# III-V-based solar cells fabrication method



Few basic microfabrication steps needed to make a solar cell

# Crystalline quality of III-V materials

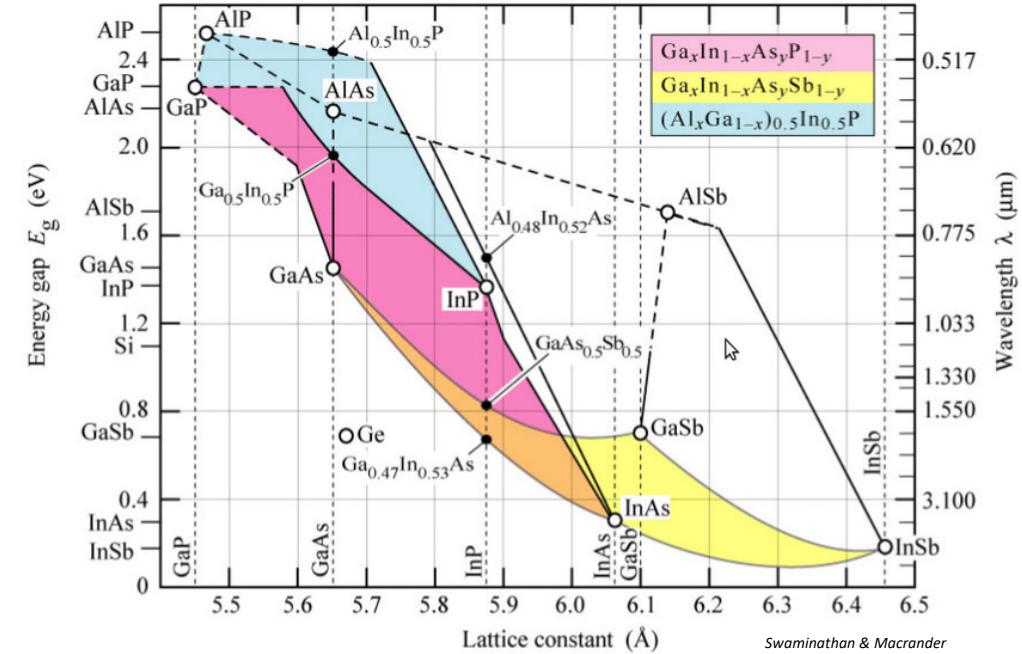
High quality crystalline material is required

→ Epitaxy is needed

→ Crystalline substrate with matched lattice constant

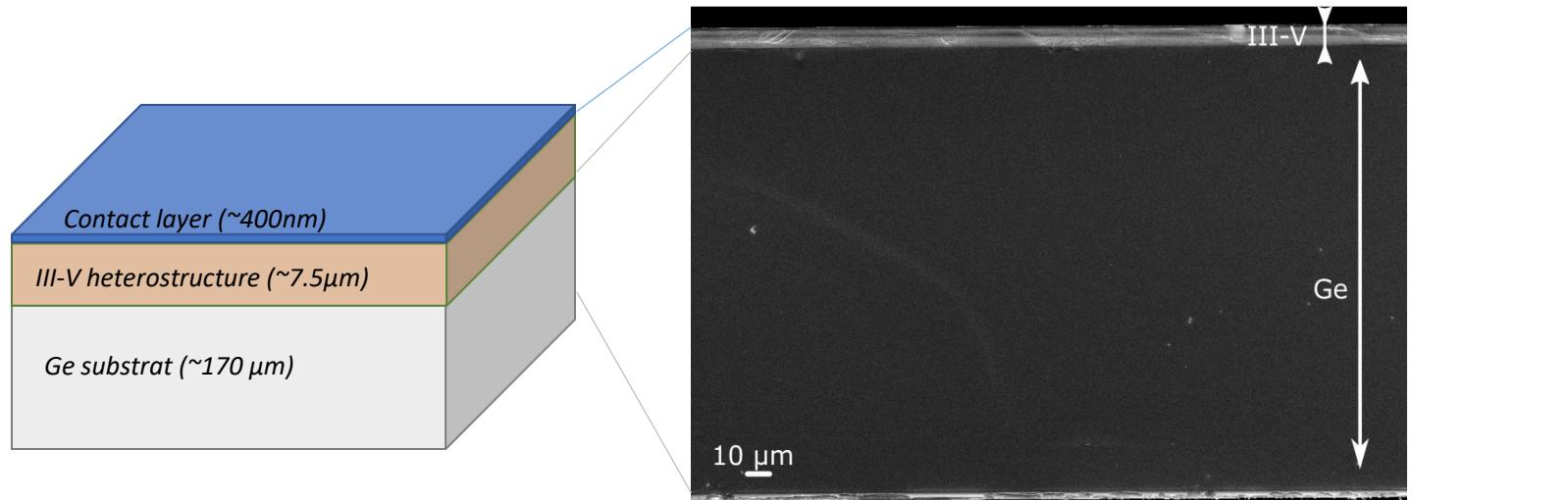
Germanium & GaAs:

- ~100\$ per wafer (~85% of the cost of the cell)
- ~5.3g/cm<sup>3</sup> (~95% of the weight of the cell)

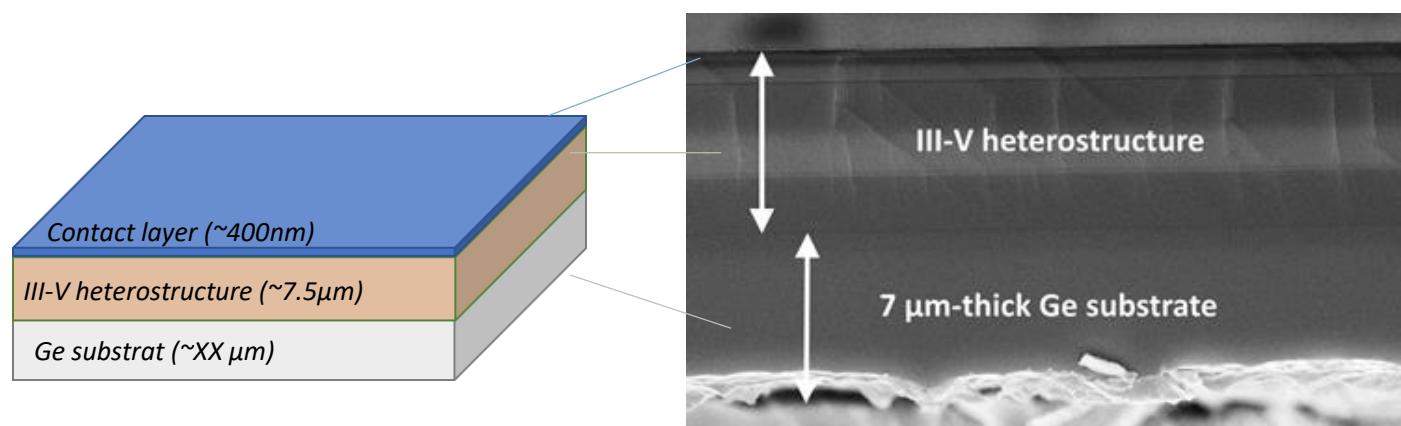

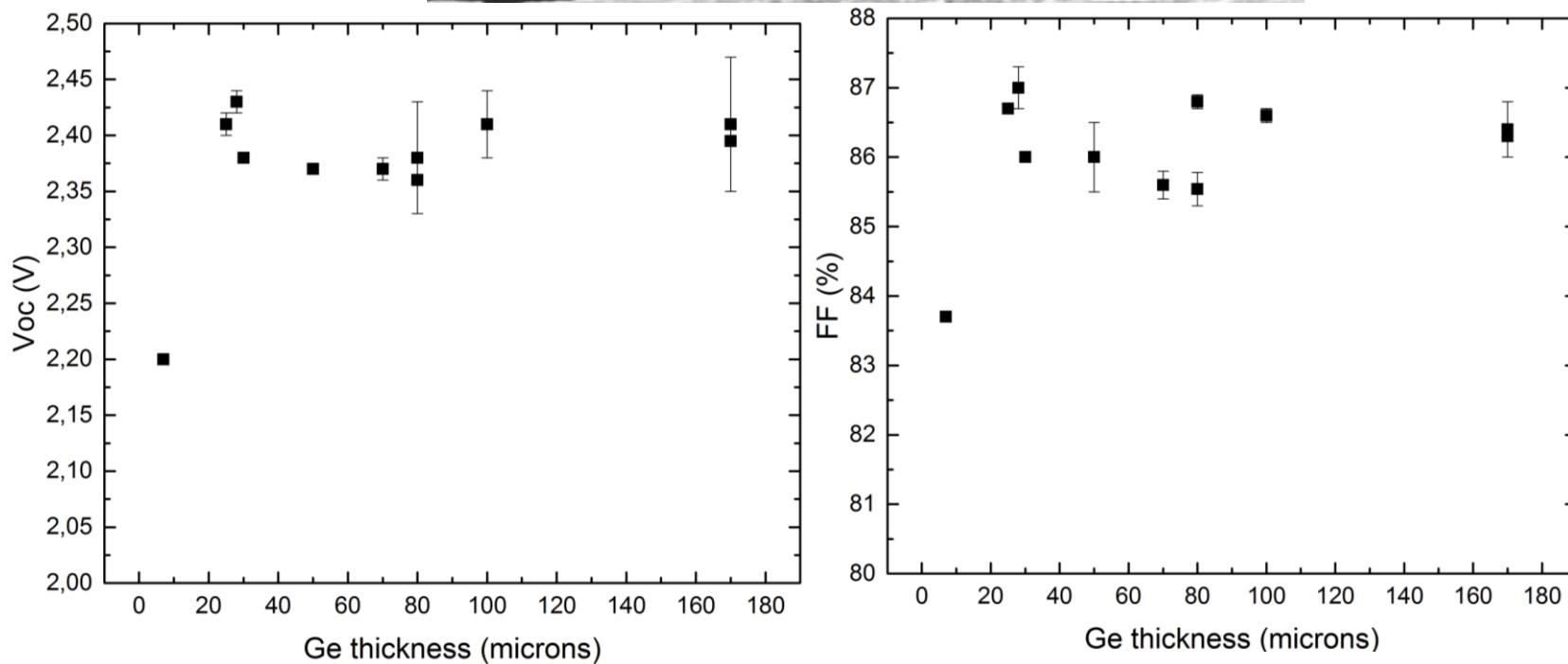
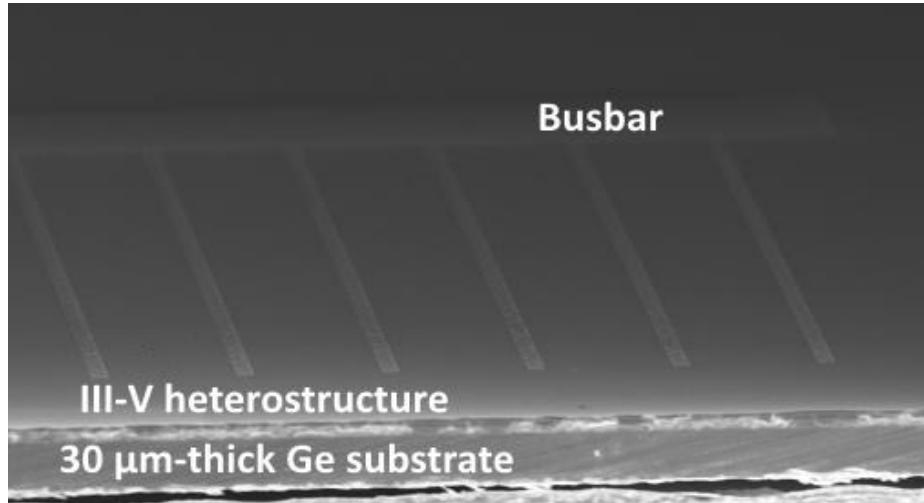

Substrate thinning process

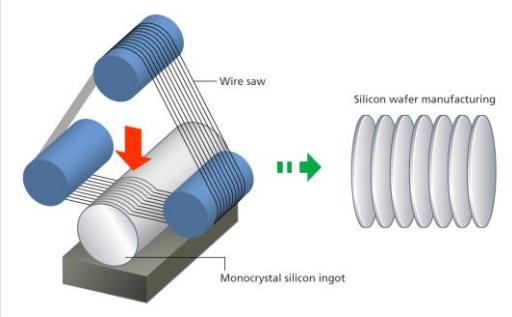
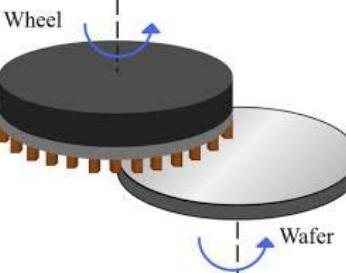
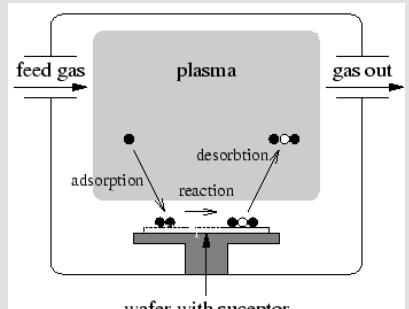


# Thin solar cell performance



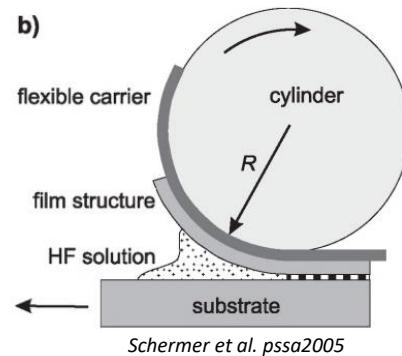
No significant cell performance degradation with thin Ge substrate ( $>25\mu\text{m}$ )  
→ 80% kg/W reduction

# Cell thinning solutions

# Substrate reusing approach

## Chemical separation (Lift off)



e.g. Alta device

- Long process (~30mm/hr)
- Needs a sacrificial layer

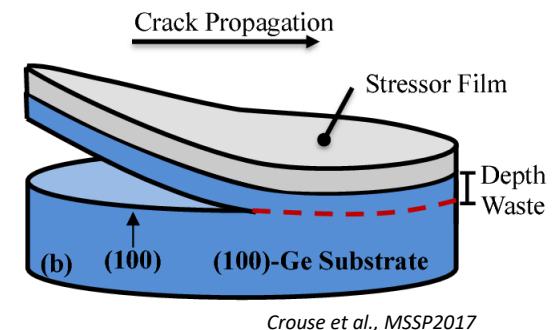
## Mechanical separation with a weak layer



e.g. smartcut, Ge on nothing,  
porous lift off

→ Need for a weak layer

## Mechanical separation (spalling)



- Need for stressor
- Wavy surface

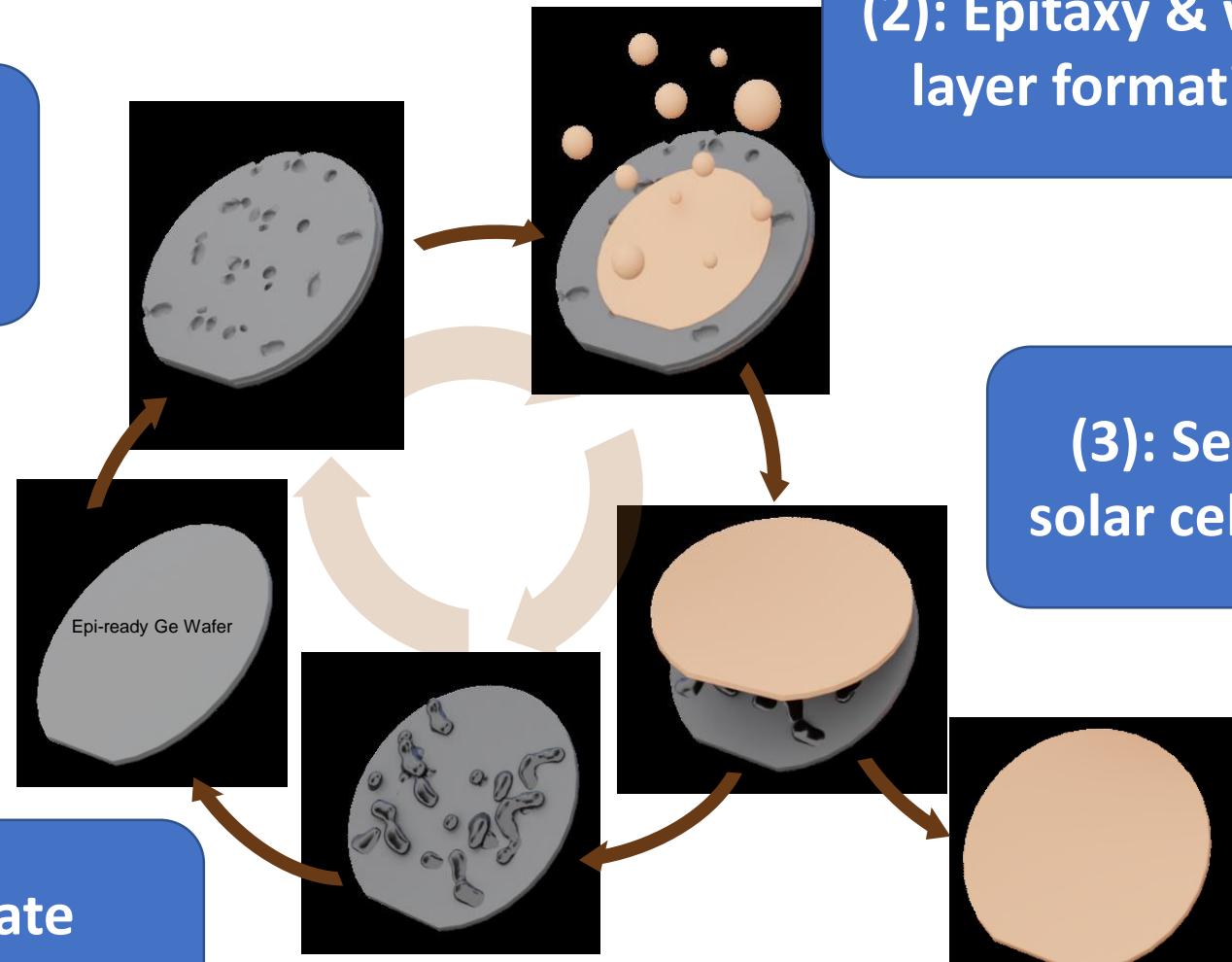
Porous Ge as a weak layer for mechanical

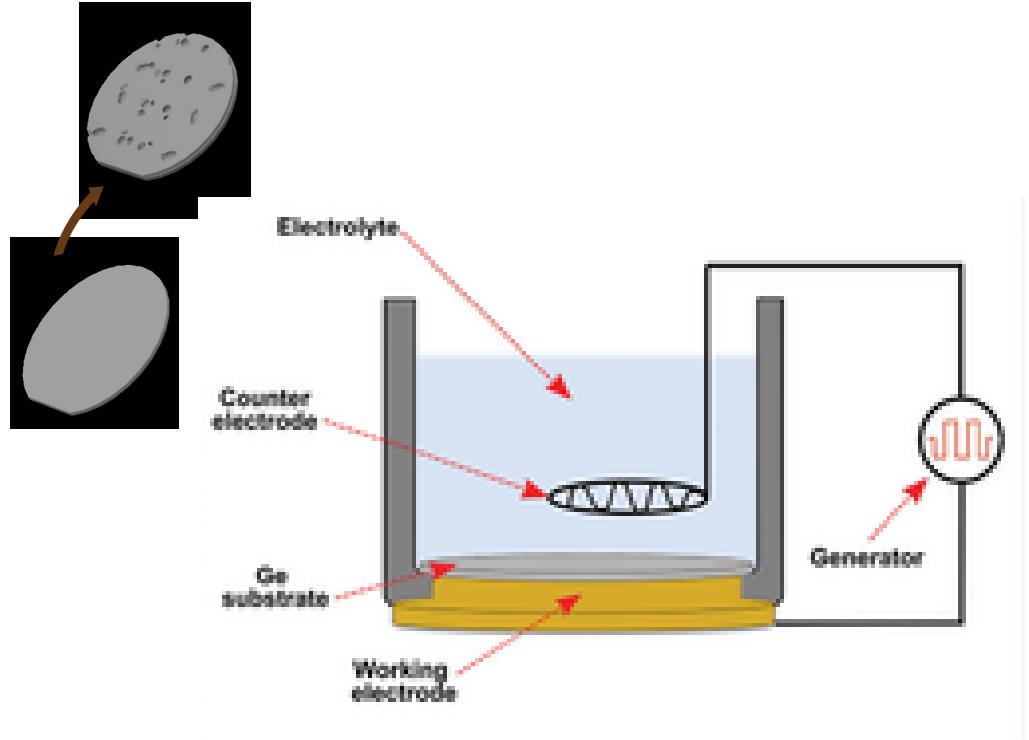

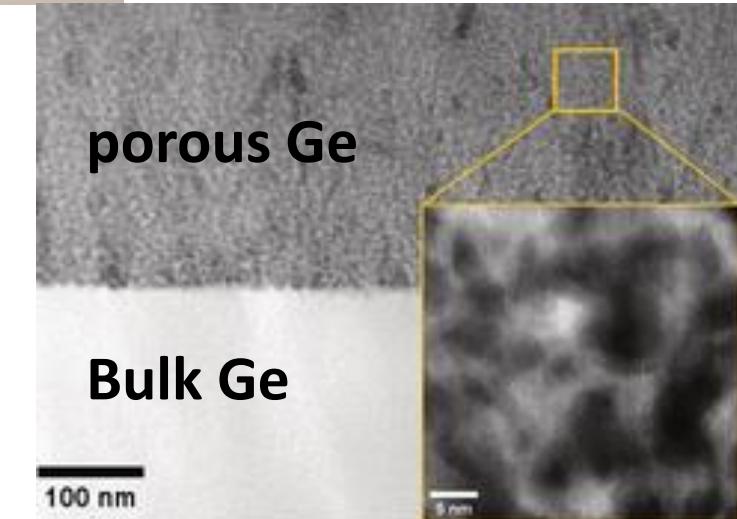
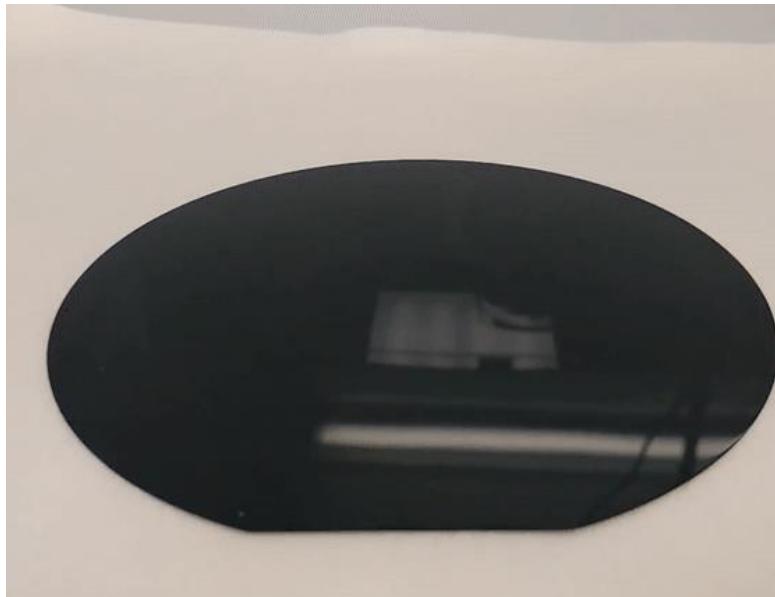

# Ge porosification

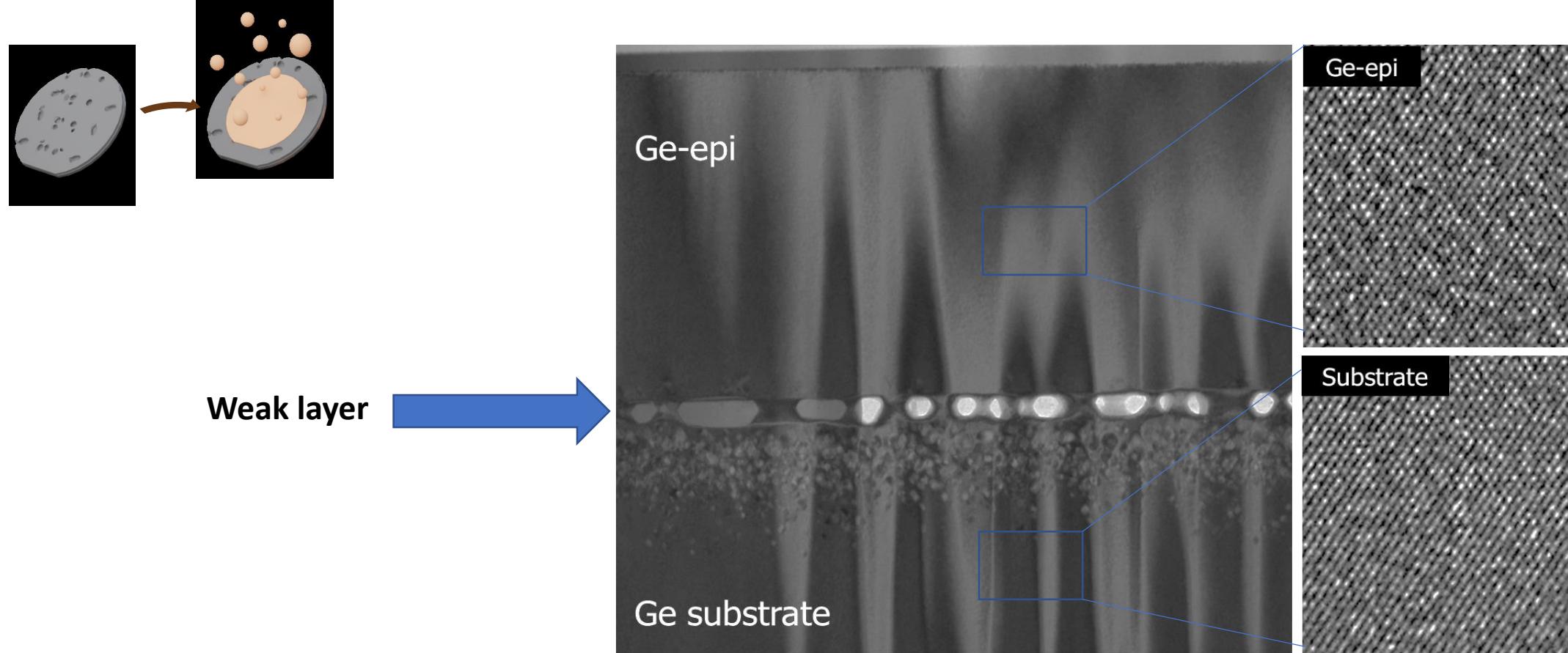


- Low cost, controllable and fast process
- Compatible with large scale wafers
- Keeps crystallinity of germanium



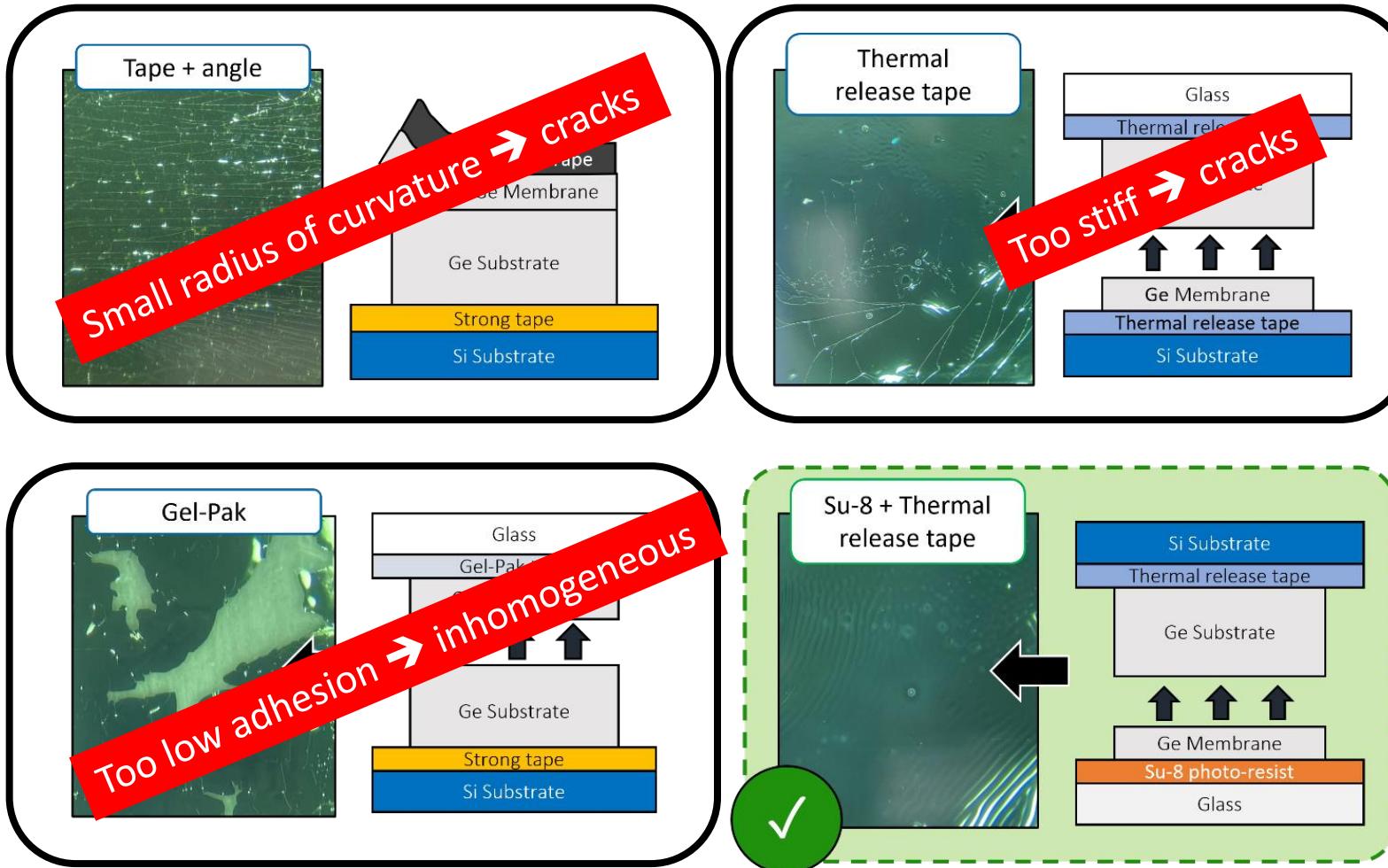
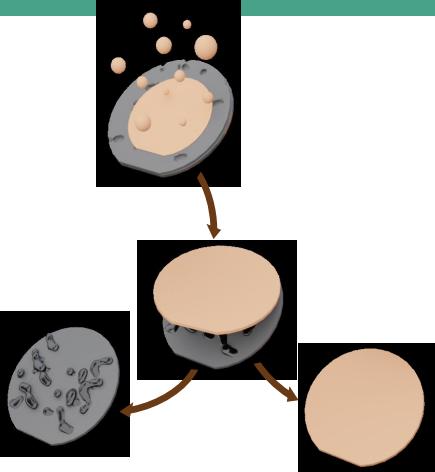

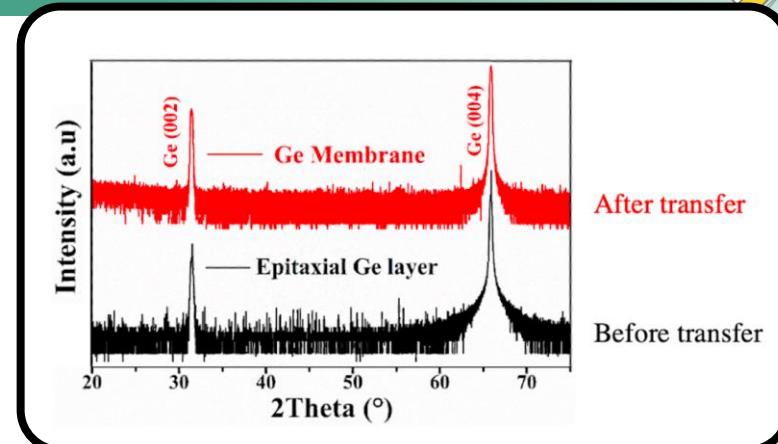
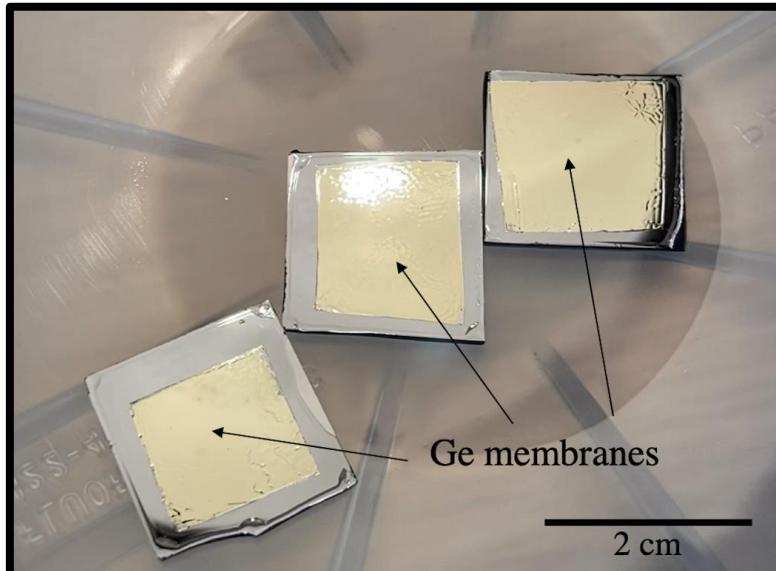
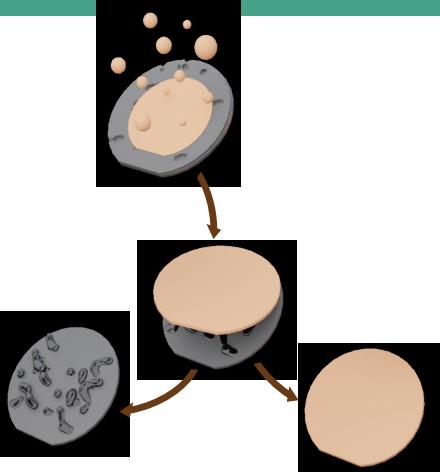
- Conservation of Ge crystalline quality

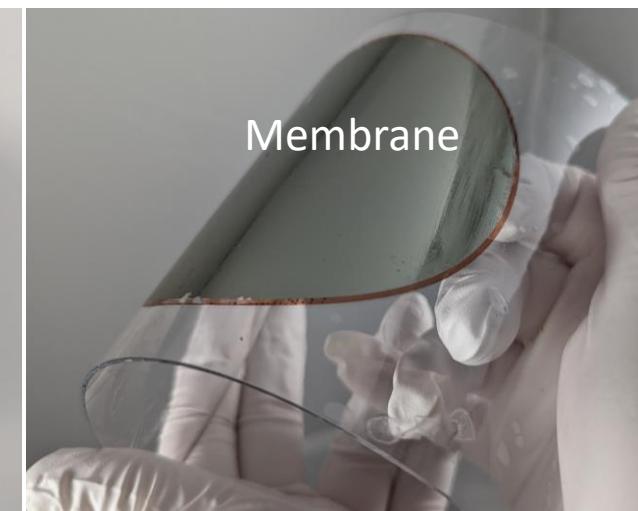


Control of adhesive and release method is key to large scale detachment

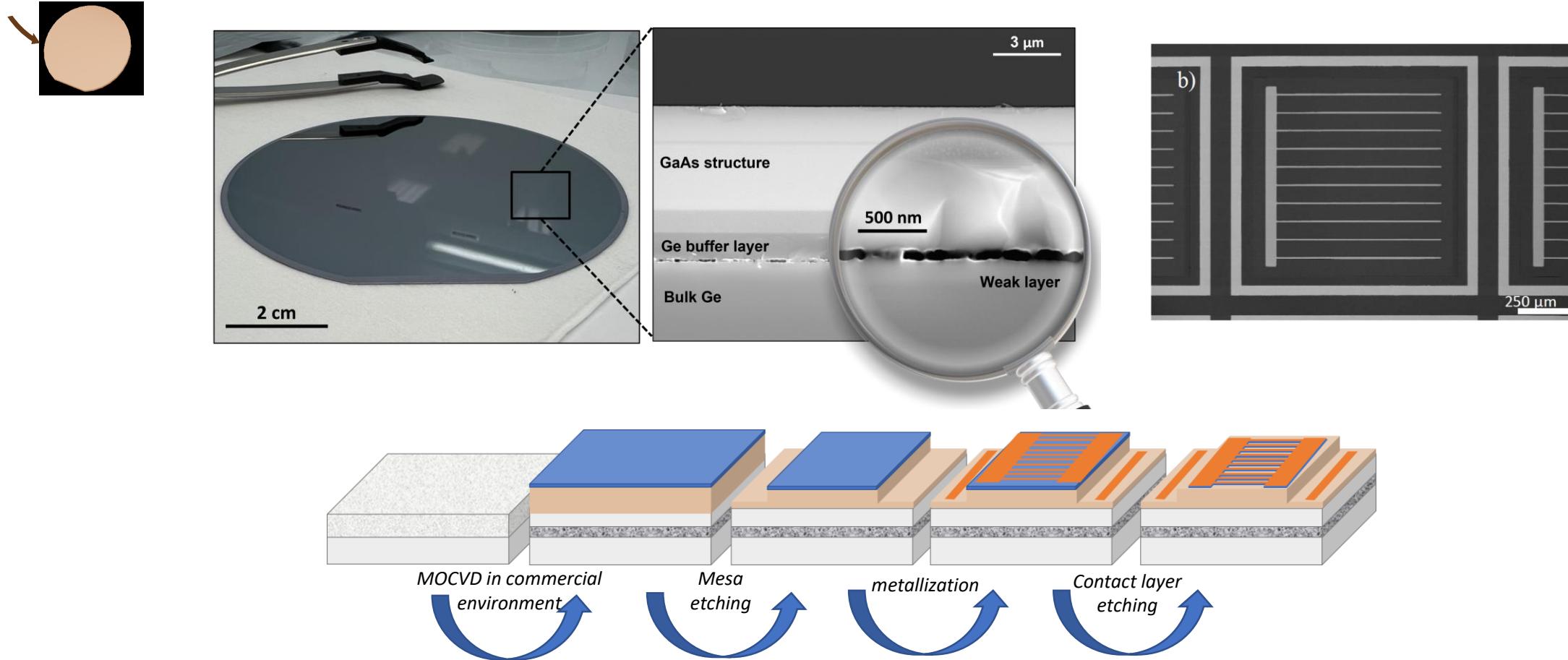

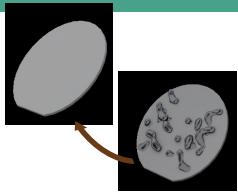
# Solar cells characteristics



- Single junction GaAs cells
  - AM1.5G 1sun I-V characterization
  - No anti reflective coating
  - Front side-contacted cells
- 22/25 cells functional (88% yield)

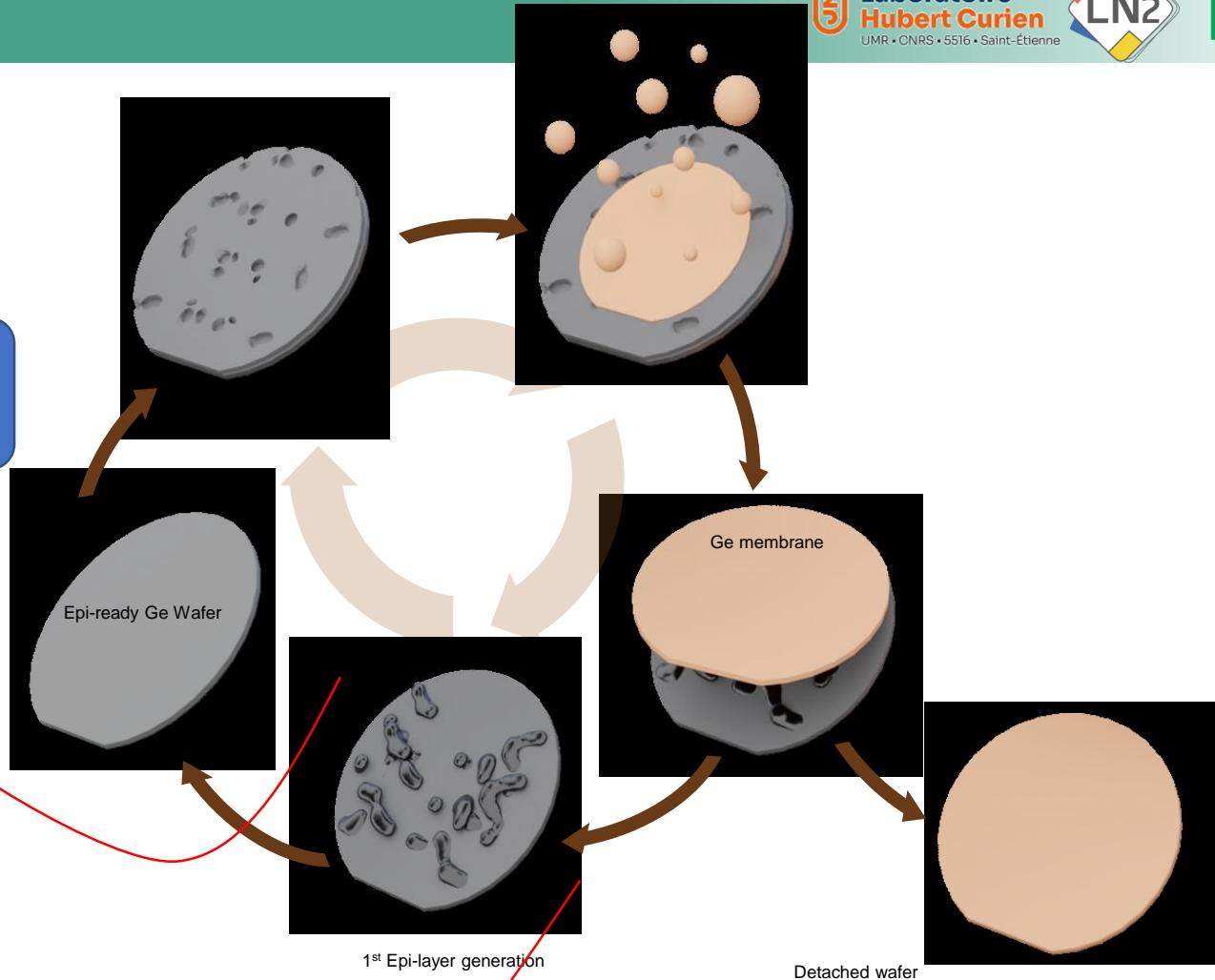
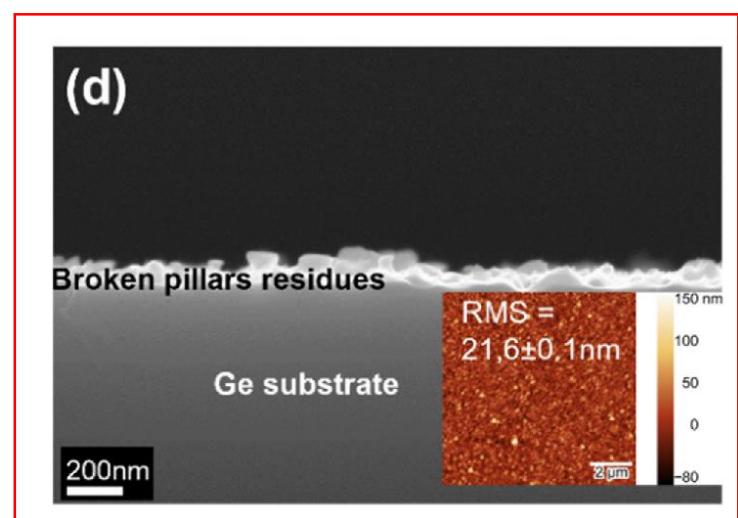
State of the art performance of cells fabricated on engineered wafers

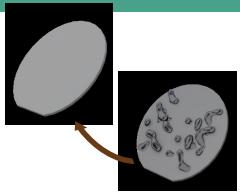


Can we recover Ge surface quality after separation?

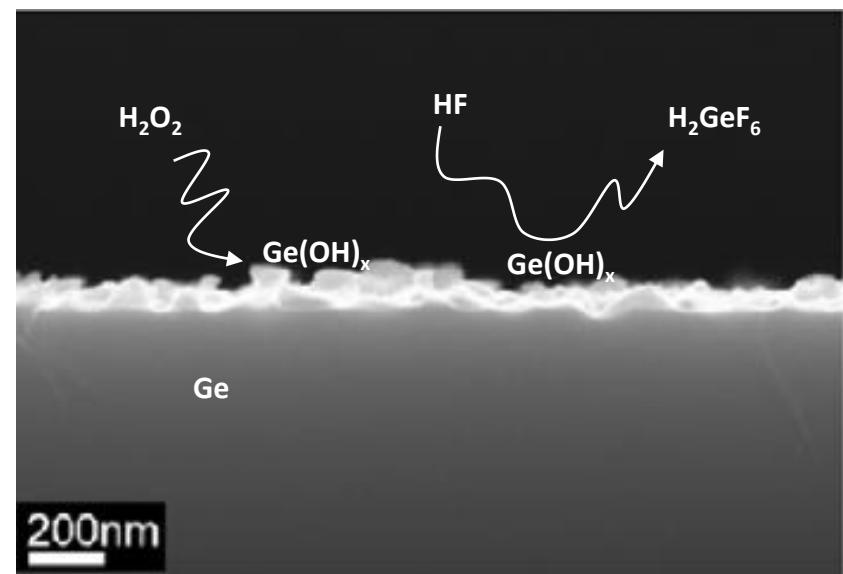
Broken pillars residues after separation  
→ High surface roughness



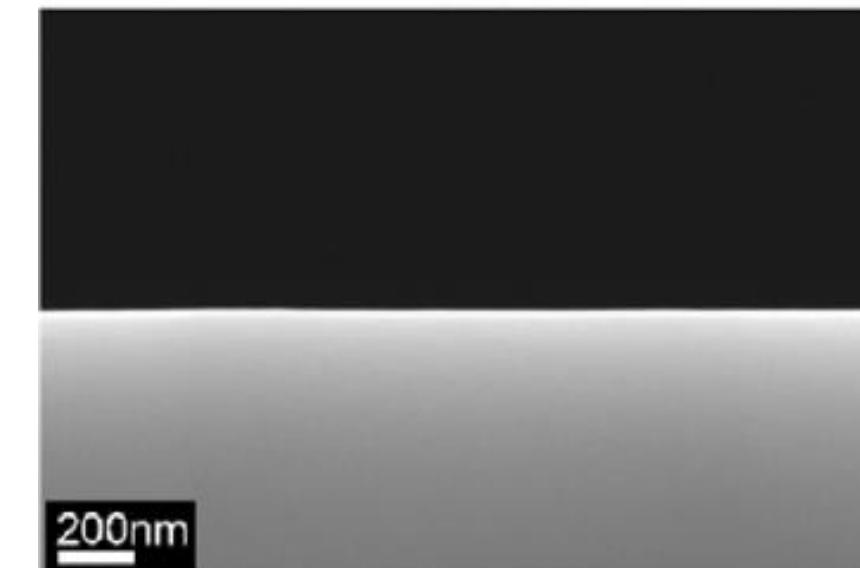

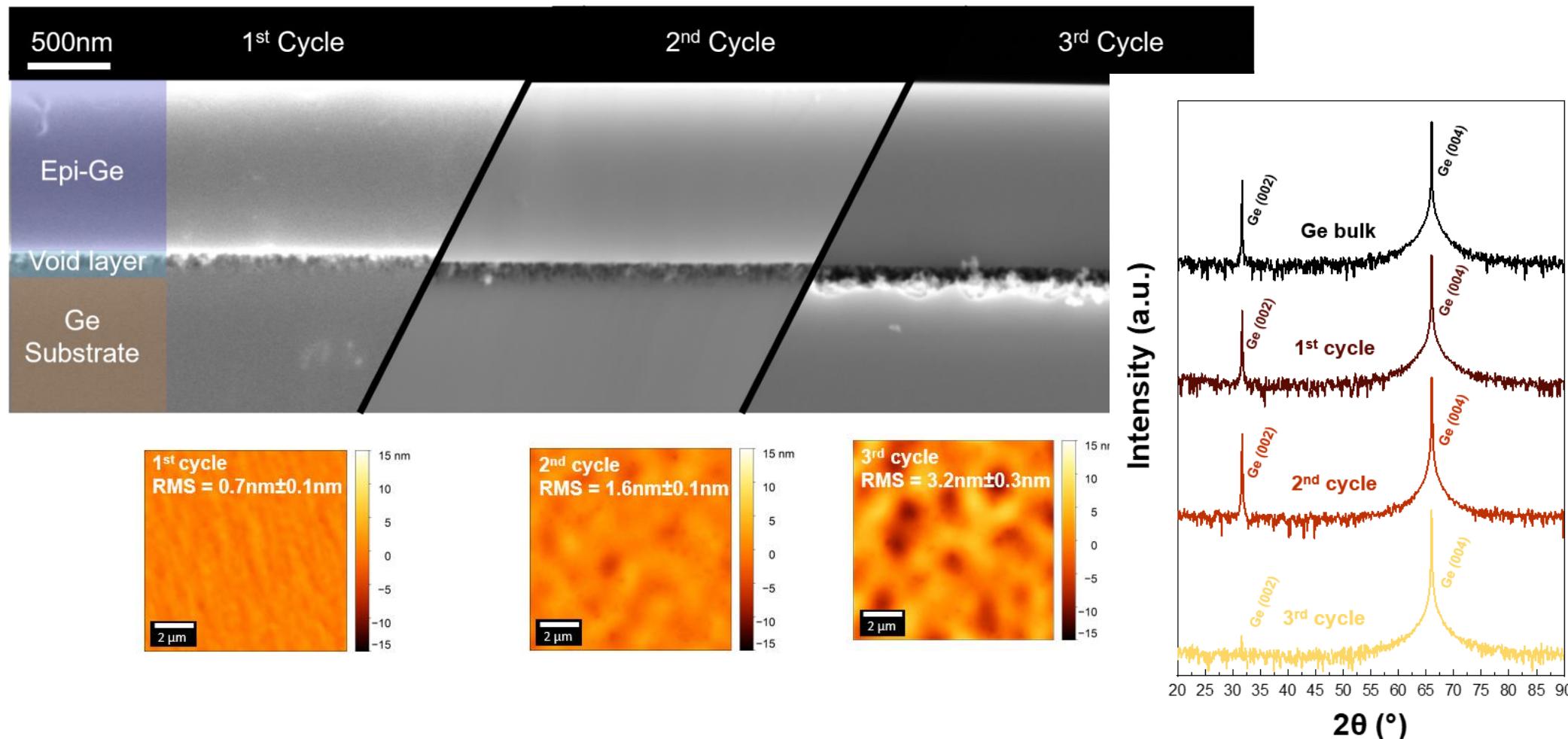
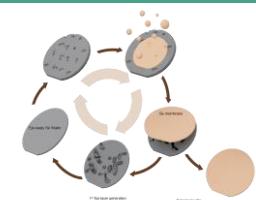
Wet chemical etching after detachment

# Multicycling

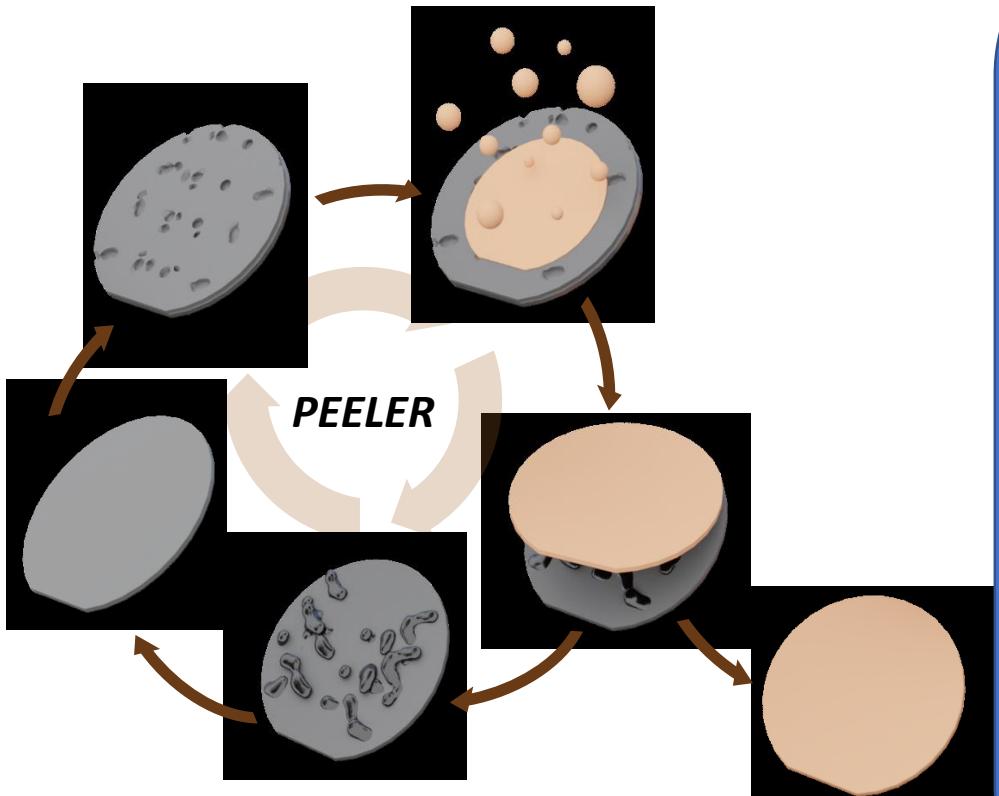

# Multicycling



Smooth surface and high crystalline quality of epi Ge after 3 cycles



- III-V-based multijunction cells can be thinned down without performance degradation
- Possibility to recycle the Ge wafer for multiple cells fabrication

### "PEELER" approach

- ➔ Wafer-scale electrochemical porosification
- ➔ Compatible with commercial epitaxy
- ➔ State of the art solar cell performance
- ➔ Recycling using simple wet bench processes

### Prospective and promises:

- Towards 80% reduction in kg/W
- Towards more sustainable germanium use
  - ➔ 75% Ge content reduction with 3 recycling cycles<sup>a</sup>
  - ➔ >95% Ge content reduction with infinite recycling<sup>b</sup>
