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1	Long-term isolation of Hadean mantle domains revealed from coupled

13	Abstract
14	The ¹⁴⁶ Sm- ¹⁴² Nd systematics of Archean rocks have been extensively studied to decipher
15	chronological and compositional constraints on Hadean differentiation processes. However, the paucity
16	of ¹⁴² Nd data on Meso- and Neoarchean mantle-derived rocks relative to earlier periods contributes to
17	uncertainty about the ultimate fate of primordial silicate reservoirs in the convective system of the early
18	Earth. Here we present ^{146,147} Sm- ^{142,143} Nd and ¹⁷⁶ Lu- ¹⁷⁶ Hf zircon data for Mesoarchean (3.0-3.1 Ga) to
19	Paleoproterozoic (2.45 Ga) granitoids, amphibolites and sedimentary rocks representing the main
20	lithological units of the eastern North China Craton (NCC). The analyzed samples have well-resolved
21	positive ¹⁴² Nd anomalies, suggesting that the Eo- to Mesoarchean continental crust of the eastern NCC
22	is derived from a depleted Hadean mantle source. The model age of differentiation $(4.44^{+0.05}_{-0.07}$ Ga) and

23	the ^{14/} Sm/ ¹⁴⁴ Nd source ratio (0.211 \pm 0.002) estimated from the 3.1 Ga Caozhuang amphibolites are
24	identical to those of the 3.8-3.6 Ga rocks from the North Atlantic Craton and the 2.7 Ga pyroxenites
25	from the Abitibi Greenstone Belt, suggesting that these mantle-derived rocks originated from a
26	common, moderately depleted reservoir that differentiated in the wake of the Moon-forming impact
27	and evolved in closed-system until at least 2.7 Ga. These observations contradict the commonly
28	accepted notion of progressive homogenization of ¹⁴² Nd anomalies in the Archean due to crustal
29	recycling and convective mixing, and instead suggest that primordial differentiation produced a
30	long-lived, depleted reservoir that remained largely isolated from convective mixing on a timescale of
31	several billion years.

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45 crust-forming processes remains unclear. Rapid continental growth in the Hadean may explain several 46 key features of the Archean isotopic record, assuming that a crustal volume similar to that of today 47 formed early (ca. 4.4 - 4.5 Gyr ago) and within a few tens of millions of years (Armstrong et al., 1981; 48 Korenaga, 2018). In contrast, the outcome of magma ocean crystallization is poorly understood with 49 respect to the structure and composition of early Earth's mantle. Unresolved questions include the 50 propensity of a convective magma ocean to generate chemically differentiated reservoirs by 51 melt-crystal segregation (e.g., Solomatov, 2015), the role of a putative basal magma ocean in 52 generating long-lived differentiated reservoirs near the Core-Mantle boundary (Labrosse et al, 2007; 53 Caracas et al, 2019), and the fate of these primordial reservoirs in the convective system of the early 54 Earth.

55 In the absence of a preserved Hadean rock record, indirect approaches based on radiogenic 56 isotopes can be used to determine the timing of early mantle differentiation and to trace the evolution of differentiated silicate reservoirs through geological time. The short-lived ¹⁴⁶Sm-¹⁴²Nd system 57 $(T_{1/2}=103 \text{ Ma}, \text{ Marks et al., 2014}; \text{ Meissner et al., 1987})$ is particularly well-suited for this approach. 58 Because ¹⁴⁶Sm became extinct about 4 Gyr ago, this chronometer selectively records differentiation 59 60 events that occurred within the first 500 Myr of Earth history. Extraction of voluminous crust (e.g., 61 Roth et al., 2014) or internal differentiation at the magma ocean stage (e.g., Caro et al., 2005) would result in large-scale Sm/Nd fractionation leading to the development of positive ¹⁴²Nd anomalies (i.e., 62 63 higher ¹⁴²Nd/¹⁴⁴Nd values relative to the Bulk Silicate Earth) in chemically depleted (mantle) reservoirs 64 and negative anomalies in chemically enriched reservoirs. In combination with the long-lived ¹⁴⁷Sm-¹⁴³Nd system, the ¹⁴⁶Sm-¹⁴²Nd chronometer provides precise clues to the age, composition, and 65 66 evolution of Hadean silicate reservoirs (Caro et al., 2006). This in turn provides important constraints

for geodynamic models of the early Earth, the nature of the Hadean crust, its longevity, and the lifetime

- 68 of primordial heterogeneities in the Earth's interior (e.g., Rosas and Korenaga, 2018; Debaille et al.,
- 69 2013; Hyung and Jacobsen, 2020; Roth et al; 2014).

70 Attempts to detect ¹⁴²Nd variations in terrestrial rocks were initiated in the 1990s (Harper and 71 Jacobsen, 1992), and more precise measurements (Caro et al, 2003) later showed that both positive and negative ¹⁴²Nd anomalies are common in Archean rocks. Obvious positive anomalies have been 72 73 detected in rocks from the Isua Supracrustal Belt and Itsaq gneiss complex in southwest Greenland 74 (Boyet and Carlson, 2006; Caro et al., 2006; Bennett et al., 2007; O'Neil et al., 2016; Rizo et al., 2011; 75 Rizo et al., 2013; Saji et al., 2018), the Archean Saglek block in northern Labrador (Morino et al., 2017; 76 Wasilewski et al., 2022), the Abitibi greenstone belt (Debaille et al., 2013), the North China craton (Li 77 et al., 2017), and the Singhbhum Craton, India (Maltese et al., 2022). Negative ¹⁴²Nd anomalies have 78 also been reported in numerous locations, including the Acasta Gneiss Complex (3.4 - 4.0 Ga) 79 (Reimink et al., 2018; Roth et al., 2014), the Nappier gneiss complex (Guitreau et al., 2019); the 80 Schapenburg and Barberton komatilites in the Kaapvaal Craton (3.55 Ga, Puchtel et al., 2013, 2016; 81 Boyet et al., 2021), the Nuvvuagittuq/Ukaliq supracrustal belts and Innuksuaq Gneiss Complex (3.5-3.8 82 Ga) (Caro et al., 2017; O'Neil et al., 2008, 2012; Roth et al., 2013), the Dwalile Greenstone Remnant 83 from the Ancient Gneiss Complex, Swaziland (3.45 Ga, Schneider et al., 2018), and the Muzidian gneiss complex in the Yangtze craton of central China (Wang et al., 2023). Overall, the terrestrial ¹⁴²Nd 84 85 record seems to indicate that the depletion of the Archean mantle is at least partly due to a major 86 differentiation event about 4.4 Gyr ago (Morino et al., 2017). The timing of this event is nearly 87 synchronous with the crystallization of the lunar mantle (e.g. Brandon et al., 2009; Boyet and Carlson, 88 2007; McLeod et al., 2014) and identical to the Pb-Pb "age of the Earth", interpreted to reflect Pb loss

during the giant impact (Connelly et al., 2022). These observations show that early differentiation
events, perhaps related to magma ocean processes, had a long-lasting influence on the structure and
compositional heterogeneity of the Hadean-Archean mantle.

92 In this context, the Archean ¹⁴²Nd record represents a promising tool for tracking the evolution of the mantle-crust system in the post-magma ocean Earth. However, despite a rapidly growing ¹⁴²Nd 93 database, there is no uniformly accepted interpretation of the Archean ¹⁴²Nd record. For instance, 94 Debaille et al. (2013) argue that the preservation of positive ¹⁴²Nd anomalies up to 2.7 Ga indicates 95 96 inefficient convective stirring favored by stagnant-lid convection, while Hyung and Jacobsen (2020) argue that the ¹⁴²Nd record is consistent with a fast mantle stirring time of about 400 Myr since the 97 98 early Hadean. Alternatively, the ¹⁴²Nd evolution of the mantle has also been interpreted to reflect the 99 efficiency of crustal recycling in the early Earth (Caro et al., 2006). Roth et al. (2014) interpreted the Archean ¹⁴²Nd record as reflecting massive crustal formation during the first few hundred Myr of Earth 100 101 history, followed by "slow" recycling of this early crust into the mantle with a crustal residence time of 102 ca. 750 Myr. Similar conclusions are reached by Rosas and Korenaga (2018), who suggest that the gradually decreasing ¹⁴²Nd heterogeneity of Earth's mantle reflects that the net growth of continental 103 104 crust was complete by the end of the Hadean but that the rate of crustal recycling was much higher at that time. Finally, based on the similarity of ^{146,147}Sm-^{142,143}Nd model ages inferred for Theo's Flow, 105 106 Nulliak and Isua supracrustal rocks, Morino et al. (2017) proposed that their parent magmas originated 107 from depleted domains that evolved in closed-system over a period of several billion years. The occurrence of positive ¹⁴²Nd anomalies in Archean rocks would then reflect episodic melting of a 108 109 depleted reservoir otherwise isolated from the convective system, rather than progressive 110 homogenization of the depleted upper mantle. This conclusion was reemphasized by Saji et al. (2018) 111 based on a similar treatment of the Archean ^{142,143}Nd database.

112 While models for the early evolution of the mantle-crust system have become increasingly sophisticated, an important limiting factor is that the current ¹⁴²Nd record focuses on Eo- and 113 114 Paleoarchean terranes, and comparatively little is known about mantle evolution during the Meso- and 115 Neoarchean. This has significantly hampered our ability to constrain the isotopic evolution and 116 heterogeneity of the Archean mantle to determine geodynamic parameters such as the rates of crustal 117 growth and recycling. To gain a more comprehensive understanding of early mantle evolution, studies that investigate the ^{142,143}Nd signature of mantle-derived rocks during this period are needed, focusing 118 on terranes with positive ¹⁴²Nd anomalies. Here, we report ^{146,147}Sm-^{142,143}Nd data and compile in situ 119 zircon ¹⁷⁶Lu-¹⁷⁶Hf data from Archean sedimentary rocks, granitoids, and mantle-derived rocks 120 121 (amphibolites) from the eastern North China Craton (NCC). The studied samples cover a wide age 122 range, from 3.5 Ga to 2.47 Ga, and represent the main lithological units of the eastern Hebei and 123 western Shandong regions in the NCC. The combined ¹⁴²Nd and *in situ* zircon Hf analysis provides 124 complementary information on the long-term evolution of Hadean mantle domains and the processes of 125 crustal additions and reworking in the NCC.

127 2 Geological setting

The NCC is the largest craton in China, covering an area of approximately 300,000 km² (Fig. 1). Its tectonothermal evolution is marked by major crustal growth peaks during the late Neoarchean to early Paleoproterozoic, in contrast to the typical ca. 2.7 Ga growth events and age peaks characteristics of other Archean cratons (Liou et al., 2022b). Most of the samples used in this study, including supracrustal rocks and associated granitoids of the Caozhuang group, were collected in the eastern 133 Hebei region (EH) of the NCC. The EH consists of high-grade Archean plutonic and supracrustal rocks 134 (Fig. 1). Among these, the oldest rocks are the ~3.78 Ga granodioritic gneisses reported by Wan et al., 135 (2021). The Caozhuang group, also known as Caozhuang supracrustal sequence, consists of 136 decameter-sized enclaves of quartzite, amphibolite, hornblendite, garnet-biotite gneiss, calc-silicate 137 rock, marble, fine-grained biotite gneiss, and banded iron formation. Based on the deformation pattern 138 and other structural criteria, the amphibolites and related rocks in the Caozhuang area were first 139 proposed in 1980s to be the oldest rocks in eastern Hebei. This structural analysis was further 140 supported by Huang et al., (1986), Jahn et al., (1987), and Jahn et al., (1983) who determined an 141 emplacement age of ca. 3.5 Ga using whole-rock Sm-Nd isochrons on amphibolites from the 142 Caozhuang and Huangbaiyu areas. In contrast to this interpretation, Nutman et al. (2011) suggested that 143 this isochron represents a mixing relationship resulting from contamination of ca. 2.5 Ga magmas by ancient felsic crust. Finally, Cui et al. (2018) reported ¹⁴⁷Sm-¹⁴³Nd whole-rock isochron ages of 144 145 3580 ± 98 Ma and 3179 ± 90 Ma for two groups of mafic-ultramafic enclaves in the Caozhuang area. 146 These authors suggested that the emplacement ages of the Caozhuang amphibolites can be correlated to 147 two major crustal growth events in the NCC, at 3.5-3.7 Ga and 3.1-3.3 Ga. 148

Despite the limited availability of outcrops, Mesoarchean crustal material is present in the East Hebei region and extensive new outcrops of Mesoarchean rocks have recently been identified (e.g., Liou et al., 2019; Nutman et al., 2011). These include ca. 2.9 Ga TTGs in the eastern EH and 3.3-2.8 Ga detrital or xenocrystic zircons found in the western EH. Finally, Neoarchean rocks are also widespread in eastern Hebei, accounting for more than >95% of the total basement exposure. Plutonic rocks dating from 2600 to 2500 Ma are the predominant rock type, accompanied by smaller amounts of supracrustal rocks. These supracrustal rocks were intruded by a variety of coeval igneous rocks such as

155	pyroxenite, gabbro, diorite, tonalite-trondhjemite-granodiorite series (TTGs) to granites. Zhao et al.
156	(2001) proposed a mantle plume model given the exceptionally large exposure of granitoid intrusions
157	within a short period (2.55-2.50 Ga) in a ~800 km-wide area. Other studies suggest that the
158	diorite-TTG magmas (Bai et al., 2016), tholeiitic to calc-alkaline volcanic rocks (Guo et al., 2017), and
159	peridotites (Polat et al., 2006; Wu et al., 2022) formed in subduction-related settings in the Neoarchean.
160	Samples analyzed in this study include amphibolites and hornblendites documented by Cui et al.
161	(2018) in the Caozhuang area, the 3.5 Ga fuchsite-bearing quartzites (Liou et al., 2023) and 3.1-2.9 Ga
162	granitoids reported by Cui et al. (2018), Liou and Guo, (2019) and Liou et al., (2019). In addition, two
163	2.5 Ga TTGs from the Caochang region and three ca. 2.7 Ga komatiite samples from the western
164	Shandong Province (WSP) were included for analysis. The WSP is an Archean granite-greenstone
165	terrane in the central part of the eastern NCC (Wang et al., 2013), with a total area of >10,000 km ² . The
166	main lithological assemblage consists of a ~2.5 Ga felsic volcano-sedimentary sequence, with
167	supracrustal rocks accounting for less than 10% of the exposed basement in the WSP (Fig. 1a). The
168	emplacement age of the komatiites is poorly constrained but has been estimated to be \sim 2.7 Ga based on
169	stratigraphic and structural evidence (Zhang et al., 2001). These rocks have undergone greenschist- to
170	amphibolite-facies metamorphism and intense deformation oriented in a northwest-southeast direction
171	along the central belt of the WSP.

175 4 Results

176 4.1. ^{146,147}Sm-^{142,143}Nd systematics of meta-igneous and meta-sedimentary rocks

Table 1 presents Sm–Nd results for samples collected from eastern Hebei and western Shandong
regions, including data from the long-lived ¹⁴⁷Sm–¹⁴³Nd and short-lived ¹⁴⁶Sm–¹⁴²Nd systems.
Complete datasets for ¹⁴²Nd measurements are provided in Supplementary Tables 1 and 2. Following
the usual convention, ¹⁴³Nd/¹⁴⁴Nd and ¹⁴²Nd/¹⁴⁴Nd isotopic ratios are expressed as the deviation from,
respectively, the chondritic and terrestrial values, using the following notation:

where "BSE" refers to "Bulk Silicate Earth" (i.e., 147 Sm/ 144 Nd = 0.1960; 143 Nd/ 144 Nd = 0.51263) (e.g., 182 Bouvier et al., 2008). The ¹⁴²Nd/¹⁴⁴Nd signature of the BSE is identical to that of the modern silicate 183 Earth and is considered equivalent to the JNdi standard. ¹⁴⁷Sm-¹⁴³Nd ages were estimated using the 184 185 IsoplotR program (Vermeesch, 2018) and the initial ε^{143} Nd values were calculated using the method of Fletcher and Rosman (1982). Errors on μ^{142} Nd and ϵ^{143} Nd_i values are quoted as 2 standard deviations 186 187 (S.D.). The reproducibility of ¹⁴²Nd measurements was assessed through repeated analyses of the JNdi 188 standard during two analytical sessions performed in April 2021 (n=11) and June 2021 (n=11), which 189 yielded 2 S.D. = 2.3 ppm (Table S1). The dataset consists of 26 samples (14 amphibolites, 3 quartzites, 190 2 granites, 2 TTGs and 3 komatiites) and includes 8 duplicates and 1 triplicate analysis (Table S2). 191 A total of 14 mafic-ultramafic rocks (11 amphibolites and 3 hornblendites) from the Caozhuang Group were selected for ¹⁴⁶Sm-¹⁴²Nd analyses (Fig. 2a). Their ¹⁴⁷Sm-¹⁴³Nd compositions, previously 192 reported by Cui et al. (2018), are summarized in table 1, along with ¹⁴⁷Sm-¹⁴³Nd analyses for twelve 193 other samples obtained in this study. As shown in Figure 2, the ¹⁴²Nd composition of the Caozhuang 194 amphibolites is overall positive but shows significant variability, with μ^{142} Nd ranging from +0.7 to 195 196 +11.2. No correlation was observed between the isotopic composition and the major or trace element

197	characteristics of the samples (Fig. 2b and Supplementary Fig. 1h). However, the ¹⁴² Nd composition of
198	the Caozhuang amphibolites reflect the classification of Cui et al. (2018), who defined their Group 1
199	and Group 2 amphibolites based on field observations, particularly their association with banded iron
200	formation. As shown in Figure 2b, Cui et al.'s Group 1 amphibolites mainly cluster around a mean
201	$\mu^{142}Nd$ of + 2.2, but include one sample with $\mu^{142}Nd$ = +7.8 (15CZ06-1). In contrast, Group 2
202	amphibolites are predominantly clustered around a mean $\mu^{142}Nd$ of +8.7, with one outlier at +3.3
203	(14CZ03-06). This overall agreement supports Cui et al.'s classification of the Caozhuang amphibolites
204	into two distinct groups, although the presence of two outliers suggests that some samples may have
205	been assigned to the incorrect group based on field observations. In the following, we use a modified
206	version of Cui et al's classification, reassigning these two outliers to their respective groups based on
207	their ¹⁴² Nd compositions. To avoid confusion with the original classification of Cui et al (2018), we
208	refer to these two groups of amphibolites as the Primitive Group (P-group) and the Depleted Group
209	(D-group) (Fig. 2b). The P-group consists of four samples with an average $\mu^{142}Nd$ of +2.5 \pm 2.3 ppm
210	and MgO ranging from 4.7 to 6.5 wt% and is broadly equivalent to Cui et al's Group 1. The D-Group
211	consists of seven samples with well resolved positive $\mu^{142}Nd$ anomalies averaging +8.7 \pm 3.0 ppm and
212	overall higher MgO contents (6.1-9.3 wt%) and is broadly equivalent to Cui et al.'s Group 2.
213	In addition, three hornblendites from the Caozhuang region exhibit moderate ¹⁴² Nd excesses

ranging from +3.5 to +6.6 (Table 1). These rocks were tentatively described by Cui et al. (2018) as part of the same assemblage as the amphibolites. However, this characterization remains speculative, as the petrogenesis of the hornblendites is not well understood. In the field, hornblendites typically occur as deformed isolated enclaves and their relationship to the amphibolites is unclear. These samples cannot be unambiguously assigned to either the D- or the P-group based on their isotopic compositions. 219 Instead, their intermediate μ^{142} Nd compositions suggest that mafic-ultramafic magmatism in the 220 Caozhuang region result from the melting of a heterogeneous mantle containing both primitive and 221 depleted components. Alternatively, this observation could reflect the hybridization of the parental 222 melts represented by the two amphibolite groups defined above.

Felsic rocks from the eastern Hebei region, ranging in age from 3.1 Ga to 2.5 Ga, also show positive ¹⁴²Nd anomalies comparable in magnitude to those of the Caozhuang amphibolites. Two ca. 3.1 Ga TTGs from the Caozhuang region show homogeneous positive μ^{142} Nd (8.6 ± 2.9 and 9.5 ± 3.7) similar to those of the D-group amphibolites, but have lower initial ϵ^{143} Nd (-2.6 to +0.7) than the D-group amphibolites (ϵ^{143} Nd_i = 2.5 ± 0.4, Section 5.2) (Fig. 2a). In contrast, the two ca. 2.5 Ga TTGs (LP288 and LP 131) are characterized by positive but less radiogenic μ^{142} Nd (6.0 ± 1.8 to 6.0 ± 2.9, Fig. 2a) and negative initial ϵ^{143} Nd at 2.5 Ga (-1.6 and -5.8).

The three 3.5 Ga fuchsite-bearing quartzites show positive 142 Nd anomalies with values of +6.8 ± 230 231 2.8 ppm, +8.6 \pm 3.4 ppm and +10.4 \pm 2.5 ppm (Fig. 2a). These quartzites exhibit unique geochemical 232 characteristics, notably containing significantly higher Cr contents (up to 320 ppm, Liou et al., 2023) 233 compared to continental crust (59 ppm, Rudnick and Gao, 2014) and similar to concentrations found in 234 the oceanic crust (317 ppm, White and Klein, 2014). The elevated Cr concentrations are primarily 235 attributed to the presence of fuchsite, a type of Cr muscovite. These fuchsite-bearing quartzites have 236 been proposed to have been derived from peridotites by multistage processes such as serpentinization, 237 carbonation, and weathering (Austrheim et al., 2021), or by sedimentary mixing of detrital grains of 238 various origins, including detrital chromites from ultramafic rocks and detrital quartz and zircons from granitic rocks (Haugaard et al., 2021). Their positive ¹⁴²Nd anomalies are therefore likely inherited 239 240 from a contemporaneous (~3.5 Ga) crustal source in the eastern NCC. However, it is important to note

that this conclusion must be considered an educated guess due to uncertainties in the depositional ageand provenance of these sedimentary rocks.

Lastly, the three komatiite samples from the ca. 2.7 Ga greenstone belt in the western Shandong province yielded highly radiogenic ε^{143} Ndi values of 6.9 ± 0.24 , 4.8 ± 0.28 and 8.1 ± 0.24 , but non-radiogenic μ^{142} Nd values of 0.7 ± 4.8 , -0.2 ± 3.1 and $+1.6 \pm 3.3$, respectively (Fig. 2a, table 1). These highly depleted ¹⁴³Nd signatures, combined with the lack of ¹⁴²Nd anomaly reflect that the source of the komatiites formed after the extinction of ¹⁴⁶Sm.

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249 4.2. U-Pb and ¹⁷⁶Lu-¹⁷⁷Hf zircon systematics

250 Results of zircon U-Pb and Lu-Hf analyses of two Paleoproterozoic TTGs (LP288 and LP131) and 251 a Mesoarchean (3.1 Ga) granite (14CZ04-5) from the Caozhuang region are summarized in Figure 3. 252 Based on these and previous results, five stages of magmatic events can be identified in the eastern 253 Hebei region of the NCC (Fig. 3). Stage I (ca. 3.8-3.7 Ga) is witnessed by the presence of ~3.78 Ga 254 granodioritic gneisses in the eastern Hebei area (Wan et al., 2021). Stage II (3.5-3.4 Ga) has been inferred from the ¹⁴⁷Sm-¹⁴³Nd isochron ages of 3470±59 Ma (Jahn et al., 1987) and 3509±78Ma 255 256 (Huang et al., 1986) for amphibolites (meta-basalts or dykes) that occur as layers or slabs in the 257 Caozhuang sedimentary sequences. Stage III (3.2-3.0 Ga) is represented by the 3.29-3.15 Ga tonalitic 258 gneisses of the Caozhuang region and the ca. 3.0-3.2 Ga xenocrysts and inherited zircon cores that 259 occur in the 2.9 Ga Caochang orthogneisses. The magmatic stage III is represented in our dataset by 260 zircons from TTG sample 15CZ04-5, which were first reported by Cui (2018) and reanalyzed here 261 (Supplementary Fig. 2), yielding a discordia line with an upper intercept of 3122 ± 11 Ma 262 (Supplementary Fig. 2). Some zircons in this sample have inherited cores crystallized between 3460 263 Ma and 3255 Ma. The ϵ Hf(t) values of the ca. 3.1 Ga zircons plot on the chondritic line, while inherited 264 cores define a trend towards negative ɛHf(t) indicative of an Eo/PaleoArchean precursor. All younger concordant and discordant zircons plot along a line with ${}^{176}Lu/{}^{177}Hf = 0$, likely reflecting ancient 265 266 Pb-loss (Supplementary Fig. 1). Stage IV magmatism is mainly evident in the 2.9 Ga dioritic-tonalitic 267 rocks in the Caochang region of the eastern EH and 2.8-2.9 Ga inherited/xenocryst zircons of 268 Neoarchean TTG sample LP131. These inherited grains are characterized by near-chondritic to subchondritic EHf(t) values (Fig. 3). Lastly, stage V magmatism is the most extensive and is 269 270 characterized by widespread ca. 2.5 Ga TTGs and granites as well as ultramafic-mafic volcanic rocks 271 in the region. Their zircon ϵ Hf(t) show a large scatter, and range from -13.0 to +4.6 (Fig. 3). Sample 272 LP288, which was used for ¹⁴²Nd analysis, shows significantly lower ε Hf(t) ranging from -13.0 to -6.3, 273 with one outlier at ε Hf(t) = 0 (Fig. 3). Zircons from sample LP131 show a more complex core-rim 274 structure, with 2.9-2.8 Ga cores ranging from -3.4 to +1.2 and ca. 2.5 Ga rims ranging from +9.3 to -5.3 275 (Fig. 3).

277 5 Discussion

278 5.1. Preservation and crustal contamination

Before discussing the implications of the ^{146,147}Sm-^{142,13}Nd systematics in the Caozhuang amphibolites, it is important to assess whether these isotopic signatures may have been modified by crustal contamination and post-emplacement processes such as alteration and metamorphism. Following Polat and Hofmann (2003), several criteria were used to evaluate the robustness of trace elements in the Caozhuang amphibolites. These include (1) the degree of correlation with the least mobile element, Zr, on binary diagrams, (2) the presence of Ce anomalies on primitive Regarding the amphibolites analyzed in this study, most rare earth elements (REE) and High Field Strength elements (HFSE) show strong linear correlations with Zr. The correlation coefficients are well above 0.75 for Nd, Sm and the HREE, indicating the relatively low mobility of these elements (Supplementary Fig. 1a-b). In contrast, the Large Ion Lithophile Elements (e.g., Sr, Rb, and Ba) show considerable scatter (Supplementary Fig. 2c-e), which aligns with their susceptibility to alteration and metasomatism. Finally, the CI-normalized REE profiles do not show significant Ce anomalies (Supplementary Fig. 3), and the samples do not exhibit significant carbonate or silica enrichment.

mantle-normalized diagrams, and (3) the presence of significant carbonate and silica enrichment (>2%).

293 Because evolved continental rocks possess high Zr, Nb and REE contents as well as high La/Yb 294 ratios relative to mafic/ultramafic rocks, these elements or element ratios may serve as indicators of 295 crustal contamination in mafic-ultramafic rocks. With the possible exception of sample 14CZ03-6, the 296 amphibolites in this study show no evidence of crustal contamination in the La/Yb and Nb/Yb - Zr 297 diagrams (Supplementary Fig. 1 f-g). Their overall low REE concentrations and flat REE patterns 298 (Supplementary Fig. 3), as well as the absence of xenocryst zircons, support this conclusion. In 299 addition, the μ^{142} Nd composition of the Caozhuang amphibolites shows no correlation with tracers of 300 crustal contamination (Supplementary Fig. 1h), indicating that the observed heterogeneities do not result from assimilation of a preexisting crust with a positive μ^{142} Nd. 301

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303 5.2 Emplacement age of amphibolites of the Caozhuang region

The protoliths of the Caozhuang amphibolites were initially assigned an emplacement age of 305 3.5-3.6 Ga based on whole-rock ¹⁴⁷Sm-¹⁴³Nd analyses (Huang et al., 1986; Jahn et al., 1987). However, 306 based on field observations, Cui et al. (2018) proposed that mafic-ultramafic enclaves of the 307 Caozhuang region can be divided into two groups; Group 1 amphibolites were found to occur as layers 308 in metasedimentary sequences, in association with banded iron formations, whereas Group 2 309 amphibolites occur as lenses or deformed dykes and sills and were never found associated with BIFs. 310 Regression of ¹⁴⁷Sm-¹⁴³Nd whole-rock data based on this classification resulted in significantly 311 different ages for Group 1 and Group 2 amphibolites, with Group 1 emplaced at ca. 3.18 Ga and Group 2 at 3.6 Ga. Our results, however, show that both groups are heterogeneous in ¹⁴²Nd/¹⁴⁴Nd (Fig. 2b), 312 indicating differences in their initial ¹⁴³Nd/¹⁴⁴Nd composition. As a result, neither Group 1 nor Group 2 313 314 amphibolites can be regarded as strictly cogenetic and the age constraints derived from the 315 classification of Cui et al., (2018) may be unreliable.

When samples with identical ¹⁴²Nd/¹⁴⁴Nd (and thus arguably identical initial ¹⁴³Nd/¹⁴⁴Nd) are 316 317 pooled together, the ¹⁴⁷Sm-¹⁴³Nd regressions for both the P- and the D-group yield consistent ages at 3.0-3.1 Ga, within errors of the age of the Caozhuang granitoids, but with distinct initial ϵ^{143} Nd. For 318 319 instance, the ¹⁴⁷Sm-¹⁴³Nd results on amphibolite samples from the D-group yield an isochron age of 3066 ± 40 Ma (95% CI; IsoplotR Model 3; one outlier excluded, Fig. 4), with an initial ε^{143} Nd of 2.5 \pm 320 0.4; the ¹⁴⁷Sm-¹⁴³Nd results on four samples from the P-group yield an isochron age of 3036 ± 55 Ma, 321 322 with an initial ε^{143} Nd of 1.1 ± 0.6 (Fig. 4). Rather than two distinct emplacement ages, these results 323 suggest that both groups of amphibolites reported by Cui et al. (2018) originate from a single magmatic 324 event 3.0-3.1 billion years ago (Stage III), but from a heterogeneous mantle source including primitive 325 and depleted components. The previous isochron age of 3.6 Ga may thus be an artifact induced by 326 combining samples with different initial isotopic compositions in the isochron calculations. Note, 327 however, that the whole-rock isochron for the P-group is strongly constrained by one sample with low 328 Sm/Nd and possibly affected by crustal assimilation (Supplementary Figure 1). As a result, the age and initial isotopic composition of the P-group amphibolites remains uncertain. In contrast, the age and initial ε^{143} Nd obtained for the D-group amphibolites are similar to those obtained by Cui et al (2018) for group 2 amphibolites, thus confirming the occurrence of a ca. 3.05 Ga magmatic event in the Caozhuang region. This emplacement age is also supported by the good agreement between μ^{142} Nd and initial ε^{143} Nd compositions, back-calculated at 3.05 Ga, for the two groups of Caozhuang amphibolites (Fig. 5a). In contrast, back-calculating the initial ε^{143} Nd values to 3.6 Ga results in significant scatter and no significant relationship is observed between ε^{143} Nd and μ^{142} Nd (Fig. 5b).

337 5.3 Contributions of Hadean mantle domains to Archean-Paleoproterozoic crust formation and 338 NCC evolution

339 Understanding the formation of granitoids requires consideration of multi-stage reworking or 340 mixing processes. Coupled in situ analyses of individual zircon grains for both U-Pb and Lu-Hf 341 systematics have allowed detailed petrogenetic histories of silicic magmas to be unraveled. In contrast, the ¹⁴⁷Sm-¹⁴³Nd systematics of Archean granitoids may be subject to secondary alteration due to open 342 343 system behavior at the mineral scale (e.g., Fisher and Vervoort, 2018). Here, we therefore combine 344 zircon Hf-Pb analysis with the more robust ¹⁴⁶Sm-¹⁴²Nd systematics to elucidate the nature of magma 345 sources and the process of crustal growth and reworking in the eastern Hebei region of the NCC. The granitoids used for ¹⁴²Nd analyses consistently show positive ¹⁴²Nd anomalies, indicating that 346

the protocrust from which the NCC formed was ultimately derived from ancient (> 4 Ga) depleted mantle domains. The presence in the Caozhuang area of ortho-amphibolites with a depleted ^{142,143}Nd composition confirms this observation and suggests that these Hadean mantle domains contributed to the production of juvenile crust in the EH until at least 3.1 Ga. The Mesoarchean granitoids (15CZ04-5

351	and 15CZ06-8) exhibit positive μ^{142} Nd values of +8.6 and +9.5 (Fig. 2a), suggesting that their matic
352	precursors originated from the same Hadean mantle source as the D-group amphibolites. However,
353	their Hf isotopic compositions range from subchondritic to chondritic and thus show no record of this
354	early depletion event (Fig. 3). Similar inconsistencies between the zircon Hf record and bulk-rock Nd
355	isotopic compositions were also observed in the Itsaq gneisses of southwest Greenland (Bennett et al.,
356	2007; Caro et al., 2003, 2006; Fisher and Vervoort, 2018) and have been interpreted as a secondary
357	perturbation of the ¹⁴⁷ Sm- ¹⁴³ Nd system, due to open-system behavior of REE-rich accessory phases,
358	compared to the more robust Hf zircon record. However, this proposed mechanism cannot artificially
359	generate ¹⁴² Nd heterogeneities because ¹⁴⁶ Sm became extinct ca. 4 Gyr ago and the μ^{142} Nd signature of
360	Archean TTGs is therefore insensitive to open system behavior at the mineral scale. The decoupling of
361	the two isotope systems in the NCC thus more likely reflects the fact that the Hf isotopic composition
362	of Archean granitoids does not consistently reflect mantle evolution, but rather a complex history of
363	crustal addition and reworking that differentially affects extant and extinct radioactivities (Liou et al.,
364	2022a).

365 As shown in Figure 3, multiple stages of crustal reworking in the NCC can be identified between 366 stages III and V. Stage III magmatism, represented by sample 15CZ04-5, involves the reworking of 367 ancient felsic crust, as indicated by the presence of xenocrystic zircons showing a trend of decreasing 368 ɛHf(t) with time. Extrapolation of this trend suggests that this precursor formed in the Eoarchean 369 (Stage I) and reached an ɛHf(t) value of ca. -7 at 3.1 Ga. The near-chondritic composition of 3.1 Ga 370 zircons in sample 15CZ04-5 (Fig. 3) is therefore best explained by addition of mantle-derived melts with positive ϵ^{176} Hf to a pre-existing NCC crust with negative ϵ^{176} Hf. The addition of juvenile material 371 at this stage is also evidenced by the depleted ^{142,143}Nd compositions of the 3.1 Ga Caozhuang D-group 372

amphibolites. Note that if the Eoarchean NCC crust had a positive μ^{142} Nd, as suggested by the 3.6 Ga quartzite results, the addition of juvenile material with an isotopic composition similar to that of the

375 D-Group amphibolites would have no effect on the ¹⁴²Nd composition of the newly formed crust.

During stage IV, crustal reworking is suggested by the scattered εHf values observed in the 2.9 Ga
zircon cores of sample LP131, as well as in other 2.9 Ga granitoids, indicating the possibility of
incomplete mixing between a juvenile component and older crustal material (Fig. 3). Finally, the εHf(t)
values of the zircon cores and rims of TTG sample LP131 suggest that Stage V magmatism (2.5 Ga)
resulted from the abundant production of juvenile melts associated with the reworking and/or
assimilation of pre-existing felsic crust.

The Paleoproterozoic (2481 Ma) granitoid LP288 exhibits sub-chondritic initial ¹⁷⁶Hf/¹⁷⁷Hf ratios. 382 383 with ε Hf(t) values ranging from 0 to -13.1 and averaging at -9.0 (Fig. 3, Stage V). Given that (1) the 384 Paleoproterozoic TTG sample is characterized by much higher Na₂O content (6.86 wt.%) and 385 Na_2O/K_2O ratio (6.24), (2) no xenocryst zircons or inherited cores are identified within, and (3) the 2.48 Ga granitoids plot near the inferred felsic ¹⁷⁶Lu/¹⁷⁷Hf trend of 0.004. For these reasons, together 386 with the positive μ^{142} Nd values of 6.3 ± 2.9 ppm (Fig. 2a), we suggest that the 2.48 Ga magmatism 387 388 represented by sample LP288 is derived from the reworking of an Eo-Paleoarchean LREE-enriched 389 mafic precursor extracted from Hadean depleted mantle domains, resulting in the evolution line with 176 Lu/ 177 Hf = 0.022 shown in Fig. 3. The μ^{142} Nd of samples LP288 and LP131 are also identical within 390 errors, at μ^{142} Nd \approx +6.0 ppm (Fig. 2a), indicating a common crustal source. 391

Overall, the combined ¹⁴²Nd-¹⁷⁶Hf results indicate that, despite the absence of depleted εHf
 signatures in zircons, the Hadean mantle was massively involved in the Meso-Neoarchean and
 Paleoproterozoic evolutionary process leading to the formation of the NCC. This occurred by i)

episodic addition of juvenile melts with a positive ^{142,143}Nd signature, which likely began in the
Eoarchean and continued until at least 3.1 Ga, and ii) multistage reworking of Eo-Mesoarchean
protocrust, during which this ¹⁴²Nd anomaly was progressively transferred to younger crustal domains.

399 5.4 Coupled ^{146,147}Sm-^{142,143}Nd chronometry

Due to the short lifetime of 146 Sm (t_{1/2} =103 Ma), the presence of positive 142 Nd anomalies in the 400 401 D-group Caozhuang amphibolites indicates that their mantle source differentiated prior to 4.0 Gyr ago (Fig.). The differentiation time and time-integrated ¹⁴⁷Sm/¹⁴⁴Nd of their source can be further 402 constrained by coupled ^{146,147}Sm-^{142,143}Nd chronometry, assuming a two-stage model as a first-order 403 404 approximation of its evolution (see the Appendix 2). The first stage corresponds to the evolution of a 405 primitive reservoir between the origin of the solar system at ca. 4.57 Ga (t_0) and a differentiation event 406 at t_d , which for simplicity is considered to be instantaneous. This event produces an early depleted 407 mantle (EDM) characterized by low LREE content and high Sm/Nd. The second stage represents the 408 period separating this event from the time when the EDM melted to produce mafic rocks of the 409 Caozhuang region 3.1 Gyr ago.

Results from the two-stage model show that the depleted mantle source of the D-group amphibolites differentiated $4.44^{+0.05}_{-0.07}$ Gyr ago, with a corresponding 147 Sm/¹⁴⁴Nd source ratio of 0.211 ± 0.002 (Fig. 6c). Assuming a slightly superchondritic 147 Sm/¹⁴⁴Nd ratio of 0.2008 for the Bulk Silicate Earth (Caro et al., 2008, Caro and Bourdon, 2010; Johnston et al., 2022; Frossard et al., 2022) would translate into an older 142,143 Nd model age of $4.51^{+0.05}_{-0.07}$ Ga. These age constraints are consistent with those inferred from other Archean terranes characterized by positive 142 Nd anomalies (with the exception of the Singhbum granitoids; Maltese et al., 2022). In particular, similar model ages and

417	time-integrated Sm/Nd were obtained from metasediments (Caro et al., 2006) and amphibolites of the
418	Isua supracrustal belt (O'Neil et al., 2016; Rizo et al., 2011; Saji et al., 2018), the Nulliak ultramafic
419	rocks of the Saglek block (Morino et al., 2017), and the 2.7 Ga Theo's Flow in the Abitibi Greenstone
420	belt (Debaille et al., 2013) (Fig. 6 a-c). These concordant results suggest that these mantle-derived
421	rocks, with ages ranging from 3.8 to 2.7 Ga, originated from a common reservoir that differentiated
422	shortly after the Moon-forming impact and was preserved from rehomogenization on a timescale of
423	several billion years.
424	

425 5.5 Significance of the ¹⁴²Nd record for Hadean-Archean geodynamics

A classic interpretation of the ¹⁴²Nd record is that primordial heterogeneities were gradually 426 427 homogenized during the Archean as a result of crustal recycling and/or convective stirring (e.g., Hyung 428 and Jacobsen, 2020; Rosas and Korenaga, 2018). A critical aspect of these models, however, is that 429 they rely on global compilations of ¹⁴²Nd data (Fig. 7a) that are strongly biased in favor of the 430 Eoarchean, due in particular to the large number of data published on the Isua Supracrustal Belt (ISB). As a result, the assumption that ¹⁴²Nd anomalies decrease with time relies for the most part on highly 431 432 radiogenic values (up to +18 ppm) reported for some Isua amphibolites and on the less scattered but sparse ¹⁴²Nd data for Neoarchean and Mesoarchean rocks (Fig. 7a). 433 The majority of ¹⁴²Nd data on ISB mantle-derived rocks (amphibolites) comes from 5 datasets, 434 435 whose results are summarized in Fig. 8a (Saji et al. 2018; Rizo et al. 2011, 2013; Caro et al 2006; 436 O'Neil et al. 2016). It must be kept in mind that these data are from amphibolite groups that differ in 437 age, location, and composition within the ISB and thus are unlikely to originate from a compositionally

438 homogeneous mantle reservoir. Nevertheless, all datasets are in excellent agreement, averaging $+10.6 \pm$

439	2.0 ppm (2 S.D.), which is similar to the composition of the D-group Caozhuang amphibolites, Nulliak
440	and Theo's flow (Fig. 8a). In contrast, these datasets differ in terms of sample dispersion (Fig. 8b),
441	ranging from ±1.4 ppm (2 S.D.; N=7; Saji et al., 2018) to ±9 ppm (2 S.D.; N=16; Rizo et al., 2011).
442	Most importantly, these datasets also differ in terms of the reproducibility of the ¹⁴² Nd measurements.
443	As shown in Fig. 8b, the analytical error estimated from repeated standard measurements for the five
444	ISB datasets varies between ± 2 and ± 6 ppm (2 S.D.) and correlates positively with sample dispersion.
445	This observation holds for the majority of Archean ¹⁴² Nd studies, where sample dispersion is typically
446	within \pm 30% of analytical reproducibility (Fig. 8b). Thus, the heterogeneity of the Archean ¹⁴² Nd
447	record, including the ISB, appears to be primarily analytical in nature, and caution should be exercised
448	when evaluating geodynamic parameters based on the apparent dispersion in global compilations of
449	142 Nd data (Fig. 7). When limited to studies with an external precision of < 4 ppm (2 S.D.), the database
450	for Archean mantle-derived rocks shows no conclusive evidence for a more heterogeneous mantle in
451	the Eoarchean or a progressive homogenization of positive ¹⁴² Nd anomalies (Fig. 7b). Models that use
452	an unfiltered ¹⁴² Nd database (e.g., Fig. 7a) to quantify mixing and/or recycling rates for the Archean
453	mantle are therefore likely to overestimate the isotopic heterogeneity of the Eoarchean mantle and the
454	rate at which primordial heterogeneities were destroyed.

Assuming that the EDM composition is representative of the Archean convective mantle, its apparent evolution in closed-system (Fig. 6a-c) would imply limited crustal recycling and/or inefficient homogenization of recycled crustal material. Such long-term isolation may imply that, if there are any links between the efficiency of crustal recycling and the tectonic regimes of early Earth, the eventual emergence of plate tectonics should be postponed to 2.7 Ga or later. However, the current Archean ¹⁴²Nd record provides little support for this hypothesis. For instance, mantle-derived rocks of tholeiitic 461 affinity from the Nuvvuagittuq and Ukaliq supracrustal belts (3.5-3.8 Ga; NE Superior Province, O'Neil et al., 2008, 2016; Caro et al., 2017) typically cluster around μ^{142} Nd ≈ 0 and show no evidence 462 463 for an EDM contribution. Mafic rocks in the Nuvvuagittuq and Ukaliq belts show striking similarities 464 to modern arc lavas, suggesting their protoliths formed in a subduction-like context (Caro et al., 2017; 465 Grocolas et al., 2022). The absence of a depleted mantle component in such context contrasts with modern plate-tectonic settings where arc lavas are characterized by predominantly positive ϵ^{143} Nd and 466 467 EHf, reflecting a ubiquitous depleted mantle contribution mixed with slab-derived Hf-Nd to arc 468 magmatism (e.g., Collins et al., 2011). On a larger scale (Fig.), Archean terranes and cratons worldwide also show no evidence of mixing between isotopically enriched (μ^{142} Nd<0) and depleted 469 $(\mu^{142}Nd>0)$ material but appear to be characterized by $\mu^{142}Nd$ compositions that range from either 0 to 470 471 positive values (North China craton, North Atlantic craton, Singbhum craton) or from 0 to negative values (Acasta gneiss complex, Innuksuaq gneiss complex, Kaapvaal craton). Collectively, these 472 473 observations suggest that the μ^{142} Nd composition of the prevailing Archean mantle may have been 474 distinct from that of the EDM, perhaps close to μ^{142} Nd = 0 as early as 3.8 - 4.0 Ga.

475 The formation of depleted mantle domains throughout geological times is classically considered 476 to be the result of melt extraction at uppermost mantle pressures, leading to the formation of a 477 chemically depleted convective upper mantle and a more primitive lower mantle. However, the 478 formation of deep, depleted reservoirs isolated from a more primitive convective mantle is a plausible 479 outcome of magma ocean crystallization (e.g., Caro et al., 2005; Boyet et al., 2021). Such reservoirs 480 could result from the gravitational overturn of an unstable stratification causing shallow, Fe-rich 481 cumulates to be returned to the deep mantle, where they may survive for billions of years (Ballmer et 482 al., 2017). Alternatively, the formation of a basal magma ocean (BMO) was predicted based on the 483 presence of a density crossover between crystals and melts at pressures above ~50 GPa (Labrosse et al.,

484 2007; Caracas et al., 2019). As the BMO cooled, Fe and incompatible elements would have partitioned 485 into the remaining melt, producing a depleted cumulate near the core-mantle boundary. If the 486 cumulates crystallizing from the BMO are positively buoyant, their entrainment in mantle upwellings 487 could explain the formation of crustal terranes with positive ¹⁴²Nd anomalies as well as the apparent 488 closed-system evolution of the EDM.

Beyond these speculative scenarios, the ubiquity of ¹⁴²Nd anomalies in conjunction with the 489 490 apparent isotopic dichotomy of Archean cratons indicates that destabilization and reworking of 491 primordial Hadean silicate reservoirs played a crucial role in crust formation at least until ~ 3 Gyr ago. The absence of positive ¹⁴²Nd anomalies post-Archean mantle-derived rocks may indicate the eventual 492 493 exhaustion of deep depleted reservoirs, their homogenization in the convective system, or a transition from plume-dominated crust-forming processes to modern plate tectonics. Given the limited ^{142,143}Nd 494 495 database for Neoarchean and Proterozoic mantle-derived rocks, none of these scenarios can be 496 completely ruled out. However, our results show that the commonly held assumption that positive ¹⁴²Nd anomalies were gradually homogenized by convection and recycling during the Archean is 497 498 currently not supported by observations. The possibility that the EDM separated early from the 499 convective system should therefore be considered.

501 6 Conclusion

502 The ^{146,147}Sm-^{142,143}Nd and zircon ¹⁷⁶Lu-¹⁷⁶Hf systematics of Archean sedimentary rocks, 503 granitoids and mantle-derived rocks, representing the main lithologic units of the eastern NCC, were 504 investigated. The main conclusions of this study can be summarized as follows: 505 (1) Despite the absence of depleted ε Hf(t) compositions in granitoid zircons, rocks from the EH 506 region show a ubiquitous positive ¹⁴²Nd anomaly, suggesting that Hadean mantle domains were 507 involved in the formation of the NCC from 3.7-3.8 Ga until at least 3.1 Ga. The apparent decoupling of 508 the ¹⁴²Nd and ¹⁷⁶Hf signals reflects the multi-stage reworking of Eo-Mesoarchean crust, during which 509 this ¹⁴²Nd anomaly was gradually diluted by the addition of juvenile material and transferred to 510 younger crustal rocks.

511 (2) Application of coupled ^{142,143}Nd chronometry to the 3.1 Ga Caozhuang amphibolites originally 512 described by Cui et al. (2018) yielded a two-stage model age of $4.44^{+0.05}_{-0.07}$ Ga, with a ¹⁴⁷Sm/¹⁴⁴Nd 513 source ratio of 0.211 ± 0.002. These estimates are identical to those obtained from other Archean 514 mantle-derived rocks with ages between 2.7 and 3.8 Ga, suggesting that their parental melts originated 515 from a common mantle reservoir that differentiated shortly after the Moon-forming impact and 516 subsequently evolved in closed system until at least 2.7 Ga.

(3) The high degree of isotopic heterogeneity observed in Eoarchean rocks appears to be largely analytical in nature and thus does not provide conclusive evidence that the Eoarchean mantle was more depleted and/or heterogeneous compared to the late Archean period. Accordingly, the generally accepted notion that positive ¹⁴²Nd anomalies were homogenized by convection and recycling during the Archean should be reconsidered.

- (4) The apparent closed-system evolution of the EDM, combined with the isotopic dichotomy of
 Archean cratons, suggests that Hadean depleted domains remained convectively isolated after magma
 ocean crystallization and that their eventual destabilization was an important process of crust formation
 in the Archean.

The areas circled by thick dashed lines 540 counterclockwise are the Eastern Ancient Terrane (EAT), the Central Ancient Terrane (CAT), and the 541 Southern Ancient Terrane (SAT), respectively. The blue stars represent the sampling locations. 542 Amphibolites from the Primitive, Depleted Group and Cumulate Group, as well as the Caozhuang 543 Quartzites and the Caozhuang Granites were sampled in the Caozhuang region. The 2.5 Ga granitoids 544 were sampled in the Caochang region of west EH. The komatiites were sampled in the Mengyin region 545 in the WS.

550	or more replicates are assigned an error of \pm 2.2 ppm (2 S.D.), which corresponds to the external
551	precision estimated from the standard analyses. (b) Diagram of MgO versus $\mu^{142}Nd$ for mafic and
552	ultramafic rocks analyzed in this study. The classification of Cui et al. (2018) based on field
553	observations is shown for comparison. With the exception of samples 15CZ06-1 and 14CZ03-6,
554	amphibolites from the D-Group correspond to amphibolites of Group 2 of Cui et al (2018), while
555	amphibolites from the P-Group correspond to Cui et al's Group 1. Note that 14CZ03-6 may be affected
556	by crustal contamination.

Assuming a slightly non-chondritic composition for the BSE

The purple curves represent the evolution of the depleted 579 mantle in the two-box model of Rosas and Korenaga (2018). The model assumes rapid extraction of a 580 continental mass similar to the present one about 4.4 to 4.5 Gyr ago, followed by a steady state 581 evolution in which the production of new crust is balanced by recycling, eventually leading to 582 homogenization of the Archean mantle. Despite the possibility of more complex evolution scenarios, the ^{142,143}Nd data are consistent with a simple two-stage evolution model. This observation confirms the 583 accuracy of model ages inferred from coupled ^{146,147}Sm-^{142,143}Nd systematics. The heterogeneous 612 613 nature of the Caozhuang mantle is also reflected in significant excess scatter relative to standard 614 analyses. Other datasets show no or limited excess scatter, with 2 S.D_{samples} typically within \pm 30% of 2

615 S.D_{standards}. The grey circles show the analytical and sample dispersion reported in other studies of
616 Archean mafic/ultramafic rocks (Boyet et al., 2021; Maltese et al., 2022; Maya et al., 2016; Morino et

627 Supplementary Fig. 1 Diagrams of Zr versus selected elements or element ratios to evaluate the effects 628 of post-magmatic alteration (a-e) and crustal contamination (f-g) for the amphibolites analyzed in this 629 study. The blue squares represent compositions of the BSE (Palme and O'Neill, 2014). Most REEs (e.g., 630 Sm and Nd) exhibit strong linear correlations with correlation coefficients well above 0.75 (a-b), 631 indicating relatively low mobility of these elements. In contrast, the LILEs (e.g., Sr, Ba, and Rb) show 632 considerable scatter (c-e), which aligns with their susceptibility to fluid circulation; (f-g) Plots of La/Yb 633 and Nb/Yb versus Zr to assess the contamination of the amphibolites by evolved crustal components. 634 The geochemical composition of the contaminant is represented by the crustal endmember of the ca. 635 3.8 Ga granitoids in the study region reported by Wan et al., (2021); (h) plot of La/Yb versus μ^{142} Nd. No obvious correlation can be seen, indicating that the range in μ^{142} Nd of the amphibolites cannot be 636

637 explained by crustal contamination of ancient felsic crust with positive μ^{142} Nd.

641	Mesoarchean granitoid (15CZ06-8). In situ zircon U-Pb ages were analyzed using a Cameca
642	SIMS-1280 at IGGCAS. Zircon Lu-Hf isotopes were measured using a Geolas-193 laser-ablation
643	system attached to a Thermo Neptune Plus multicollector ICP-MS equipped in the same institute. The
644	zircon U-Pb and Lu-Hf isotopic data have been reported by Cui (2018). These samples were reanalyzed
645	for the purpose of this study, and a revised interpretation based on this new dataset is presented in
646	section 5.3.
