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# ALGEBRAIC ISOMORPHISMS OF QUANTIZED HOMOGENEOUS SPACES

#### ROBERT YUNCKEN

ABSTRACT. We describe a proof of the following folklore theorem: If  $\mathcal{X} = G/K$  is the homogeneous space of a simply connected compact semisimple Lie group with Poisson-Lie stabilizers, then the *q*-deformed algebras of regular functions  $\mathbb{C}[\mathcal{X}_q]$  with  $0 < q \leq 1$  are mutually non-isomorphic as \*-algebras.

### 1. INTRODUCTION

Fix *G* a compact simply connected semisimple Lie group and *K* a proper closed Poisson-Lie subgroup. The homogeneous space  $\mathcal{X} = G/K$  admits a family of *q*-deformations,  $0 < q < \infty$ , realized via their \*-algebras of regular functions  $\mathbb{C}[\mathcal{X}_q]$ .

The following theorem is folklore.

# **Theorem 1.1.** $\mathbb{C}[\mathcal{X}_p] \cong \mathbb{C}[\mathcal{X}_q]$ *if and only if* $p = q^{\pm 1}$ .

In this expository note, we will give a proof of this fact. The ideas are mostly not original. A proof for the quantum spheres  $\mathcal{X}_q = S_q^{2n+1}$  was given by D'Andrea [DAn24]. Krähmer [Krä08] proved a similar result for the nonstandard Podleś spheres.

In the present context, the algebras  $\mathbb{C}[G_q]$  are due to Soibelman [Soi91], see also [Wor87]. The algebras  $\mathbb{C}[\mathcal{X}_q]$  were introduced over the following years, but a systematic study of their structure was undertaken by Stokman and Dijkhuizen [SD99; Sto03]. This was further developed by Neshveyev and Tuset in [NT12]. The essential points necessary for proving Theorem 1.1 are already contained in the papers just listed.

Giselsson [Gis20] proved that the enveloping  $C^*$ -algebras  $C(\mathcal{X}_q)$  are all isomorphic for  $q \in (0, \infty) \setminus \{1\}$ . In other words, the quantum spaces  $\mathcal{X}_q$  (0 < q < 1) are isomorphic as noncommutative topological spaces but not as noncommutative algebraic varieties.

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## 2. Preliminaries

This article is not completely self-contained. We will make heavy use of the notation and results of [NT12], especially Sections 1, 2 and the beginning of Section 3.

The isomorphism  $\mathbb{C}[\mathcal{X}_q] \cong \mathbb{C}[\mathcal{X}_{q^{-1}}]$  is well-known, *cf.* [NT13, Lemma 2.4.2]. Also,  $\mathbb{C}[\mathcal{X}_q]$  is commutative if and only if q = 1. We therefore work throughout with 0 < p, q < 1.

# 3. $SU_q(2)$ and the quantum disk

The algebra  $\mathbb{C}[SU_q(2)]$  is the universal \*-algebra generated by two elements  $\alpha$  and  $\gamma$  satisfying

$$\begin{array}{l} \alpha\gamma = q\gamma\alpha, \quad \alpha\gamma^* = q\gamma^*\alpha, \quad \gamma\gamma^* = \gamma^*\gamma\\ \alpha^*\alpha + \gamma^*\gamma = 1 = \alpha\alpha^* + q^2\gamma^*\gamma. \end{array} \tag{3.1}$$

The \*-subalgebra  $\mathbb{C}[\gamma, \gamma^*]$  is a polynomial algebra in 2 commuting conjugate variables. We use the notation

$$lpha^{(i)} = egin{cases} lpha^i, & ext{if } i \geq 0, \ (lpha^*)^{-i}, & ext{if } i < 0. \end{cases}$$

Putting  $A_i = \alpha^{(i)} \mathbb{C}[\gamma, \gamma^*] = \mathbb{C}[\gamma, \gamma^*] \alpha^{(i)}$ . we get an algebra grading

$$\mathbb{C}[\mathrm{SU}_q(2)] = \bigoplus_{i \in \mathbb{Z}} \mathcal{A}_i.$$
(3.2)

The standard irreducible representation  $\rho_q$  of  $\mathbb{C}[SU_q(2)]$  on  $\mathcal{B}(\ell^2(\mathbb{Z}_+))$  is given in the basis  $(e_n)_{n \in \mathbb{Z}_+}$  by

$$\rho_q(\alpha): e_n \mapsto \sqrt{1 - q^{2n} e_{n-1}}, \quad \rho_q(\gamma): e_n \mapsto -q^n e_n. \tag{3.3}$$

**Lemma 3.1.** The kernel of  $\rho_q$  is the ideal generated by  $\gamma - \gamma^*$ .

*Proof.* Let  $a \in \text{ker}(\rho_q)$ . Write  $a = \sum_i c_i \alpha^{(i)} \in \bigoplus_i \mathcal{A}_i$  where  $c_i \in \mathbb{C}[\gamma, \gamma^*]$ . Since  $\rho_q$  maps  $\mathcal{A}_i$  to weighted shifts of degree *i*, we have  $\rho_q(c_i \alpha^{(i)}) = 0$  for each *i*.

Let  $i \ge 0$ . We have  $\rho_q(c_i \alpha^{(i)} \alpha^{(i)*}) = 0$ . Since  $\rho_q(\alpha^{(i)} \alpha^{(i)*})$  is diagonal with no zero entries, we get  $\rho_q(c_i) = 0$ . The spectrum of  $\rho_q(\gamma) = \rho_q(\gamma^*)$  is  $-q^{\mathbb{Z}_+}$  which is Zariski dense in  $\mathbb{R}$ . So if we view  $c_i$  as a polynomial in  $\mathbb{C}[\gamma, \gamma^*] \cong \mathbb{C}[Z, \overline{Z}]$ , it is zero on the real line and hence divisible by  $\gamma - \gamma^*$ . For i < 0, we can take the adjoint to reduce to the previous case.

We define  $\mathbb{C}[\overline{\mathbb{D}}_q] = \mathbb{C}[\mathrm{SU}_q(2)]/\langle \gamma - \gamma^* \rangle \cong \rho_q(\mathbb{C}[\mathrm{SU}_q(2)])$  and let  $F_q : \mathbb{C}[\mathrm{SU}_q(2)] \to \mathbb{C}[\overline{\mathbb{D}}_q]$  denote the quotient map. Then  $\mathbb{C}[\overline{\mathbb{D}}_q]$  has generators

$$y = F_q(\gamma), \quad z = F_q(\alpha)^*$$
 (3.4)

and relations

$$yz = qzy, \quad y = y^*, \quad zz^* + y^2 = 1 = z^*z + q^2y^2.$$
 (3.5)

In Poisson language,  $F_q$  is the restriction of polynomials on  $SU_q(2)$  to a certain quantized symplectic leaf.

*Remark* 3.2. The \*-algebra  $\mathbb{C}[\overline{\mathbb{D}}_q]$  embeds into the *C*\*-algebra of the quantum disk  $C(\overline{\mathbb{D}}_q)$  of [NT12, §3] via the homomorphism

$$z \mapsto Z_q, \quad y \mapsto -(1 - Z_q Z_q^*)^{\frac{1}{2}}.$$
 (3.6)

This is not an algebraic map, which is why we add the generator *y*.

## 4. Homogeneous spaces for $SU_q(2)$

Write *T* for the diagonal torus in SU(2) . For  $n \in \{1, 2, ..., \}$ , let  $T_n$  denote the closed subgroup of *T* generated by the *n*th roots of unity. We also use the convention  $T_{\infty} = T$ . The associated quantum homogeneous spaces [NT12, §2] are given by the quantized function algebras

$$\mathbb{C}[\mathrm{SU}_q(2)/T_n] = \operatorname{span}\{\alpha^{(i)}\gamma^j\gamma^{*k} \mid i+j-k \in n\mathbb{Z}\} \subseteq \mathbb{C}[\mathrm{SU}_q(2)], \quad (4.1)$$

where we use the convention  $\infty \mathbb{Z} = \{0\}$ . Explicitly  $SU_q(2)/T_n$  is  $SU_q(2)$  when n = 1,  $SO_q(3)$  when n = 2 [Pod95], the quantum lens space  $L_q^3(n, 1)$  when  $3 \le n < \infty$  [HS03] and the standard Podleś sphere when  $n = \infty$  [Pod87].

Let us also write

$$\mathbb{C}[\overline{\mathbb{D}}_q/T_n] = F_q(\mathbb{C}[\mathrm{SU}_q(2)/T_n]) \cong \rho_q(\mathbb{C}[\mathrm{SU}_q(2)/T_n]).$$

This is the quantization of a 2-dimensional symplectic leaf of  $SU_q(2)/T_n$ .

## 5. Commutator spectrum

**Definition 5.1.** Define the *commutator spectrum* of an algebra A to be

$$CommSp(\mathcal{A}) = \{ \omega \in \mathbb{C}^{\times} \mid \exists a, b \in \mathcal{A} \setminus \{0\} \text{ with } ab = \omega ba \}.$$

**Lemma 5.2.** The commutator spectrum of  $\mathbb{C}[\overline{\mathbb{D}}_q/T_n]$  is

$$\mathcal{Q}(\mathbb{C}[\overline{\mathbb{D}}_q/T_n]) = \begin{cases} q^{\mathbb{Z}} & \text{if } n \text{ is odd} \\ q^{2\mathbb{Z}} & \text{if } n \text{ is even or } \infty. \end{cases}$$

*Proof.* Consider first the quantum plane algebra  $\mathbb{C}_q[y, z]$  generated by y, z with yz = qzy. We do not impose a \*-structure for the moment. We have

$$(y^{j}z^{k})(y^{j'}z^{k'}) = q^{jk'-j'k}(y^{j'}z^{k'})(y^{j}z^{k}).$$
(5.1)

This shows that  $q^{\mathbb{Z}} \subseteq \text{CommSp}[\mathbb{C}_q[y,z])$ . Moreover, by considering the leading terms for the lexicographical ordering on powers of y and z, one can deduce that  $\text{CommSp}(\mathbb{C}_q[y,z]) = q^{\mathbb{Z}}$ .

Now suppose  $\omega \in \text{CommSp}(\mathbb{C}[\overline{\mathbb{D}}_q/T_n])$ , so we have  $a, b \in \mathbb{C}[\overline{\mathbb{D}}_q/T_n]$ nonzero with  $ab = \omega ba$ . By considering the highest order terms in the grading (3.2), we can assume without loss of generality that  $a \in F_q(\mathcal{A}_i)$ ,  $b \in F_q(\mathcal{A}_{i'})$  for some i, i'. If both  $i, i' \leq 0$  then  $a, b \in \mathbb{C}_q[y, z]$  so  $\omega \in q^{\mathbb{Z}}$ . If both i, i' > 0 we can reduce to the previous case by taking adjoints. Finally, if i < 0 and i' > 0 then we can reduce to the previous case by replacing bby  $a^m b$  for some sufficiently large m.

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This proves that  $\text{CommSp}(\mathbb{C}[\overline{\mathbb{D}}_q/T_n]) \subseteq q^{\mathbb{Z}}$ , and also that it is realized on monomials  $a = y^j z^k$ ,  $b = y^{j'} z^{k'} \in \mathbb{C}[\overline{\mathbb{D}}_q/T_n]$ . Note also that it is closed under taking integer powers, by considering *a* and  $b^m$ .

If *n* is even or  $\infty$ , then Equation (4.1) forces  $j \equiv k$  [2] and  $j' \equiv k'$  [2]. Therefore, by Equation (5.1), CommSp $(\mathbb{C}[\overline{\mathbb{D}}_q/T_n]) \subseteq q^{2\mathbb{Z}}$ . Putting  $a = F_q(\gamma^* \alpha) = yz^*$ ,  $b = F_q(\gamma^* \gamma) = y^2$  gives  $\omega = q^2$ .

If *n* is odd, we can put  $a = F_q(\gamma^{n+1}\alpha^*) = y^{n+1}z$ ,  $b = F_q(\gamma^{\frac{n+1}{2}}\gamma^{*\frac{n-1}{2}}\alpha^*) = y^n z$  and we get  $\omega = q$ .

## 6. QUANTIZED HOMOGENEOUS SPACES

Let  $\Pi = \{\alpha_1, ..., \alpha_r\}$  be the simple roots of *G* and  $\{\omega_1, ..., \omega_r\}$  the associated fundamental weights. We write  $(\cdot, \cdot)$  for the *G*-invariant bilinear form on  $\mathfrak{h}^*$  with  $(\alpha, \alpha) = 2$  for all short roots  $\alpha$ , and we use the standard notation  $q_i = q^{(\alpha_i, \alpha_i)/2}$ . Thus  $q_i = q, q^2$  or  $q^3$  depending on the length of  $\alpha_i$ . For every  $\alpha_i \in \Pi$ , there is a restriction map  $\sigma_i : \mathbb{C}[G_q] \to \mathbb{C}[SU_{q_i}(2)]$ .

The Poisson-Lie subgroups of *G* are determined by pairs (S, L) where *S* is a subset of the simple roots for *G* and *L* is a subgroup of the lattice  $P(S^c) = \mathbb{Z}\{\omega_i \mid \alpha_i \in S^c\}$ . We refer to [NT12, Proposition 1.1] for the details. Fix such a subgroup  $K^{S,L}$  and consider  $\mathcal{X} = G/K^{S,L}$  and its quantized algebra of function  $\mathbb{C}[\mathcal{X}_q]$ .

**Lemma 6.1.** For every  $\alpha_i \in S^c$  we have  $\sigma_i(\mathbb{C}[\mathcal{X}_q]) = \mathbb{C}[SU_{q_i}(2)/T_{n_i}]$  for some  $n_i \in \{1, 2, ..., \infty\}$ .

*Proof.* This follows from [NT12, Corollary 2.4]. Explicitly,  $n_i$  is the generator of the subgroup of  $\mathbb{Z}$  obtained by restricting the weights  $\mu \in L$  to weights for  $\mathcal{U}_{q_i}(\mathfrak{sl}_2)$ , *i.e.*,  $n_i\mathbb{Z} = \{(\mu, \alpha_i) \mid \mu \in L\}$ .

Let *T* be the maximal torus of *G*, and  $T_L \subseteq T$  the subgroup annihilated by  $L \subseteq P = \hat{T}$ . Let  $W^S \subset W$  be the set of  $w \in W$  such that  $w(\alpha_i) > 0$  for all  $\alpha_i \in S$ .

The irreducible representations of  $\mathbb{C}[\mathcal{X}_q]$  are indexed by pairs  $(w, t) \in W^S \times T/T_L$ . These representations  $\pi_{w,t}$  are described explicitly in the preamble to Theorem 2.2 of [NT12]. See also [SD99, Theorem 5.9]. We recall only that in the case where  $w = s_i$  is the simple reflection in  $\alpha_i \in S^c$ , the associated representation is

$$\pi_{s_i,1} = \rho_q \circ \sigma_i : \mathbb{C}[\mathcal{X}_q] \to \mathbb{C}[\mathbb{D}_{q_i}/T_{n_i}] \to \mathcal{B}(\ell^2(\mathbb{Z}_+)).$$
(6.1)

#### 7. QUANTUM 2-CELL REPRESENTATIONS

**Definition 7.1.** An irreducible representation  $\pi$  of  $\mathbb{C}[\mathcal{X}_q]$  will be called a 2-*cell representation* if the norm closure of the image is an extension of an abelian  $C^*$ -algebra by the compacts—that is, if it fits into an exact sequence of  $C^*$ -algebras

$$0 \to \mathcal{K} \to \pi(\mathcal{C}(\mathcal{X}_q)) \to A \to 0$$

with *A* abelian and  $\mathcal{K}$  being the compacts on a separable infinite dimensional Hilbert space.

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**Example 7.2.** The standard representation  $\rho_q$  of  $\mathbb{C}[SU_q(2)/T_n]$  is a 2-cell representation for any  $n \in \{1, 2, ..., \infty\}$ . To see this, let *I* denote the *\**-ideal of  $\mathbb{C}[SU_q(2)]$  generated by  $\gamma$  and put  $I_n = I \cap \mathbb{C}[SU_q(2)/T_n]$ . Then  $\overline{\rho_q(I_n)} = \mathcal{K}(\ell^2(\mathbb{Z}_+))$  since it contains  $\rho_q(\alpha^*\gamma)$  which is a compact weighted shift with distinct nonzero weights. And putting  $\gamma = 0$  in the relations (3.1) shows that  $\mathbb{C}[SU_q(2)/T_n]/I_n$  is abelian.

**Lemma 7.3.** The representation  $\pi_{w,t}$  is a 2-cell representation if and only if w is a simple reflection, i.e.  $w = s_i$  for some  $\alpha_i \in S^c$ .

*Proof.* The representation  $\pi_{w,t}$  is the representation  $\pi_{w,1}$  twisted by a character, so the image of  $\pi_{t,w}(\mathbb{C}[\mathcal{X}_q])$  is independent of t. Therefore, we may take t = 1.

If w = 1, then  $\pi_{1,1}$  is the counit.

If  $w = s_i$  for  $i \in S^c$ , then by Lemma 6.1  $\pi_{w,1}(\mathbb{C}[\mathcal{X}_q]) = \rho_{q_i}(\mathbb{C}[SU_{q_i}(2)/T_{n_i}])$ , so  $\pi_w$  is a 2-cell representation by Example 7.2.

If  $w \in W^S$  has Bruhat length two or more, then [NT12, Theorem 4.1] shows that  $\pi_{w,1}(C(\mathcal{X}_q))$  has a nontrivial nonabelian quotient, so  $\pi_{w,1}$  is not a 2-cell representation.

## 8. Proof of the main theorem

*Proof of Theorem* 1.1. By Lemmas 5.2, 6.1 and 7.3, the greatest value, less than one, of the commutator spectrum of the image of any 2-cell representation of  $\mathbb{C}[\mathcal{X}_q]$  is  $q^m$ , for some  $m \in \mathbb{N}$  independent of q. This is an invariant of  $\mathbb{C}[\mathcal{X}_q]$ .

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
