Creative Problem Solving: A complex phenomenon to be understood.

- 1. Problem-solving is domain and **task-specific** and dependent on factual, conceptual, procedural and strategic knowledge (Kilpatrick et al. 2001)
- 2. Problem-solving takes place in a specific socio-cultural context

Mediating artefacts

3. Humans have a brain that can experience quite similar (meta)cognitive processes.

Beyond inductive/deductive, analogical thinking and Concept formation pattern recognition Socio-cultural context

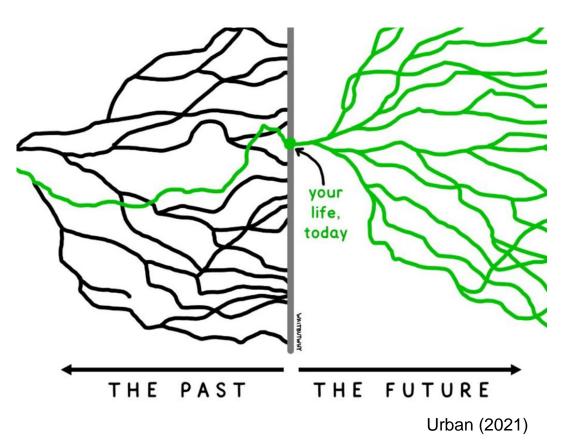

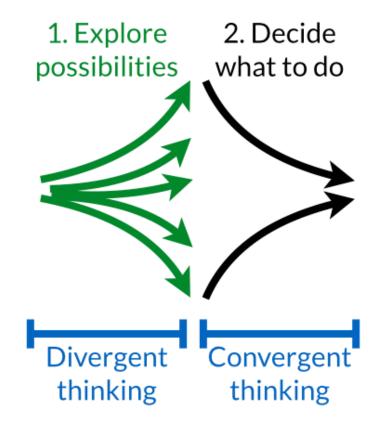

- "Imagined alternatives [divergent thinking] play a serious role in our cognitive lives" (Byrne, 2022)
- Creative problem solving (CPS) expands the boundaries of what is considered possible and propelling the field of possibility studies forward.
- CPS facilitates the identification and evaluation of alternative paths, enabling researchers to navigate through uncertainties and complexities

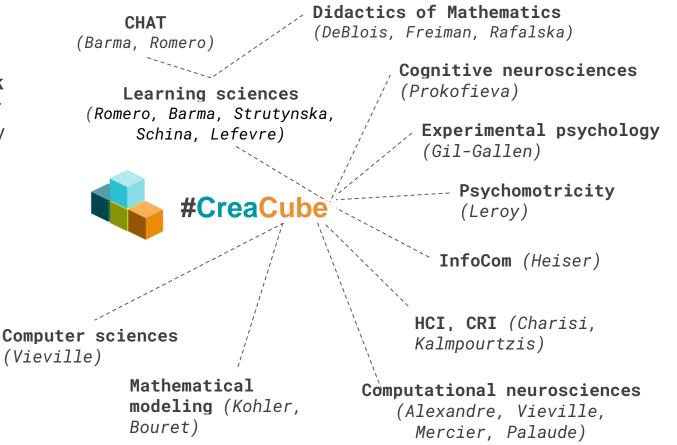

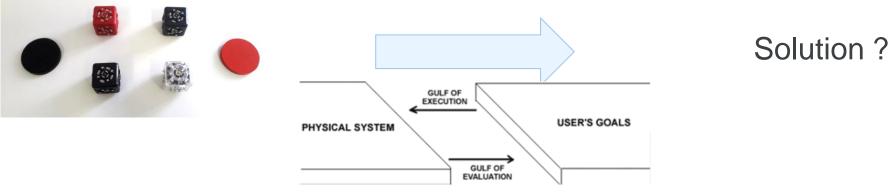

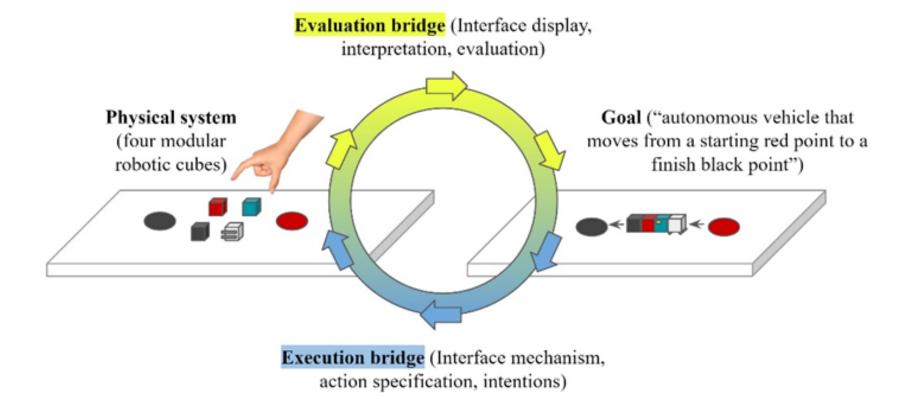
#CreaCube: a creative problem-solving task

Problem

"Build a vehicle composed of 4 items, moving autonomously from a black point to a red point" ⇒ an ill-defined problem



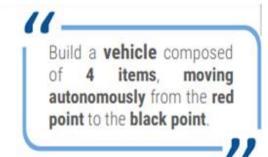
Norman (1986) designates as the gulf of execution, the distance between the user's goals and the means of achieving them through the system.

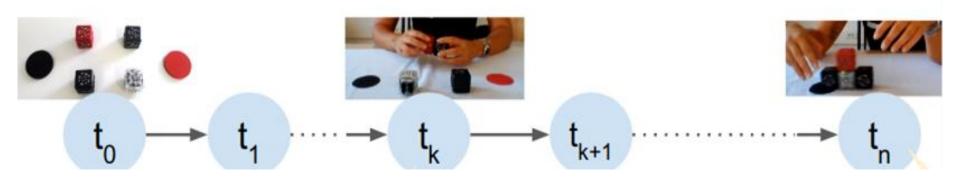
#CreaCube corpus: *high-quality* learning analytics

Study 1. Assess the components of divergent thinking during the creative problem-solving task

AUT (Guilford, 1967)

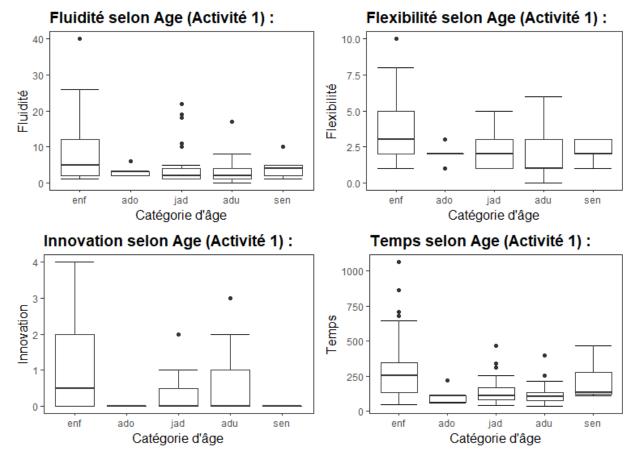
Flexibility: different alternative uses found by object **Fluidity:** total number of alternative uses found per object **Originality:** uniqueness of each response

DT components	Results: mean score (standard deviation) for the AUT task	Results: mean score (standard deviation) for the CreaCube task
Fluency = total number of ideas for the objects in AUT and total number of configurations for the CreaCube Task	<i>M</i> = 5.8 (1.49)	<i>M</i> = 4.9 (3.89)
Flexibility = number of different category or different configurations	M = 3.97 (1.07)	<i>M</i> = 2.85 (1.77)
Originality = response given by fewer than 5% of the participants	<i>M</i> = 0.82 (0.78)	M = 0.51 (0.79)

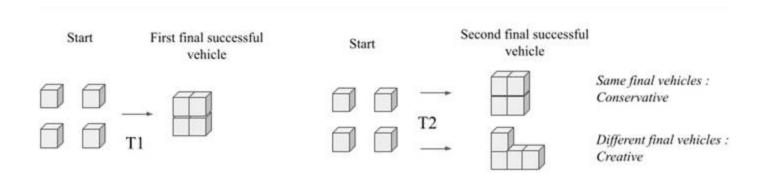


Study 3. Creative perseverance in the task

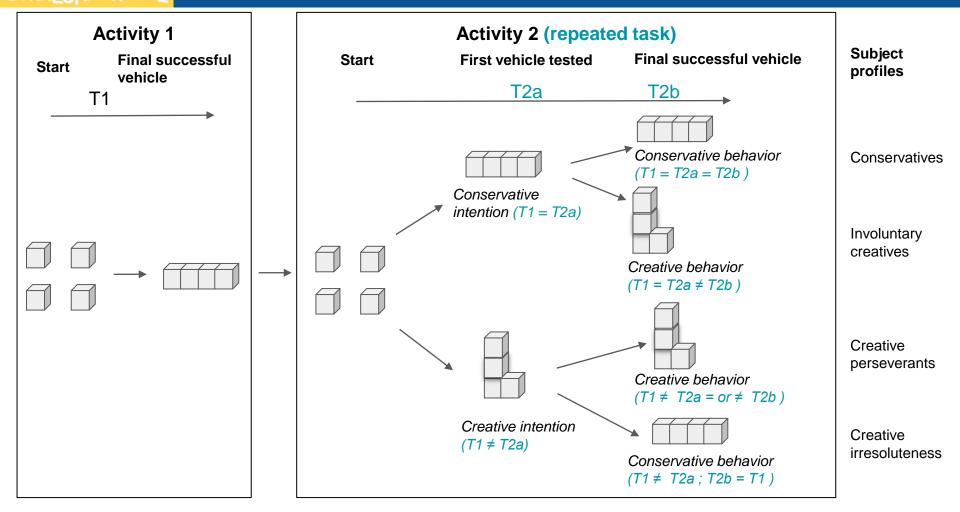
- 37 primary school teachers (neo teachers) who took part in continuing training on the creative uses of digital technologies.
- Repeat CreaCube task

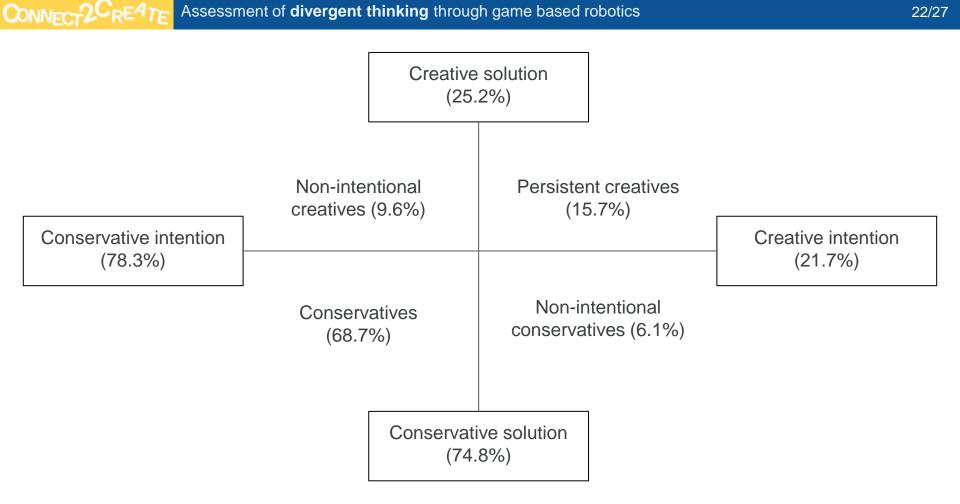

- First activity without solution model
- Second activity with solution model
 - Conservative behaviour is observed when the participant applies an existing solution, often as a means of resolving tasks as quickly as possible.
 - **Creative behavior** requires inhibiting previous solutions and exploring new ideas.

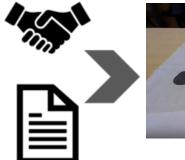
Study 4. Effects of instruction on Creative Thinking



Explicit instructions appear to improve scores on divergent thinking dimensions (Acar et al., 2020)

23 students of INSPE of Nice

2 groups: With instructions or without instruction

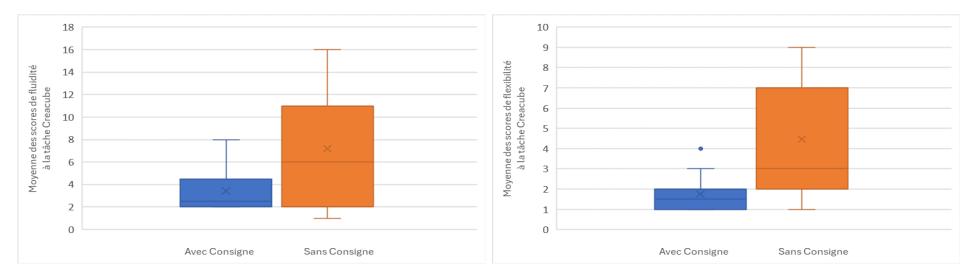

Study 5. Instantaneous behavioral effects of self-induced cognitive trance on creative thinking: the case of Art School students.

Self-Induced Cognitive Trance as an non-ordinary state of consciousness

- Can be achieve voluntarily after a training
- Inspired by traditional Mongolian shamanic trance
- Without religious or spiritual ritual
- Studied scientifically through different scientific lenses



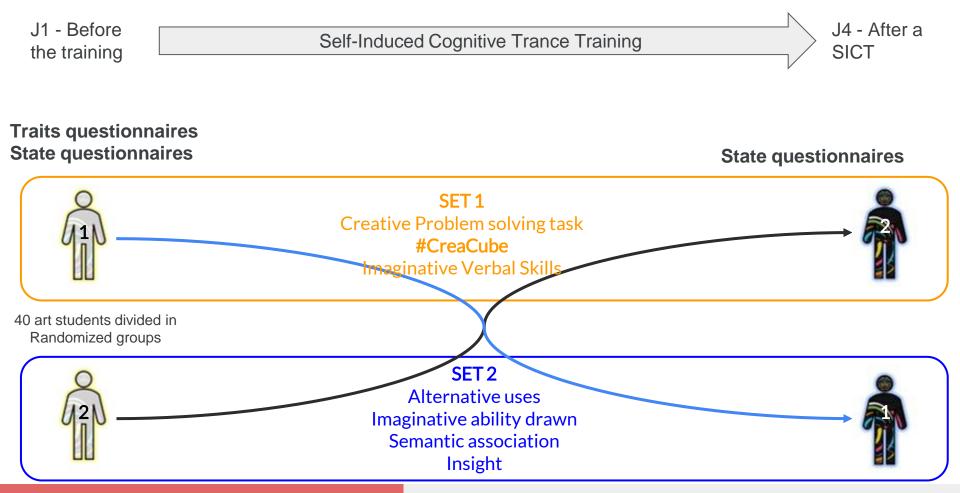
Non-ordinary states of consciousness and creative thinking

Effects of non-ordinary states of consciousness, **self-induced** (different types of meditation) or **induced by psychotropic substances**, on convergent and divergent thinking.
