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Chemical toxicity and radioactivity of spent nuclear fuel raise concerns regarding the prediction of radionuclide behavior in the geosphere and deep underground storage and its interaction with water. Hydrogen peroxide ( $\text{H}_2\text{O}_2$ ), a key product of water radiolysis, may contribute to the corrosion of  $\text{UO}_2$ -based matrices, forming uranium peroxide precipitates such as studtite and metastudtite. These species can facilitate the dissolution of radionuclides and their release into the environment.<sup>[1-3]</sup>

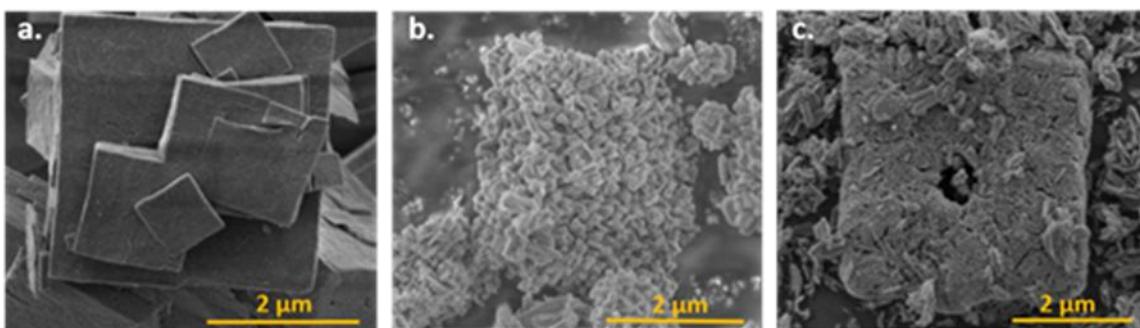


Figure 1: a) SEM picture of  $\text{UO}_2$  platelets synthesized by the oxalate route. b) and c) SEM images of uranyl peroxydes after  $\text{UO}_2$  sonolysis in  $5.10^{-4}$  M  $\text{H}_2\text{SO}_4$  at 346 kHz (20 W.mL<sup>-1</sup>, 20°C, Ar/O<sub>2</sub>, 6h)

Sonochemistry, using ultrasound to influence chemical reactions, shares similarities with radiolysis by generating *in-situ* hydrogen peroxide.<sup>[4]</sup> However, the literature about sonochemistry of actinides remains limited. Sonolysis of  $\text{UO}_2$  powder (20 to 1047 kHz) in pure water or slightly acidic solutions saturated with an oxygenated atmosphere revealed the formation of (meta)studtite  $[(\text{UO}_2(\text{O}_2)(\text{H}_2\text{O})_2 \cdot x\text{H}_2\text{O}]$ .<sup>[5]</sup> Analyses of the solution aliquots (UV-Vis absorption spectroscopy, ICP-OES) and solid residues (SEM, XRD, FTIR) attributed this behavior to  $\text{H}_2\text{O}_2$  generated by sonochemistry. The complete conversion of  $\text{UO}_2$  into (meta-)studtite occurred while preserving the initial morphology (Figure 1.b). Surprisingly, specific sonochemical conditions led to the reproducible formation of cavities at the center of the platelets (Figure 1.c).
