A comprehensive functional force velocity endurance (FoVE) model reveals unsuspected muscle properties affected by the expression of DUX4

ABSTRACT

Measurements of muscle function is crucial to the assessment of potential treatments for muscular diseases. To date, several force tests have been proposed in the literature such as the grip strength test and in situ measure of maximum muscle force-producing capacity. These experiments are realized under isometric conditions at null velocity, which does not reflect what happens in everyday life. Here, we developed a Force-Velocity-Endurance (FoVE) model to in situ compare the muscle functional capacities of the ACTA1-MCM/+ (Cre+) and ACTA1-MCM/FLExDUX4 (CD-Cre+) transgenic mice. The integrative FoVE model describes the evolution of the muscle force capacity simultaneously as a function velocity and the time (i.e. fatigue). Experimentally, FoVE capacities were assessed during a fatiguing 180-s exercise by repeating maximal (100 Hz stimulation) shortening contractions performed at different velocities (2 to 15 mm.s⁻¹). This test provides a complete mapping of muscular function by describing the force production capacities at all velocity and fatigue levels. This comprehensive functional force-velocity-endurance model reveals muscle properties affected by the expression of DUX4, leading to a weaker, less powerful muscle but less quickly fatigable muscle.

The main indices are represented graphically; F_0 : muscle maximal force in isometric condition (i.e. static, null velocity); V_0 : muscle maximum contraction velocity; P_{max}: muscle maximal power production capacity. Indices i and c, represent respectively the initial condition ion a fresh state end in extreme fatigue, at the end of the test. Statistical comparison of FoVE indices expressed in absolute and specific, i.e. normalized to muscle mass (C).

p values were calculated using Graphpad Prism9: 2-way ANOVA followed by a Fisher's LSD post hoc were performed. *p < 0.05; **p<0.01

Conclusion

- FoVE evaluation provides a complete mapping of muscular function by describing the force production capacities at all velocity and fatigue level
- The expression of DUX4 led to a decreased absolute in-situ force capacity for the tibialis anterior muscle partly due to loss of muscle mass
- ACTA1-MCM;FLExDUX4/+ mice showed greater fatigue, albeit at a slower rate of onset
- ACTA1-MCM;FLExDUX4/+ muscles have less force capacity but are enable to maintain its power capacity both in a fresh and fatigued state.
