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INTRODUCTION

Context of the project

Developing an empathetic virtual agent to accompany cognitive remediation therapy (CRT) at home

Problematic

- ullet Relevant automation of emotion recognition is a challenge in the context of healthcare 1
- Few corpora applied to the healthcare context are available for training models
 Objectives

1. Proposing an ecological corpus applied to the healthcare for affect research consisting of:

- Audio video segments of both healthy senor and Mild Cognitive Impairment (MCI)
 participants performing a CRT accompanied by a Wizard of Oz (i.e., experimenter posing
 as a virtual assistant)
- 2. Annotation:
 - Over time and in a summarized form based on appraisal dimensions (arousal, novelty, intrinsic agreement, goal conduciveness, coping) ²
 - In a summarized form based on 23 affective labels relevant for task achievement and learning ³
- 3. Identifying a coreset of the most relevant affective labels in the context of healthcare
- 4. Providing performance of baseline models trained from the THERADIA-WoZ corpus

METHOD

Data collection

Fifty-two healthy seniors (M = 68 ans, SD = 5) and nine MCI (M = 76 ans, SD = 2)

Performed one or two sessions of CRT accompanied by a WoZ consisting of:



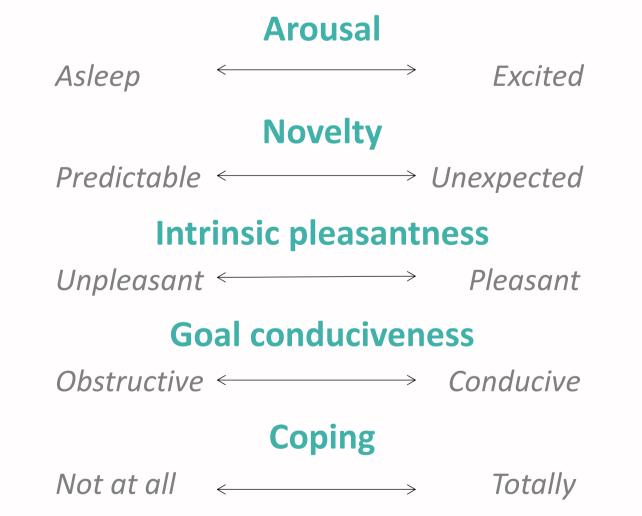
Entrainment 4-8 exercises
Instructions and feedback of
performance provided by WoZ

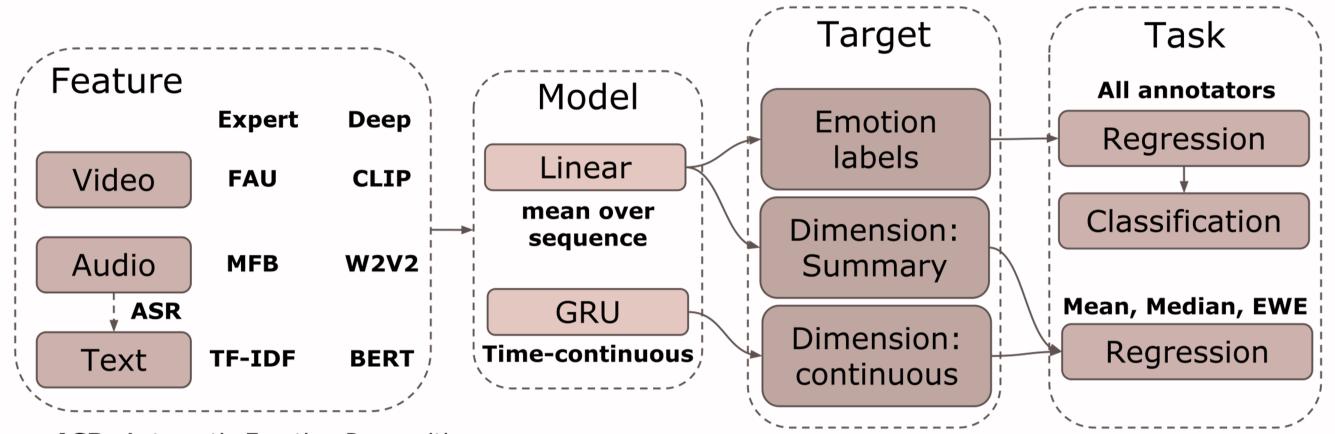
