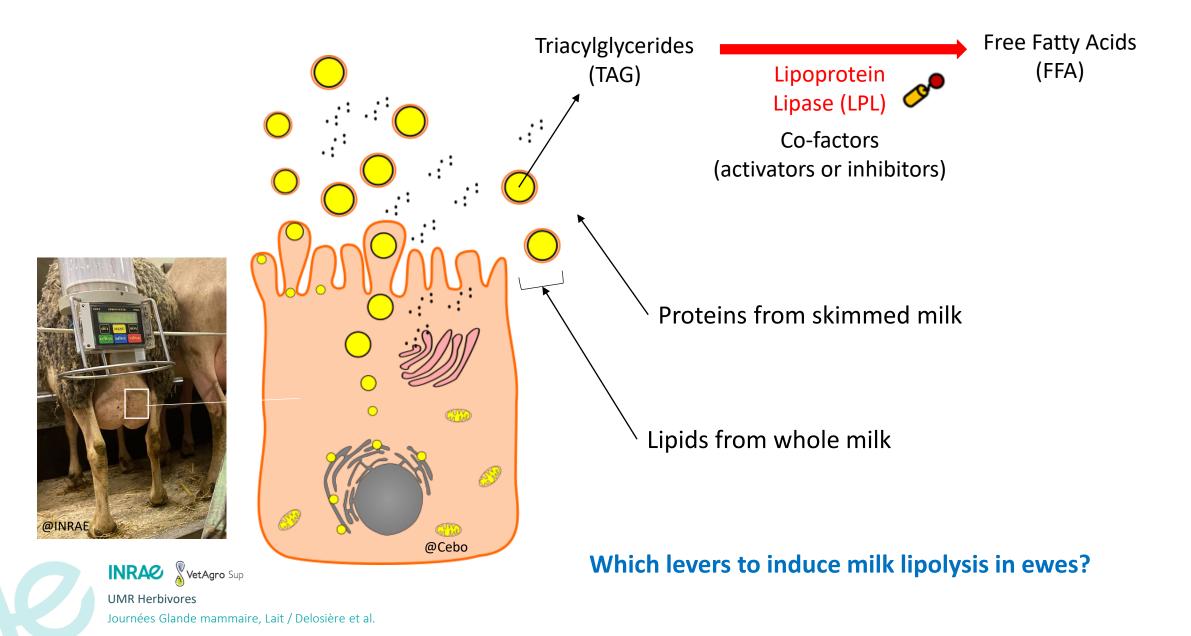
- « spontaneous lipolysis » in cold milk is due to the action of milk native lipoprotein lipase (LPL)
- « induced lipolysis » is due to LPL action increased by milk agitation, foaming or temperature changes
- « microbial lipolysis » occurs during long-term storage of products

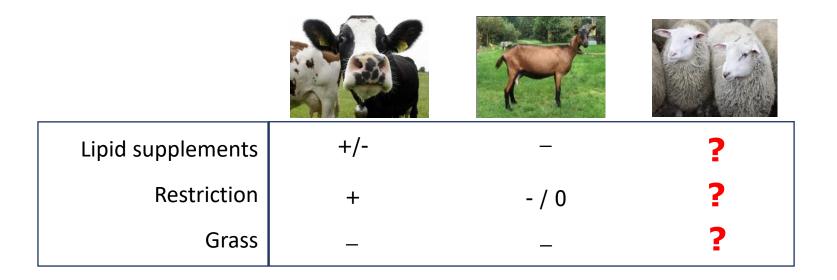

To characterize the effects of dietary restriction on milk lipolysis in ewe

To explore proteomes and lipidomes of ewe's milk to better understand the mechanisms of lipolysis



> Experimental design

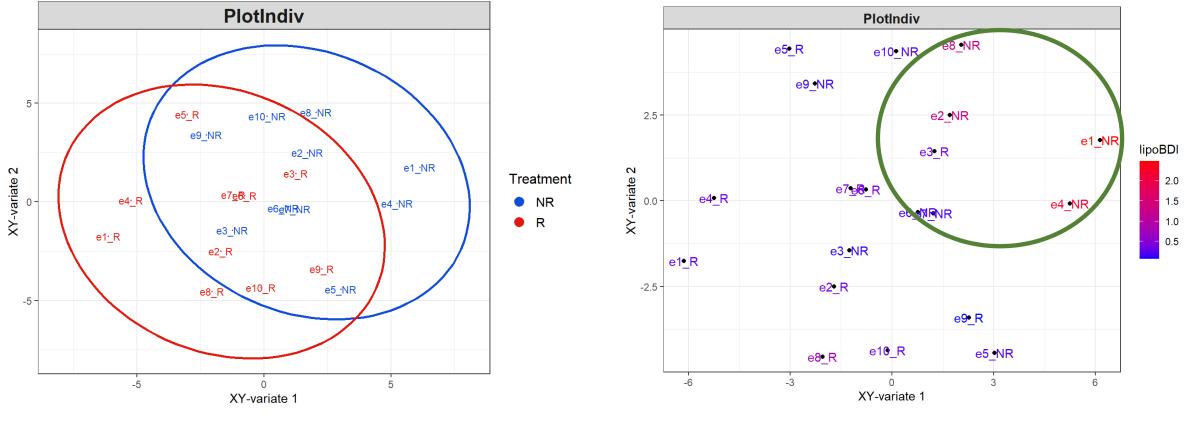
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Effect on milk's proteome and lipidome?

328 proteins were identified in skim milk from ewes

A highest lipolysis group

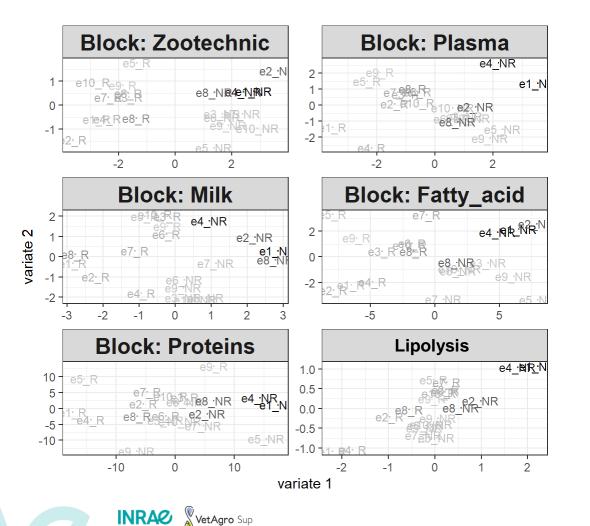
Which are the proteins discriminating lipolysis?

A light feed restriction effect

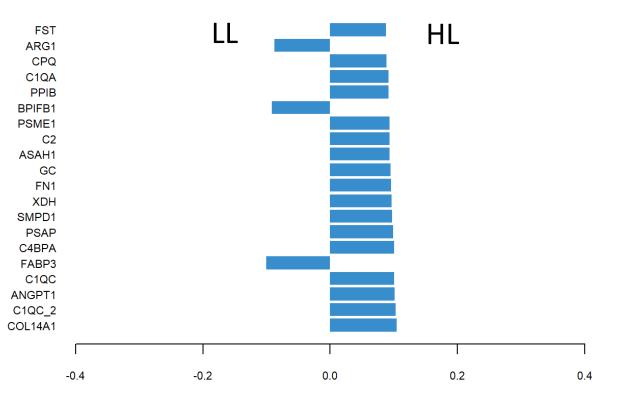
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> Milk proteins discriminates high lipolysis group

> 17 skimmed milk proteins contribute to high lipolysis group

Gene Ontology reported significant terms

BP: Complement activation ; Immune system ; Ceramide and sphingolipid catabolic process

CC: Lytic vacuole, lysosome

MF: Acid sphingomyelin phosphodiesterase activity; ceramidase activity

-	SMPD1	Sphingomyelin phosphodiesterase

3 proteins implicated in degradation of sphingolipids (SM) and ceramides (Cer)

- Sphingolipids and ceramides are located in the rafts of fat globule membranes (Lopez et al., 2010; Wei et al. 2023).
- The lipid rafts are suggested as break-down point of MFGM (Wei et al., 2023).

=> Follow up with the lipidome



> First results from the milk lipidome analysis

Sphingomyelin (SM)	41 826	110 606
Ceramide (Cer)	7.4	164.3

⇒ Analysis workflow on lipidome and lipolysis effect is still in progress ...

SM and Cer are modulated by feed restriction (to be confirmed)

3 proteins from high lipolysis skim milk could participate in the hydrolysis of SM and Cer of MFGM...



> Conclusions and perspectives for the study on ewes

- Feed restriction affects dairy performances in ewes and modulates spontaneous milk lipolysis
- The 3 proteins contributing to the high level of milk lipolysis (PSAP, SMPD1, ASAH1) could participate to hydrolyze Cer and SM and fragilize the MFGM (to be confirmed by lipidomic analysis)

A first combination of proteins and lipids results allow to propose a mechanism explaining lipolysis => a fat globule membrane degradation allows LPL access to TAG substrate

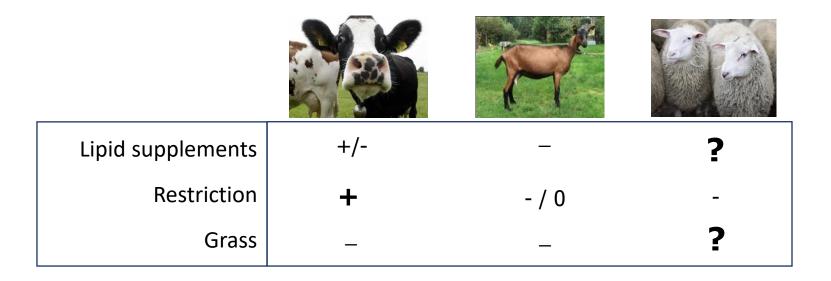

To identify biomarkers of spontaneous lipolysis and putative regulators of LPL enzyme in bovine skim milk.

=> we used feed restriction as a lever to generate highly contrasted samples with regard to milk lipolysis and to study skim milk proteome.

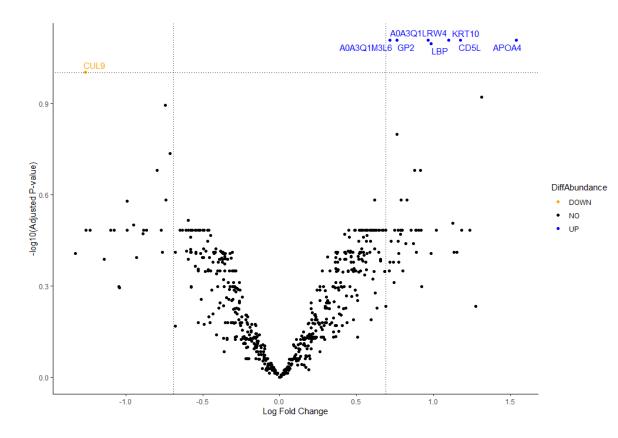
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Effect on cow milk's proteome?

Projection of <u>differential abundances</u> of milk's proteins (Volcano plot representation)

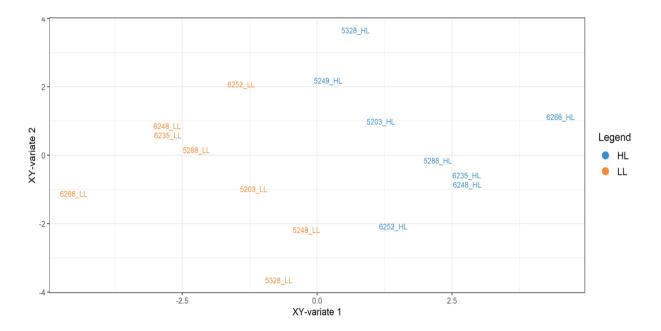

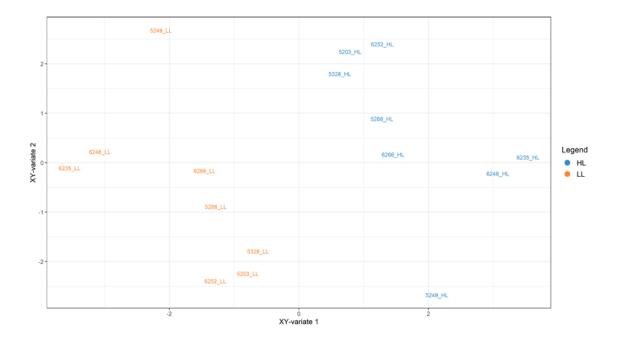

Proteome projection of individuals according to sparse Partial Least Squares regression-Discriminant Analysis (block X = proteins; <u>block Y = LPL activity</u>)



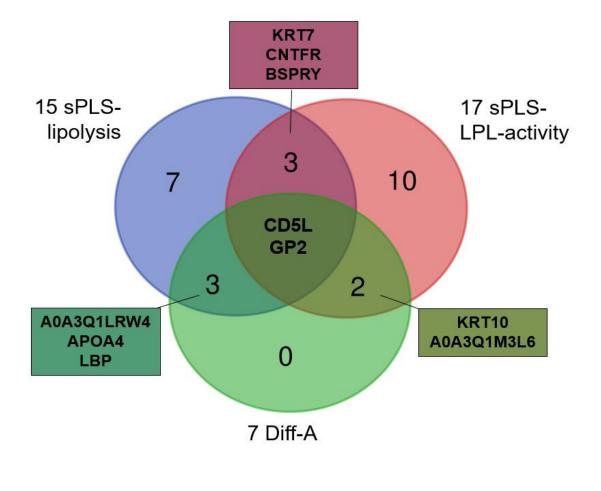

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Common proteins contributing to HL?

> 2 skim milk proteins are putative biomarkers of lipolysis

Combination of analyses: differential abundances, sPLS-DA on lipolysis and sPLS-DA on LPL activity



Putative biomarkers of high lipolysis in cow milk:

CD5 molecule like (CD5L) could bind and inhibit FASN, lowering de novo FA synthesis and favouring a higher FA uptake by both the mammary LPL and NEFA transporters.

Glycoprotein 2 (GP2) is a glycosylphosphatidylinositolanchored glycoprotein may be involved in the link of LPL with MFGM.

+ Apolipoprotein A4 (APOA4) is requiered for efficient activation of LPL by APOCII.

> Conclusions and perspectives for the study on cows

• Feed restriction affects dairy performances and increases spontaneous milk lipolysis

- We identified CD5L and GP2 as robust biomarkers of high spontaneous lipolysis in cow milk
- Lipidome is under analysis

- HID1 (Chromosome 17 open reading frame 28 ortholog),
- SURF4 (Surfeit locus protein 4)
- CUL9 (Cullin 9)
