Implications for the Olympics

OLYMPIC AGENDA 2020+5 5 RECOMMENDATIO



As more and more International Federation of Basketball's (FIBA) sporting events and other single sport events are co-hosted (e.g. FIBA World Cup in 2023 by Japan, Indonesia, and the Philippines or most of the latest FIBA Eurobasket events) and the Olympics Games are allowed to go beyond one host city concept as per Agenda 2020+5 (Recommendation 2), these findings prove to be relevant for the Olympic world and its federations in understanding the collaborative patterns between the co-hosts, be it multiple venues, cities and/or countries.
