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Hippocampal functional adaptation to hypergravity exposure : new insights for cognitive alterations in astronauts

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Introduction

Materials and Methods

One of the difficulties for manned missions to Mars relies on exposure during flights to repetitive gravitational variations affecting in particular the vestibular system.

Given the vestibulo-hippocampal connections, hippocampal activity would be altered and could affect cognitive performances of the crew.

We studied the effects of a 24h, 48h or 15-day exposure to 2G hypergravity on 4-month C57BL/6JRj male mice hippocampus. Basal synaptic transmission and functional plasticity induced by conditioning stimulation at CA3/CA1 hippocampal synapses investigated using electrophysiological extracellular were recordings in ex vivo hippocampal slice preparations.

This study aimed to characterize functional alterations of hippocampal neuronal networks that could be induced by short- and long-term hypergravity exposure.



Functional plasticity (High Frequency Stimulation (HFS)-induced long-term potentiation)



depressed in 24h exposed mice (Unpaired t test, *:p<0,05; Mean+/-SEM).

Basal synaptic transmission

NMDAr activation (isolated synaptic potentials)



NMDA activation Specific receptor (required for LTP expression) was impaired 24 hours of hypergravity. only after Interestingly, this alteration was compensated by saturating the slices with the NMDA co-agonist D-serine $(100\mu M)$.

These results suggest that the NMDAdependent LTP deficit could rely on a weaker synaptic availability of the endogenous coagonist (D-serine or glycine) rather than changes in receptor density.



400 500 Stimulus intensity (μA) **Basal synaptic** transmission was unaffected regardless of time exposure to hypergravity.



One-way ANOVA ; Mean+/-SEM

Transient changes in functional synaptic plasticity in CA1 hippocampal networks occur in mice exposed to hypergravity. Whether these changes could drive cognitive alterations is currently under investigation and will provide information for putative mechanisms leading to cognitive deficits in astronauts, notably after maneuvers with transient changes in gravity (launching and landing).
