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Multi-scale mechanistic approach to colloidal transport in porous media

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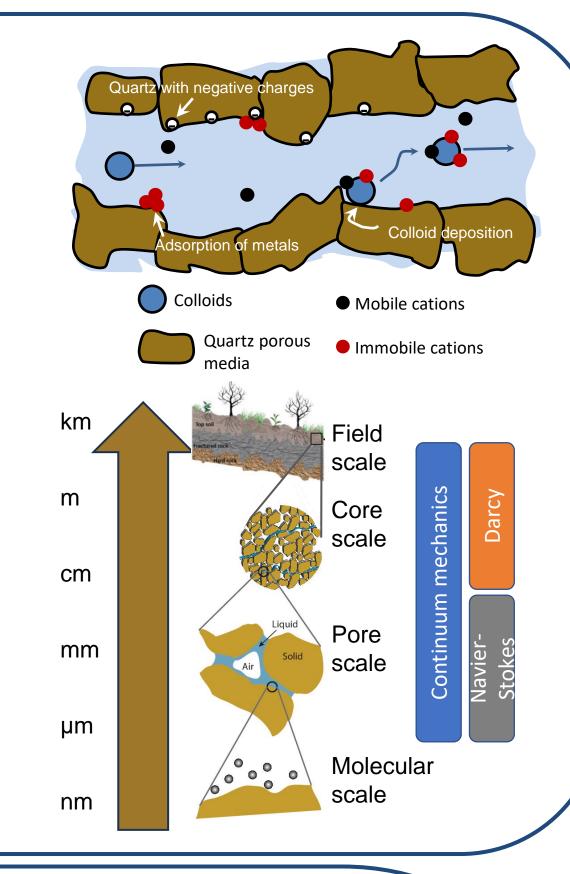






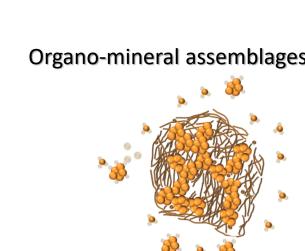
Motivation

- Colloidal particles, including nanoparticles, bacteria, and fine particles, have significant potential to mobilize contaminants in porous media.¹
- Understanding the mechanisms controlling colloidal transport is limited, hindering their effective use in underground engineering, such as groundwater remediation and enhanced oil recovery.
- Therefore, a multi-scale approach combining laboratory experiments and numerical modeling is necessary to accurately predict retention and transport of colloids in porous matrices.



Role of colloids in contaminant transport

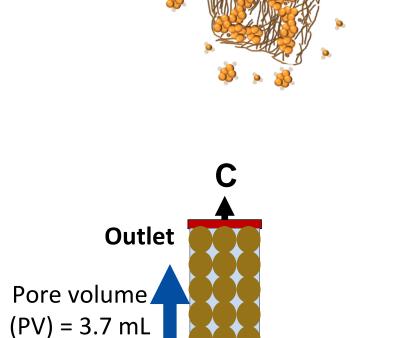
- Rare Earth Elements (REE), now recognized as emerging contaminants are shown to have strong interactions with natural colloids (Fe/Mn/Al (oxyhydr)oxides, and humic substances).²
- Limited knowledge is available on the impact of C- and Ferich colloids on REE mobility in subsurface systems under flow-through conditions.

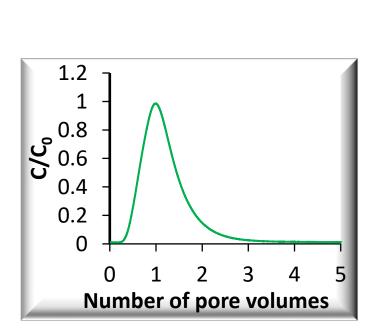


Organic matter

Experimental design

- 1. The sorption of REE under flow-through conditions was investigated using a liquid chromatography system (Äkta™ Pure) equipped with a fraction collector (F9-R).
- 2. A constant total metal ion concentration (C_0) of 0.7 μ M was injected through fixed-bed columns packed with quartz sand. Colloids were injected until a complete breakthrough of HA was achieved.
- 3. The height of the porous bed was approximately 5 cm, the flow in the column was from bottom to top at a fixed rate of 0.5 mL min⁻¹, using 5 mM NaCl solution at pH 5.
- 4. The dissolved metal ions concentrations from the column outflow solutions (C) were measured using Triple Quadrupole ICP-MS.





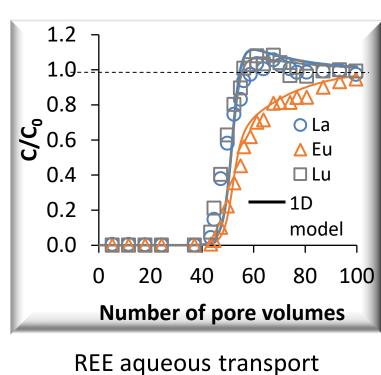
C₀ concentration

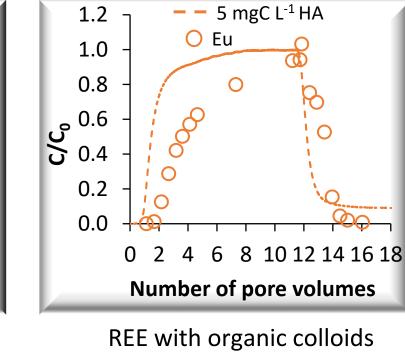
at pH = 5

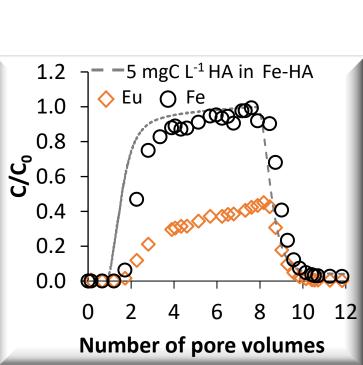
Breakthrough curve (BTC) of conservative tracer

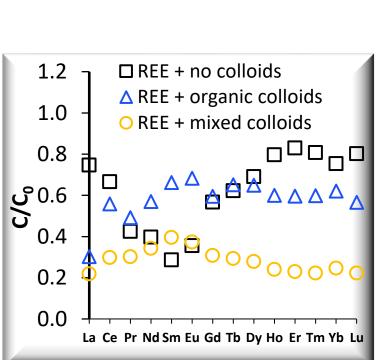
Results

- In the absence of colloids, no breakthrough of REE was observed until 40 PV showing that REE are strongly adsorbed to the quartz.
- reactive transport model developed in Phreeqc for aqueous REE transport accurately describes the experimental breakthrough curves.³
- Colloids represented the dominant transport pathway for REE which otherwise would have remained immobile in the quartz column.
- Variability in REE patterns is an important tool probe competitive adsorption in the context of transport from water to soils in porous media.







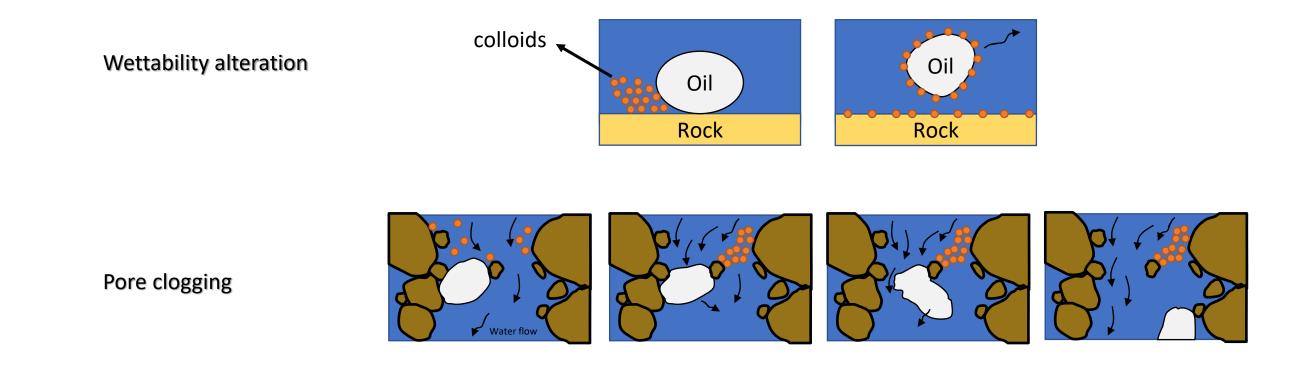


REE with mixed colloids

On-going research / perspectives

Prediction of colloidal transport is not only dependent on scales but also on hydroelectro-chemical effects in geological porous media.



4D X-ray micro computed tomography

Time-resolved 3D non-invasive, non-destructive high resolution imaging technique which can be applied in-situ to observe colloid retention and transport processes directly inside the pore matrix.

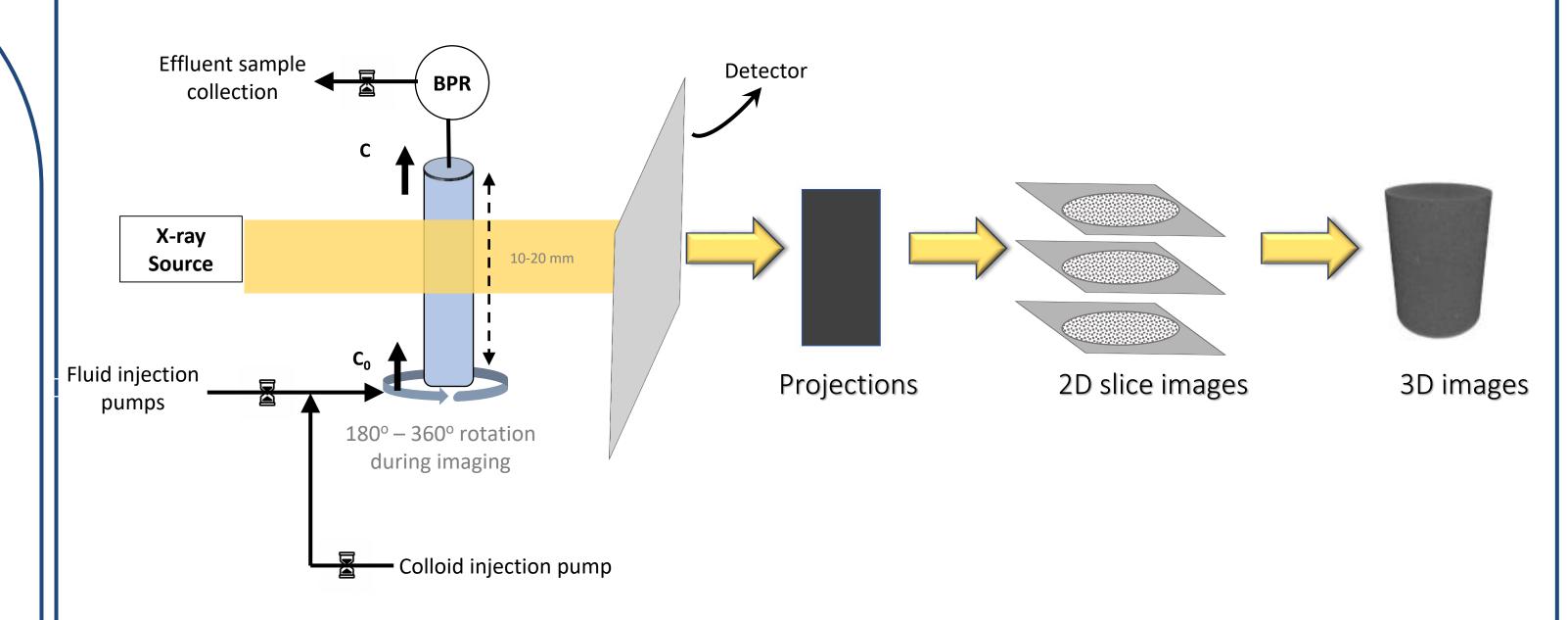
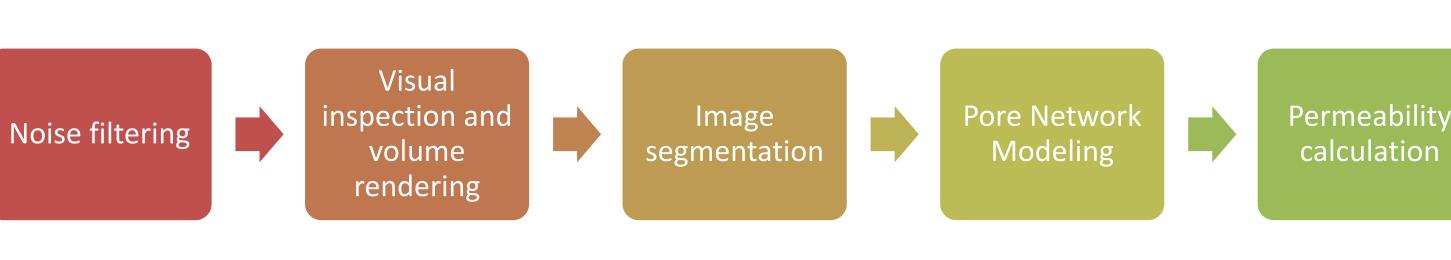


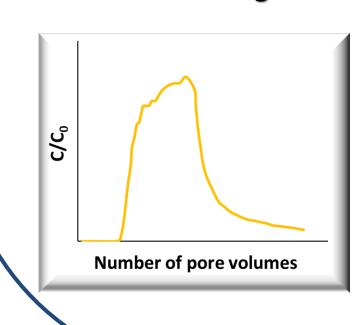
Image processing



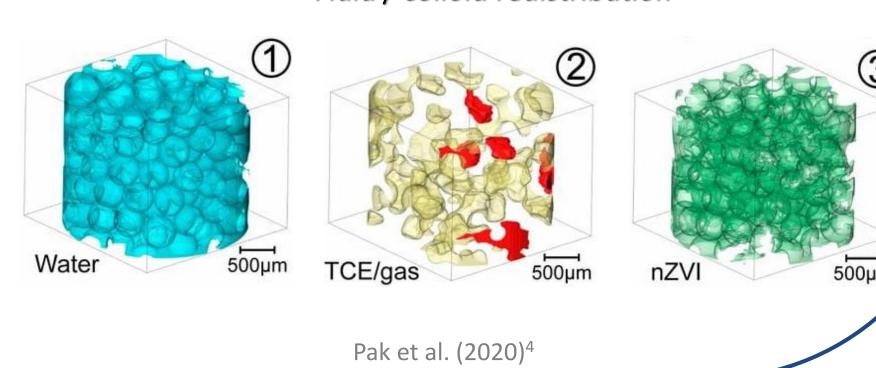
Goals to achieve

- Providing reference dataset validating continuum-scale models.
- Identification of key parameters controlling the distribution of colloids and the subsequent remobilization of fluids using 4D X-ray micro computed tomography.
- Understanding of dynamic processes \rightarrow Pore clogging, wettability alteration and remobilization of fluids and particles (e.g. snap-off and Haines jump events).

Colloid breakthrough curves



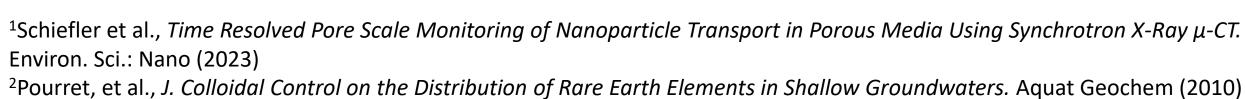
Fluid / colloid redistribution

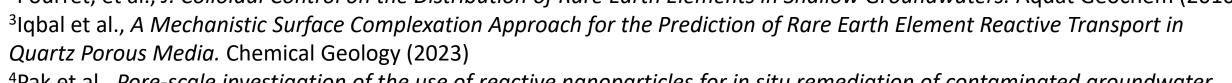


Summary

- Colloids play a crucial role in mobilizing contaminants in subsurface systems.
- > REE are emerging contaminants used in many modern-day technologies.
- Breakthrough curves show enhanced REE mobility in the presence of colloids.
- Limited knowledge on the mechanisms controlling colloid retention and transport hinders their widespread use in underground engineering, such as groundwater remediation and enhanced oil recovery. Therefore, a combined modeling-laboratory approach focused on multi-scale phenomena is necessary.
