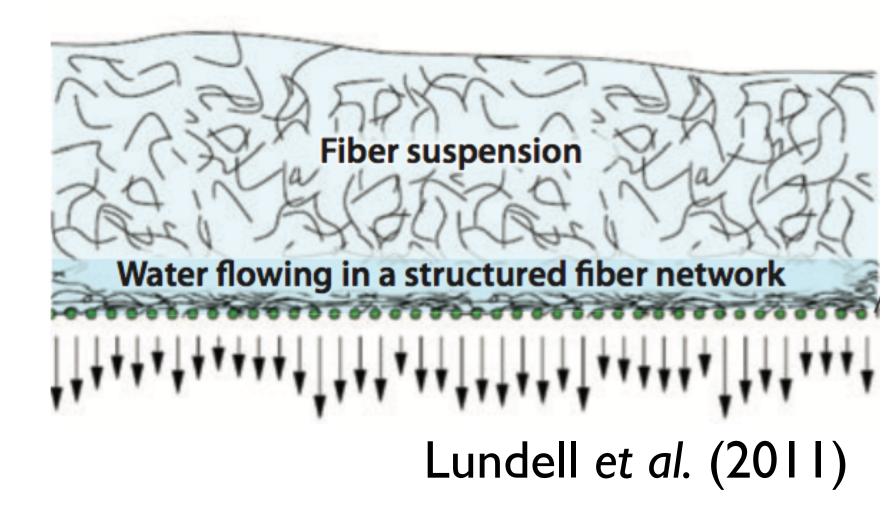

 - * flexible fibres

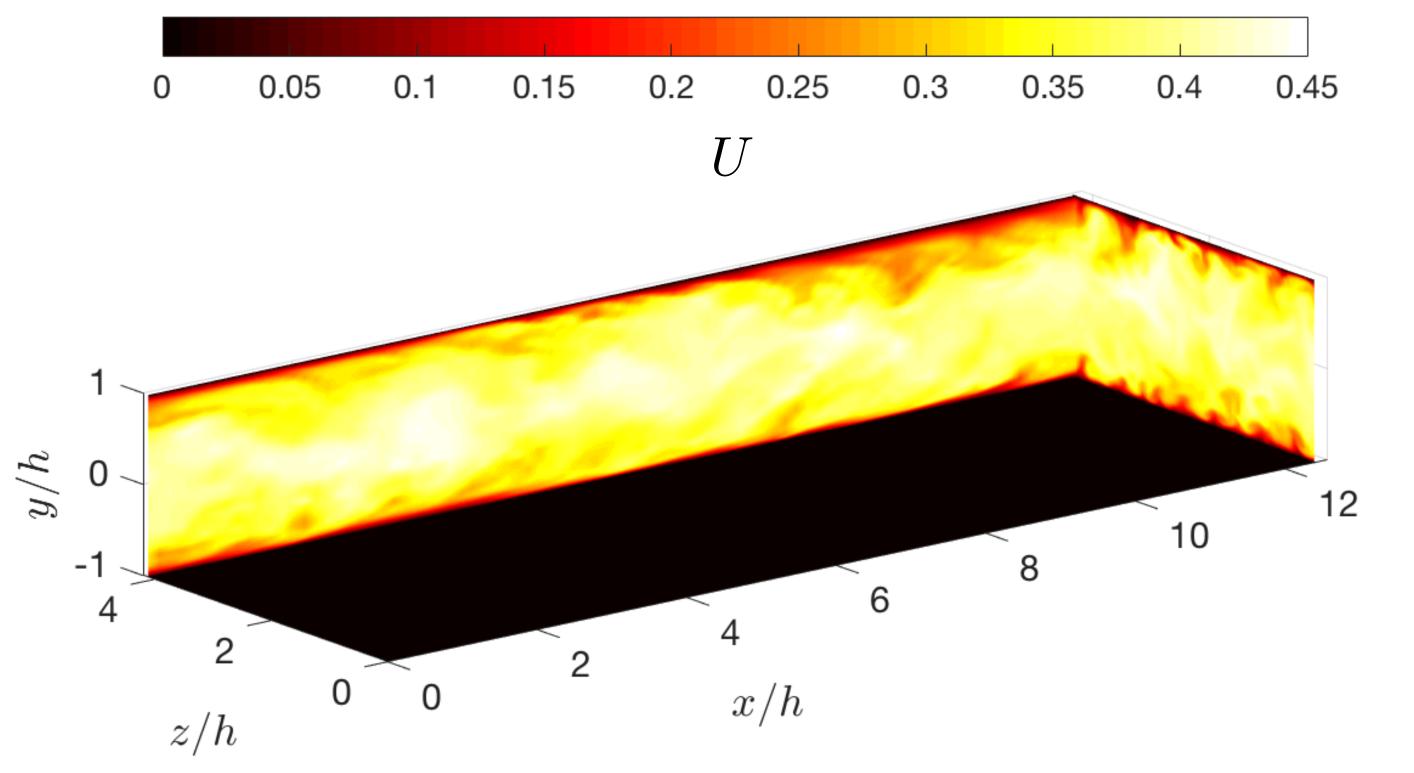

- wall-bounded turbulent flows: inhomogeneous & anisotropic
 - * rigid & short fibres (only)

=> experiments & simulations

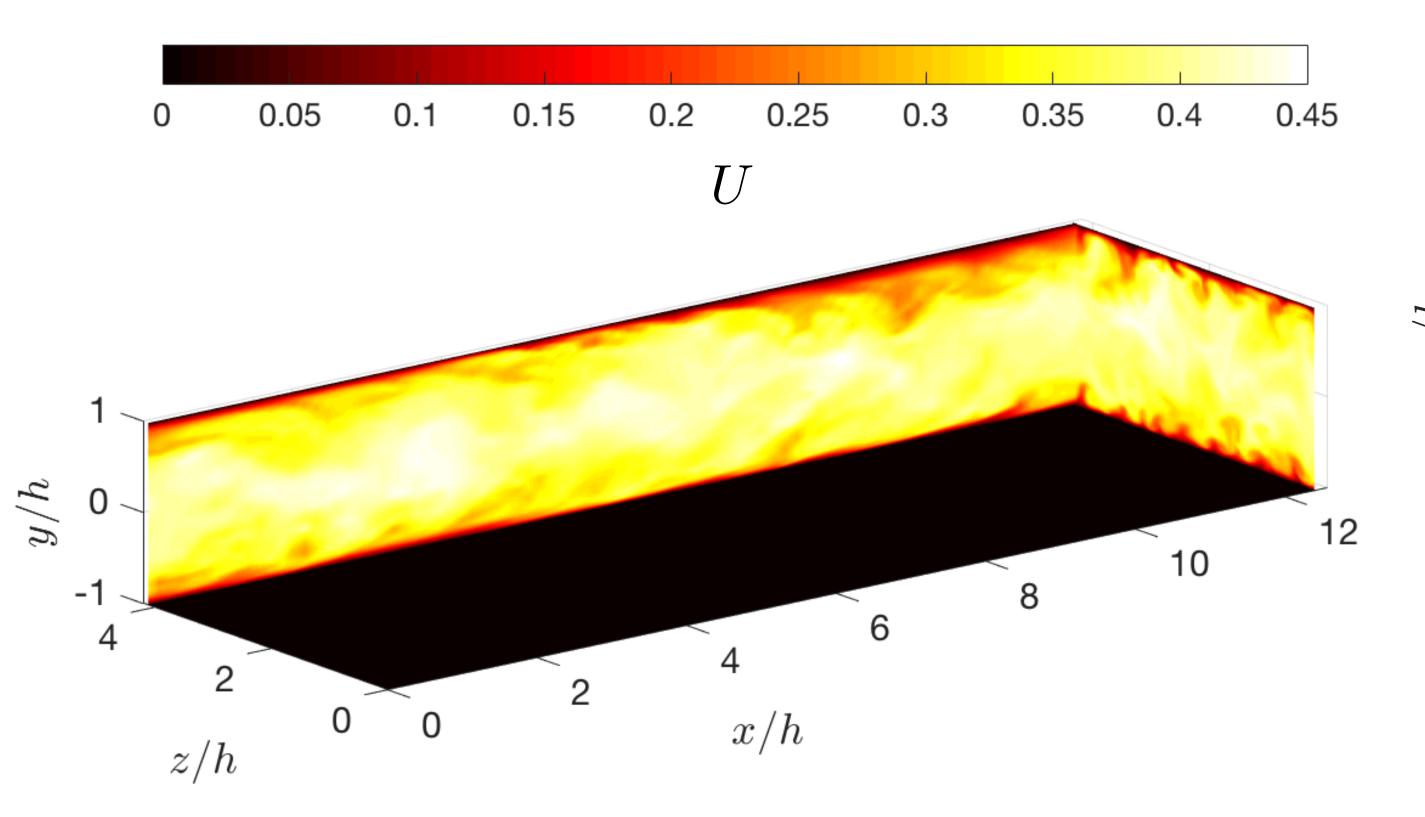
• Fluid flow:

- open-source spectral solver Channelflow 2.0
 - * $L_x \times L_y \times L_z = 4\pi h \times 2h \times 4\pi h/3$
 - * periodic boundary conditions in x and z
 - * constant bulk velocity imposed

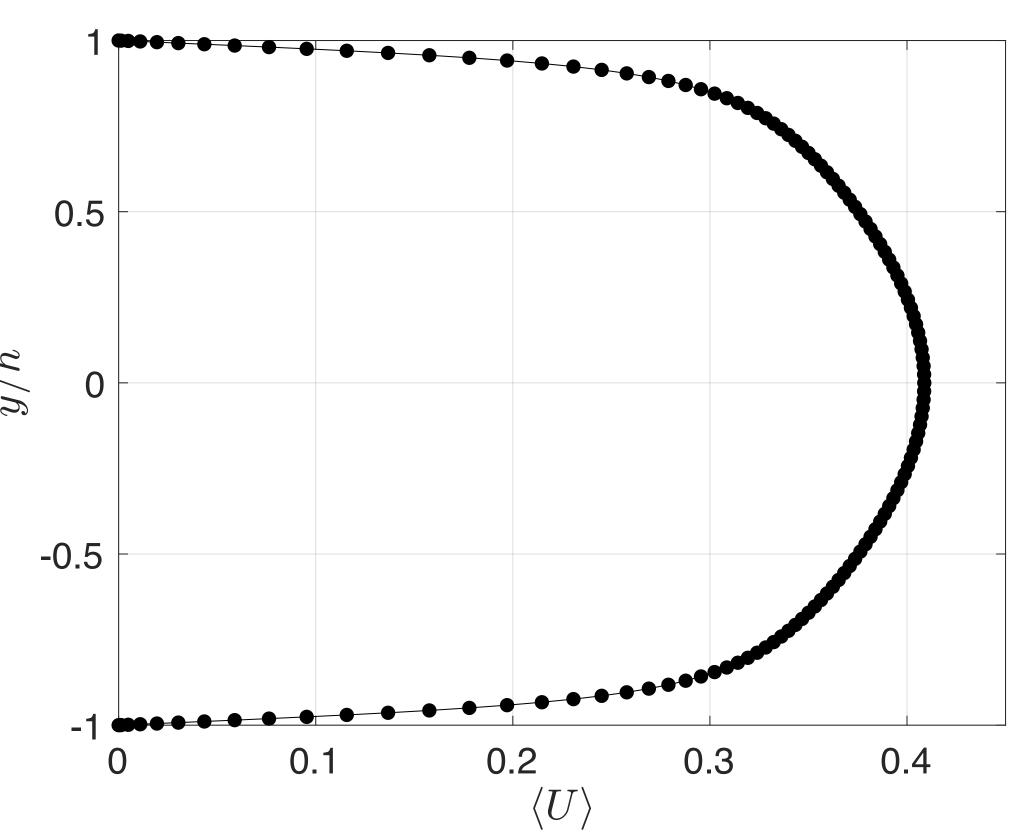

- over-damped slender-body theory: Cosserat equation for $\mathbf{X}(s,t)$

$$\partial_t \mathbf{X} = \mathbf{u}(\mathbf{X}, t) + \frac{c}{8\pi\eta} [\mathbb{I} + \partial_s \mathbf{X} \partial_s \mathbf{X}^{\top}] [\partial_s (T\partial_s \mathbf{X}) - EI\partial_s^4 \mathbf{X}]$$

with
$$|\partial_s \mathbf{X}|^2 = 1$$



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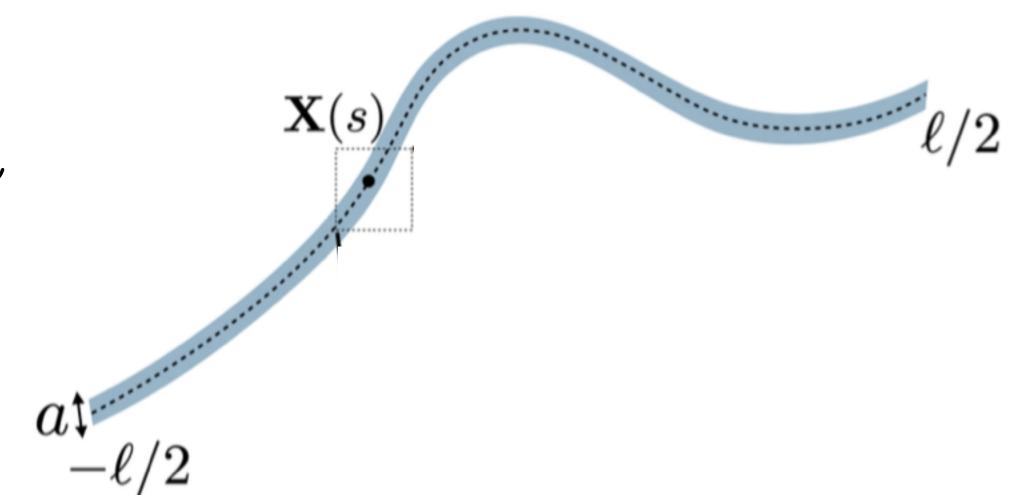
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– elastic length: $\ell_E \equiv (cEI\tau_{\nu}/(8\pi\eta))^{1/4} \approx 7.1\delta_{\nu}$



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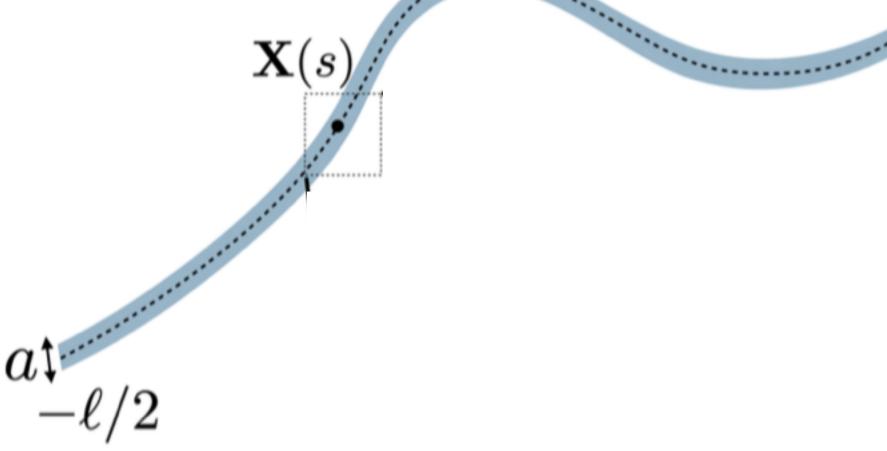
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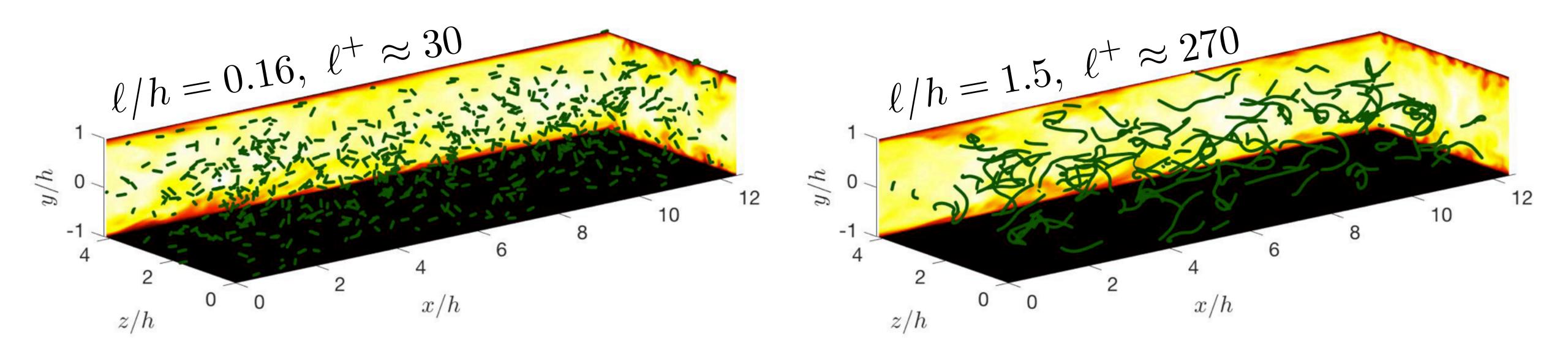
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- wall contact: soft boundary approach

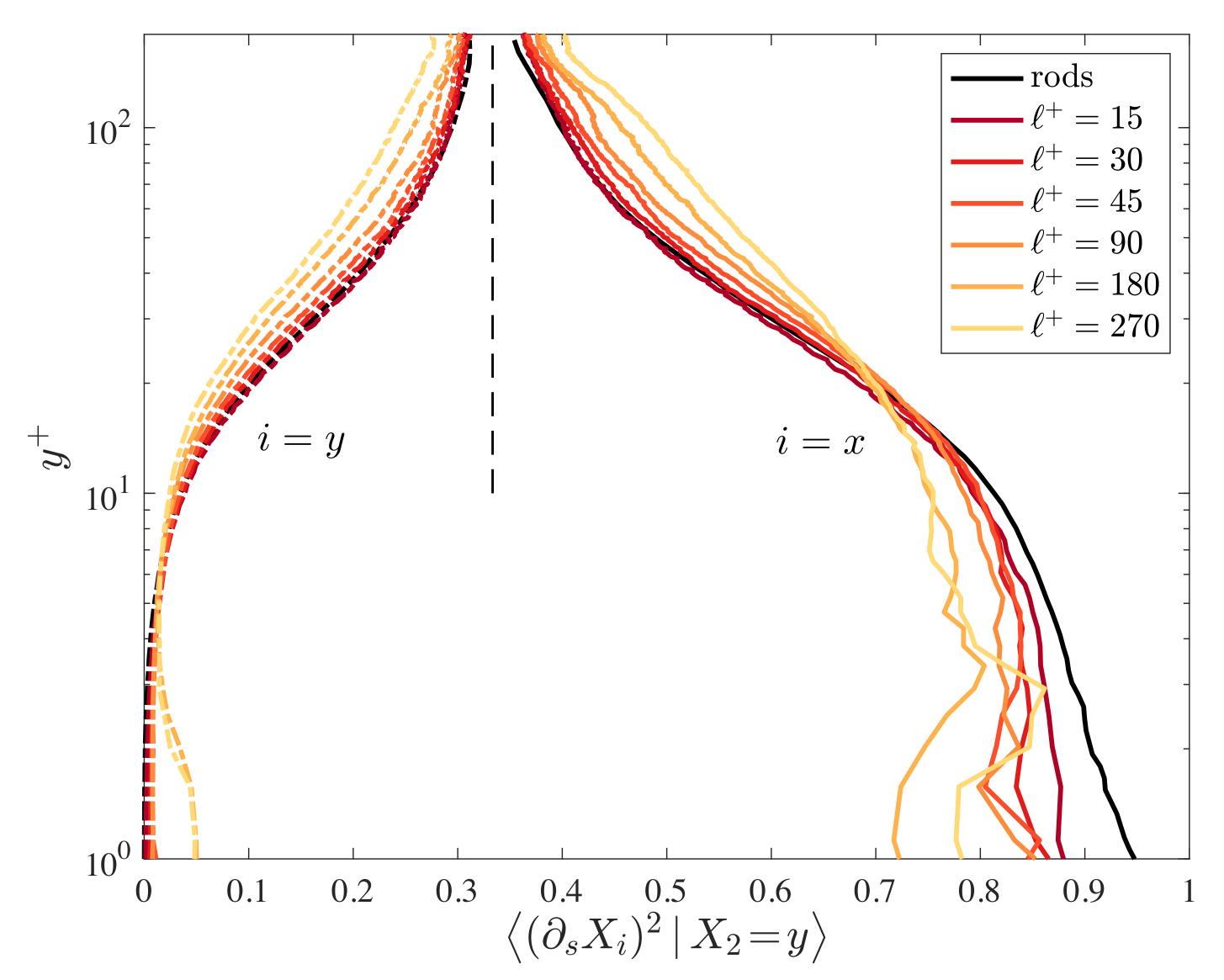


• Fibres:

- parameter space:
 - * fixed elastic length: $\ell_E^+ \approx 7.1$
 - * 6 different lengths: $\ell/h \in [0.08-1.5], \ \ell^+ \in [15-270]$ + rods



• Fibre orientation:

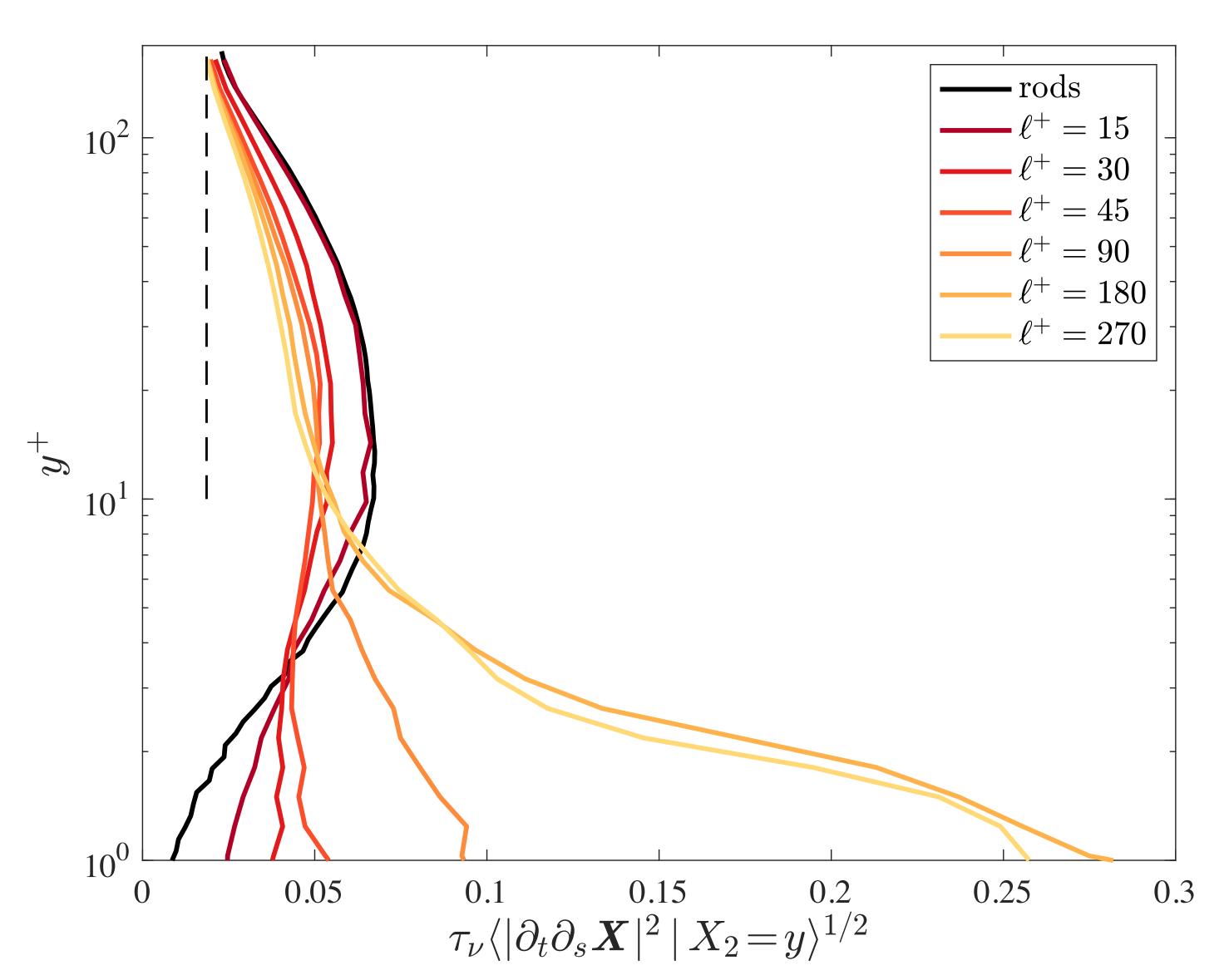


- in the centre: relatively isotropic

 close to the wall: aligned with the flow direction

- small variations with length

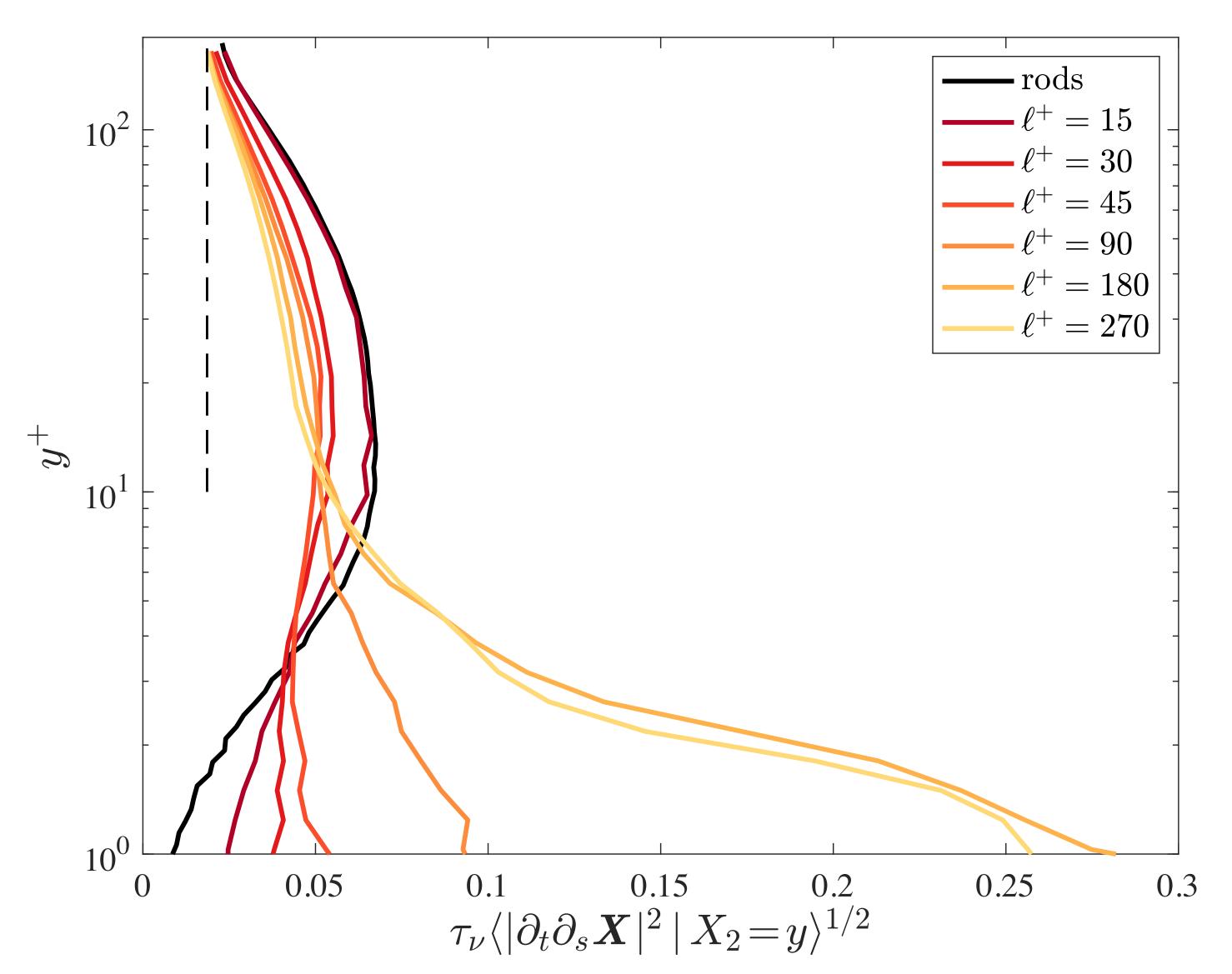
• Fibre tumbling rate:



- in the centre:
 - * mainly independent of length
 - * consistent with HIT

- close to the wall:
 - * strong variations with length
 - * the longer, the higher the rate

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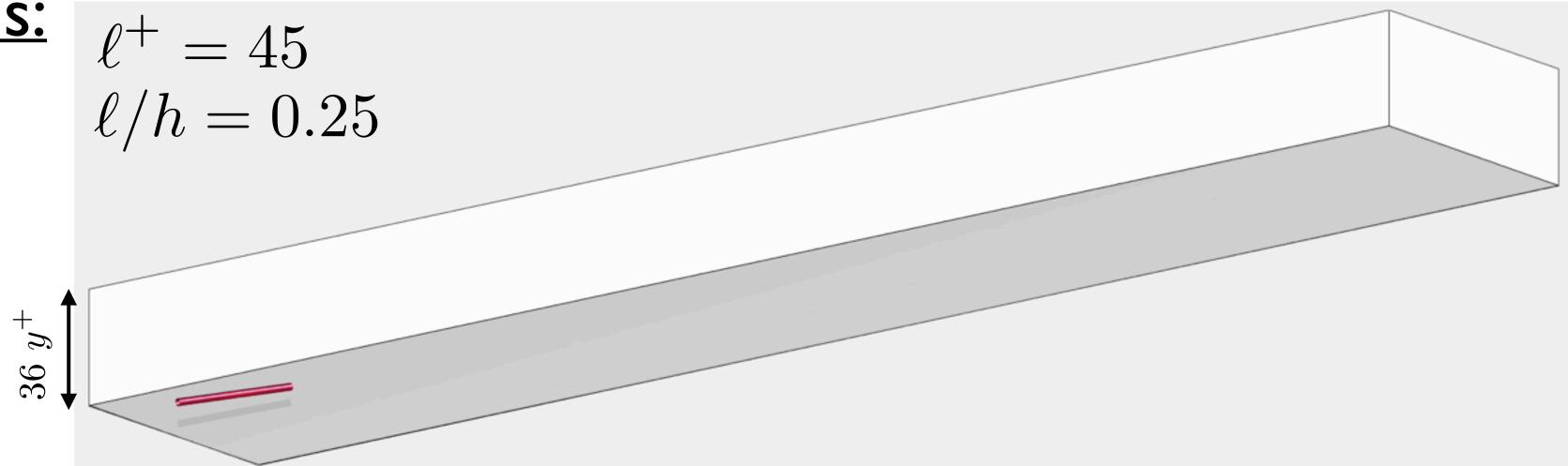
- close to the wall:
 - * strong variations with length

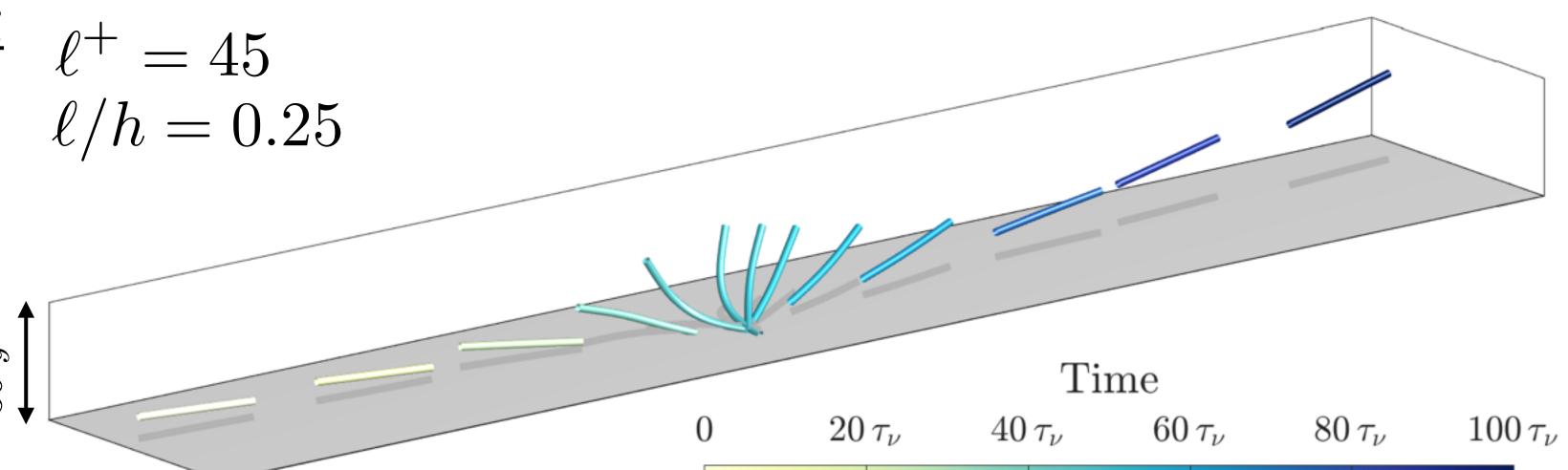
- Fibre-wall interactions:

 * "pole vaulting"

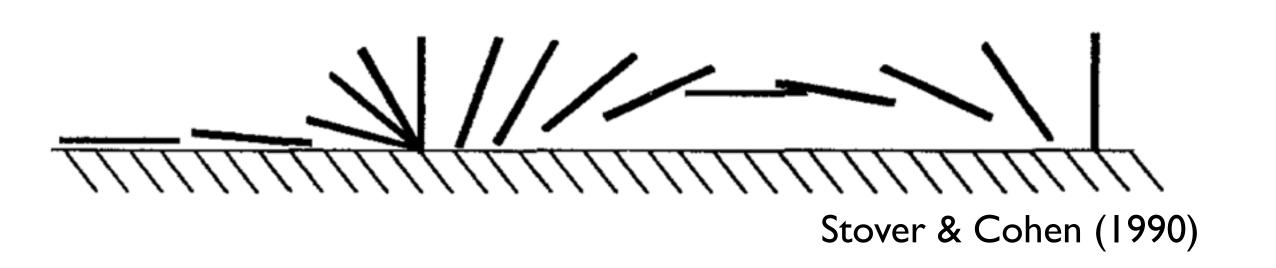

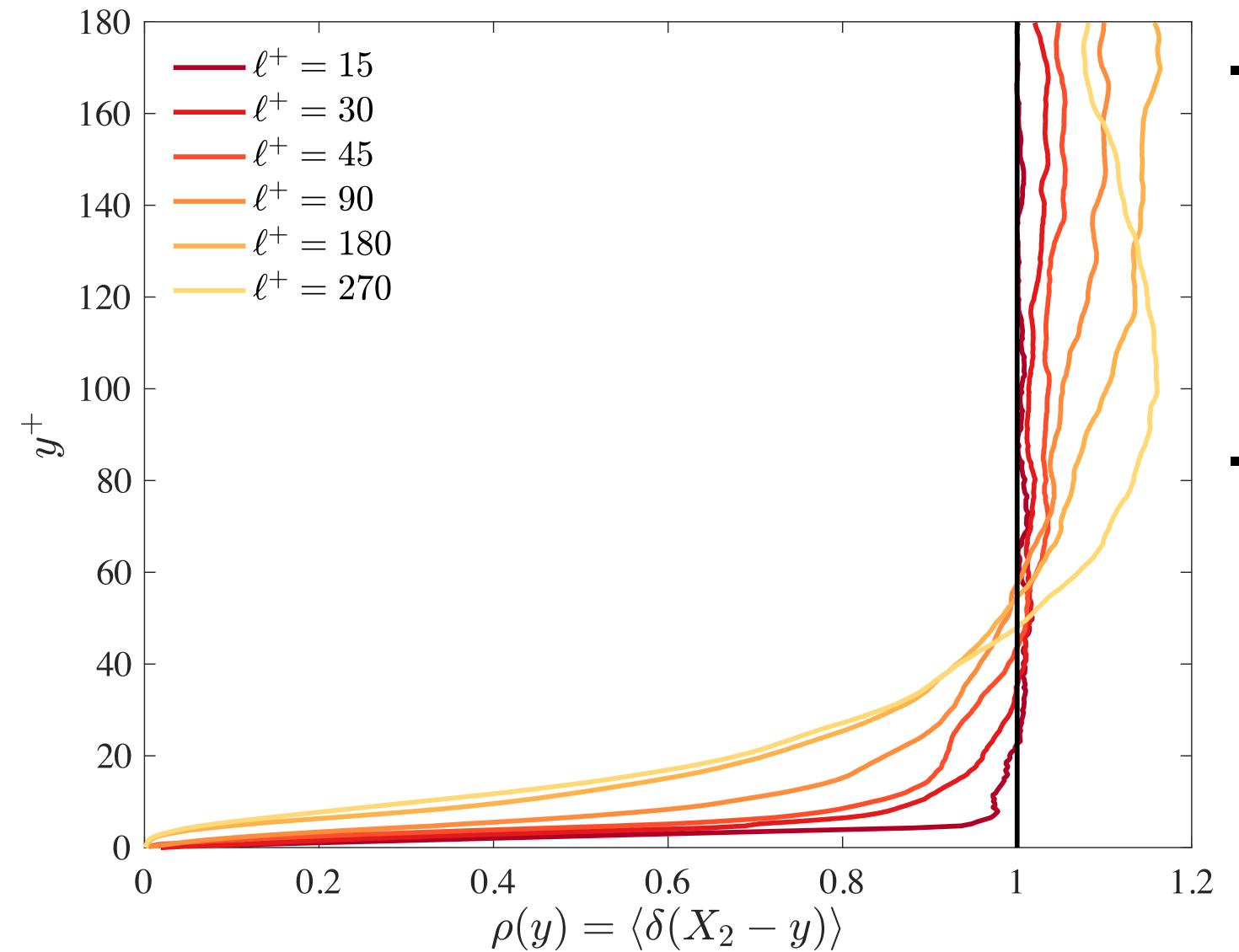
• Fibre density distribution:



- inhomogeneous distribution:
 - * higher concentration in the center
 - * depleted region close to the wall
 - * increases with fibre length

due to wall collisions?

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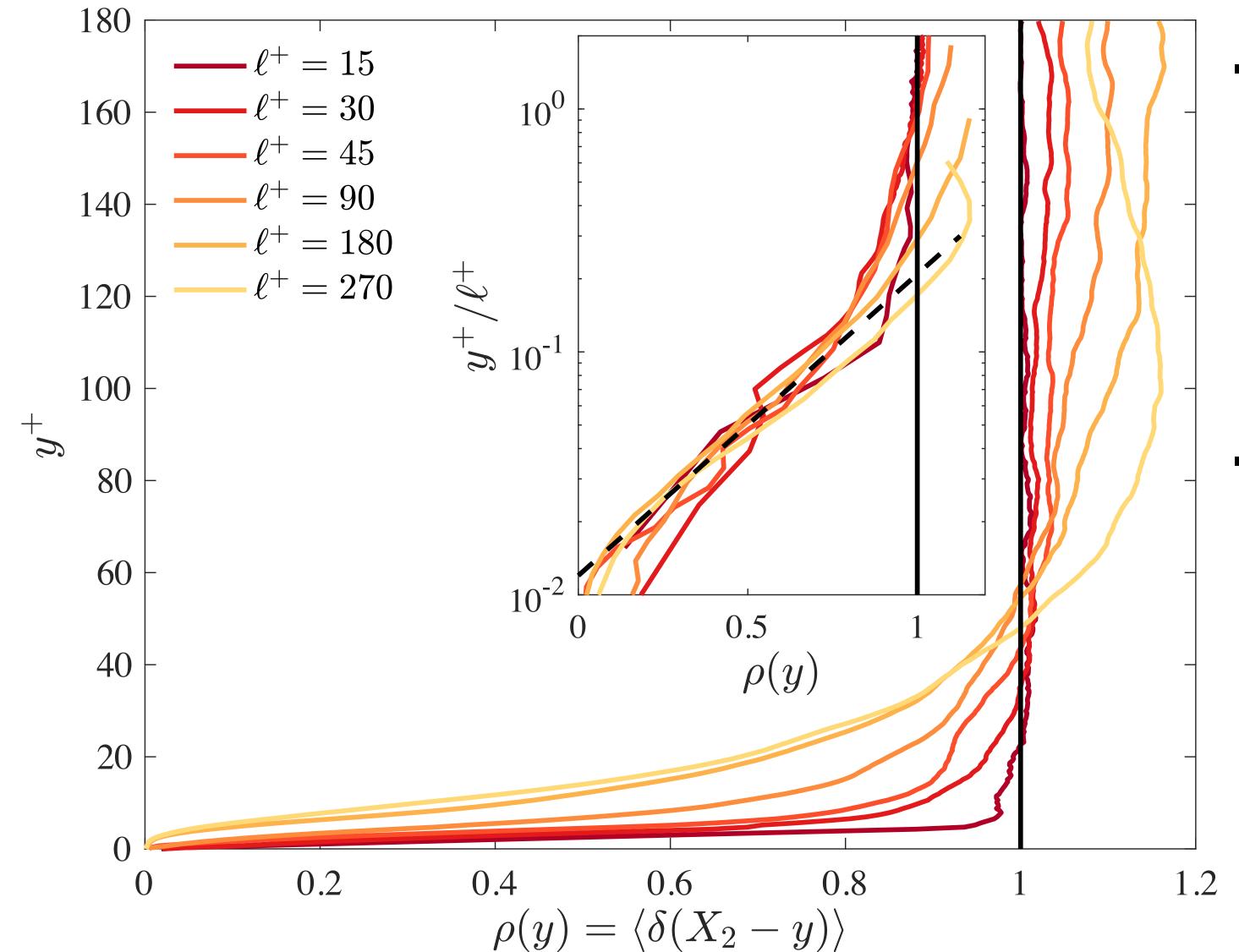


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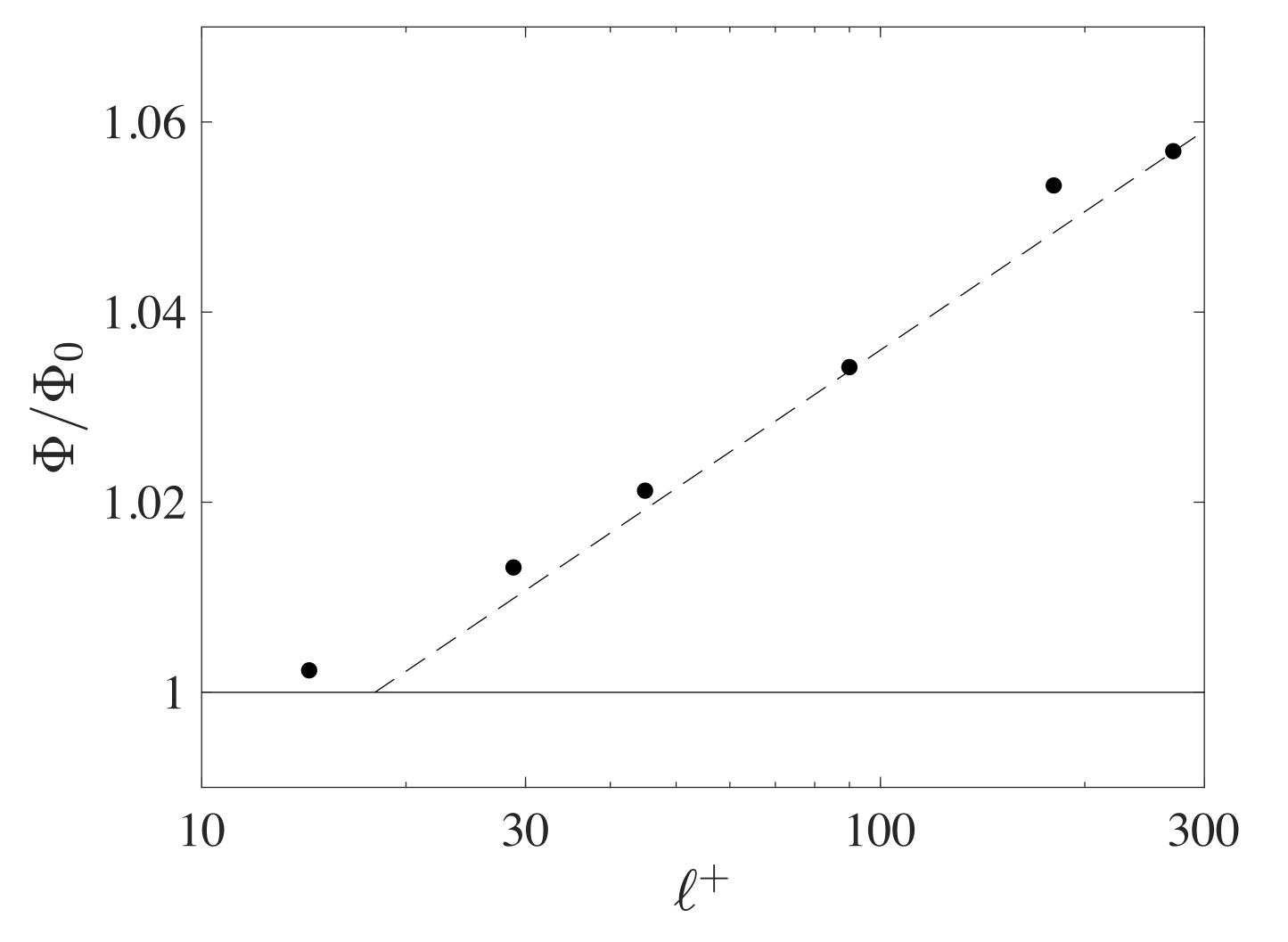


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due to wall collisions!

• Fibre net flux:



- fibres net flux Φ :
 - * velocity X concentration
 - * compared to fluid flux Φ_0
 - * increases with fibre length
- enhancement:
 - * for fibre length within the log-layer
 - * log law scaling?

effect on the flux!

Conclusions

• Main results:

- first study on long flexible fibres in turbulent channel flow
 - * numerical simulations

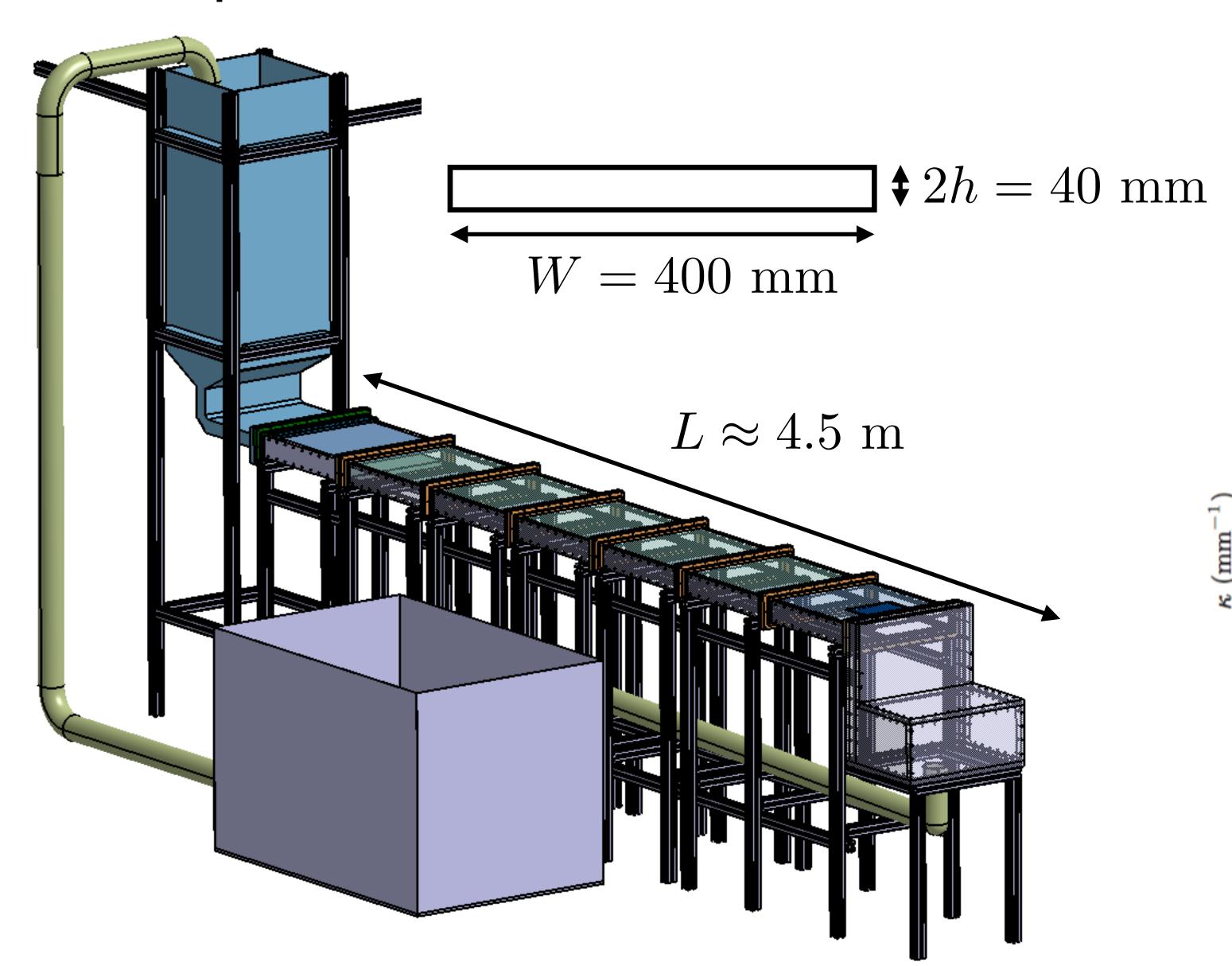
$$*\ell/h \in [0.08 - 1.5]$$

- fibre-wall collisions: "pole vaulting"
 - * high tumbling rates
 - * depleted regions
- effect on the fibre net flux:
 - * higher fibre concentration in the centre
 - * enhancement of the flux up to 6%

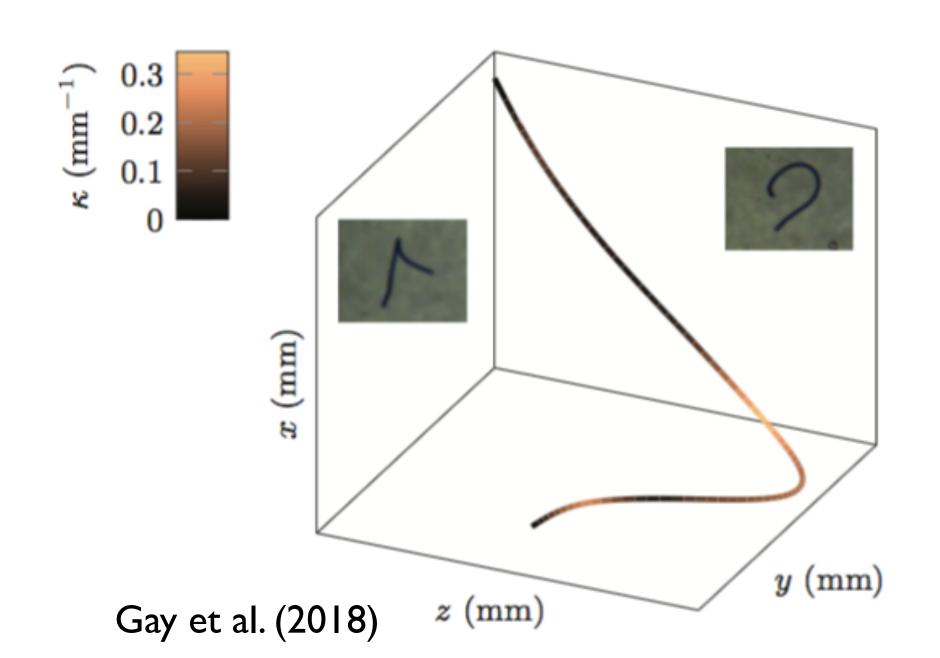

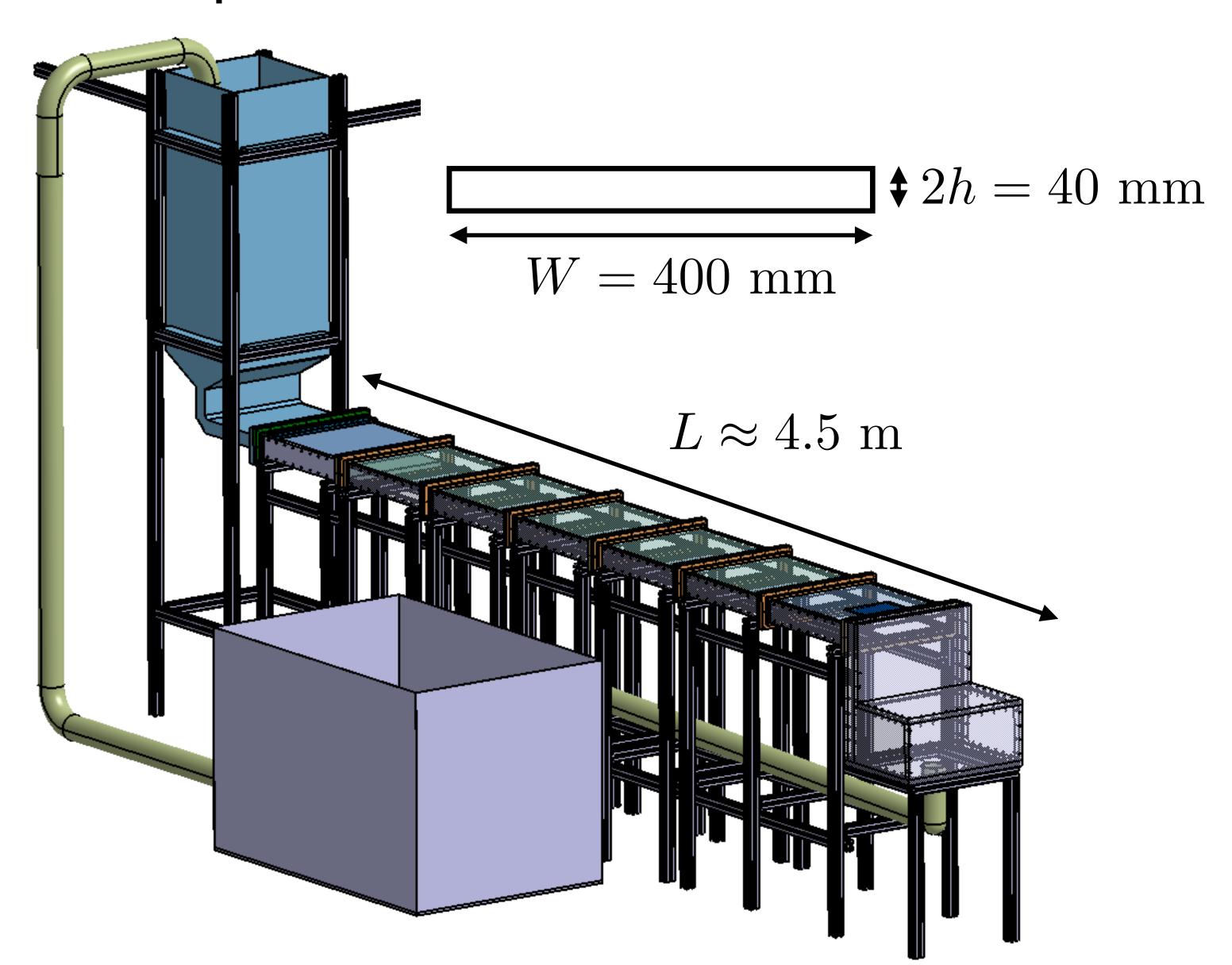

 - * discretisation in N_s points of length $\delta s^+ = l^+/N_s \approx 0.9$
 - * Cosserat equation for $\mathbf{X}(s,t)$

- Fibres:
- wall contact: soft boundary approach
- fibres are:
 - * allowed to penetrate the wall
 - * strongly repulsed by an effective force
- fluid velocity outside the domain $\mathbf{u} = (0, v, 0)$

bottom
$$\begin{cases} v = -\gamma(y+h) \\ \text{for } y < -h \end{cases}$$
 with $\gamma = 0.5/\Delta t$ top
$$\begin{cases} v = -\gamma(y-h) \\ \text{for } y > h \end{cases}$$
