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Development of 3D cellular models of infection of the human and equine central nervous systems by Flaviviruses.

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SUMMARY

Tick-Borne Encephalitis virus (TBEV) and West Nile virus (WNV) are two Flaviviruses that can cause severe and potentially fatal neurological disorders in human and/or horses, for which there is currently no antiviral treatment. These viruses have mostly been studied in cell lines, often not representative of their natural tropism. In order to have more physiologically relevant models, we recently used human neuronal/glial cells in culture and demonstrated their permissivity to TBEV and WNV (see poster François Piumi).

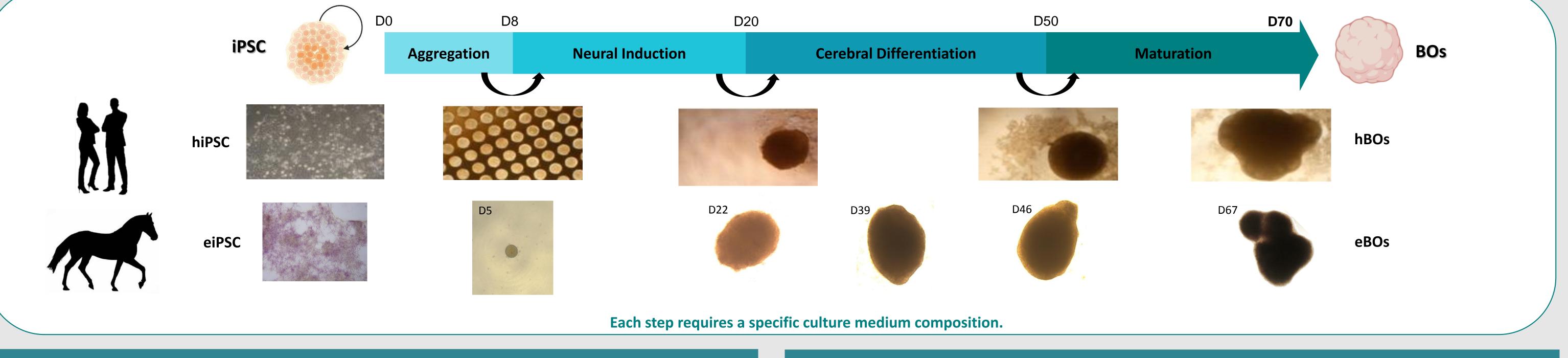
Here, with the aim of continuing to develop ever more relevant in vitro models, we produced and characterized three-dimensional (3D) cellular models, called Brain Organoids (BOs), which mimic the tissue organization of the human and equine central nervous system.

We infected human BOs (hBOs) with TBEV and WNV and equine BOs (eBOs) with WNV and assessed viral replication through quantification of viral RNA (RT-qPCR) and viral particles (TCID 50) in supernatants, and immunostaining with antibodies specific to the viruses on 10 µm sections. Both viruses replicated efficiently in hBOs, as did WNV in eBOs.

Infected hBOs and eBOs were next used to test the antiviral activity of chemical compounds, some of which having a dose-dependent activity.

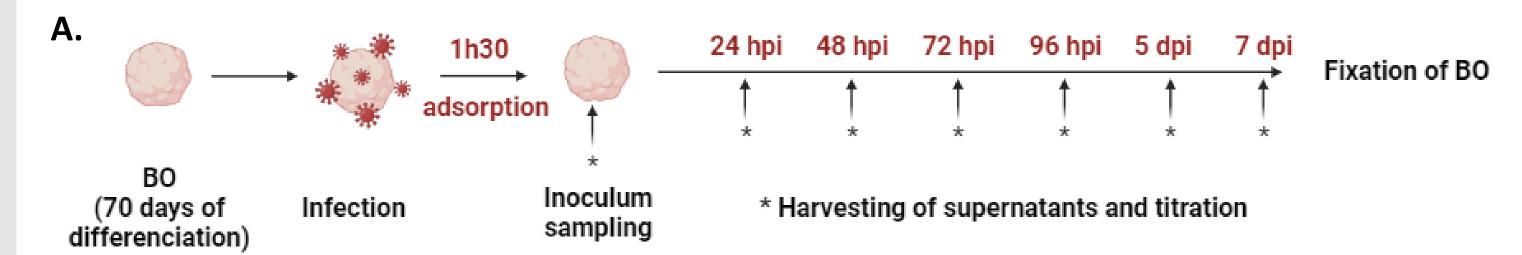
Thus, human and equine BOs represent novel, physiologically relevant, 3D in vitro models of viral infection which can be used to confirm antiviral activity of chemical compounds before in vivo testing.

GENERATION OF OF HUMAN/EQUINE BOs (Dr B Pain, SBRI, Lyon)



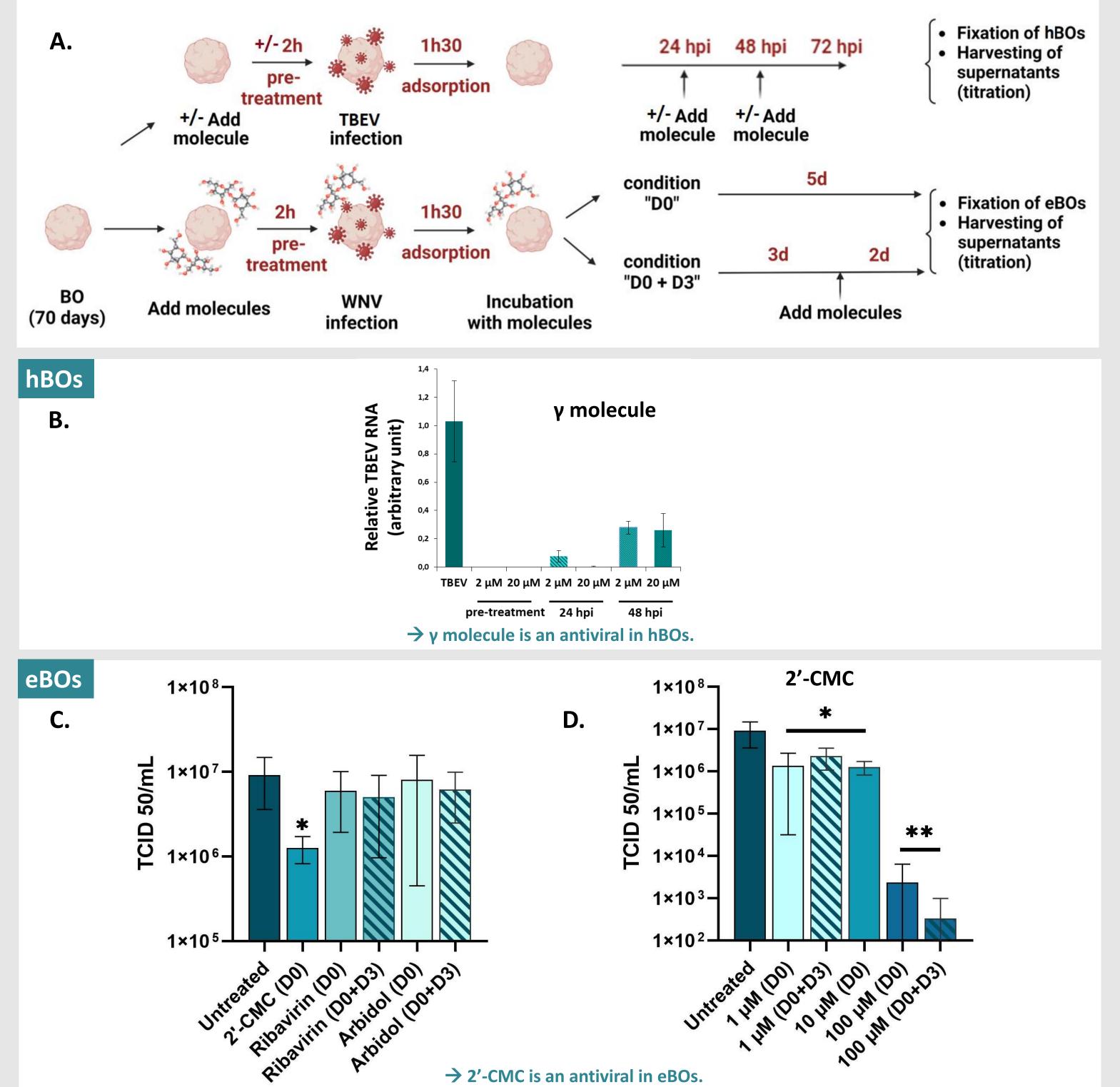

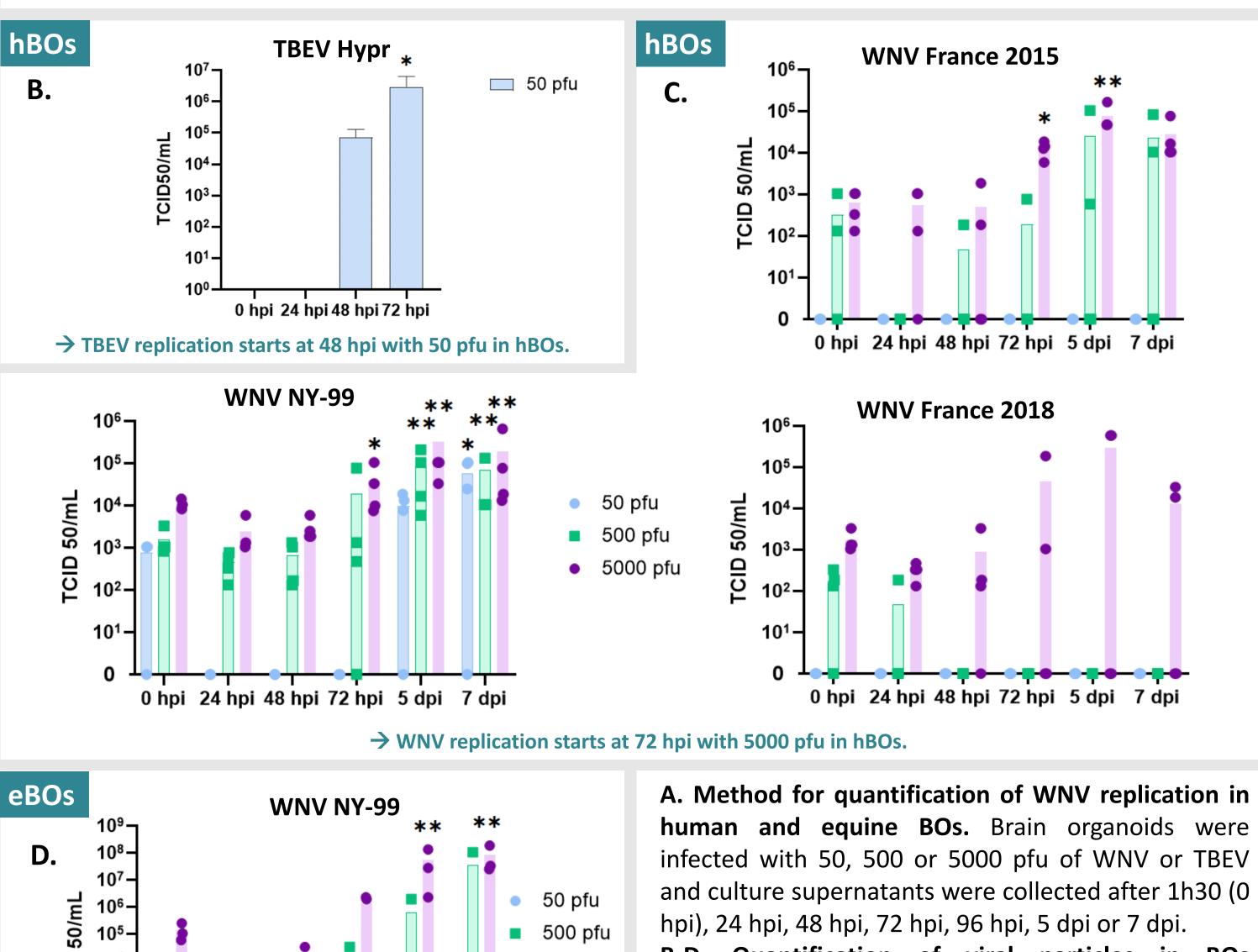




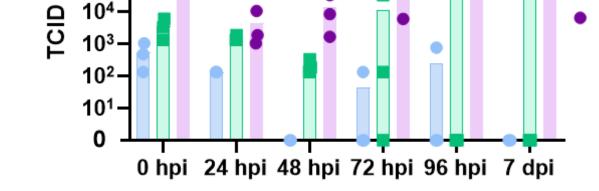

TAKE-HOME MESSAGES

- Identification of antiviral compounds with a high predictive value of therapeutic efficiency in *vivo* may require relevant 2D/3D *in vitro* pathological models.
- In order to mimic the tissue organization of the brain, 3D BOs structures (made of cells expressing early and late cortical markers) can be used.
- hBOs are permissive to TBEV and WNV ; eBOs are permissive to WNV.

- hBOs and eBOs can be used to validate the potential of chemical compounds as antivirals.
- One molecule already used in human medicine for other indications displayed antiviral activity against TBEV in hBOs.
- 2'CMC displayed antiviral activity against WNV in eBOs.



A. Method for testing antiviral activity of molecules against TBEV and WNV in hBOs and eBOs. After +/-pretreatment with molecules, hBOs were infected with 50 pfu of TBEV and incubated for 3 days before fixation. Molecules were added before the infection (pre-treatment) or at 24 hpi or at 48 hpi. After pre-treatment with molecules, eBOs were infected with 5000 pfu of WNV and incubated for 5 days before fixation. Molecules were added again after 72 hours in some eBOs. Antiviral activity was assessed by quantification of relative viral RNA in supernatants by RT-qPCR and by quantification of viral particles in supernatants (TCID 50).

B. Dose-effect of y molecule antiviral activity. γ molecule was added at a concentration of 2 or 20 μ M, at pretreatment or at 24 hpi or at 48 hpi in hBOs supernatants.

C. Testing of the antiviral activity of three molecules. 2'-CMC, ribavirin or arbidol were added at a concentration of 10 μ M once (D0) or twice (D0+D3) in eBOs supernatants.

D. Dose-effect of 2'-CMC antiviral activity. 2'-CMC was added at a concentration of 1, 10 or 100 µM, once (D0) or twice (D0+D3) in eBOs supernatants. Histograms are the mean ± SD. *: p-value < 0.05 ; **: p-value < 0.01
