Impact of grass-based diet on vitamin B content in cow milk

Introduction

The content of B vitamins in cow milk can be altered by several factors and one of them is the diet of the cows¹:

- Vitamin B2² and B9³ content in milk increase when cows have grass-based diet compared to corn-based diet
- B5 level is improved in milk with a cow's diet richer in fodder ⁴

> **Objective of the study** <

Relate the breeding practices : grass-based VS corn-based diet to the B vitamins content of cow milk

B12 content is increased with corn-based diet compared to grass-based diet 3

Materials and methods

40 dairy cows from Holstein and Montbéliarde breeds were split into 2 groups of 20 cows for 2 months : AE : pasture-based diet and IN : corn-based diet with limited access to pasture For the next 2 months, each group was split again in 2 sub-groups of 10 cows differing in the amount of grass received in their diets :

AEC : Pasture-based diet; **AED** : AEC with a reduced access to pasture

INC : corn based diet with a limited access to pasture; **IND** : INC but no access to pasture

Tank milks from each 4 groups were collected before the morning meal 3 times in September and the B vitamin content was analyzed by UPLC Fluorometer for vitamin B2 and B6 (pyridoxin, pyridoxal, pyridoxamine) ⁵, by UPLC MS for vitamin B5 and B1 ⁶ and by chemiluminescence for B9 and B12 (MP Biomedicals).

Anova and t-test statistical analysis were performed on R software.



Results

More B2 and B9 with grass-based diets

B1 and B12 trends show optimum with corn-based diet and access to pasture



Figure 2 : Effect of diet on the total vitamin B2 (p<0.05) (A) and B9 (p=0.06) (B) content of milk from the 4 group of the study.

Milk was richer in total vitamin B2 with more grass in the diet (p<0.05) when comparing the 2 systems AE and IN (p<0.01) (A).

- • 36,7% B2 in AEC compared to IND
- With a little access to pasture, **INC** milk was richer by **+ 22%** from IND.
- The drought simulation of **AED** decreased the content of milk by -7% compared to the diet with grass only AEC.

No significant results show the effect of the diet on vitamin B9, but **trends** are visible (p=0.06). The milk from AgroEcological system (AE) seems to be richer in B9 compared to the Intensive system (IN) (B).

B6 follow the same trend pattern : Pyridoxal (B6) content of milks show the same trend as B9 (p=0.1) B2 and pyridoxamine (B6) are correlated (p<0.01) at r= 0.95, for raw and dry matter datas.



Figure 3 : Effect of diet on vitamin B1 (Thiamin) (p=0.2) (C) and B12 (p=0.1) (D) content of milk from the 4 group of the study.

Trends (p>0.1) in vitamins B1 (C) and B12 (D) show that the content of the 2 vitamins seems to be higher in the milk of cows fed corn silage and having access to pasture for a small time of the day (INC). The lowest content was found in the grass-based diet (AEC) for B1, whereas it was in corn-based diet (**IND**) for **B12**.

More B5 with corn-based diets

Diets have an impact on the vitamin B5 content in milk (p<0.001) (**E**) :

Discussion

Breeding practices seem to have an impact on the vitamin B content of cow milk and are in line with those found in the literature for B2 and B9^{2,3}:

- Pastural systems would have milks richer in vitamin B2 and B9 (that could be partially explained by a concentration effect due to lower milk yield) but poorer in vitamin B1, B5 and B12,
- Simulation of drought periods tends to decrease B2 (B1 and B12 in intensive systems only) but to increase B5 content,
- > Further studies on the vitamin B content of yogurts and cheeses produced from these milk will follow (Auzance et al. at EAAP, Florence, Italy, 2024).

- The **higher content** was found in **IND** milk, richer by + 27% compared to AEC (p<0.05)
- **Drought** simulation **increase** the vitamin B5 content in milk (p<0.01)
- An effect of the system is also observed with a **higher content** in milks from IN systems (corn-based diets) compared to AE systems (p<0.01)
