Scientific objectives

- Investigate the nature of the dark matter in the Milky way
- Study compact objects
- Explore **planetary systems** in the Sun's vicinity and particularly rocky exoplanets in the habitable zone. Draw up a list of potential targets for future spectroscopic missions (LIFE, HWO)





High precision differential astrometry Differential astrometry allows to increase the precision on a pointed object. The position, distance and motion of the target object are evaluated relatively to the stars present in the field of view Target star



End of the mission required precision : 0.3 μ as \Leftrightarrow 5e-6 px \Rightarrow Calibrations are needed

Theia mission



- Space telescope
- Diffraction-limited
- 0.8 m in diameter
- A large field of view (0.5°)
- A fine resolution (0.3 µas)
- Stability monitored in real time

Theia telescope design (Malbet et al. 2021)

• Wavelength : visible

Why not use HWO telescope for high precision astrometry ?





Characterize an adequate CMOS detector

The detectors :

• Need for total field of view coverage : $30\ 000\ x\ 30\ 000\ px = 1\ Gpx$

• Current laboratory experiments : Gigapyx (Pyxalis) CMOS 8320 x 5436 px = 46 Mpx pixel size : 4.4 µm total size : 24 x 26 mm λ visible







Results : Global characterization pixel by pixel (linearity, dark current, readout noise, gain, ...)

Interferometric calibration of the pixel centroid position

In a theoretical detector (a), row and columns are well aligned, but in a real detector (b) the centroïds are misaligned (because of fine pixel structure, quantum efficiency local variations ...)

 \rightarrow Need of calibration





Calibration procedure :

- Fibres create Young's fringes on the detector
- Phase modulators make the fringes scroll
- The modulation observed by each pixel provides the position of the centroids





- Proof of concept on small matrices (Crouzier et al. 2016, A&A 595, A108) : 6e-5 px
- performance needs to be validated on large matrices \rightarrow a testbed will be developed at IPAG

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Calibration of optical distortion

Detector model :

measured signal

 $\mu_y = \mu_e + \mu_d + \mu_b$

measured noises

 $\sigma_y^2 = \sigma_e^2 + \sigma_d^2 + \sigma_r^2 + \sigma_q^2$

Objectiv : Show that a polynomial model is able to calibrate the telescope distortion with a precision smaller than 5e-6 px (corresponding to Earth like planet signal) Recent work on telescope stability (Malbet et al. 2022, SPIE 12180, 1F) has shown that the reference stars in the field of the telescope can be used as metrology sources in order to compute the distortion function

- model the field distortion function by a 2D polynomial (T or T1oT2)
- Adjust T thanks to the reference stars in the field of view known with Gaia catalog
- Apply T to the target star to recover its undistorted position

Objectiv : show that the procedure described before works in laboratory

- Illuminating pseudo stars on the led screen
- Induce distortion with lens and diaphragm
- Recording distorted star images with the detector
- Apply the previous procedure to recover the undistorted



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
