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## Introduction **Materials and methods** Small pelagic fish = key components of marine ecosystems [1] **Conditioning of sardines [4]** account for 25% of worldwide landings 7 months to 4 feeding conditions: But: reduction in the size and body condition index of sardines small or large pellets (0.1 and 1.2 mm) $\rightarrow$ Gulf of Lions since 2008 [2] in small or large quantities (0.3% and $\rightarrow$ Bay of Biscay since 2012 [3] 0.6% of the total fish mass in tanks) Result of a change in prey quantity and/or quality? Sardina pilchardus n = 15 individuals/tank Growth and body condition of sardines are [4]:

- an immediate response to food quantity and pellet size
- optimal when sardines consume large amount of large pellets

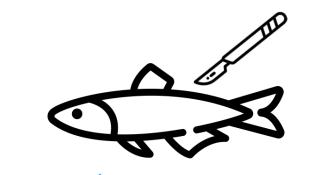
n-3 highly unsaturated fatty acids (n-3 HUFA) = essential to vital functions and fitness [5] food-dependent in fishes [6] the best known: EPA and DHA

<u>Hypothesis</u>: small food items and/or reduced food quantity induce insufficient intake of n-3 HUFA in muscle and constrain the individuals' growth

Objective : assess the n-3 HUFA composition of structure and reserve lipids in muscle of sardines exposed to different diets varying in quantity and in supply size

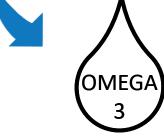


Analysis of n-3 HUFA in the muscle of 40 female sardines

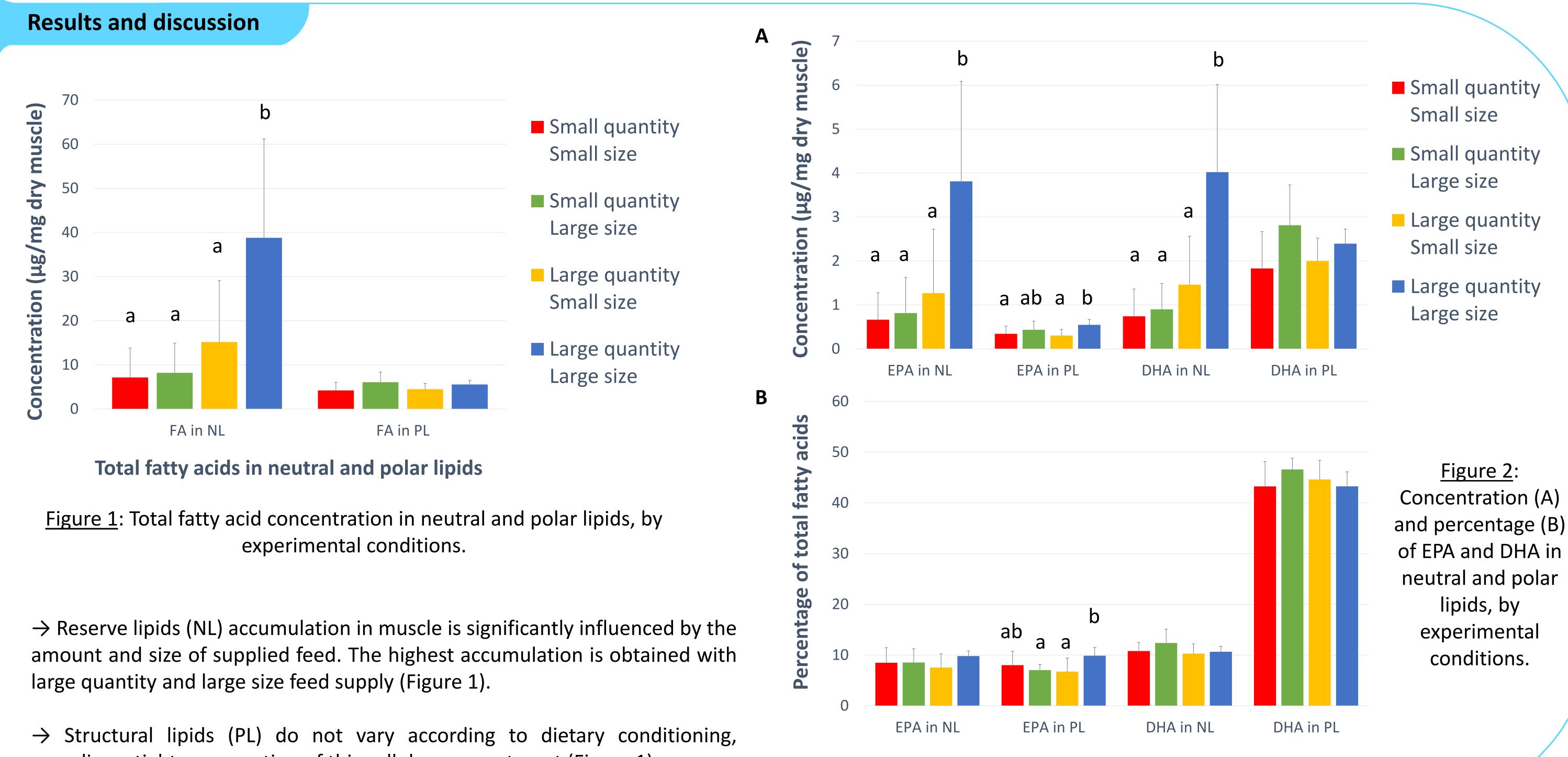


Collection of a dorsal muscle sample n = 5 females/tank

Extraction of lipids by the Folch method [7] Separation of neutral lipids (NL = metabolic energy source) and polar lipids (PL = cell membrane structure)



Saponification and transmethylation of NL and PL samples Gas chromatography analysis (GC-FID) of NL and PL FA



revealing a tight conservation of this cellular compartment (Figure 1).

 $\rightarrow$  Accretion of EPA and DHA in fish reserves (NL) is dependent on their quantitative supply more notably with large size feed. The accumulation of EPA in structural lipids (PL) is significantly higher with large quantity and large size feed supply (Figure 2A).

 $\rightarrow$  Proportions of EPA and DHA in structure and reserve lipids (PL and NL) are well regulated when the diet is not limiting in these two essential nutrients (Figure 2B).

# Conclusion

 $\rightarrow$  After this first step of analysing muscle lipid composition, we will explore the relationship between muscle composition and growth performance at the individual level.

**EPA and DHA in neutral and polar lipids** 

 $\rightarrow$  Beyond food quantitative supply, it would be interesting to explore the effect of EPA and/or DHA deficient feed on growth and behavioural performances.
