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Analysis and 3D TCAD simulations of EDSR in an industrially-compatible FD-SOI device

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Introduction

- An essential component of a microelectronics engineering toolbox is technology computer-aided design (TCAD) software.
- In May 2022, Nanoacademic released QTCAD[®], a TCAD software package for spin qubits in semiconductors.
- Here, we present TCAD simulations of electric-dipole spin resonance (EDSR) in the presence of a micromagnet.¹
- We consider a simplified 3D model of a 28 nm Fully Depleted Silicon on Insulator (FD-SOI) device, akin to foundry-compatible structures recently investigated with STMicroelectronics, Université Grenoble-Alpes, and Institut quantique.^{1,2,3} These simulations can give insight into the viability of EDSR in this device before considerable effort and resources are deployed to engineer a device with an integrated micromagnet. We find Rabi frequencies on the order of MHz by driving the system using the side gates. We also compute the associated leakage out of the qubit subspace.



Hamiltonian and Eigenstates

EDSR Dynamics

to obtain the confinement potential, $\tilde{V}(\vec{r}, \Phi)$ $U(t) = \Delta V(\vec{r}, \Phi(t)) = \tilde{V}(\vec{r}, \Phi(t)) - V(\vec{r})$

Matrix elements of the EDSR drive

 φ_F : Reference potential χ : Electron affinity T = 1.4 K: Convergence at cryogenic temperatures achieved using adaptive meshing⁴





b is the slope

 $H_Z = -\vec{\mu} \cdot \vec{B} = \frac{\mu_B g^*}{r} \vec{S} \cdot \vec{B}$ $g^* = 2$: Effective g-factor



• ν labels the eigenstates of H_0 Matrix elements depend linearly on the applied bias:

 $[\Delta V(\vec{r},t)]_{\nu\nu'} = \alpha_{\nu\nu'} \Phi$ $[\Delta V(\vec{r}, \varphi_0 \cos(\omega t))]_{\nu\nu'}$

 $= \alpha_{\nu\nu'} \varphi_0 \cos(\omega t)$

 $= [\Delta V(\vec{r}, \varphi_0)]_{\nu\nu'} \cos(\omega t)$

Dynamics Simulations⁵

- EDSR transitions between the qubit states ($\nu = 0, \nu = 1$).
- Rabi frequency of $f_R = 4.7 \text{ MHz}$ for $\varphi_0 = 0.2 \text{ V}$.
- Leakage to higher states (e.g. $\nu = 2, \nu = 3$) is ≤ 0.004 .





Conclusions

References

- We simulated the EDSR signal for a spin qubit located in a STMicroelectronics 28 nm ultra thin body and buried oxide (UTBB) Fully Depleted Silicon on Insulator (FD-SOI) device.
- The simulations were performed starting only from the device geometry and before the device was fabricated.
- We find Rabi frequencies on the order of MHz using a drive applied to the side gates of amplitude 0.2 V.
- The leakage out of the qubit subspace does not prevent single-qubit gate fidelities from achieving the (surface-code) fault-tolerant threshold.
- In future work, we will investigate how charge impurities can affect the presented Rabi oscillations.
