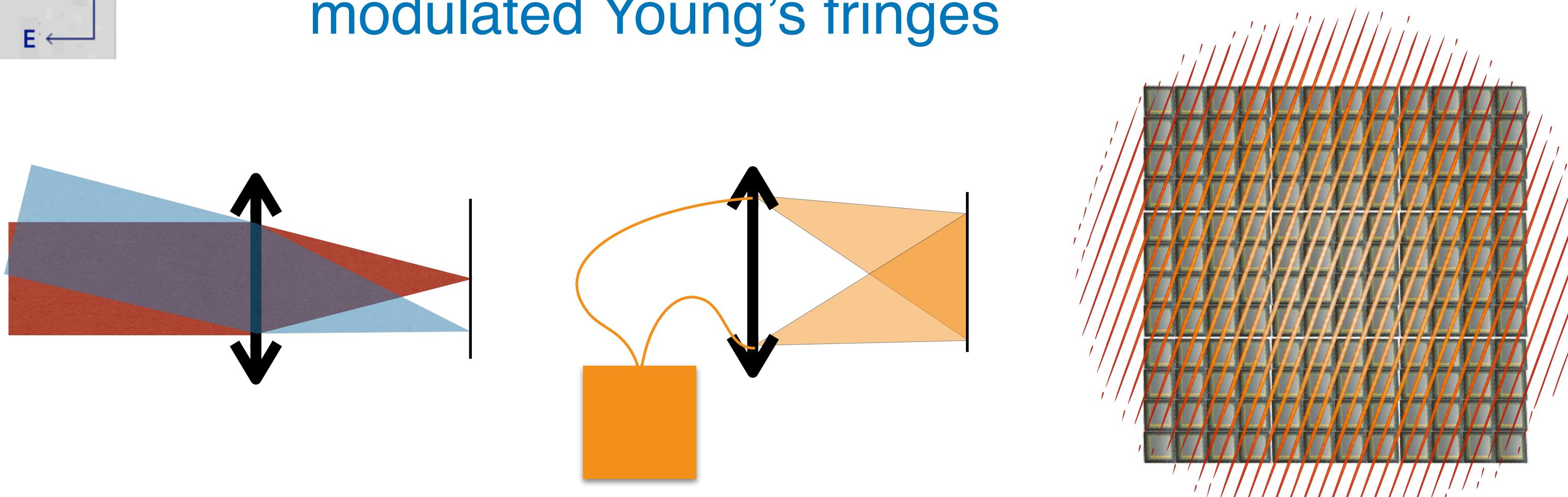


# Identifying the nearest rocky exoplanets with high-precision differential astrometry in space

# Principle of Theia : relative and precise differential astrometry

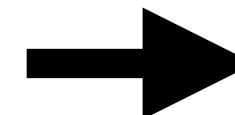


- ✓ The science target is at the center of the FOV
- ✓ We measure the offset angles between the target object (in **black**) and the reference stars (other stars in **red** and **blue**)
- ✓ The single measurement is repeated several times over the mission lifetime to reach the required accuracy on the target motion
- ✓ The detector calibration is done using interferometric modulated Young's fringes

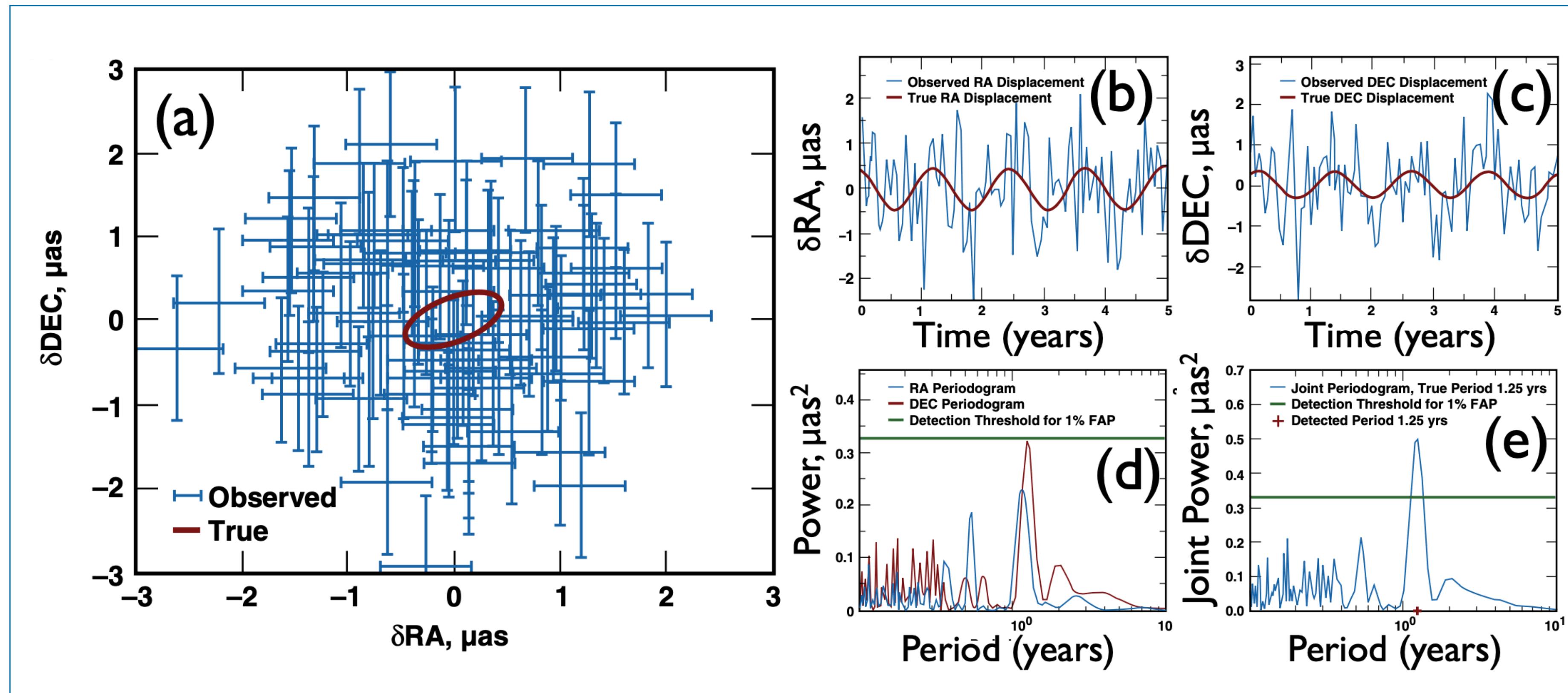
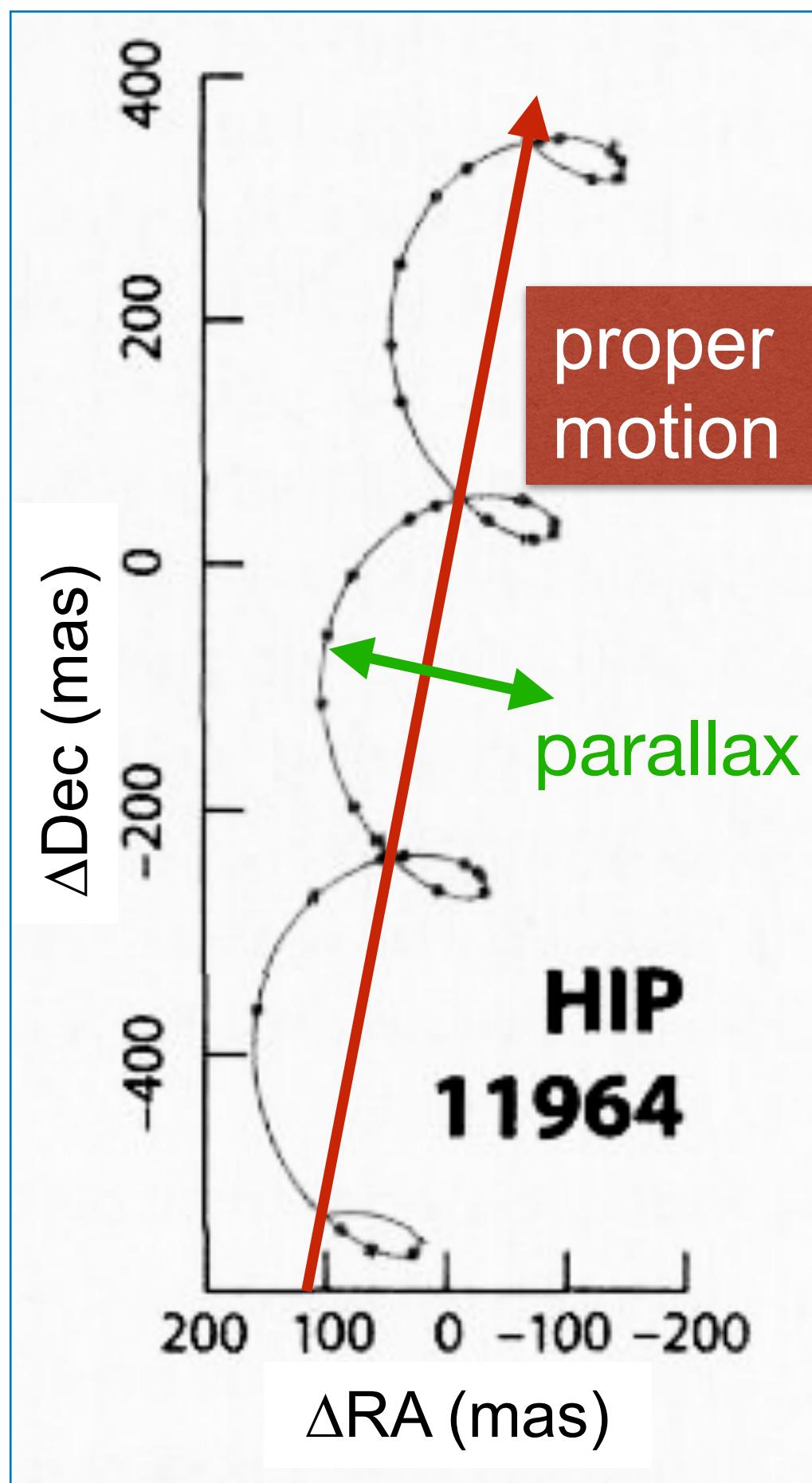


# Astrometry: parallax, proper motion and reflex motion

Proper Motion + Parallax



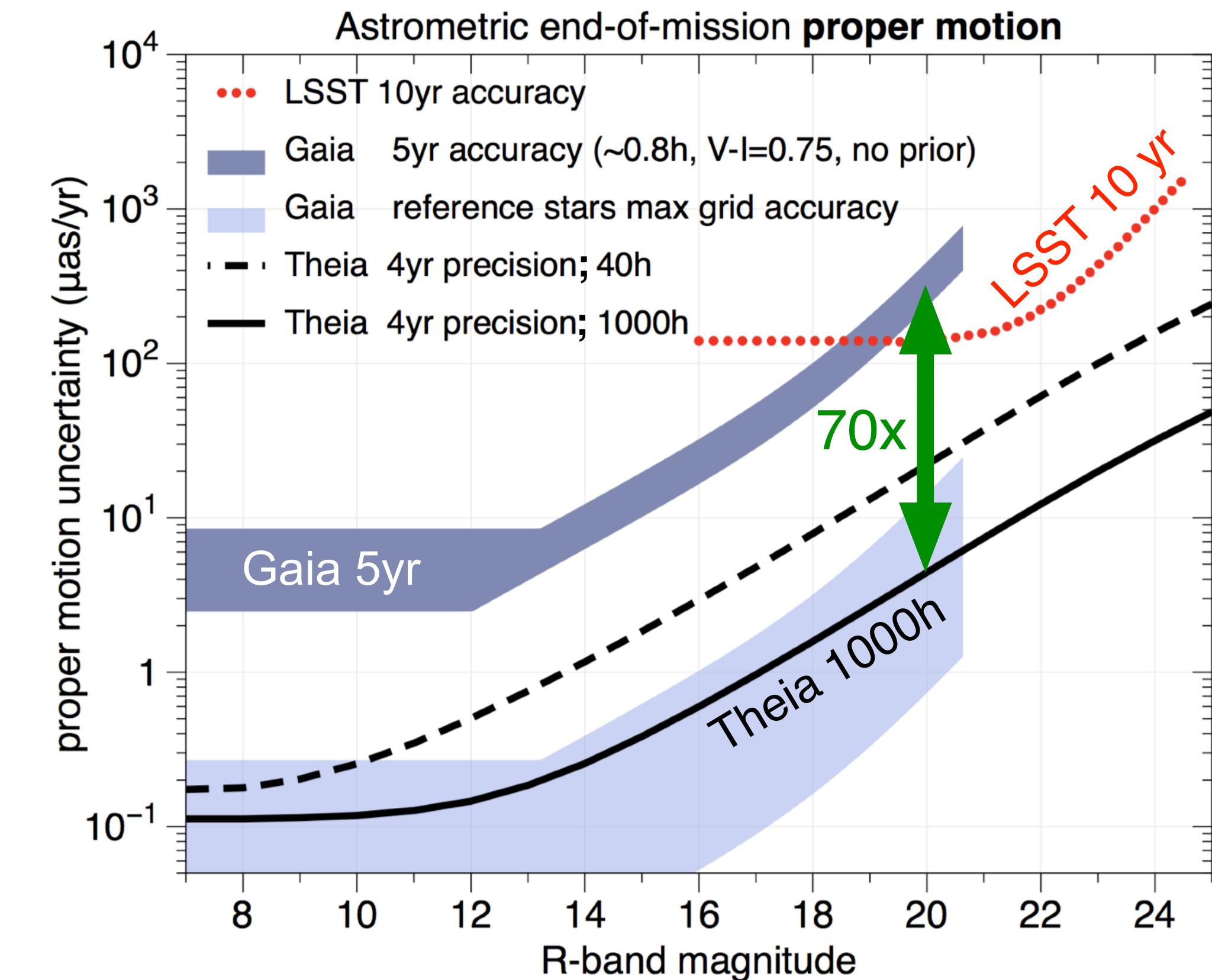
Residuals where (a) plots RA and DEC positions while (b,c) are positions with time and (d, e) are period-gram for each direction



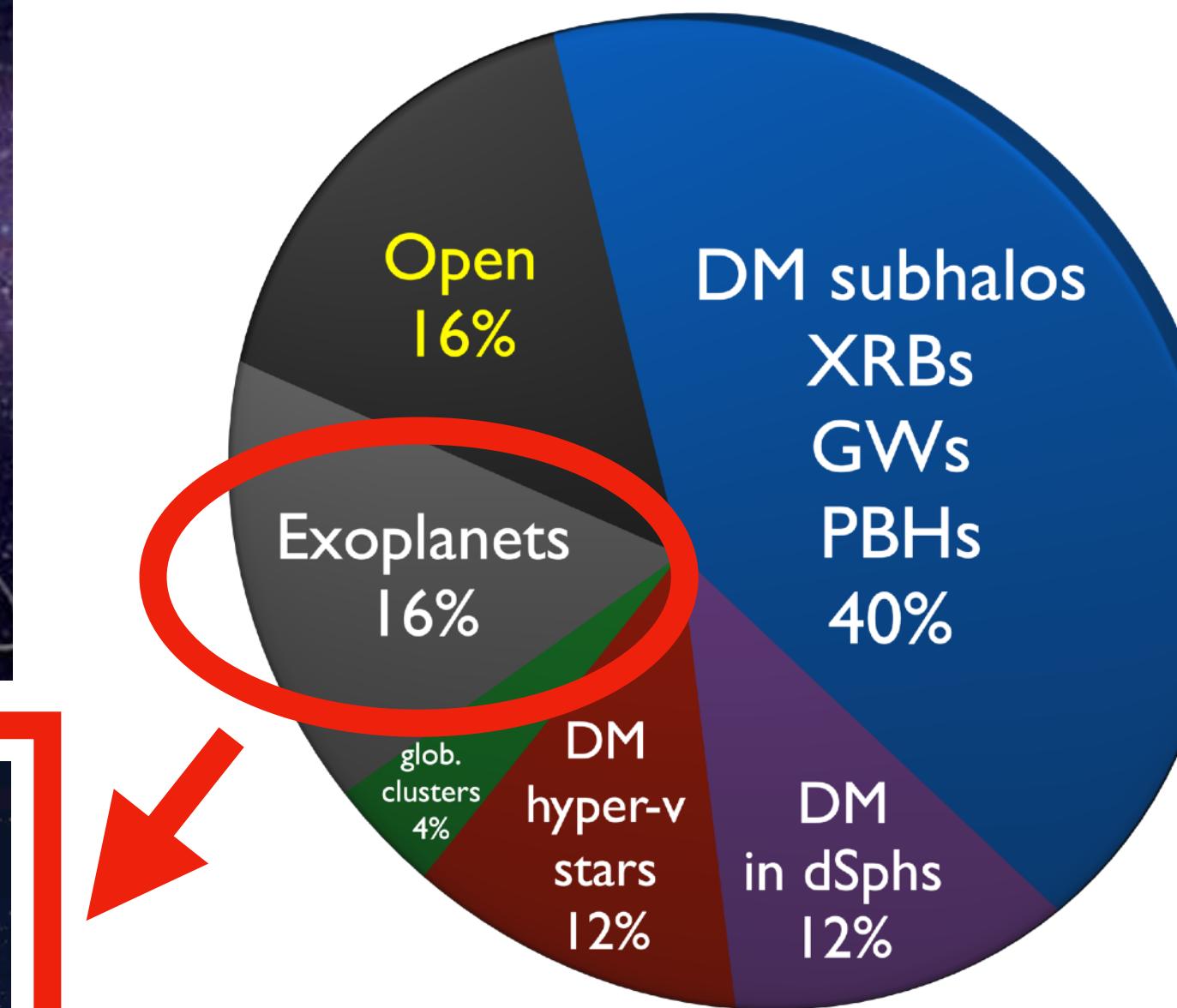
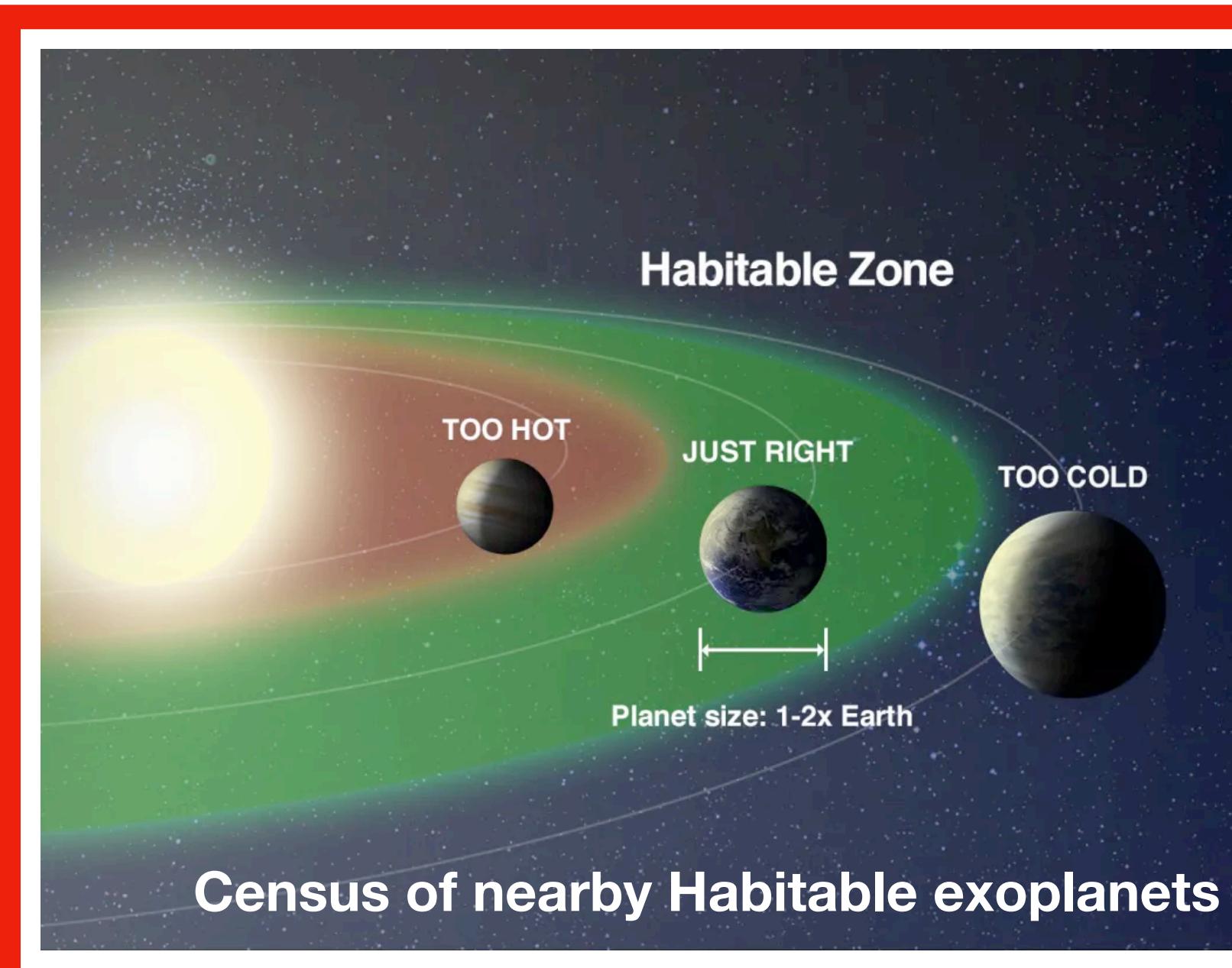

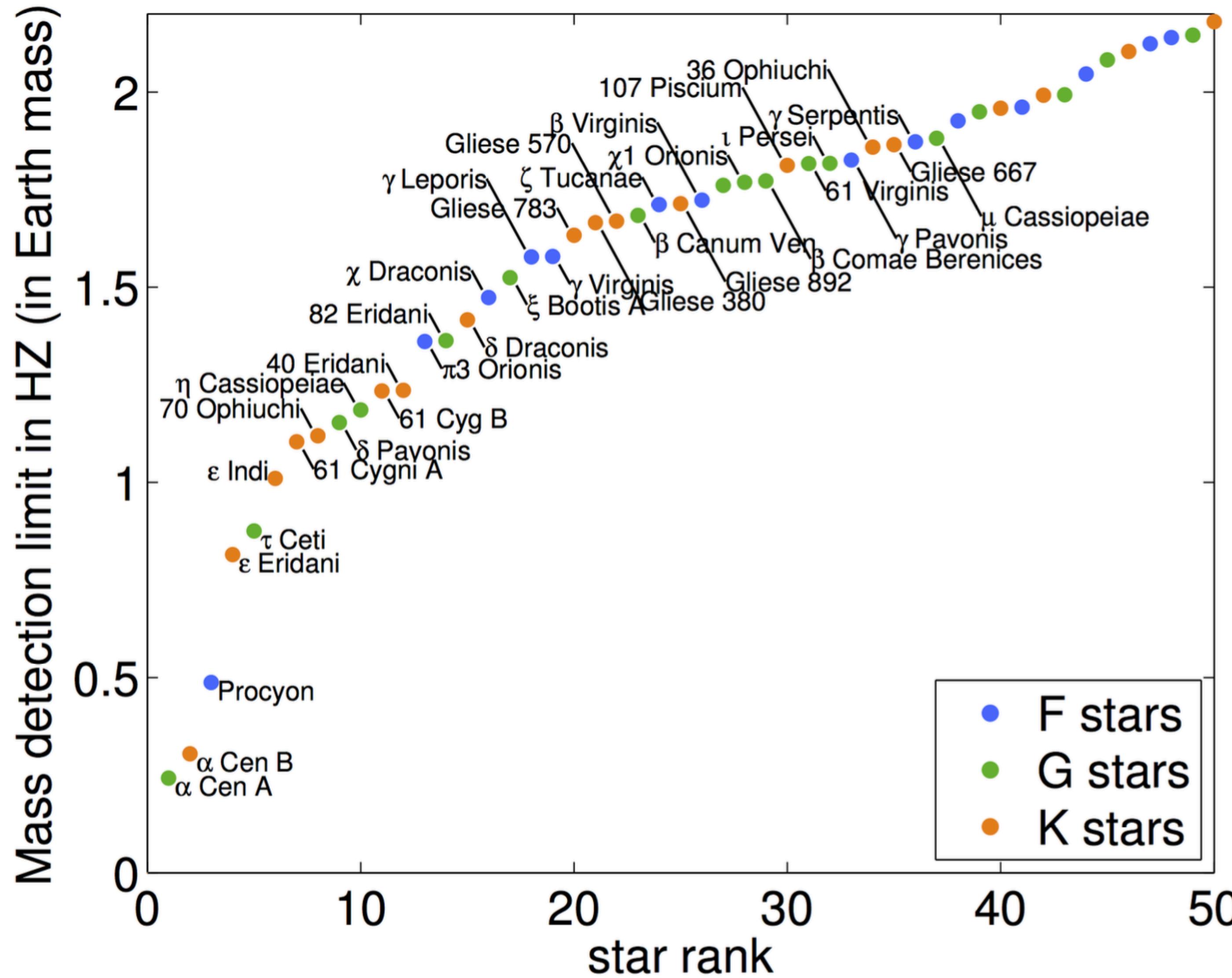


Two main observing modes:

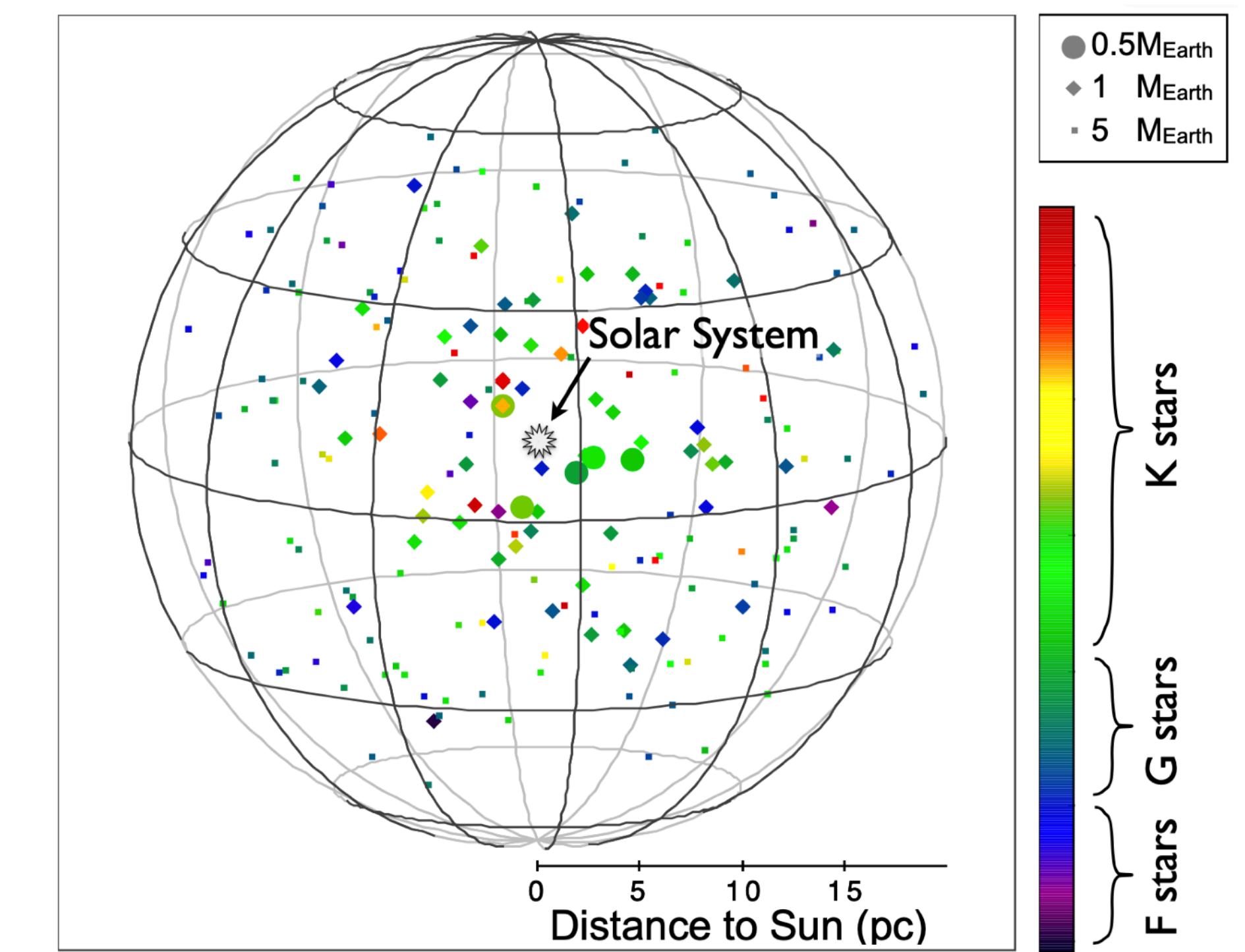
- Faint star mode

# Exoplanets primary goal : Earth-mass planets in HZ in the vicinity of the Sun



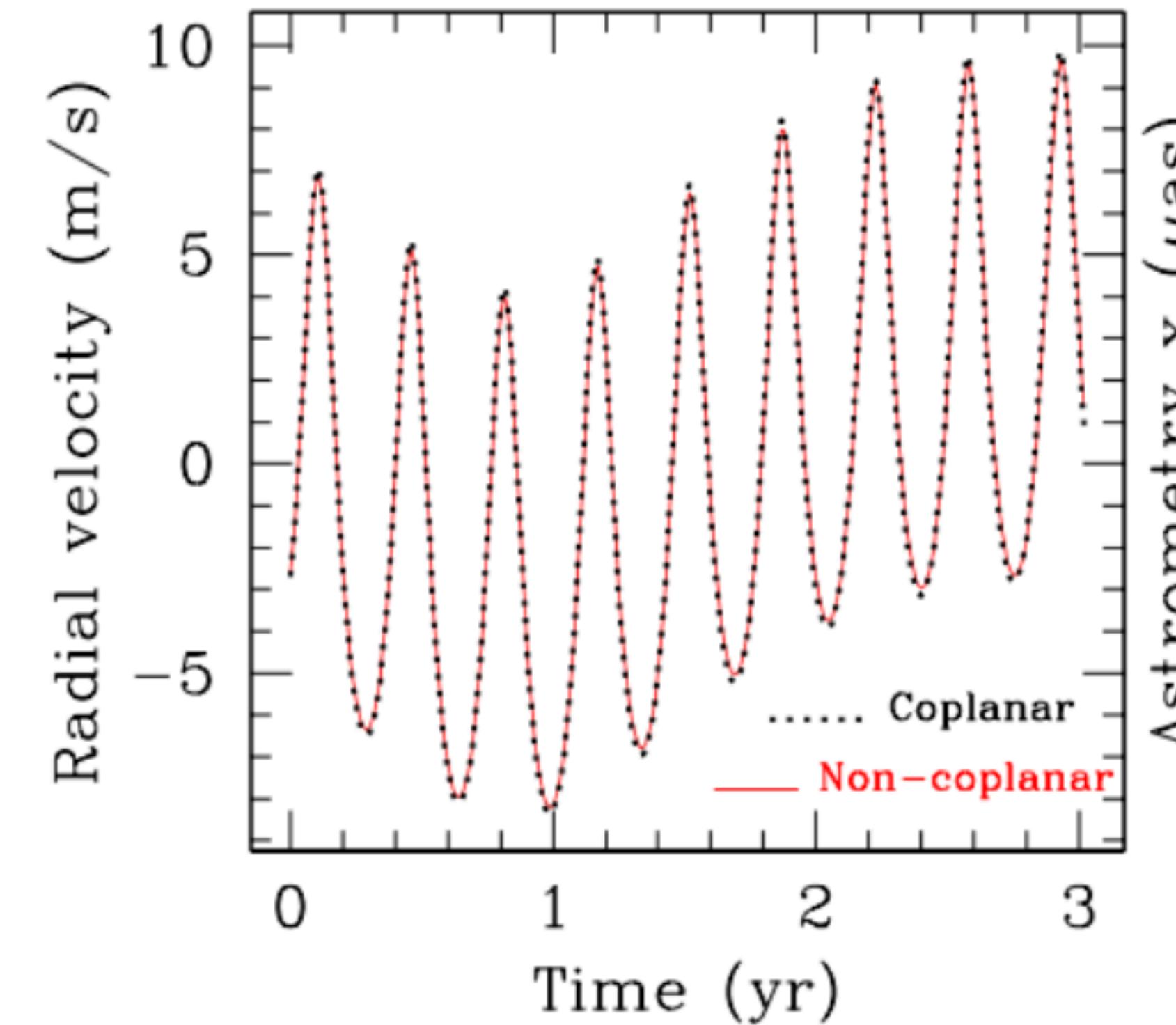
Complete census of exo-Earths

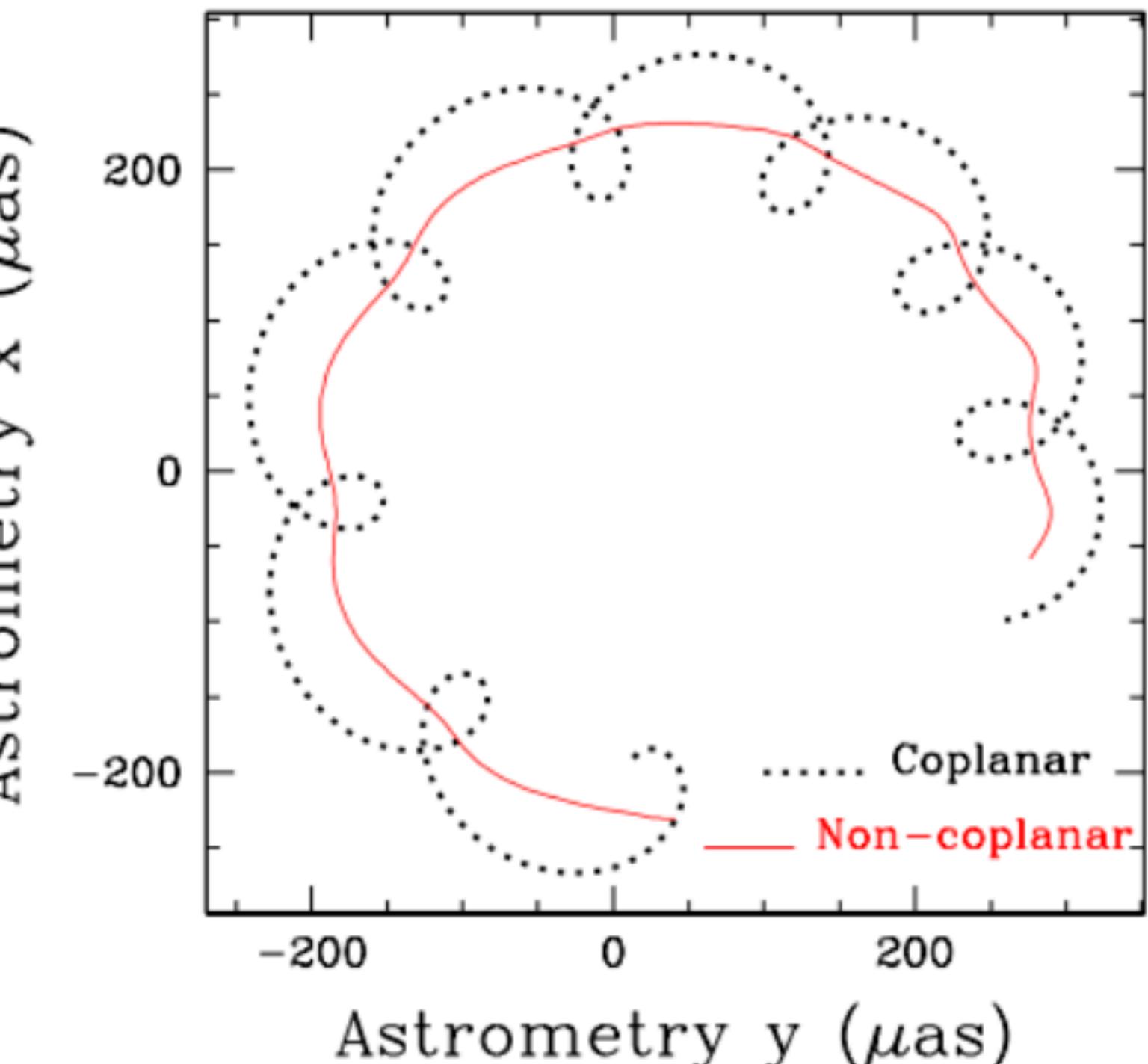
Coplanar planetary system

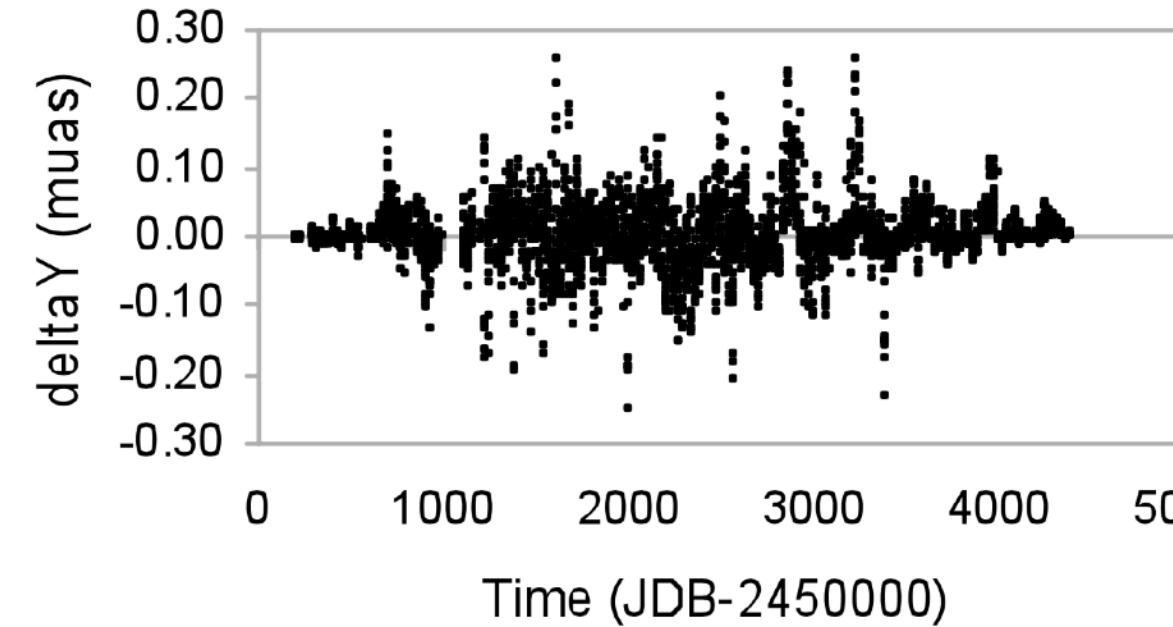

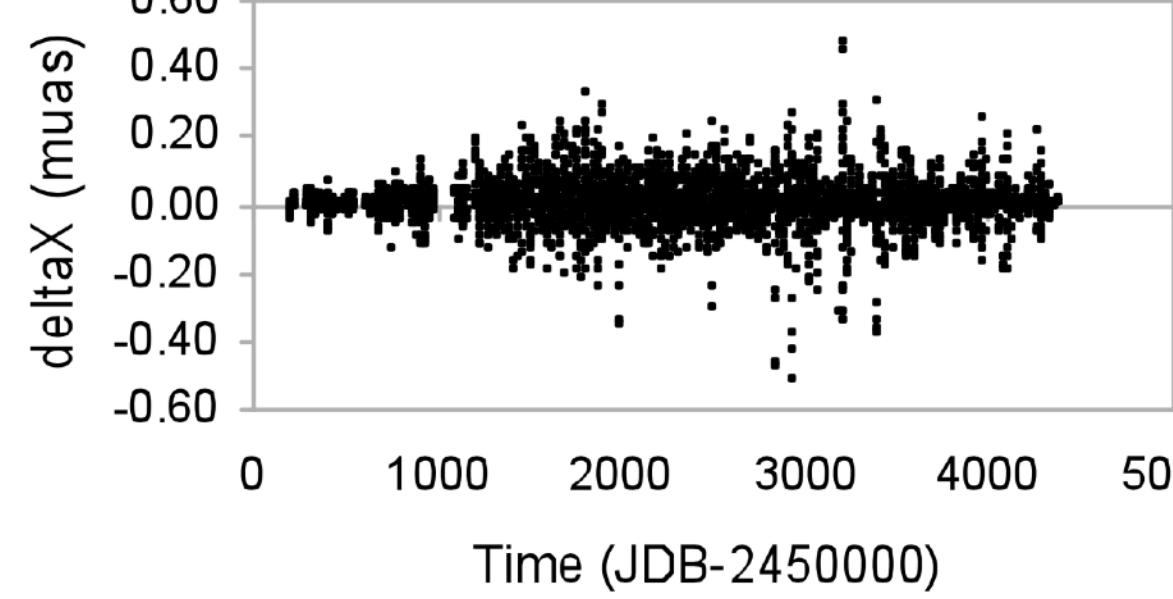

due to activity (1996-2007)

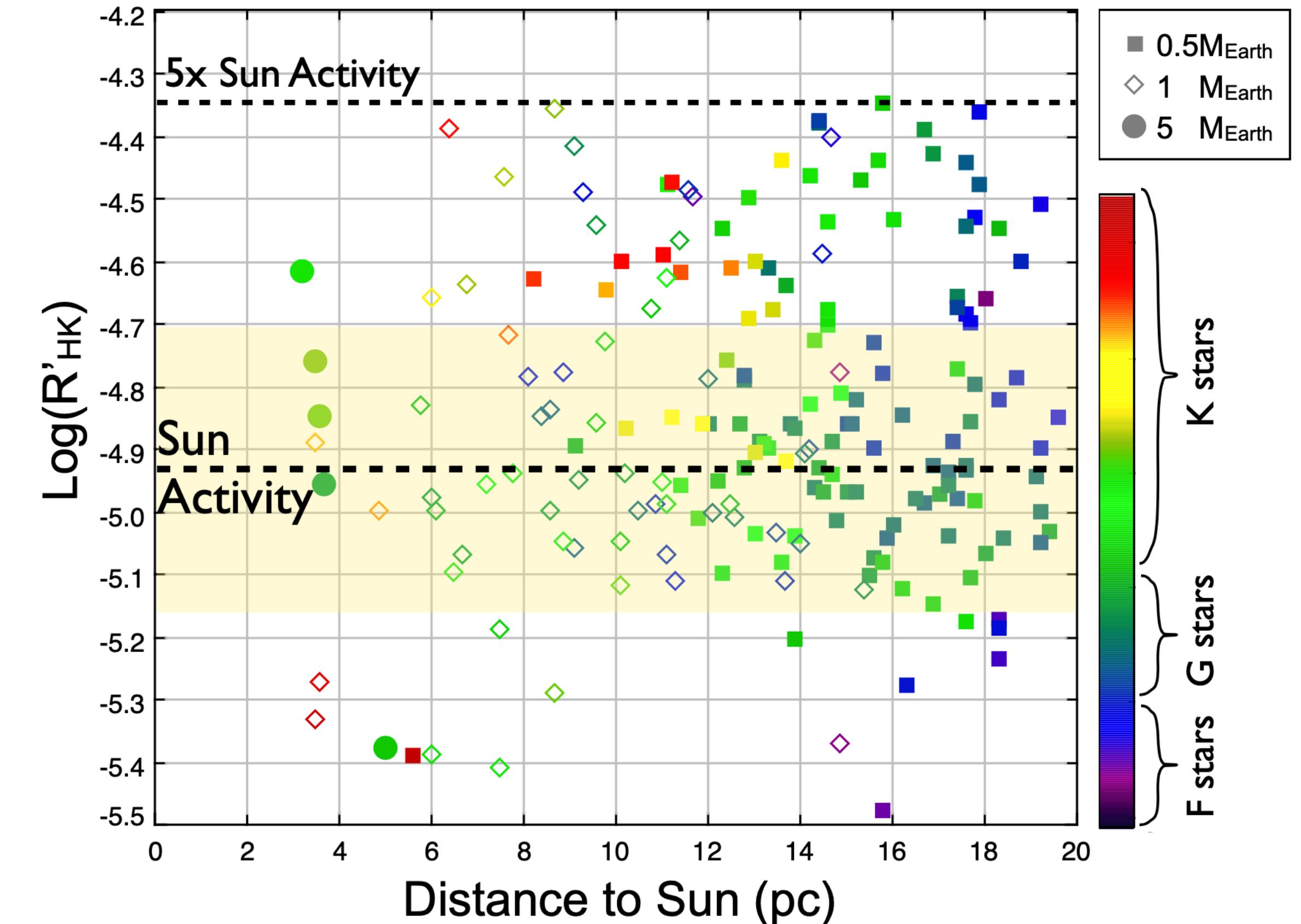

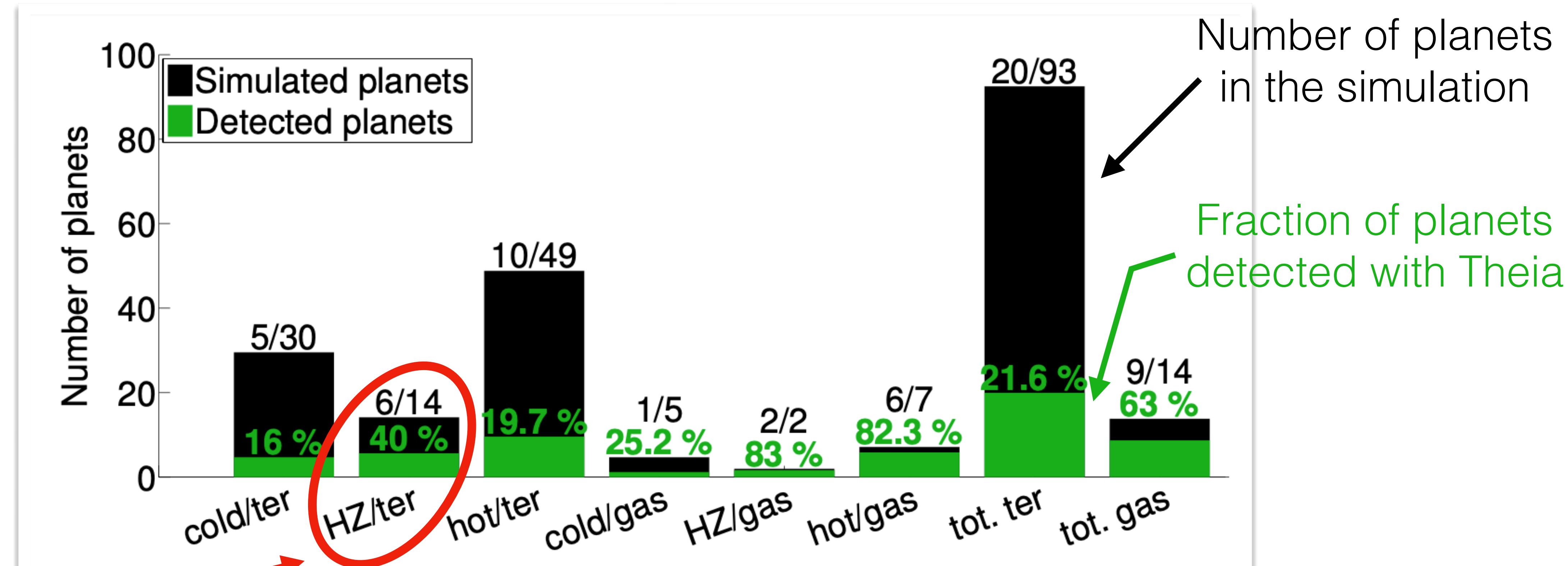

Detection limits have been revisited by Meunier & Lagrange (2023) through a blind test method and found lower detection limits, except for a handful of stars, **showing that it is probably possible to reach lower masses.**

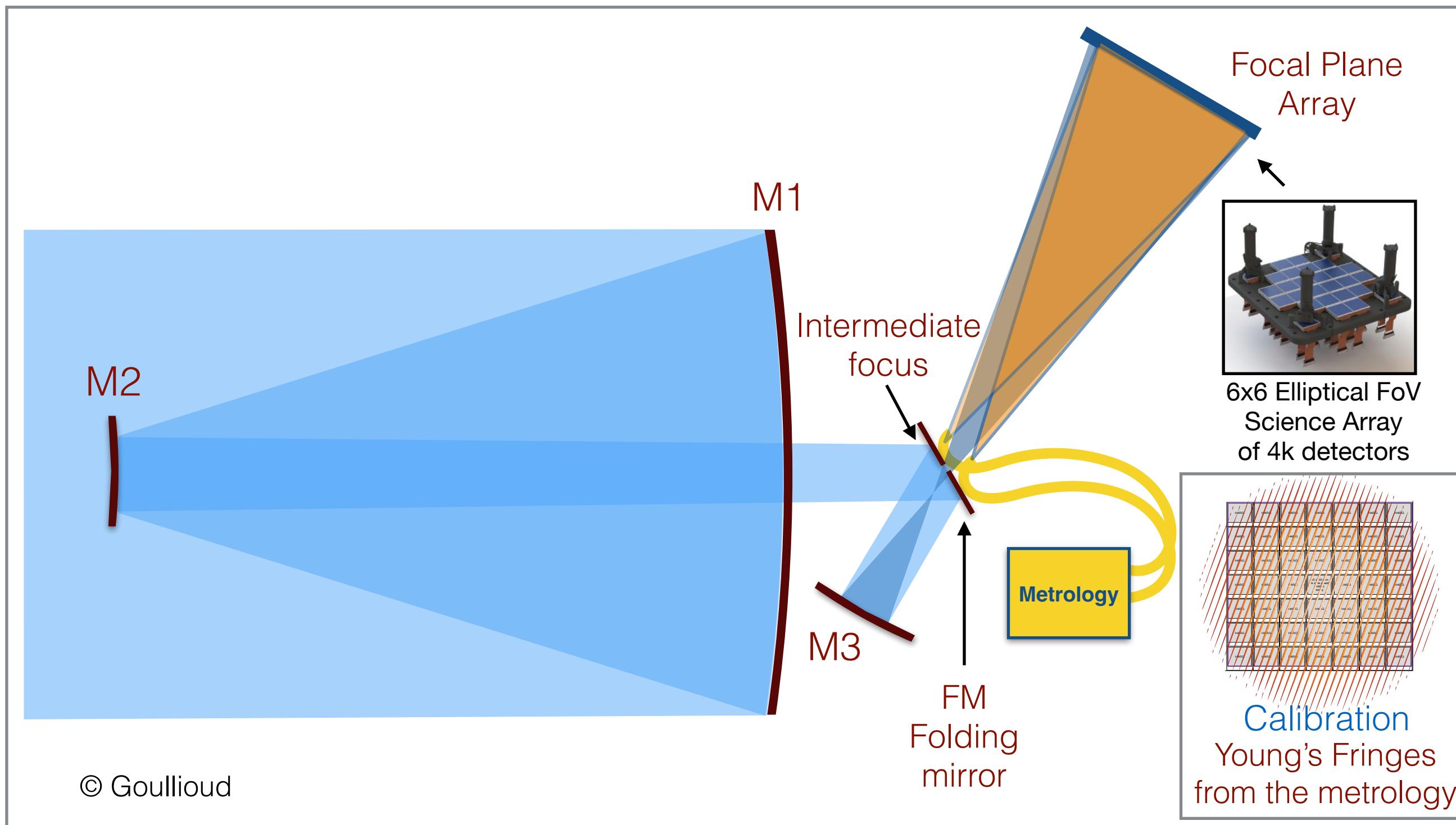

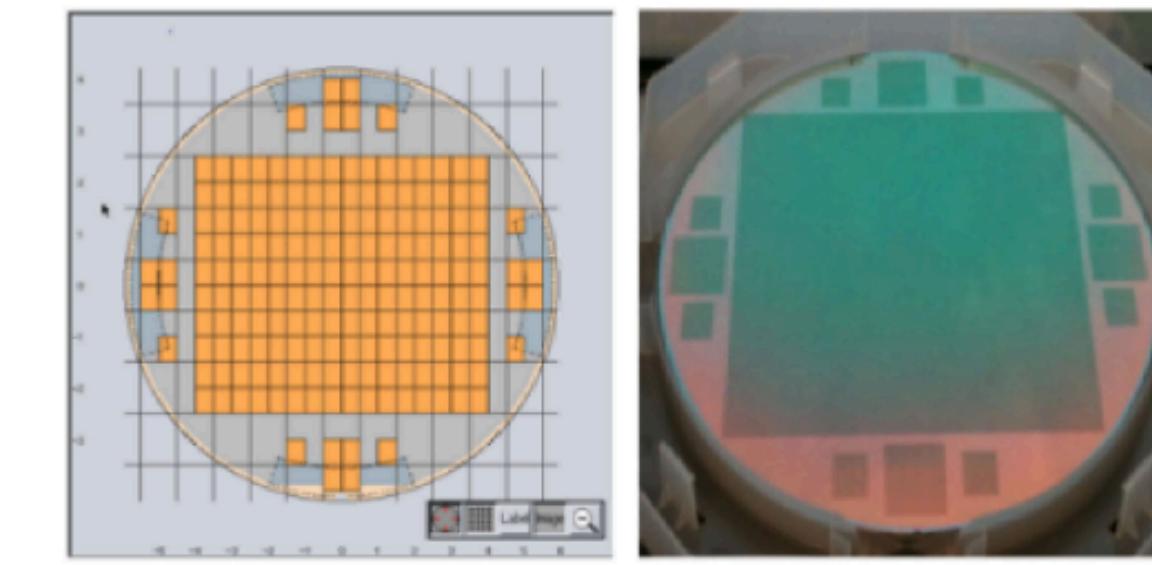

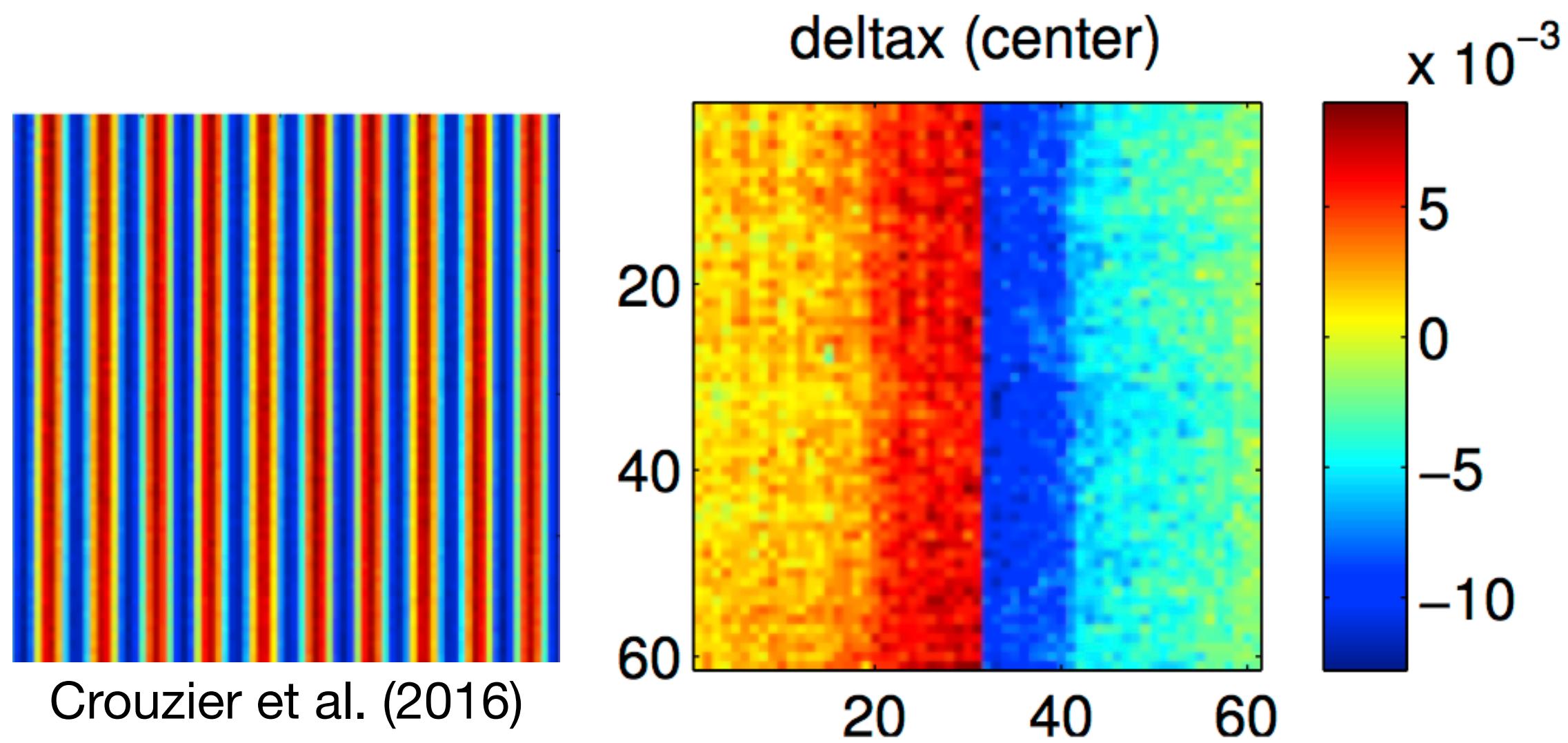

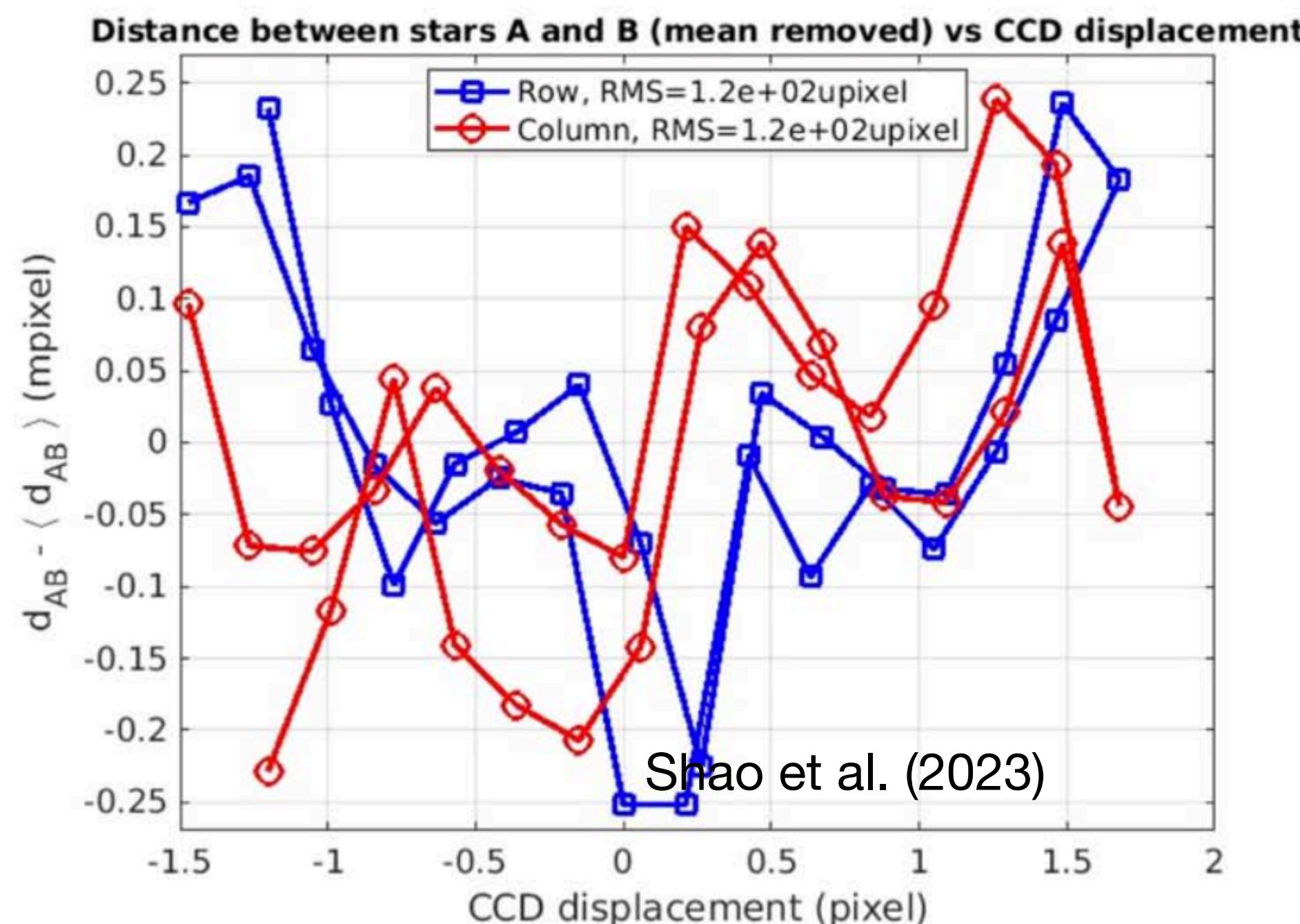
**Fig. 14.** A huge area,  $203 \text{ mm} \times 179 \text{ mm}$ , 1.8 Billion pixels CIS (Left: A photograph of the exposure shot map placement and the sensor fabricated on 12 inch; Right: the corresponding wafer image.)

- JPL/VESTA:  $3 \times 10^{-5}$  pixels (Shao et al. 2023)

# Telescope calibration : using reference stars to monitor the distortion



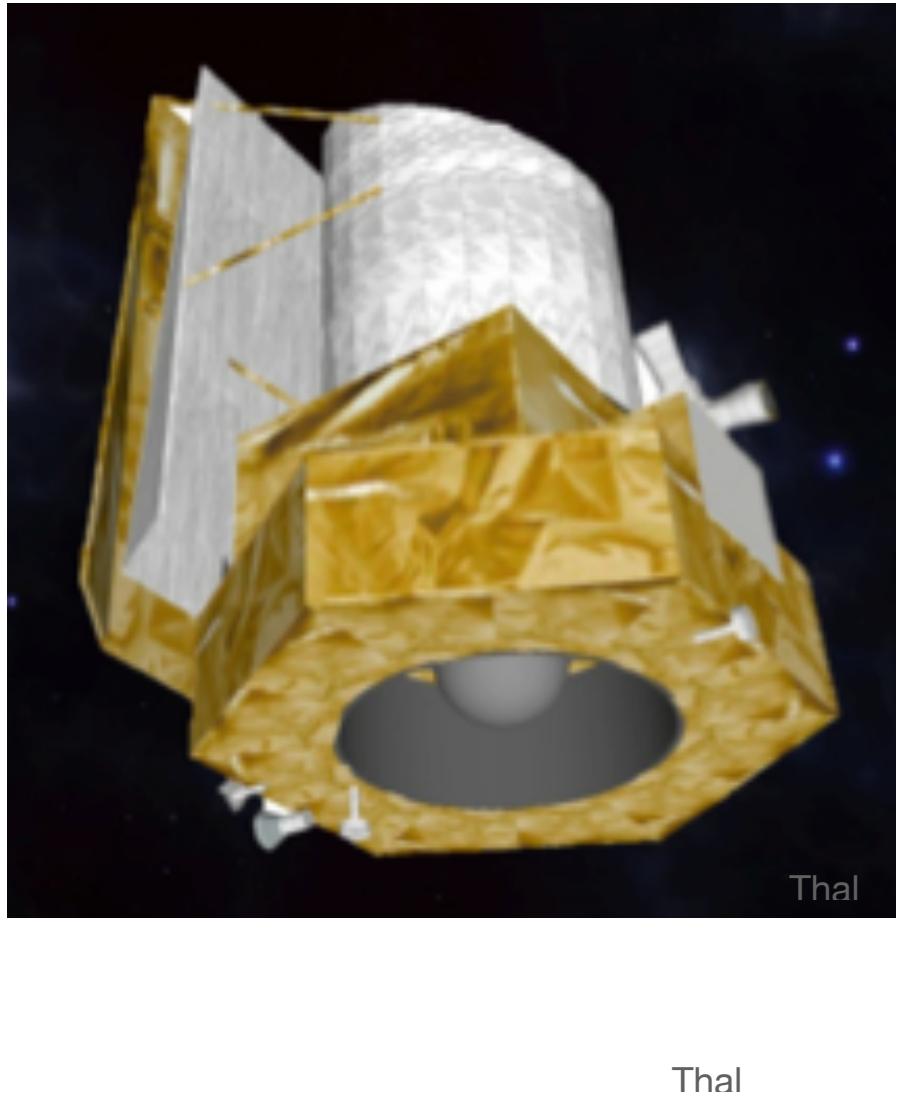
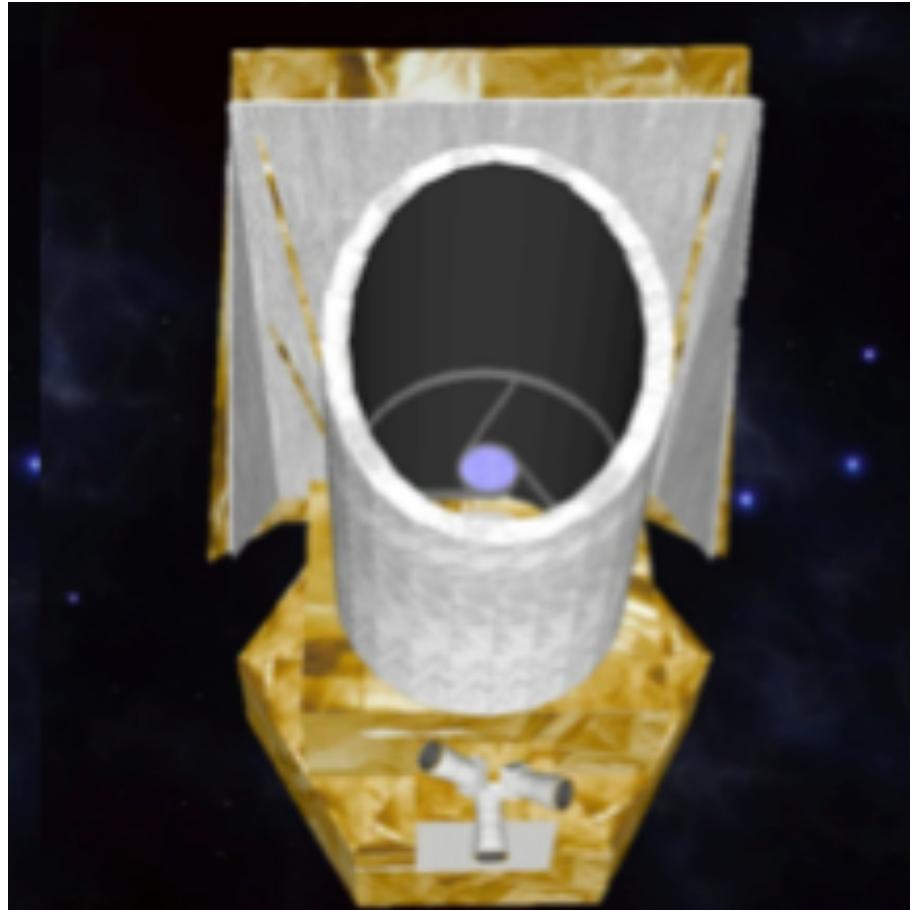
Distortion can be corrected by fitting the transformation (Sky  $\rightarrow$  Detector) as calculated by Ray-tracing (Zemax) by a 2D polynomial



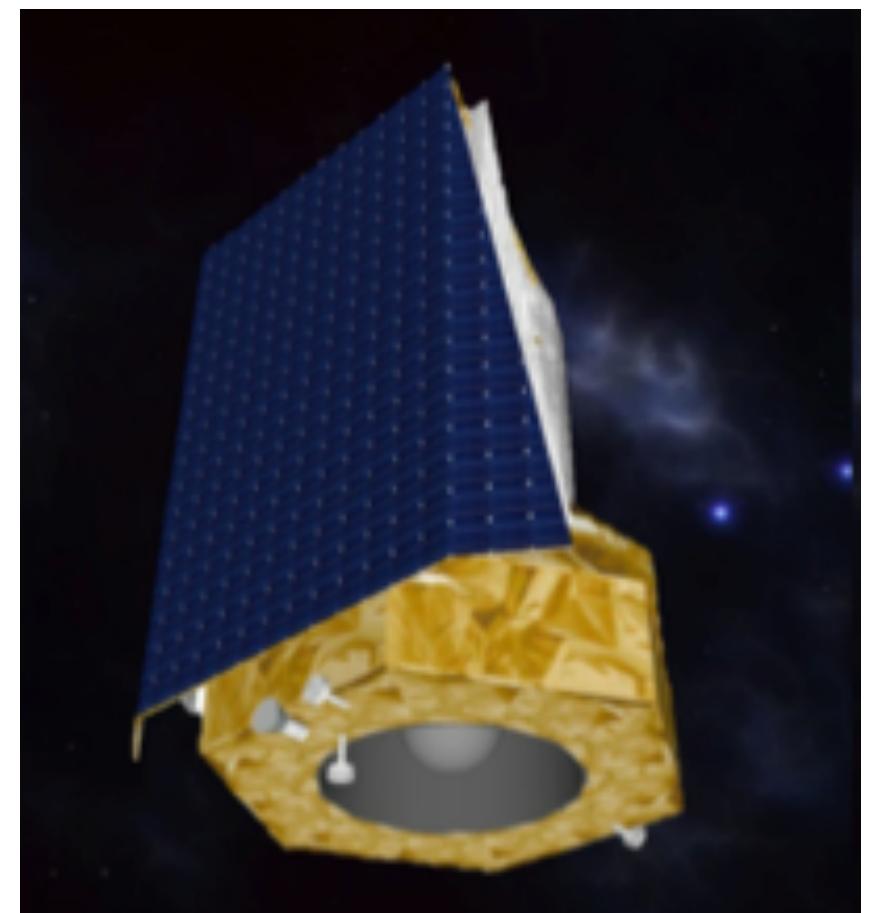
Simulated field-dependent distortion and fitted position

# Theia mission profile

- **ESA-led, ESA-operated mission with consortium funded payload** (this is the normal type of ESA mission)
- Submitted for the **ESA M7 call** as an Ariane 6.02 launch
- Spacecraft dry mass with margin: 1063 kg. Total launch Mass: 1325 kg



<b>Launch date</b>	No constraints, allowing launch date in <b>2037</b>
<b>Orbit</b>	Large Lissajous in L2
<b>Lifetime</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• 4 years of nominal science operations</li> <li>• Technical operations: 6 months orbit transfer plus instrument commissioning and 1 month decommissioning</li> </ul>
<b>Concept</b>	Single spacecraft, single telescope in the PLM, single camera in the focal plane, metrological monitoring of PLM
<b>Communication architecture</b>	75 Mbps, 4h/day



# Conclusion and perspectives

- One of Theia main science objectives is to identify Earth-like ( $M \leq 5 M_{\text{Earth}}$ ) exoplanets in the habitable zone of Solar-type stars in the vicinity of the Sun ( $d \lesssim 30 \text{ pc}$ )
- Astrometry allows planet masses to be measured even for stars with stellar activity
- Pointed differential astrometry allows the number of exposures to be increased compared to global astrometry allowing to reach sub-microarcsecond accuracy
- Synergy with RV for long period and massive planets
- Technical challenges are the focal plane array and mitigation of the optical distortion of the telescope: new detectors and new calibration strategy are under investigation with lab test benches.
