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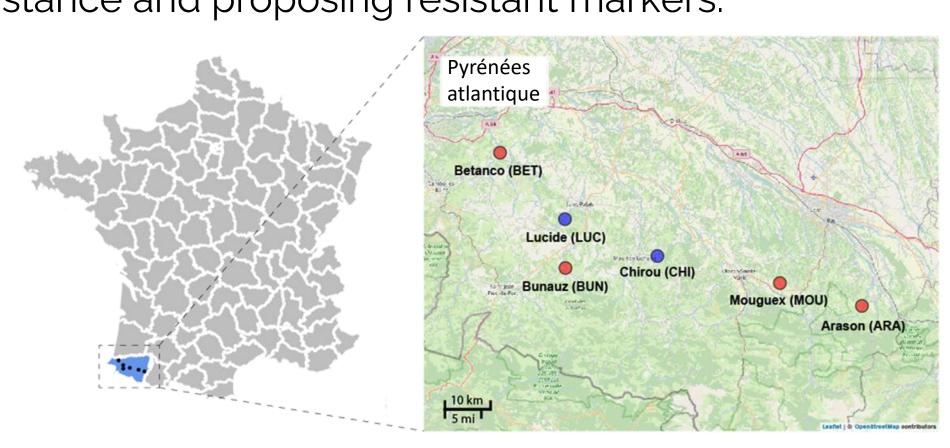
INTRODUCTION

• Infections by gastrointestinal nematodes (GIN) in dairy sheep farms cause major economic losses and affect animal welfare. Haemonchus contortus is the most pathogenic GIN and dairy sheeps are routinely treated with Eprinomectin (EPR) which is the last efficient Anthelminthic with no withdrawal period.

• However, we recently reported eprinomectin-resistant isolates of *Haemonchus* contortus in 5 dairy sheep farms from the Pyrénées Atlantiques (Jouffroy, S. et al. Parasitology (2023)).

Objectives and Originality

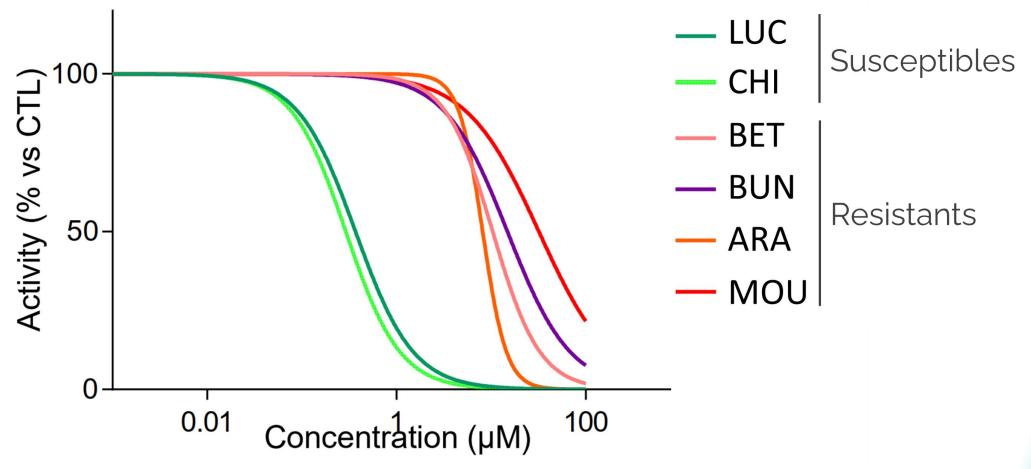
By combining farm Anthelmintic treatment history with phenotypic, genomic and transcriptomic data, we aim at deciphering the determinant of Eprinomectin resistance and proposing resistant markers.

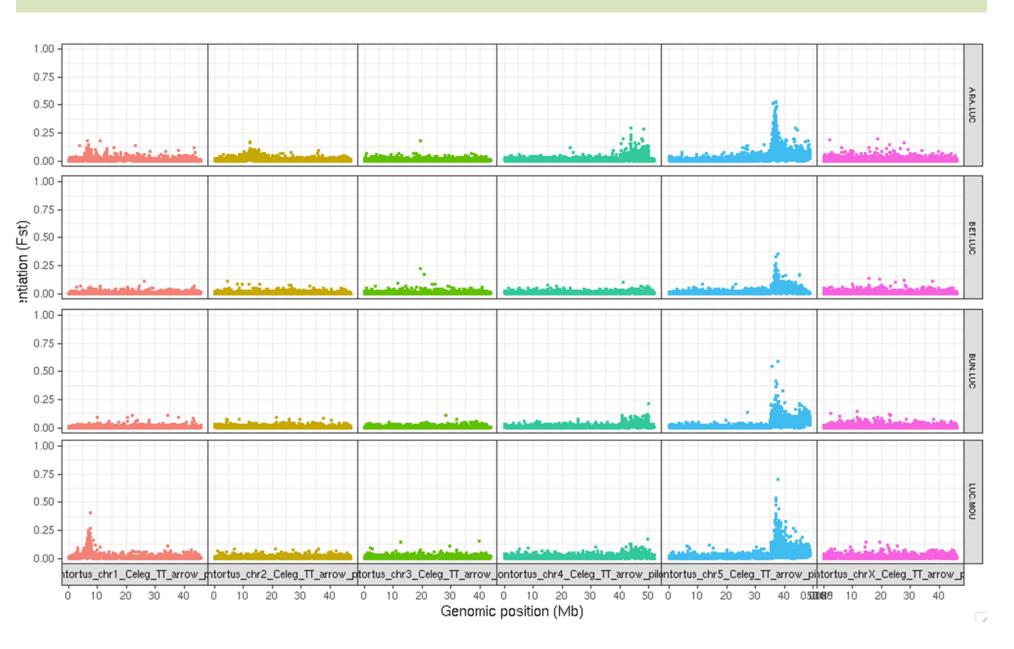
PHENOTYPIC CHARACTERIZATION



Resistance to EPR of field Haemonchus contortus populations is extremely high (>30x).

Motility of *H. contortus* larvae with increasing concentration of Eprinomectin (EPR), monitored with the WormicroTracker.

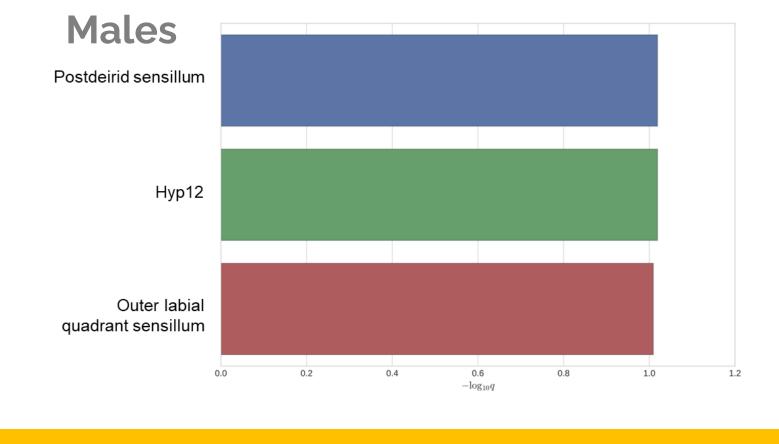
GENOMIC COMPARISONS



A major Qantitative Trait Locus (QTL) on chromosome V is associated to Eprinomectin resistance.

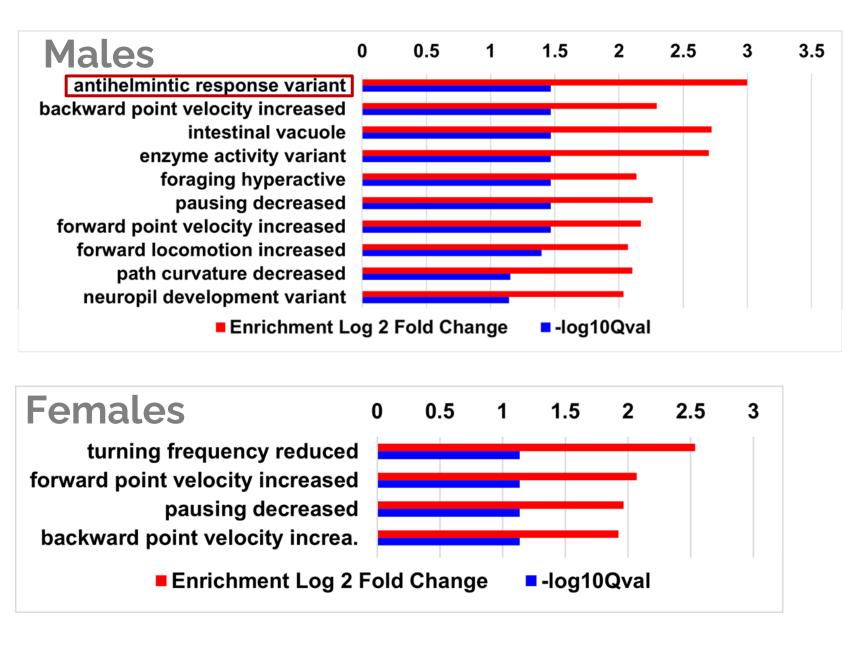
Genome-wide comparison of susceptible Eprinomectin-resistant isolates. Pairwise genetic diversity (FST measured in 10 kbp windows using grenedalf) between one susceptible isolates (CHI) and Eprinomectinresistant isolates (ARA, BET, BUN, MOU)

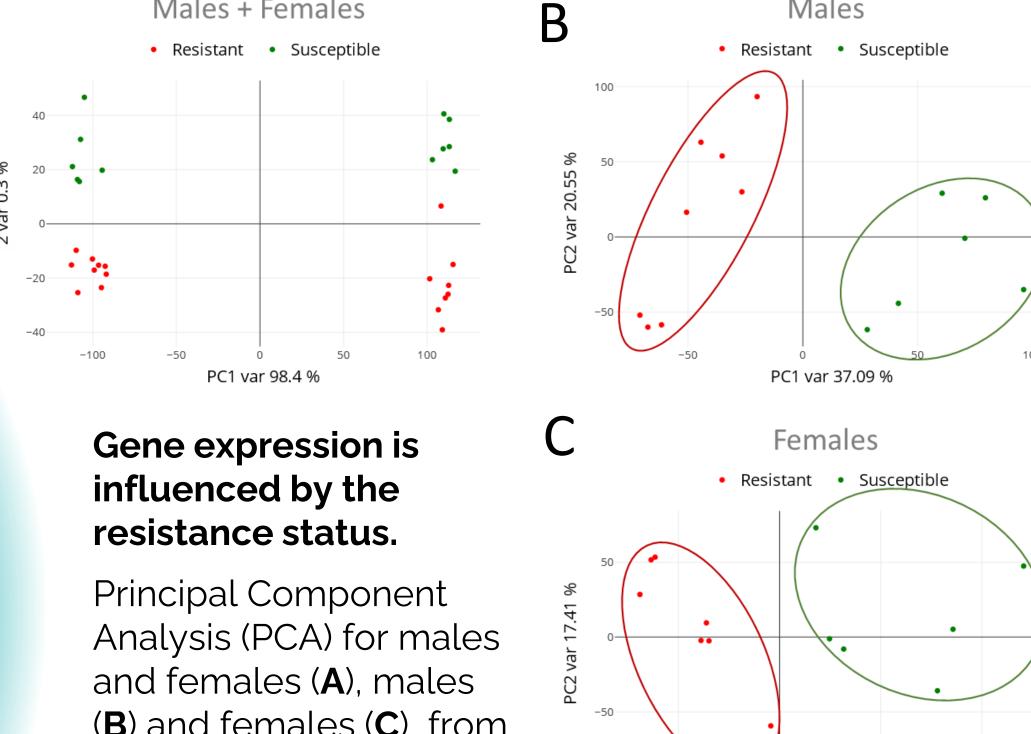

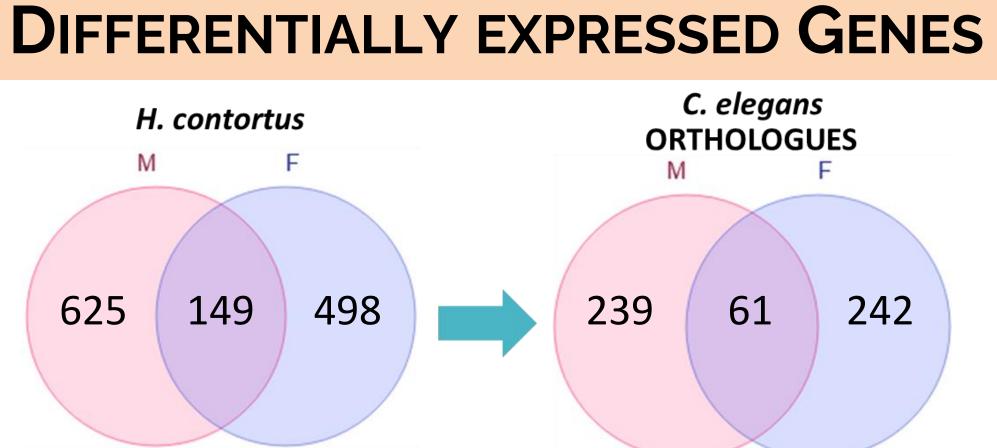


TRANSCRIPTOMIC ANALYSIS

Males + Females

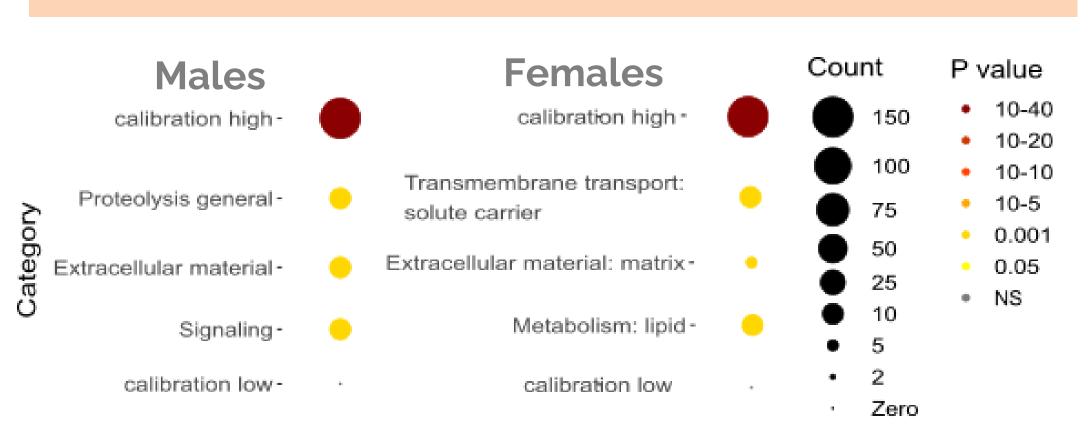


(B) and females (C) from normalised log transformed data.

GENE ONTOLOGY ENRICHMENT



Enrichment analyses highlight the potential implication of neuronal tissues such as the sensilium (Tissue enrichment), of genes responding to anthelmintics in C. elegans (phenotype enrichment) and in diverse cellular and metabolic functions (Gene ontology enrichment).

C. elegans gene orthologs significantly differentially expressed between susceptible and resistant Haemonchus contortus populations and with a Fold change > 1.5 were taken to perform tissue and phenotypic enrichment with Wormbase enrichment analysis tool and gene ontology enrichment with Wormcat.

CONCLUSION

Combining phenotypic, genomic and transcriptomic approaches enabled us to unveil the very high resistance to Eprinomectin of *Haemonchus contortus* isolates (>30x). These isolates selected a narrow QTL on chromosome V and genes expressed in neuronal tissues, associated with anthelmintic response and implicated in diverse cellular and metabolic functions. Investigations of individual genes deregulated and present on chromosome-V QTL are ongoing.







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
