Fast evolving recombination landscapes support a role of PRDM9 in directing hotspot location in Salmon genomes

Introduction

- **Recombination** has a major role in shaping genome evolution.
- Recombination events tend to concentrate at **hotspot** positions in a wide range of species.
- **PRDM9** protein determines recombination events in **mammals** and leads to **rapid evolution** of their recombination landscapes (Myers et al., 2010; Auton et al., 2012). By contrast, it has been **lost** in other taxa which show **conserved hotspots** (e.g. birds, dogs, **teleosts**; Singhal et al., 2015; Auton et al., 2013; Baker et al., 2017).
- Full-length copies of PRDM9 have been found in Salmonids, but their function is still unknown.

Is the regulation of recombination by PRDM9 ancestral in the animal kingdom ?





Hotspot calling 2kb window at least 5x > 50kb flanking regions

Characterization of the recombination landscapes and their evolution in the coho salmon Oncorhynchus kisutch and the rainbow trout Oncorhynchus mykiss

Inter and intra chromosomal variation in recombination rates



Averaged recombination rates ρ decrease with chromosome length and with distance to telomeres. One crossing-over (CO) per meiosis per chromosome is obligatory to ensure their proper segregation, but more COs usually prevented by chromosomal interference. Thus small chromosomes display higher recombination rates. Heterochiasmy and interference can explain the deficit of recombination in centro-chromosomal regions as compared to telomeres.

Presence / Absence of PRDM9 footprints revealed by recombination rates at promoter-like features





Fine scale recombination landscapes. Recombination rates ρ are very heterogeneous along chromosomes (~90% of the recombination in 20% of the genome) and concentrate into hotspots.

Limited enrichment of recombination rates at promoter-like features in Salmons, compared to the non-PRDM9 teleost *D. labrax*. Recombination does not increase at transcription start and end sites (TSS/TES) and in TSS in CpG islands (CGI), as in human and mice (on the left). On the contrary, the alternative mecanism directing recombination sites in species lacking functional PRDM9 such as *D. labrax* (on the right, two populations) targets these regions (as in birds, dogs, swordtail fish).



Rapid evolution of hotspot location



Fast evolving recombination landscapes between *O. kisutch* and *O. mykiss*. Less than 6% of hotspots are shared between the two speices, suggesting fast evolving recombination landscapes.

Conclusion

- The low enrichment of recombination events at promoter-like features and the lack of sharing of hotspots between the coho salmon and the rainbow trout are signatures of a PRDM9-dependent system and differ from the patterns in non-PRDM9 organisms (e.g. sea bass).
- The role of PRDM9 in the regulation of recombination in these two Oncorhynchus species needs to be validated by analyzing enrichment of PRDM9 binding sites, or by the mapping of double-strand breaks to identify empirically the location of recombination events.
- These PRDM9-like footprints must be determined in other taxa in order to assess its role across Salmonids (work in progress on the Atlantic salmon Salmo salar) and more broadly in animals.



Hotspots comparison: how to distinguish between different and identical landscapes ? Using simulations to assess the performance of LDhelmet, we found that, depending on the effective population size (Ne) and the sample size, ~1-2% hotspots are found shared between two populations with different recombination landscapes, and ~30% between populations sharing the same landscape. The real fraction of shared hotspots is often underestimated due to falses positves and false negatives (Raynaud et al., 2022).
