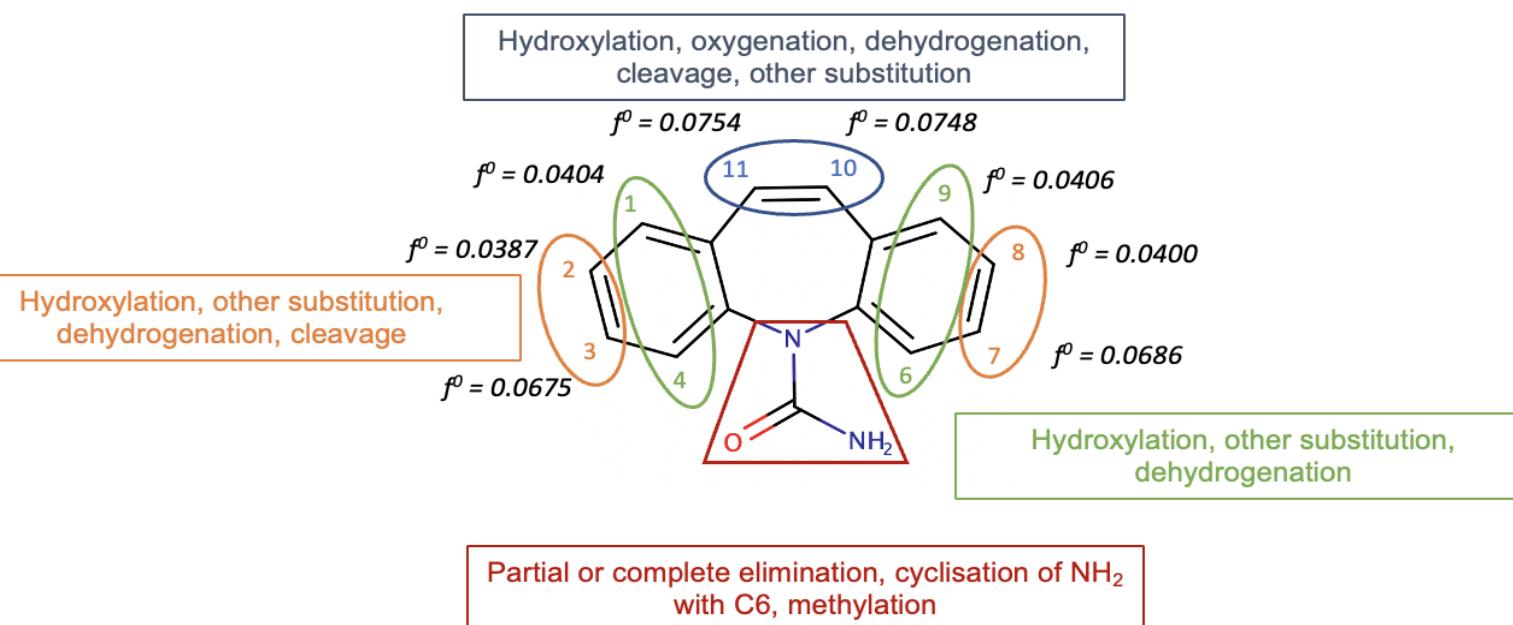
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Carbamazepine and water treatment

Carbamazepine (CBZ) = anticonvulsant drug (treatment of epilepsy, bipolar disorder and trigeminal neuralgia)

- Worldwide consumption > 1000 t/year
- Poor removal (< 25%) by conventional secondary processes
- 500-1000 ng.L⁻¹ in WWTP effluents

AOP : radicals attack on CBZ structure → **Generation of transformation products (TPs)**



Trognon, Albasi and Choubert, *Sci. Tot. Env.* (2024)

- **Various TPs** (structures, physico-chemicals characteristics, concentrations)
- Many **unknown** about the fate and behavior of such diversity of TPs

Computer-based modelling as a promising tool to predict the fate of MPs

Control MP release → Risk evaluation

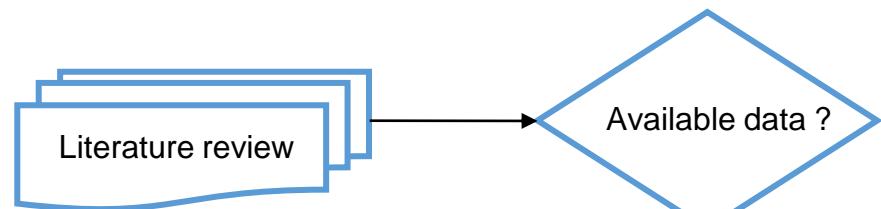
→ Processes optimization

Aims: improve the knowledge on the **nature, fate and dynamics** of CBZ and its TPs

Fill the research gap of the mechanisms occurring between CBZ removal and TPs effect

Identification and modelling of CBZ transformation pathways in various oxidation processes to improve the knowledge of TPs

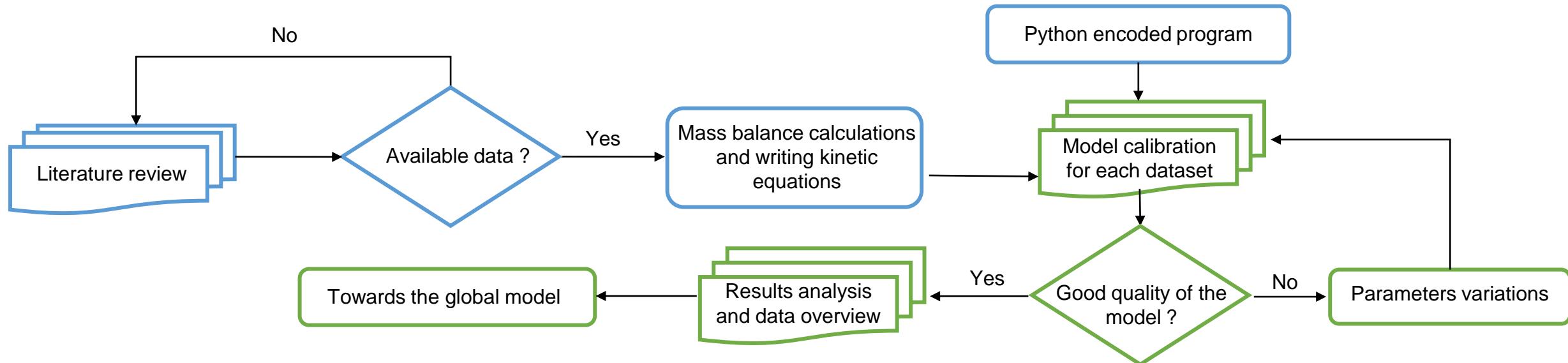

Challenge : experimental [TPs]

Scientific approach: Development of individual models



$$\frac{dCBZ}{dt} = -k_{CBZ} * [CBZ] \quad (1)$$

$$\frac{dT_P}{dt} = k_{stoic_TP} * k_{molécule\ mère} * [molécule\ mère] - k_{TP} * [TP] \quad (2)$$

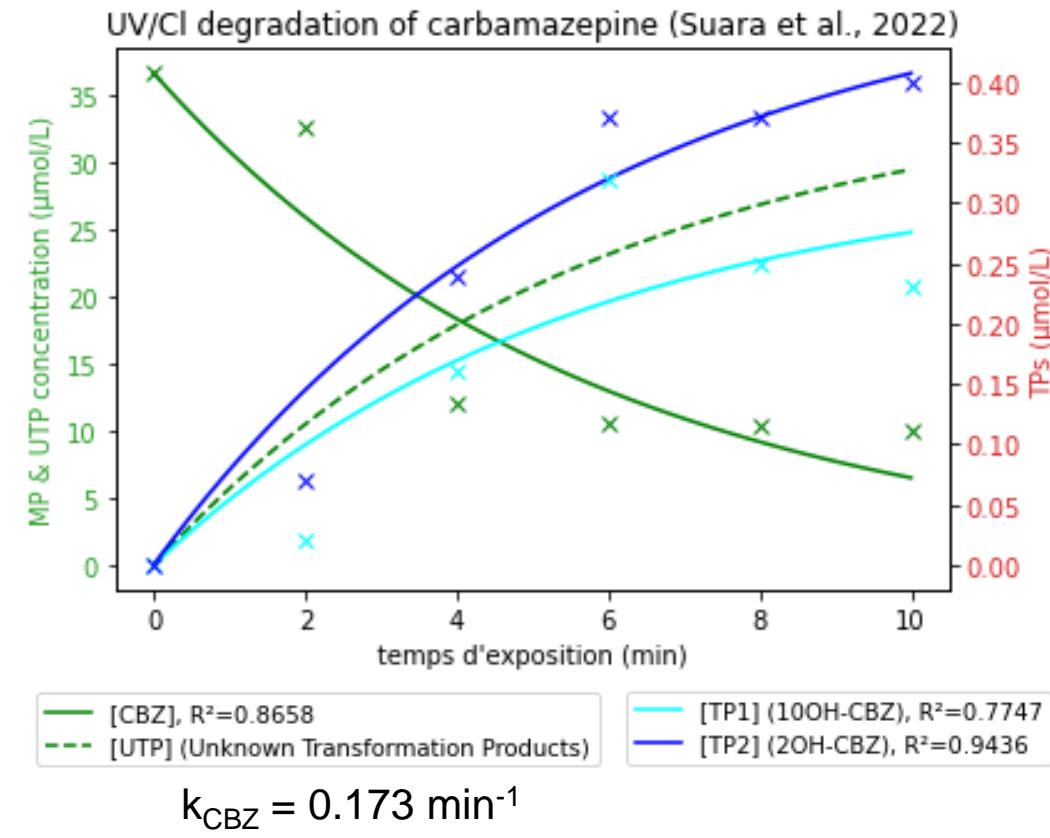
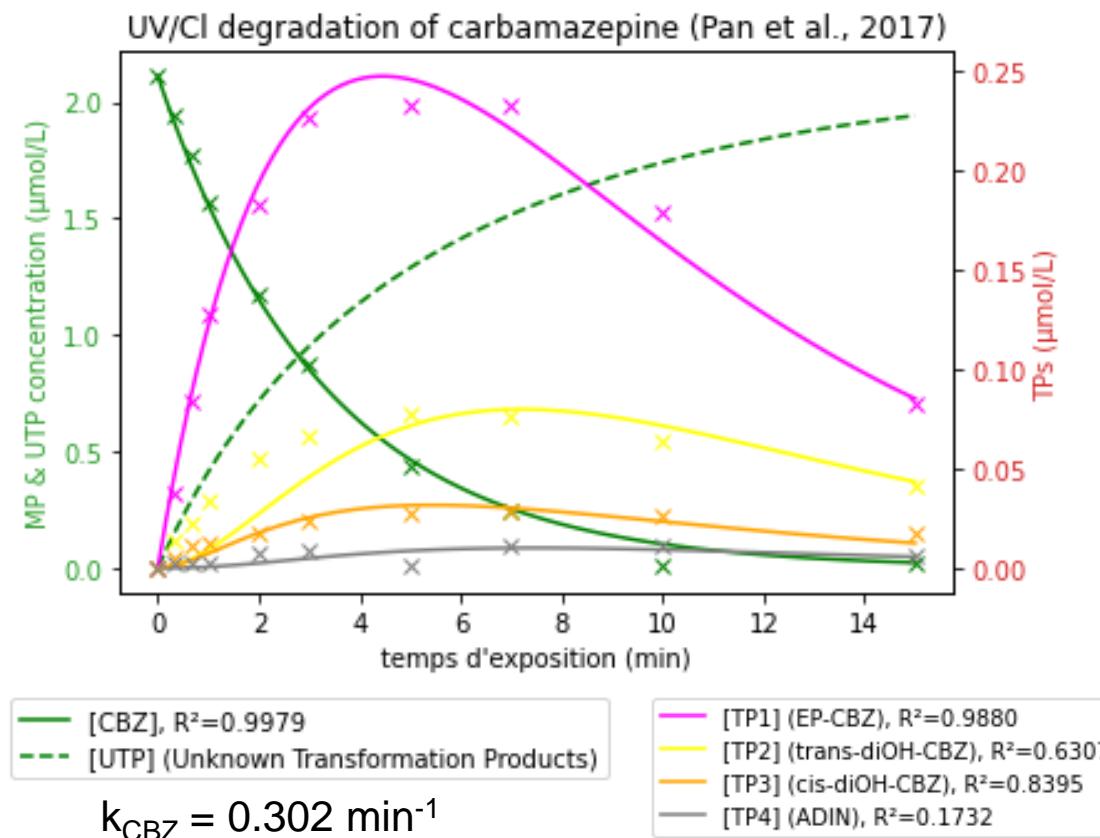

Paramètres du modèle :

kstoic : coefficients stœchiométriques

k : constantes cinétiques de dégradation

Modelling of CBZ degradation

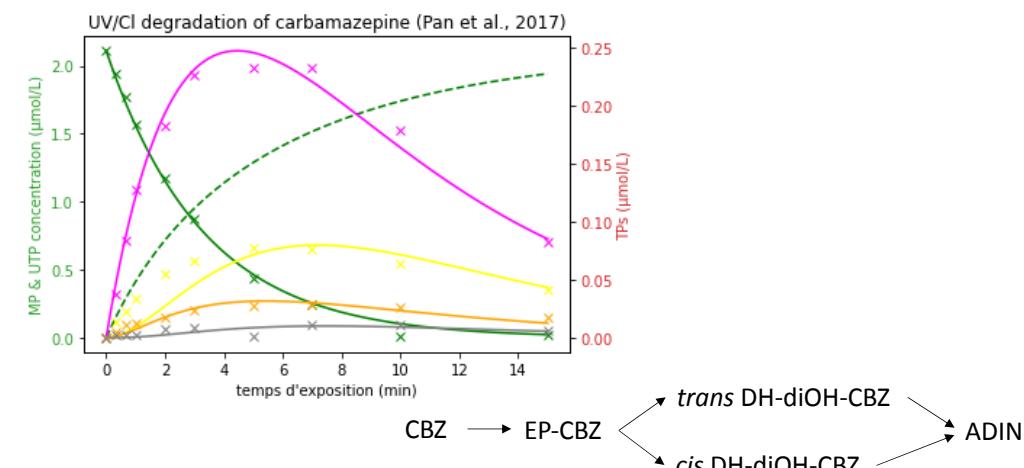


- good adequation between predicted and experimental data ($R^2 > 86\%$)
- k_{CBZ} resulting from model and k_{CBZ} originally calculated in datasets are comparable
- Pseudo-first order equation appropriate for ¾ datasets

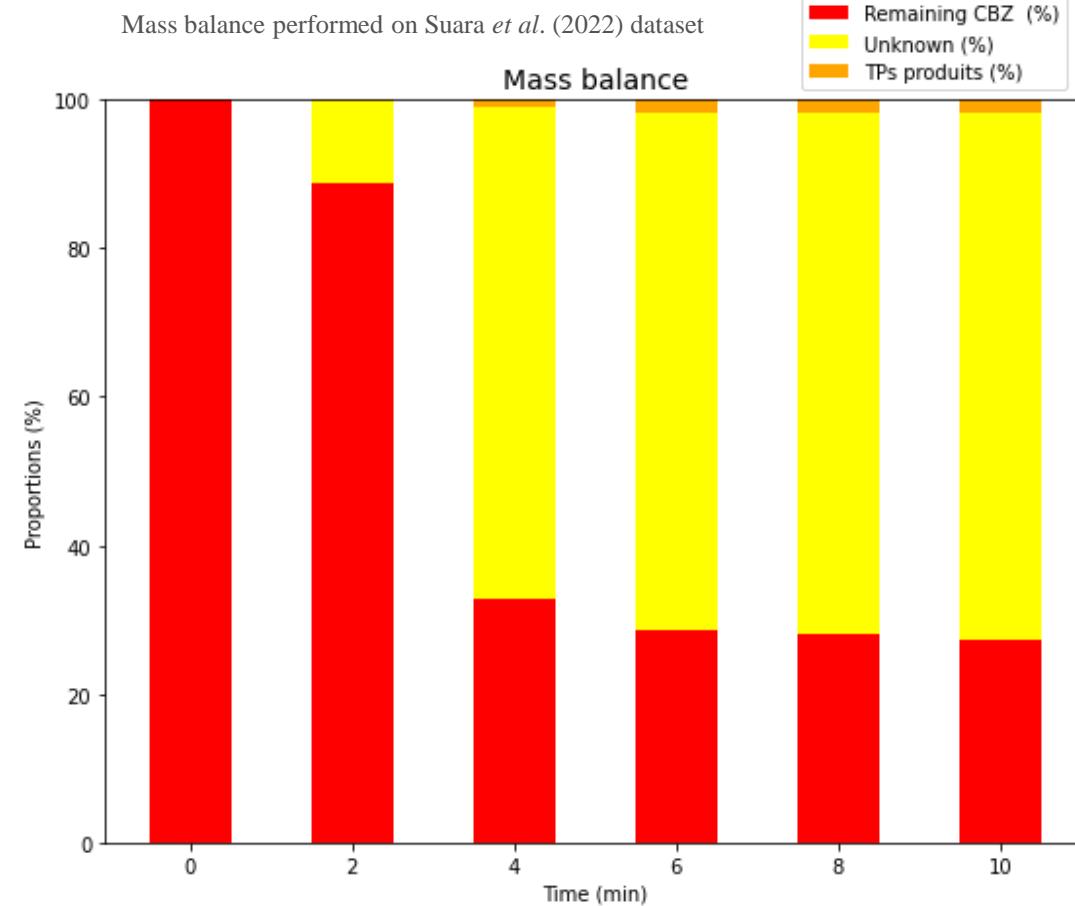
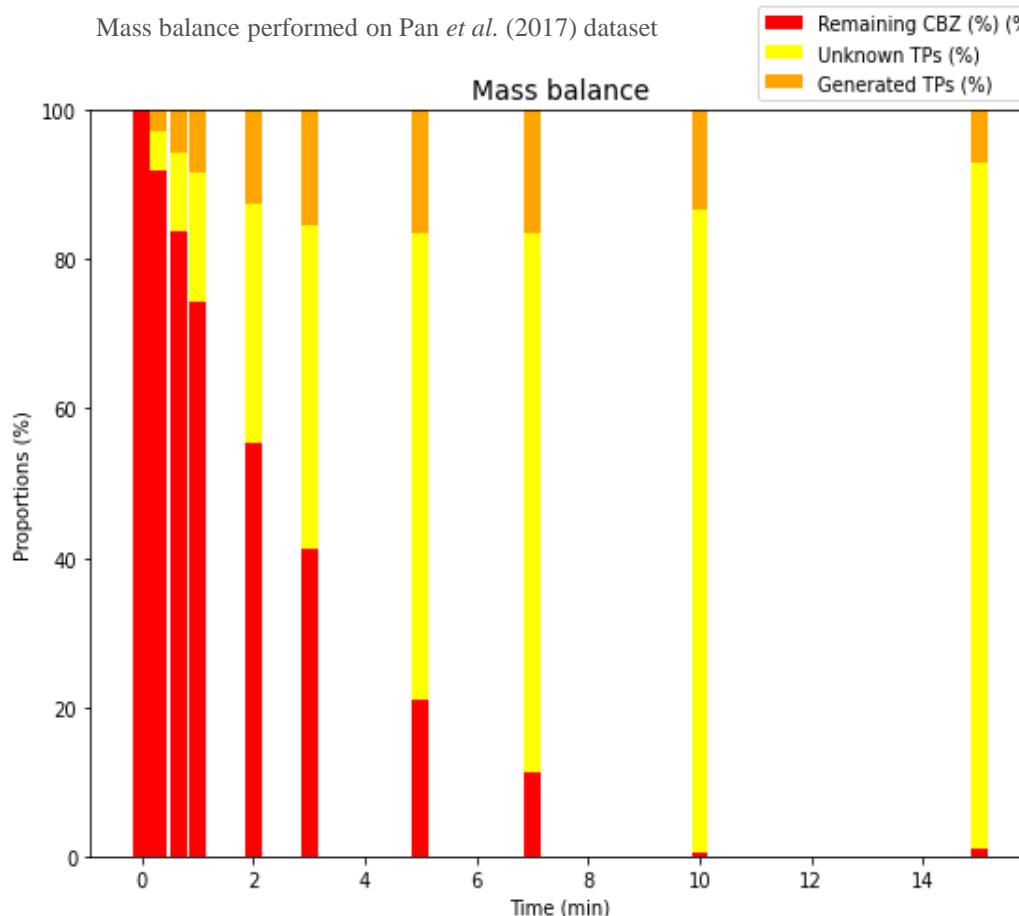

- 11/15 TPs predicted and experimental data fit-well ($R^2 > 63\%$)
- Quality of the fit decreases for secondary and final TPs (*reaction scheme*) or lowest concentrations
- Predicted concentrations consistent with the reaction pathway



Modelling of CBZ degradation & TPs formation – mass balance

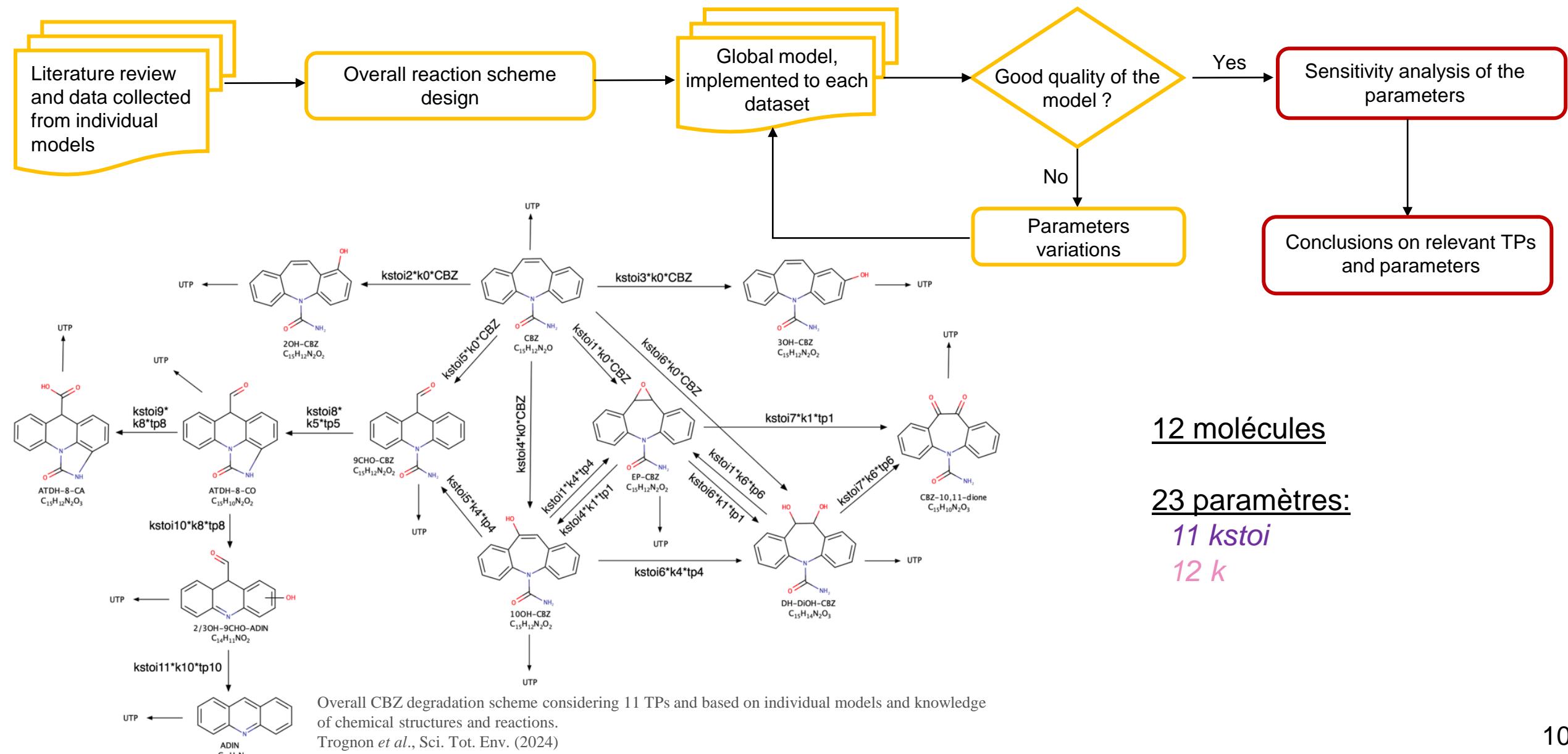


- Studied TPs represents 2 % to 17% of the transformed CBZ
- Major proportion of unknown TPs



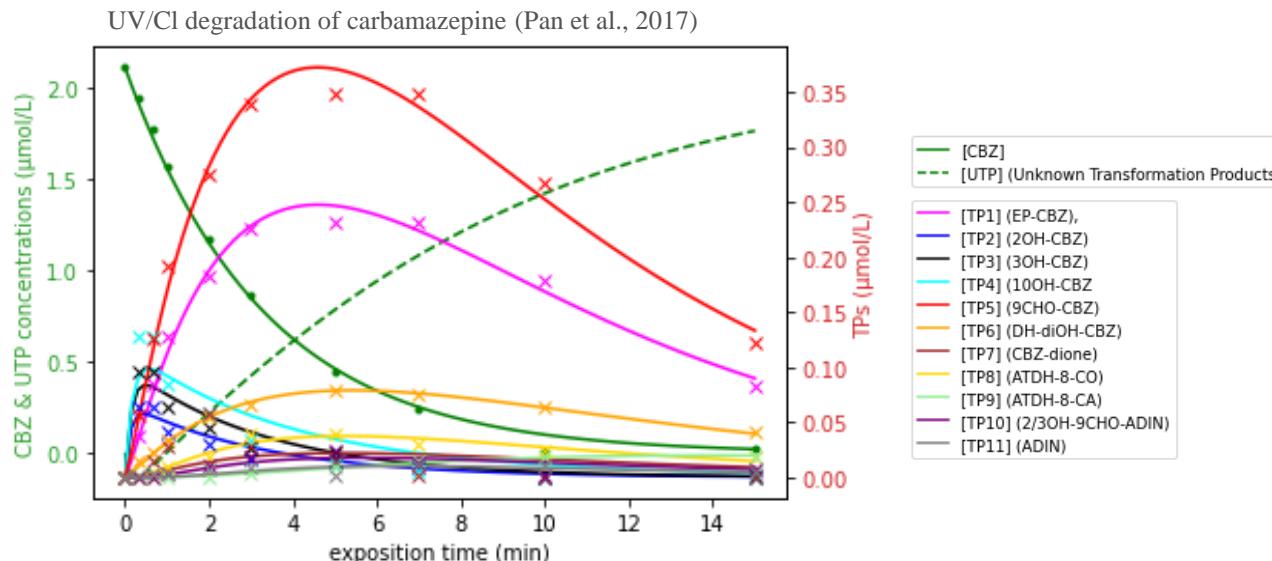
Choice of molecules of interest

Scientific approach: Development of a global model

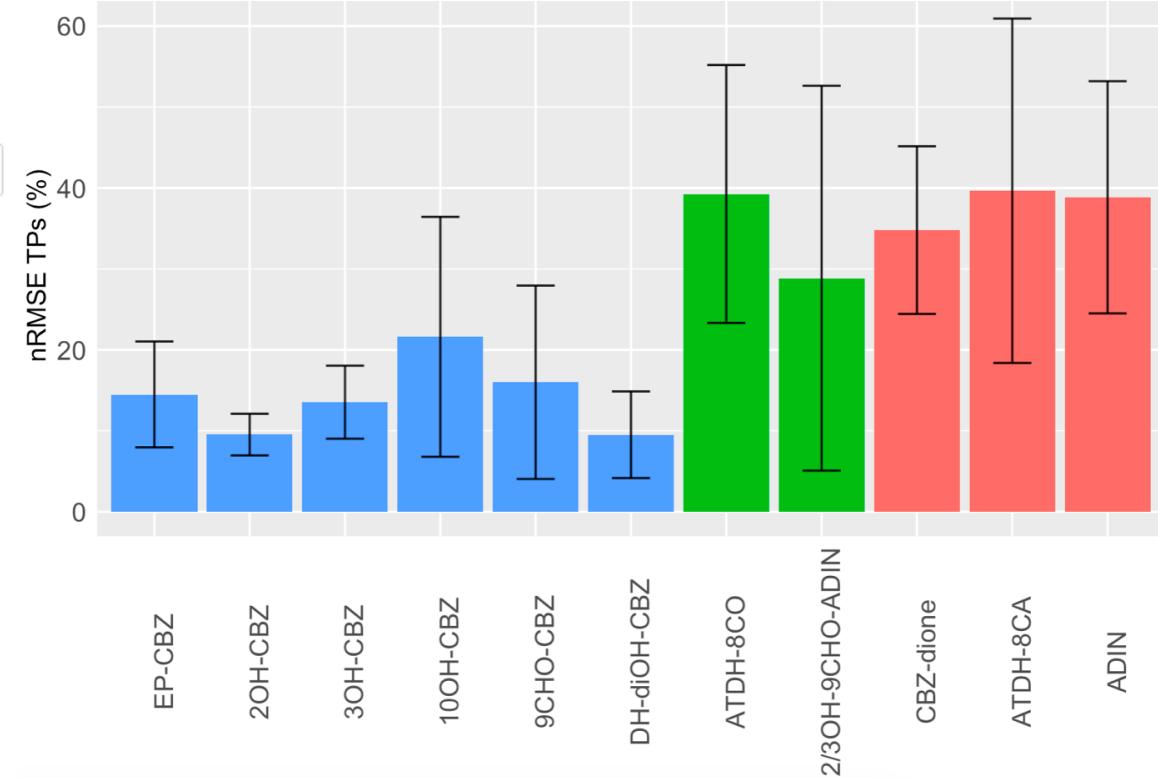


Modelling of CBZ degradation & TPs formation

Global model based on an overall reaction scheme – CBZ and TPs results



Mean nRMSE (%) of each TP, calculated using data from all four datasets. Primary, intermediate and final TPs are represented in blue, green and pink, respectively.



- Good adequation between predicted and experimental data ($R^2 > 80\%$, data not shown)
- Modelling error for primary TPs $< 22\%$; Modelling error for intermediate and final TPs $> 35\%$

Global model based on an overall reaction scheme – sensitivity analysis

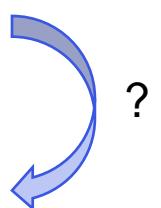
Global model = 12 molecules, 13 differential equations, 23 parameters (k_{stoi} , k)

TP_s parameters

→ Which TP_s? Which parameters?

Quality of the model prediction

→ Help future calibration



Observing the changes in the CBZ and primary TP_s prediction upon variations of their parameters

For each parameter studied, 5 different values were used:

0.1, 0.3, 0.5, 0.7 and 0.9 for k_{stoi} ,
 $10^{-4}, 10^{-3}, 10^{-2}, 10^{-1}$ and 10^0 for k

Global model based on an overall reaction scheme – sensitivity analysis

- k_{stoi} have more influence on the model quality than k
- 4 Primary TPs appear as important for the overall quality of the model (EP-CBZ, 9CHO-CBZ, 2OH-CBZ and 10OH-CBZ)

- Development of a **model resolving ordinary differential equations** (ODEs) based on formation/degradation kinetic equations and mass balance approach
- **Overall reaction scheme**
- Promising results with **good correlation** between the model predictions and the experimental data for both CBZ and TPs and for both the individual and the global model
- **4 primary TPs** are instrumental for the quality of the predictions: EP-CBZ, 9CHO-CBZ, 2OH-CBZ and 10OH-CBZ. Future model calibrations should focus on the **stoichiometric k_{stoi} parameters**, rather than the kinetic constants k .

Model validation

Investigation of the UTP fraction

Add more **parameters** in the model such as macroscopic properties of the TPs (hydrophobicity, ...)
