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Fatal poisoning with *Rhamnus alaternus* in two heifers

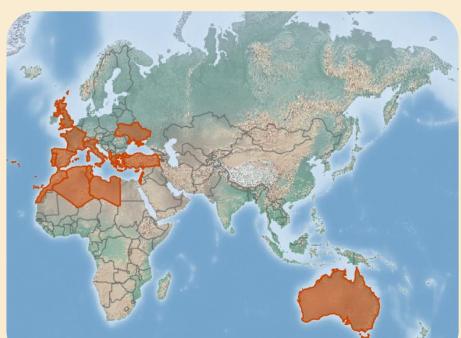
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INTRODUCTION

Rhamnus alaternus is an evergreen shrub from Rhamnaceae family, also known as "Mediterranean buckthorn" or "Italian buckthorn".



The distribution of the plant is concentrated around the Mediterranean Sea, its area of origin. It has been introduced by man in other countries, perhaps for its medicinal virtues

2 NECROPSY

Whole carcass: - Severe dehydration - Diffuse congestion **Epicardial fat:**

- Petechiae

Endocardium

- Multifocal suffusions $\leq 4 \text{ cm } \emptyset$

Colon:

- Grey liquid contents with some fibers

Bladder contents:

- Yellow-green urine
- Specific gravity 1.010
- pH 8.5
- Proteins and positive peroxidase activity

Small intestine:

- Greenish to reddish liquid contents

1 CASE HISTORY

In late January 2022, two 400 kg Aubrac heifers were found dead in their meadow.

Both animals were in **good general** condition, with no clinical signs before death.

No clinical signs were reported in the other 3 heifers and 20 mature cows in the herd.

- Mild hepatic cytolysis

Abomasum:

Liver:

- Haemorrhagic foci $\leq 5 \text{ cm } \emptyset$
- Pasty and greenish contents

Rumen contents:

- Strong aromatic odour
- pH 6.1
- Multiple lanceolate, serrated leaves

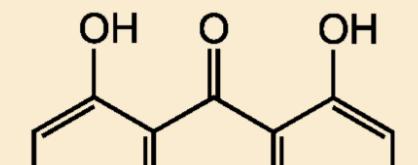
3 BOTANICAL ANALYSIS

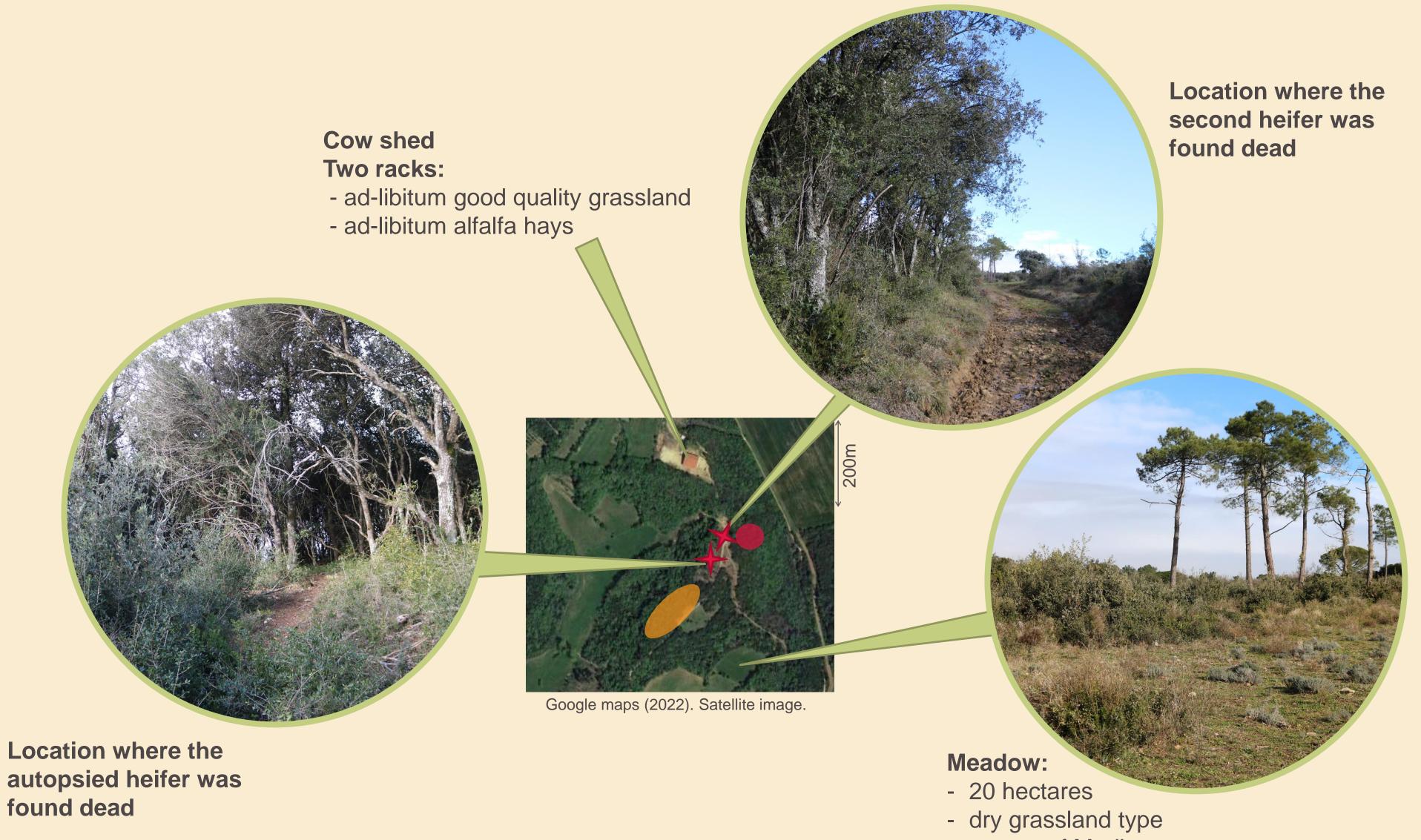
• As Rhamnus alaternus and Phyllirea latifolia are likely to be confused, a botanical analysis on site by a specialist was necessary to find and remove buckthorn and to estimate the consumption by the herd.

• There was storm and persistent heavy rains the day the two heifers died and were found 50 m near the only grove with *Rhamnus alaternus*. The other cows in the herd had taken shelter in another grove.

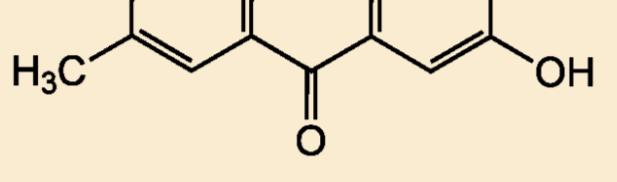
4 DISCUSSION

Toxicity of RA is believed to be caused by the anthraquinones^[1], especially emodin^[2].

Emodin can be found in humans' urines until 12 hours after consumption^[3]; **urine emodin dosage** may have been useful in the diagnosis of buckthorn poisoning.

Several plants containing anthraquinones are already suspected of **hepatotoxicity**^[4], **including Rhamnus species**: *Rhamnus purshiana*^[5] and *Rhamnus cathartica*^[6]. In the present case report, necropsy revealed a mild hepatic cytolysis, so *Rhamnus alaternus* should also be considered as a hepatotoxic plant.

Buckthorn, although considered poisonous, is widely used in herbal human medicine to treat jaundice^[7] but after excessive use, a case of **intoxication** has been described in a man^[8].

Traces of consumption

- Several sudden deaths happened in a herd.
- Necropsy revealed: diffuse congestion of the carcass + leaves of buckthorn in the rumen.
- Eaten buckthorns were found under cover of rain and sun in the woods.
- Heifers which took shelter in a grove without buckthorn did not die.

First reported case of a non-human Rhamnus alaternus poisoning
