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Photoluminescence of Two-Dimensional Hole Gas (2DHG) in GaNbased polariton waveguide

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Context

The Bose-Einstein condensation of polaritons has been studied for over two decades with the aim of developing light emitters that can eventually be optoelectronic devices. The into integrated polariton laser effect was initially investigated in microcavities. However, the complex nature of these structures make difficult their integration into devices. To address this issue, waveguides have been proposed. The objective of this study is to better understand the relaxation dynamics of guided polaritons, ultimately leading to the achievement of the **polariton laser effect**.

Experimental results

(1) μ PL under continuous wave excitation at 320nm :



Accurate identification of excitonic transitions.

- Micro-reflectance (μR) experiments and simulations allowed us to determine the energies of free-exciton transitions.
- In the **waveguide**, the excitonic transitions have the same energies as those in the template. Therefore, the **GaN** luminescence in the waveguide primarily originates from the buffer layer.



(3) Band alignment and TRPL measurements



Strained würtzite structure: spontaneous

- consistent resolution of Schrödinger and
- Electrostatic equilibrium is achieved by the accumulation of holes and electrons at the interfaces, creating potential wells in the valence band and conduction



On the waveguide, a **specific transition** that is **not observed in the template** show a **rapid** blue-shift with increasing peak power density. After reaching 150 kW.cm⁻², this transition becomes no longer visible. These characteristics are typically associated with electric field effects, specifically with two-dimensional carrier gases (2DHG or 2DEG).



- When using a pulsed laser at 349 nm, this transition is no longer detectable on sample 2. \rightarrow The luminescence does not come from GaN buffer layer.
- Power density dependant transition observed when using CW laser at 320nm is associated with recombinations of electrons and holes localized on surface states.

Conclusion

First optical observation of a two-dimensional hole gas (2DHG) in a GaN-Al_xGa_{1-x}N heterostructure.

Perspectives

Photoluminescence measurements on SiO₂ extraction gratings deposited on the surface of the waveguide have allowed, through Fourier plane imaging on a CCD camera, the determination of guided mode dispersion. Comparison with **2DHG luminescence** shows clearly that :

Guided polaritons modes are fed by the 2D hole gas.

This result is important because the low intensity and long lifetime of this transition enable the preservation of a polaritonic mode in the waveguide beyond an optical density of 1 MW.cm⁻². This represents an advancement in the field, as it is known that such structures can exhibit polariton laser effects [Phys. Rev. Appl. 18, 044029 (2022)] at room temperature.

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
