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#### 1. Introduction

Postural stability is a prerequisite to the performance of most of our daily motor tasks. Gait initiation, the transient period between quiet standing and steady-state walking, is a functional task classically used in the literature to evaluate the capacity of healthy individuals and neurological patients to maintain stability under dynamic conditions (Yiou et al. 2017). Postural stability during gait initiation is commonly evaluated through the "margin-of-stability", a quantity which takes into account both the position and velocity of the centre-of-mass within the base-of-support (Hof et al. 2005). This quantity is often computed from force plate system recordings (e.g. Yiou et al.,

2016). This study tested the agreement between the force plate system (considered here as the "gold standard") and markerless motion capture system, an innovative and easy-to-use technology, to estimate the MoS during gait initiation in young and elderly healthy adults as well as in patients with Parkinson's disease. Markerless motion capture system uses standard video and deep learningbased software to detect body segment landmarks directly from digital images (Kanko et al. 2021). In the present study, the focus was put on the marginof-stability along the mediolateral direction, because controlling stability along this direction is known to be particularly challenging during locomotor tasks.

#### 2. Methods

#### 2.1 Population

Thirty-three participants divided into three groups (young healthy, elderly healthy, and patients with Parkinson's disease) took part in the experiment which was conducted in accordance with the Declaration of Helsinki.

#### 2.2 Experimental Set-up and procedure

Participants initiated gait from the standing posture and continued walking to the end of a sixmeter track. Gait was initiated at a spontaneous velocity ("spontaneous velocity condition") and at a maximum velocity ("maximum velocity condition"). The force plate system was composed of two force plates (400x600mm, AMTI, USA) placed in series and embedded at the beginning of the walking track. The markerless motion capture system was composed of twelve Qualisys Hybrid cameras (Qualisys, Göteborg, Sweden) which recorded the body motion during the entire gait initiation process and the subsequent steps.

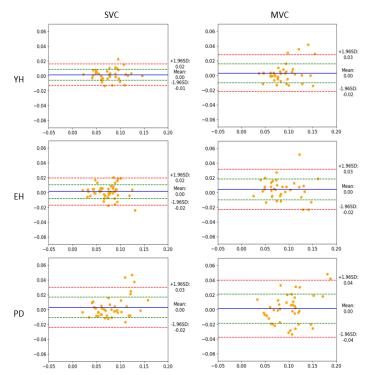
#### 2.3 Margin of stability

The margin-of-stability was computed as the difference between the mediolateral base of support boundary (BoSymax) and the mediolateral position of the "extrapolated centre-of-mass" at the foot-contact (vCoM<sub>FC</sub>), time of i.e MoS=BoSymax-yCoM<sub>FC</sub>. yCoM<sub>FC</sub> was calculated as follows:  $yCoM_{FC}=yCoM_{FC}+y'CoM_{FC}/\omega0$ , where yCoM<sub>FC</sub> and y'CoM<sub>FC</sub> are respectively the mediolateral centre-of-mass position and the velocity at foot-contact;  $\omega 0$  is the eigenfrequency of the body modelled as an inverted pendulum, calculated as:

 $\omega 0 = \sqrt{\frac{g}{l}}$ , where g is the gravitational acceleration and l is the length of the inverted pendulum (57.5% of body height (Winter,2009)).

#### 2.4 Statistics

For each trial, the margin-of-stability was computed with both systems. To investigate the agreement between force plate system and markerless motion capture system, a Bland-Altman analysis was performed. Bland-Altman plots were generated for each velocity condition and group, with the horizontal axis representing the average MoS obtained using the two systems, and the vertical axis representing the difference between the two systems. The lack of agreement between the two systems was summarised by calculating the bias, estimated by the mean difference (d) and the standard deviation of the differences (SD). Repeated-measures (RM) ANOVA with the Velocity (spontaneous velocity condition vs. maximum velocity condition) and System (force plate system vs. markerless motion capture system) as withinsubject factors, and the Group (young healthy, elderly healthy adults, patients with Parkinson's disease) as between-subject factor were also carried out.



#### 3. Results and discussion

In spontaneous velocity condition (Figure 1), Bland-Altman analysis showed that 95% of the absolute differences between the two measurement systems ranged between -0.01 and 0.02 m for young healthy (which corresponded to a [-17 and 20%] range of relative difference), -0.02 and 0.02 m for elderly healthy adults ([-23 and 26%]) and -0.02 and 0.03 m for patients with Parkinson's disease ([-28 and 30%]). In maximum velocity condition (Figure 1), 95% of the absolute differences between the two systems ranged between -0.02 and 0.03 m for young healthy ([-21 and 25%]), -0.02 and 0.03 m for elderly healthy adults ([-27 and 36%]) and -0.04 and 0.04 m for patients with Parkinson's disease ([-41 and 37%]). Absolute bias was very close to zero and the deviation was considered neglectable for each velocity condition and group, indicating that the accuracy of the markerless motion capture system was good. RM ANOVA further showed that there was a significant main effect of the Group (F[2,476]=5.7, p<0.001) and the Velocity (F[1,476]=28.1, p<0.001) on the margin-ofstability. In contrast, there was no significant main effect of the System, nor any significant interaction between factors. In other words, although relatively high differences in the margin-of-stability do occur between markerless motion capture system and force plate system on a trial-by-trial basis, these two systems are similarly effective in detecting an effect of the group and velocity on the margin-of-stability.

#### 4. Conclusions

Results of the present study add to the growing body of evidence in the literature that markerless motion capture system is a sufficiently reliable tool to investigate gait initiation biomechanical features in healthy participants and patients with Parkinson's disease patients (Simonet et al. 2024). This statement may have important implications in both clinical and laboratory settings due to the ease of use of markerless motion capture system compared to force plate system.
