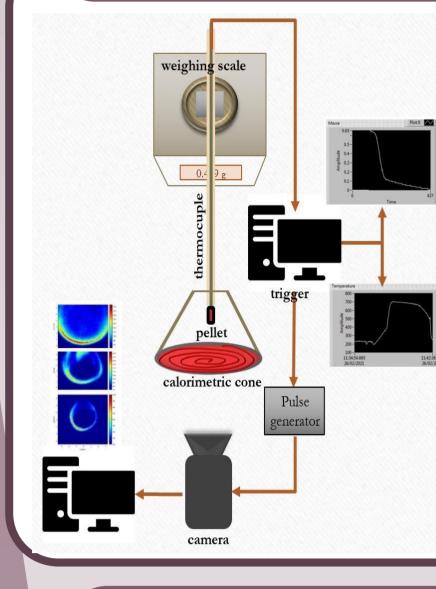
### Context

**Biomass** > wide variety of sources : composition & properties affect the degradation sequence during combustion > still require fundamental knowledge to overcome efficiency, pollutant emissions, and ash-related issues This work : combustion of single pellets of biomass in a free-ventilated cone calorimeter

#### Set up

- Cone calorimeter: constant &
  - controlled radiative heat flux
- Measure of M & T at the pellet center

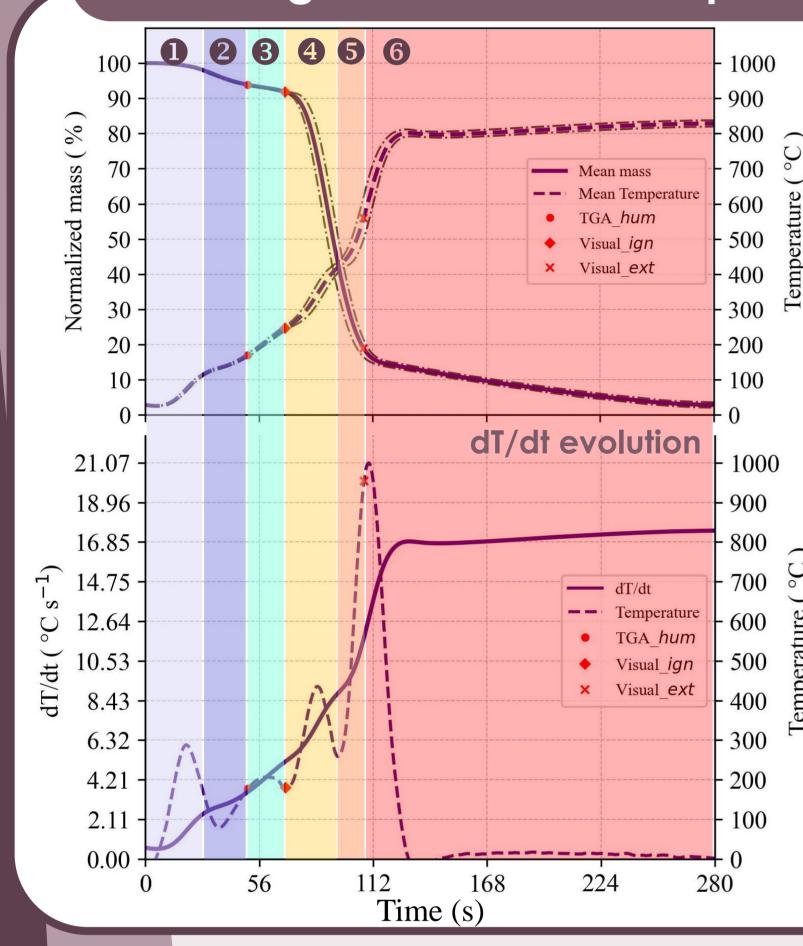
#### **Operating conditions**

- Woody pellets = reference biomass
- Miscanthus, herbaceous biomass

- LabVIEW data synchronisation
- Samples prepared for reproducibility: pellets 6mm dia.
- Straw = agricultural waste
- differences in VM, density, porosity
- affects HRR, modifies thermal propert oxygen supply, ignition time

## Mass degradation of wood pellets at 34kW.m<sup>-2</sup>

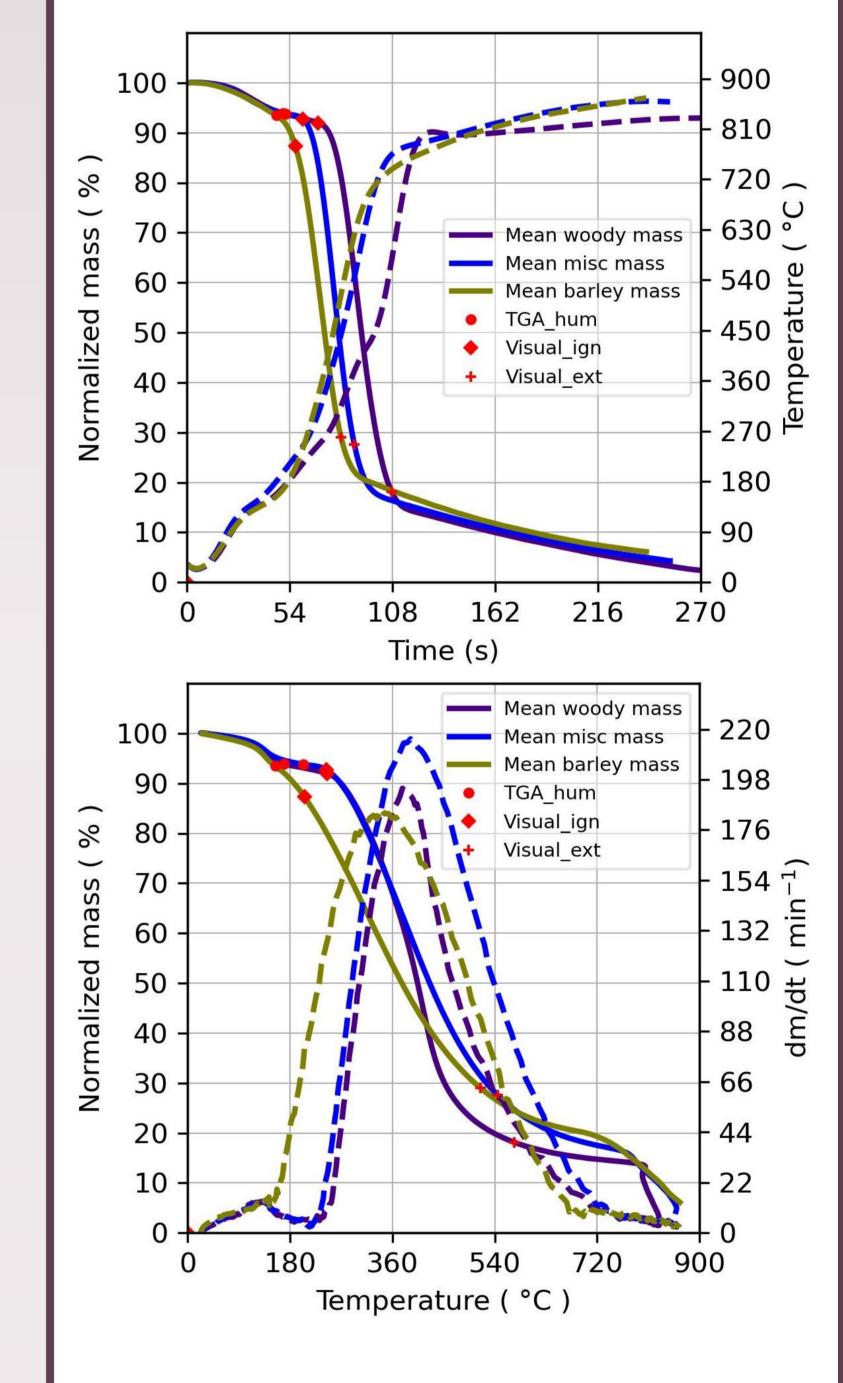


**Degradation sequential steps** 

- Pure heating of the sample by thermal conduction,
- Orying of the sample (6,2%m loss ATG)
- B Heating & start of devolatilization,
- 0 Devolatilization & flame  $\Rightarrow$  rapid mass loss, intense heating
- **6** Devolatilization, flame & char oxidation  $\Rightarrow$  (dT/dt) increase
- 6 Pure char oxidation (flame extinction /end of VM)
- Iower mass loss, cont. heating up: exothermicity & char thermal diffusivity
- char oxidation Tc=800°C: balance char oxidation HR & loss by conduction + mass transfer
- ashes Cooling down: sharp drop of temperature

## **Degradation dynamics**

### Comparison of degradation of wood, miscanthus & straw @ 34kW.m<sup>-2</sup>



Maximum of mass degradation during devolatilization / gas combustion phase Maximum heating during char oxidation phase

## Heat flux effect on the degradation process

Flux 21kW.m<sup>-2</sup> : below flame ignition threshold devolatilization & char oxidation

### Flux 24kW.m<sup>-2</sup> : limit for flame ignition

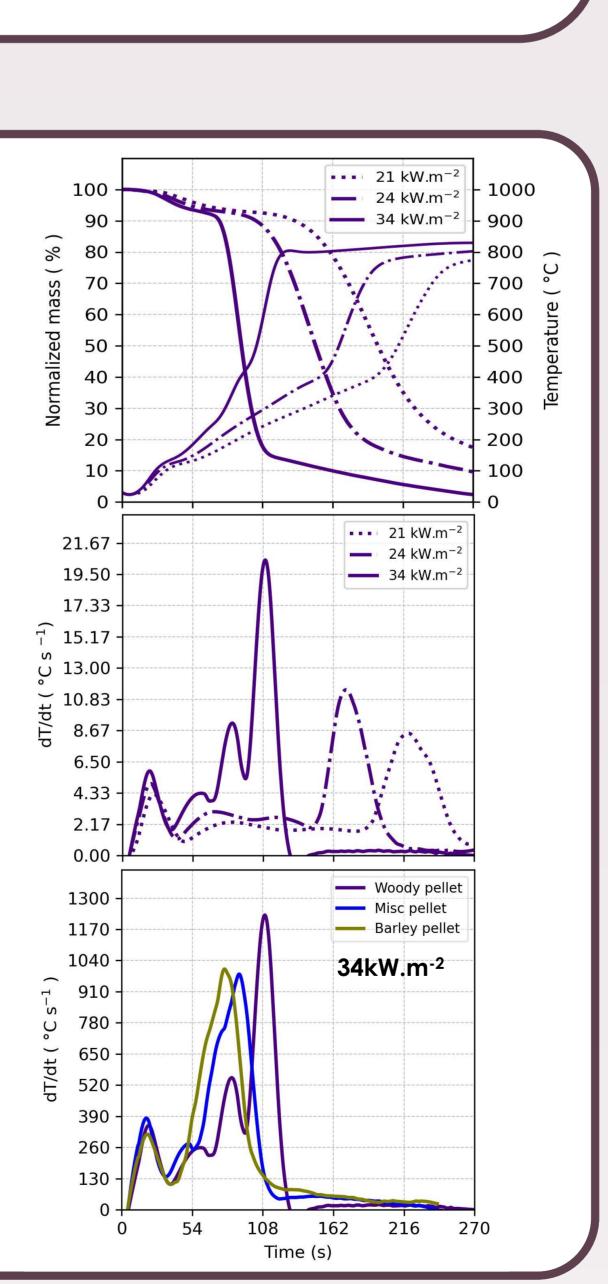
devolatilization, combustion gas phase & char oxidation

#### Wood pellets:

- Low fluxes: drying, devolatilization, & char oxidation, last longer, spaced out over time.
- High flux: shorter & superimposed steps
  - Mass degradation & heating sped up with heat flux
- Independent of flux :
  - Change of slope @  $450^{\circ}C \rightarrow$  char oxidation start
  - Plateau at 800° C  $\Rightarrow$  char oxidation period
- 34 kWm<sup>-2</sup>: change of slope  $@300^{\circ}$  C  $\Rightarrow$  additional heat flux due to flame ignition

#### Wood, miscanthus, straw @ 34kWm<sup>-2</sup>

- Steps occur in a shorter time and are overlapped
- Wood : devolatilization rapidly followed by gas phase combustion before char oxidation
- Miscanthus & straw : overlap of devolatilization, flame & char oxidation



- Similar Humidity loss
- Straw degrades first then miscanthus finally wood
- Wood: heats up slowly compared to miscanthus and straw density effect
- Straw: flame duration shorter effect of low VM content

- density effect
- high amount of inorganic catalyst (alkaline)

Higher density slow material degradation Low density, high porosity Iower T for devolatilization & ignition

## Conclusions

**Detailed description** of sequential process of **solid fuel degradation** under **combustion** 

- characteristics time scales and orders of magnitude:
  - duration of the gas flame very short (50s) compared to char oxidation (150s)
  - (dm/dt) max at the end of the devolatilization step
  - particle heating max during char oxidation

**Influence of biomass origin:** low VM > flame duration shorter low density / high porosity > low devolatilization T & ign T

**Overlap of flame and char oxidation stages** important for straw and miscanthus density effect, higher content of inorganics (Na, K) = degradation process catalysts

# Perspectives

**OH\* Chemiluminescence flame imaging** > more insight flame stage / degradation process [Na], [Ca] [K] measured by CF-LIBS > influence on the degradation process & residual ashes.



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
