Asymptotic mass

Consider hard parton propagating through quark-gluon plasma.

Forward scattering with medium induces shift in parton's dispersion relation $\Rightarrow m_{\infty}^2$, known as **asymptotic mass**.

In heavy-ion collisions, along with transverse scattering rate, $C(k_{\perp})$, serves as key input for calculations of:

 jet modification (i.e, medium-induced radiation and transverse momentum broadening)

Lattice Determination from EQCD

To go from hot QCD to electrostatic QCD (EQCD), integrate out all but zero Matsubara mode. Arrive at static 3D EFT for Matsubara zero-mode (dimensional reduction):

- A^0 field $\Rightarrow -i\Phi$, adjoint scalar picks up Debye mass, $m_D \sim gT$
- $g_{3d}^2 \sim g^2 T, U_R \Rightarrow \tilde{U}_R$

But why is this relevant here? Lightcone analyticity arguments allow us to compute classical corrections to $Z_{\rm g}$ with EQCD [2]

 \implies Can bypass horrible HTL computation and more importantly, gain access to non-perturbative evaluation of classical corrections by studying EQCD on the **lattice**!

Arrive at EQCD version of Eq. (2): $Z_{g}^{3d} = -\frac{4T}{d_{A}} \int_{0}^{\infty} dL L \langle FF \rangle$ defined through \tilde{U}_{R} , $D_{i}\Phi$ and F_{ij} Short-distance behavior: $\langle FF \rangle_{m_{D}L \ll 1} = \frac{c_{0}}{L^{3}} + \frac{c_{2}g_{3d}^{2}}{L^{2}} + \frac{c_{4}g_{3d}^{4}}{L} + \dots$ To obtain **finite lattice determination**, subtract off LO, UV **power law** divergence and separate into pieces

• thermalisation, transport

In hot QCD, take parton momentum $p^+ = \frac{p^0 + p^z}{2} \gg T$, temperature of plasma \Rightarrow Can integrate out scale p^+ to write m_{∞}^2 [1]

$$m_{\infty}^{2} = g^{2}C_{\mathrm{R}}\left(Z_{\mathrm{g}} + Z_{\mathrm{f}}\right) + \mathcal{O}\left(\frac{1}{p^{+}}\right)$$
(1)
$$= g^{2}C_{\mathrm{R}}\left(\left[\frac{T^{2}}{6} + \mathcal{O}(g)\right] + \left[\frac{T^{2}}{12} + \mathcal{O}(g^{2})\right]\right) + \mathcal{O}\left(\frac{1}{p^{+}}\right)$$

as sum of gluonic and fermionic condensates.

Classical Corrections

 $Z_{\rm g}$ given in terms of Wilson lines (representing hard parton) and field strength insertions

 $Z_{\rm g} = \frac{1}{d_{\rm R}C_{\rm R}} \int_0^\infty dx^+ x^+ {\rm Tr} \langle U_{\rm R}(-\infty; x^+) \quad (2) \\ \times F^{-\perp}(x^+) U_{\rm R}(x^+; 0) F^{-\perp}(0) U_{\rm R}(0; -\infty) \rangle$

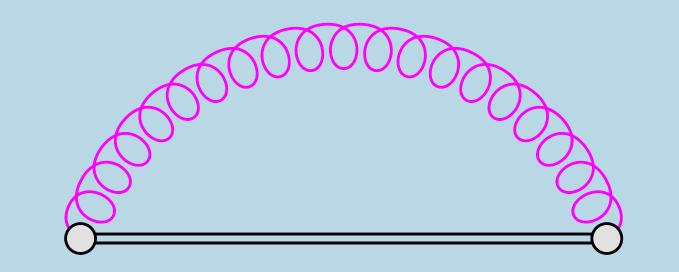
$$\begin{split} Z_{\rm g}^{\rm 3d}|_{\rm merge} &= -\frac{4T}{d_{\rm A}} \Big\{ \int_{0}^{L_{\rm min}} dL \, L \left[\langle FF \rangle_{\rm NLO} - \frac{c_0}{L^3} - \frac{g_{\rm 3d}^2 c_2}{L^2} \right] \\ &+ \int_{L_{\rm min}}^{L_{\rm max}} dL \, L \left[\langle FF \rangle_{\rm lattice} - \frac{c_0}{L^3} \right] + \int_{L_{\rm max}}^{\infty} dL \, L \left[\langle FF \rangle_{\rm tail} - \frac{c_0}{L^3} \right] \Big\} \end{split}$$

Lattice piece calculated and IR tail fitted in [3, 4] At short distances, switch to perturbative NLO EQCD evaluation, calculated in [4] \Rightarrow additionally subtract off $\mathcal{O}(g^2)$ logarithmic divergence $\sim c_2$ Motivation for our work [5], where we compute $\mathcal{O}(g^2)$ thermal scale $\sim T$ contribution from hot QCD:

- $\mathcal{O}(g^2)$ EQCD logarithmic divergence still needs to be matched against corresponding one from hot QCD to eliminate spurious L_{\min} -dependence
- Obtain all $\mathcal{O}(g^2)$ corrections to $Z_{\rm g}$

Cutoff-independent results

Starting at $\mathcal{O}(g), Z_{g}$ receives contribution from



with gluon soft $\sim gT$. Associated Bose–Einstein statistical function

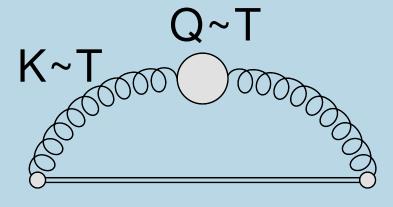
 $n_{\rm B}(\omega) = \frac{1}{e^{\frac{\omega}{T}} - 1} \approx \frac{T}{\omega} \gg 1$

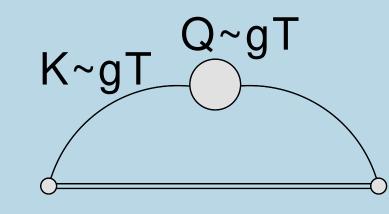
 \Rightarrow Bose enhancement!

These are **classical corrections**:

- Originate from zero Matsubara mode
- For soft gluon exchange, corrections can be computed using Hard Thermal Loop Effective Theory (HTL) but analytically difficult in practice

We find that in Feynman gauge, only need to compute one diagram in hot QCD (left below) Compare to its EQCD counterpart (right below)





Isolate K zero-mode contributionProbe UV limit by taking $K \gg gT$ Logarithmic divergences cancel \Rightarrow Finite cutoff-independent result for non-perturbative evaluation!

Errors from statistical errors in lattice EQCD (first bracket), integration of IR tail (second bracket) and quadrature of lattice data (third bracket)

First column contains non-perturbative evaluation. Second contains in addition finite part (see outlook) of quantum $\mathcal{O}(g^2)$ corrections from T scale \Rightarrow Larger in magnitude than Z_g^{LO} for all

• Can also have **ultrasoft** gluon $\sim g^2 T$ exchange – these corrections **cannot** be studied perturbatively (Linde problem)

Outlook

- Find double-logarithmic divergence in region $k^+ \gtrsim T$, $k^- \lesssim g^2 T$, $k_\perp \sim gT \implies K^2 \sim g^2 T^2$ \Rightarrow Collinear, hard divergence hints at sensitivity to regions where:
 - LPM resummation in necessary
 - Scale hierarchy assumed in Eq. (1) is no longer respected
 - \Rightarrow Outstanding divergence implies our separation of non-perturbative classical corrections and quantum $\mathcal{O}(g^2)$ ones is somewhat ambiguous. Complete $\mathcal{O}(g^2)$ evaluation of collinear and hard contributions needed
- Looking farther forward, want to evaluate impact of non-perturbative corrections on mediuminduced radiation, similar to what was done in [6] for $C(k_{\perp})$
