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Table tennis performance indicators relationship under fatigue condition

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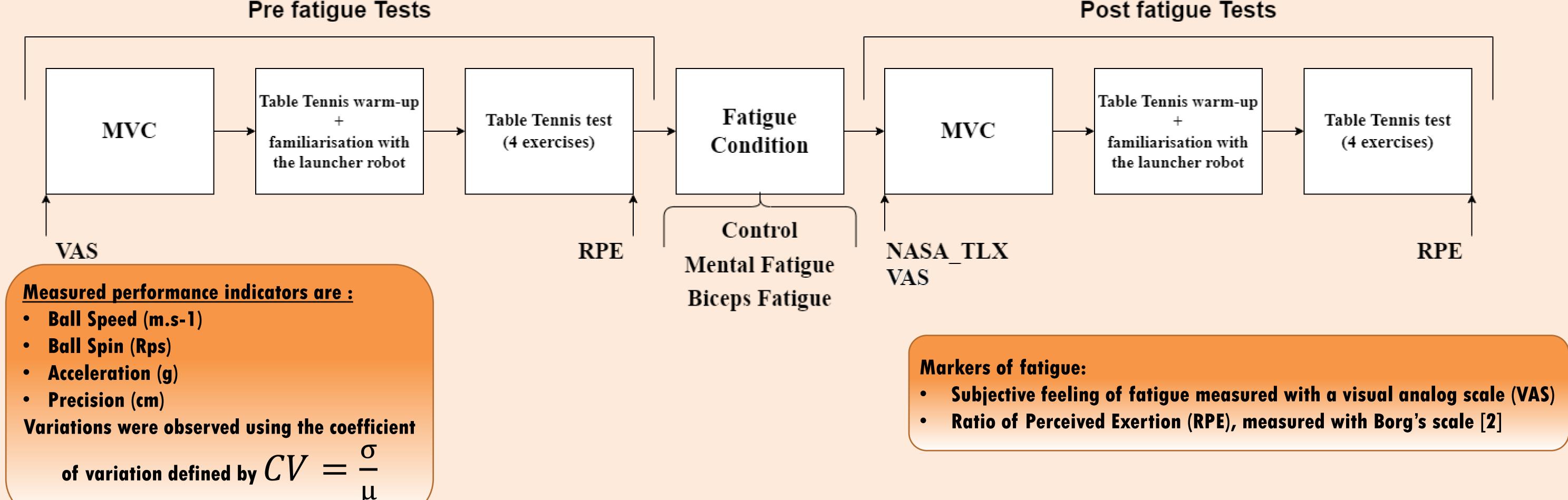
Introduction & objectives

Table tennis is a complex sport involving many performance indicators such as ball speed, spin, racket acceleration, or foot-step patterns. Some of them showed sensitivity to fatigue in the work of *Lemansec et al.* [1]. Ball speed, precision, and numbers of faults showed a rise or a diminution in fatigue condition.

But the variability of these performance indicators has never been studied to our knowledge, our study focuses on which fatigue could impact performance and at which level?

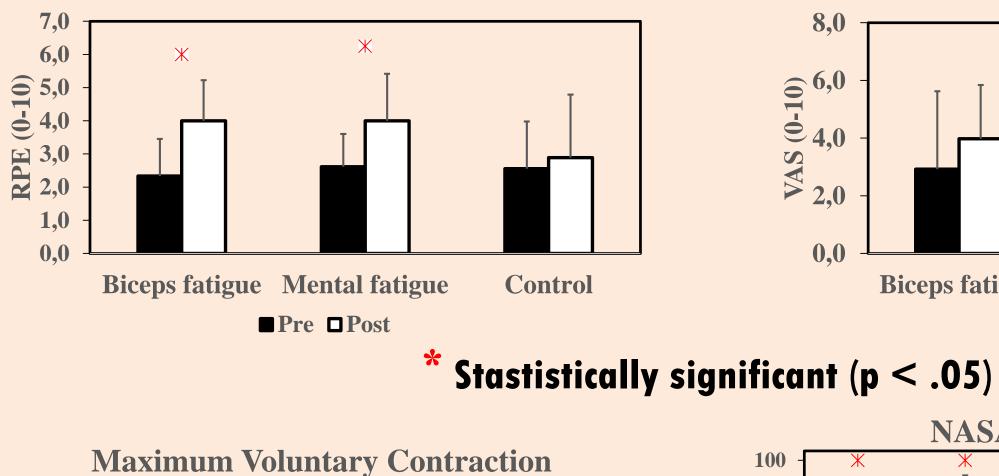
Materials & Methods

Nine players from the French table tennis national center of Nantes were selected to perform table tennis tests under 3 different fatigue conditions. Players are all men of 15 ± 1.5 years and of French ranking points 2103 ± 344 points (semi-professional). Players had to hit 30 balls launched by a ball thrower in 4 different exercises and 3 fatigue conditions. The original protocol is based on the work of *Le Mansec et al.* [1]. All participants had to perform the three test sessions. An overview of the protocol is presented below:



Results & Discussion

Statistical analysis has been conducted by a two-way ANOVA using *Jasp* software.

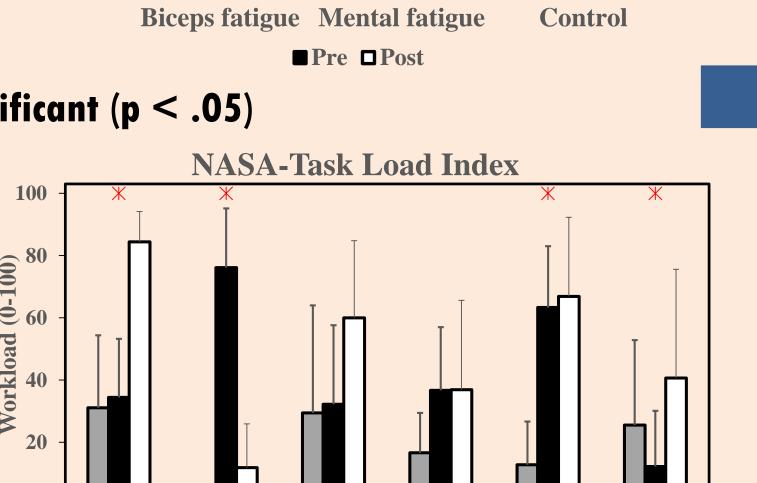

Conclusions

- 1. Measurements made on a specific population
 - 2. Fatigue has been induced
- 3. Mental fatigue affects mainly the precision and variability of performance indicators as a whole.
 - 4. Neuromuscular biceps fatigue affects the kinetics of the ball indicators and their variability.

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
