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Positron Transmission Imaging of Histological Slices

CONTEXT

Positron lifetime imaging

- Traditional 27 positron emission tomography (PET) reconstructs the topological biodistribution of an injected radio-labeled molecule
- Biological information extracted from the specificity of the tracer to a biological function
- Information on the annihilation tissue encoded in the positron lifetime
- Ortho-positronium (O-Ps) state's lifetime sensitive to physical and chemical state of the annihilation medium (PALS)
- O-Ps lifetime not used in clinical PET yet

3D in-vivo positron lifetime imaging

- Measuring a lifetime requires a trigger of positron time of emission : (β^+, γ) emitters $\Rightarrow 3\gamma$ coincidences (J-PET, uExplorer, Xemis,...)
- Requires high sensitivity, excellent coincidence time resolution tomographs
- New upcoming technology
- Challenges :
 - Information restricted to the biodistribution
 - High statistics per voxel required to untangle the different lifetimes
 - Still poor understanding on the biological causes of τ_{O-Ps} changes (correlation to pathologies, lesions, chemical imbalance, ...)

Image reconstruction

- Simulations
 - Simulations performed with Gate 9.1
 - ¹⁸F source

- **TRI**ple Coincidence Events from β^+ **RA**dioisotopes to image **TO-Ps**
- $2\gamma \tau_{O-Ps}$ Imaging : usual β^+ isotope (18F)
 - Emission time from plastic scintillator
 - Annihilation γ detected by LYSO:Ce crystal matrix + SiPM
- Mesurement independant from radiotracer biodistribution
 - Uniform high activity source
 - Remove biodistribution dependency
 - Allows for pixellized tissue-related τ_{O-Ps} studies
- e+ transmission imaging
 - Pixellized detection layers upstream and downstream of tissue sample
 - Measure positron attenuation in tissue
 - High resolution reference anatomical imaging for τ_{O-Ps} image comparison - Possible technologies :
 - CMOS \Rightarrow focus on this technology in this poster
 - MWPC
 - MicroMegas
 - Fibrous hodoscope
- Both imaging modalities acquired **simultaneously**
 - Limit tissue slice ageing
 - No need to image registration
- **TRICERATOPS** will allow us to bridge the gap between PALS measurements
- of large biological samples and 3D in-vivo measurements in 3γ PET scans
- **High resolution, high activity,** τ_{O-P_S} **imaging** of tissue slices will improve our knowledge of τ_{O-Ps} variation for various tissues and pathologies and of the underlying biological reason for such change

Illustrations of the planed imaging modalities

In this poster, we will focus on the novel concept of positron transmission imaging

- CMOS : 100µm thick Si layer, 50µm pixellization
- Trigger : 300µm thick scintillating PMMA
- Si Derenzo phantom : 200 µm thick, inserts ranging from 600 to 100 μm
- Tissue layer position reconstruction
 - Assume straight line from CMOS-pixel to CMOS-pixel
 - Error from true tissue layer crossing : ~0.15 mm
- Attenuation factor evaluation
 - Comparison between pixel i in the tissue-image I_i and water-only image $I_{0,i}$:

$$\mu_i = -\frac{1}{\langle \Delta z \rangle} \ln\left(\frac{I_i}{I_{0,i}}\right), \text{ with } < \Delta z > \sim 250 \,\mu m \text{ the}$$

average path in the tissue layer









- Conclusions

- A novel imaging technique : positron transmission imaging will serve as a high resolution anatomical reference image
- A first study with a dense material provides a limit on spatial resolution for high contrast images
- Preliminary studies show a < 200 μ m spatial resolution using two CMOS.
- Resolution limited by tissue layer diffusion : ~0.15 mm

- Perspectives

- Other possible technologies, each with their advantages :
 - **MWPC** (upstream) \Rightarrow provides (X,Y) and **e**⁺ **directionality**
 - **MicroMegas** (downstream) \Rightarrow provides high resolution (X,Y)
 - Scintillating fibers hodoscope \Rightarrow provides (X,Y) and trigger time
- **Iterative reconstruction** \Rightarrow account for e⁺ scattering, improving spatial resolution
- Sensitivity studies : contrast and resolution achievable with biological tissues?
